Sidney Jaycees Host Montana **2023 Year End Celebration**

The Sidney Jaycees (JCI Richland County) hosted the Montana 2023 Year End Celebration at the Richland County Events Center last week. The Jaycees (Junior Chamber International USA) is a nonprofit organization that grows young leaders for community involvement. Nationwide the Jaycees currently have approximately 6,000 members with a worldwide membership of 150,000 in over 100 countries. The last statewide Jaycees event hosted in Sidney was the mid-year election conference in 2022.

Nathan Martin, 2023 JCI USA national president, was in attendance for the event. Martin traveled from his home state of Hawaii to participate in the Montana 2023 Year End Celebration. "The same impact we have in Sidney we are doing all across the globe," Martin said. Every chapter has done things a little differently around the world. "We all have the same mission, our same vision. We just develop our leaders in a little bit different ways. Some of our chapters might be more on the business entrepreneurial side of things. A lot of our chapters, especially in the U.S., are more on the community impact."

A total of five out of the six chapters throughout the state were in attendance at the event. Approximately 30 members from the Central chapter (Lewistown), Billings, Miles City, Havre and Richland County participated. The Dillon chapter was unable to attend due to a conflict with one of the chapter's local events.

Friday's activities included completions for members to showcase their leadership abilities. These competitions included write up and speak up competitions as well as a fun activity called Jaycee Jeopardy. On Saturday, the activities began with a business meeting with the 2024 board of directors and updates from the state and national levels of the organization followed by updates on each chapter's plans for the first half of the year.

Addressing his property tax task force at the group's first formal meeting Wednesday, Gov. Greg Gianforte had two big messages: Figure out how to bring some permanent tax relief to Montana homeowners - and don't do it by recommending

a statewide sales tax.

"As we and all Montanans know too well, property taxes are too high. That's why we're here - Montana homeowners need relief," Gianforte said, detailing a list of goals that includes

slowing how fast property taxes are growing and making it easier for the public to understand how they're

"And we must do all of this without imposing a statewide sales tax. Period," the governor added.

The 23-member group of lawmakers, local government officials and fiscal policy experts was named by the Republican governor last month, a response to widespread concern about rising property taxes following last year's reappraisal cycle, which reflected the dramatic

increase in home prices that Montana saw through the COVID-19 pandemic.

An analysis by Montana Free Press found that property taxes rose on median by 21% on residential properties this year, driven partly by historic home value growth that has transferred tax burden onto residences from other types of properties. That analysis also found that tax bills decreased this year for many industrial properties owned by large businesses.

Local Government Review On Richland County **Primary Ballot**

In accordance with the constitution of the State of Montana, local governing bodies in Richland County have voted to place the question of conducting a local government review and establishing a study commission to do so, on the primary ballot June 4, 2024.

Section 9, Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Montana requires that each unit of local government shall conduct an election once every ten years to determine whether the local government will undertake a local government review procedure.

The City of Sidney passed resolution #3928 asking voters to vote for or against the review of the government of Sidney and the establishment and funding not to exceed \$31,000, of a local government study commission consisting of three members to examine the government of the City of Sidney and submit recommendations on the government. The town of Fairview passed a similar resolution with a dollar amount not to exceed \$1500 and Richland County passed resolution #2024-04 with dollars not to exceed \$120.258.

All registered voters will vote for Richland County. Sidney residents will also vote for Sidney; Fairview voters will also vote for Fair-

Should voters choose a government review of their local entity, a study commission comprised of three members would be elected in the general election to conduct the review. The dollar amounts each entity chose would be paid for with an additional tax.

The review would not be an investigation into any potential wrongdoing by the entities but rather a review of the makeup of each one.

Violet was born on Sept. 8, 1927, at home on a farm near Sidney, MT, the youngest of seven children to Niels Peter Oversen and Julia Marie (Christensen) Oversen.

She would smile and tell stories of when she was very young and babysat the Bosshard girls. Then, while still a young girl attending Ridgelawn School, she would walk home and tackle the chores, caring for livestock and toting firewood to the house, among many other jobs. Not a burden, just something that needed to be done. Later, after the family relocated to a farm in Savage, she told of how she and the Kimball girls would short hoe sugar beets on their knees and then hand top those same beets in the fall and load them by shovel on the wagons as teenagers. She worked many jobs in her lifetime to support her family. She worked the lunch counters at Woolworth, Lalonde Hotel, Ben Franklin, and others. She was a nurse's aide at the Sidney Hospital and Nursing Home. All through life, she was a masterful sewer, from making western shirts for her older brothers when young to clothing and dresses for her children and others. Some very happy years came when she worked as a seamstress for the Dasinger Brothers Cleaners. After finally retiring, she still kept sewing at home. Even while recovering from a broken hip and replacement surgery, she insisted on crocheting many stocking caps for gifts to the SHC newborns.

Her older brothers and sister were very close, and they often visited and got together. Overheard conversations usually centered around the youthful antics of farm children with vivid imaginations. Eventually they all grew up and got older and wiser.

After graduating from Savage High School in 1945, she naturally went to work. Eventually in 1946, she met and married Allan Ronningen and to that marriage were six children: Ron (Betty) Ronningen, Billings, MT; Donna (Keith) Nelson, Savage, MT; Herb Ronningen, Colstrip, MT (deceased);, Bob (Janice) Ronningen, St Augustine, FL, Judy Church, Billings, MT; and Gene Ronningen, Savage, MT.

They farmed north of Sidney and eventually settled in Savage, MT. Later in their lives, Violet and Allan divorced. Violet kept anchored in Savage and lived there most of her life until deteriorating health and mobility led her to the Extended Care Facility in Sidney, MT.

Mom is survived by all her children, excluding Herb; her dear sister-in-law Lorna Oversen, Laurel, MT; 14 grandchildren, 35 great-grandchildren, 2 great-great-grandchildren

and numerous nieces and nephews. Violet was preceded in death by her parents; twin 2 month old brothers Herbert and Robert (whooping cough 1918), Brorson, MT; siblings Herb (1943), Savage, MT; Robert (Lorna) (1996), Laurel, MT; Rose Considine, Savage, MT (2001); and Donald (2014), Miles City, MT; her son, Herb in 1993 which devastated her; grandson Daniel Church; granddaughter Robyn; and many brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law and cousins. 





Property Tax Task Force...

charge for the task force, spelled out in an executive order, asks the group to compile recommendations that could translate into legislation when the Montana Legislature meets next year. That's the same approach his administration took with a 2022 housing task force, which built bipartisan political support for a suite of bills passed last year to promote longterm housing affordability by reining in local government development restrictions in an effort to make it easier and cheaper to build new homes.

Wednesday's property tax task force meeting, the first held in public following training sessions intended to get members on the same page about the intricate workings of the state's tax system, was focused primarily on agreeing on a list of challenges the group would like to address.

Once the governor bowed out of the meeting following his initial remarks, that brainstorming effort produced a wide-ranging discussion, touching on everything from the tax implications of large industrial taxpayers shutting down operations to the difficulty non-tax-expert homeowners often have trying to understand how their property tax bills square with local government budgets.

Several task force members also expressed an interest in exploring ways to ensure the tax system differentiates between residential properties used as full-time homes, as opposed to those used as second homes or Airbnb-style short-term rentals.

"We traditionally think of residential as those things we wish to encourage, which is home ownership and long-term rental affordability," said Rep. Llew Jones, R-Conrad. "How do we sort through the residential mix so we target the actual relief to those folks we hope to target?"

Also among their key considerations, several members said, was what Department of Revenue Director Brendan Beatty termed "squeezing the balloon" — that is, the reality that cutting taxes for homeowners will push taxes onto other payers like farms, stores or industrial properties if that reduction isn't offset by new revenue from someplace else.

Gianforte and legislative Republicans have argued in recent years that higher property taxes are fundamentally driven by rising local government spending — an assertion that typically draws vigorous pushback from city and county officials. Several task force members suggested Wednesday that they're interested in revisiting the existing state law that in theory caps how fast local government tax collections can grow to half the average rate of inflation. That cap, task

force members noted, puts city and county governments in a bind when the cost of buying equipment and paying wages rises at the full rate of inflation. In some cases, they said, local governments have resorted to circumventing the cap by funding programs with technically-non-tax property assessments — a state of affairs that further muddies what's happening with public collections.

Despite the governor's pronouncement that a sales tax is off the table, the initial task force conversation did veer into sales tax territory. Member Sandra Vasecka, who also serves on the Missoula City Council, wondered aloud at one point in the meeting whether it would be possible for the state to replace property taxes with sales taxes.

A sales tax could lighten the tax load on permanent residents by collecting more taxes from tourists. It also would theoretically diversify the state's tax base so it's less likely that an unexpected turn of events — say, a sudden economic downturn that devastates income tax collections - could blow a hole in public budgets. Montana is also one of only five states nationally that doesn't have a statewide sales tax.

As such, the sales tax option is routinely discussed as a reasonable possibility by budget-minded analysts and lawmakers. The conventional wisdom in the State Capitol, however, is that the idea is unpopular enough with the Montana public to make it a political non-starter.

Additionally, as Jones noted in response to Vasecka, the Montana Constitution was amended in the 1990s to cap any future statewide sales tax adopted by the Legislature at 4%. Jones said models run by the Legislature have indicated that cap limits how much a Montana-wide sales tax could collect to the point that the Legislature couldn't replace all the money currently raised by property taxes.

The property tax task force plans to meet monthly, in addition to dividing some of its work into subcommittees focused on education funding, local government finance and tax equity. It has a deadline of Aug. 15 to submit a report to the governor.

Sidney farmer Devin Bell earned a spot with the top soybean growers in the country in the Go for the Gold Soybean Yield Contest sponsored by Golden Harvest Soybeans. His test plot of 20 acres of Golden Harvest soybean GH 0502XF vielded 69.51 bushels per acre, about two bushels more than his other varieties. "It was the highest yields I've ever had," Bell said. He farms about 250 acres of soybeans on irrigated land.


Farmers Choice, which is new to the area and sells Golden Harvest seed, approached Bell about trying their soybean seed. He is


pleased that he did, as the results were better than expected. The win also brings a trip to Americas largest farmer-led, farmer-focused agricultural show in the country, the 2024 Commodity Classic, in Houston the end of February. Bell is looking forward to visiting with the vendors and attending seminars to extend his educational knowledge in commodity crops.

Bell says he was born into a farming family, went to college in Iowa for an Ag degree, then returned to join his parents Raymond and Trish Bell in the farming business. He has been farming in partnership with his father

Biebers Awarded 2nd Prize at National Wheat Yield Contest

Local farmers, Justin Bieber, and his dad, Jeff, have been looking to increase profitability on their 1700 acres of irrigated farmland since the closure of the Sidney Sugars plant ended decades of sugar beet growing. The three primary crops they now raise are corn, wheat, and soybeans. Looking to increase yields, Justin delved into various varieties of wheat. The duo settled on WestBred Wheat 9719 due to its proven high yield and good standability.

That variety, with increased nitrogen, and trying some new farming practices, yielded 109.33 bushels per acre, which was an excellent bump in yields. It also earned the Biebers second place at the National Wheat Contest and a trip to the 2024 Commodity Classic in late February in Houston, TX, where they will be honored along with other winShow banquet. Jeff said that theirs was the first entry from this area in the contest, but many farmers have grown over 100 bushels per acre over the years.

The contest field seed was pre-treated with a fungicide/insecticide treatment and the field was fall fertilized prior to planting on the previous year's soybean field. Typically, their fertilizer rates for nitrogen are 150-160 units broadcast in the fall. The trial field had 160 units of nitrogen on it. Then, after tillering, during jointing, they used a sprayer with stream bars on it to apply 20 gallons per acre of 28%, which is the equivalent of 60 more units of nitrogen. This was applied on about half the field so that half had a total of 220 units of applied nitrogen. Justin said that one benefit of waiting to apply in season is that the wheat plant will not tiller as much as

if the nitrogen was applied before planting. By waiting until tillering was completed. the plant focuses on making grain instead of making a bigger plant. The difference in the two halves of the field was remarkable with the half receiving the extra nitrogen taking on a fuller, darker, healthier look.

The real test came when the combine entered the field. The first half with the 160 units of nitrogen yielded 90 bushels per acre, so it was running better than Bieber's average yields just from switching to a West-Bred variety. When they entered the test half of the field with 220 units of nitrogen, the yield monitor in the combine showed a definite increase in bushels per acre. Documentation is required to enter the National Wheat Yield Contest, so Leslie Tveit was recruited to certify that the acres were measured correctly, and the combine

and truck were empty before starting the trial. The truck was then weighed at the elevator to verify the production. Thank you, Leslie for the help

The final yield was 109 bushels per acre, which was a 20-bushel bump. Test weight was in the 60-lb. range, with protein around 14. After penciling out all the costs the extra nitrogen provided an additional return of \$76 per acre in a cash rent scenario!

The Biebers said they entered the National Wheat Yield Contest to prove that WestBred wheat seed could generate a yield of 100 bushels or more since it's critical that farmers receive as high of a return as possible, enabling them to keep wheat in the rotation on their farm as a profitable option. The second was to prove the value of stream barring the nitrogen on in-season. The goal is to increase profitability by having the farm produce 100 plus bushels of wheat per acre every year.

Biebers are sharing their information since all the former beet growers are under the same conditions. "We are all trying to find cropping options and newto-the-area farming practices to maximize returns to the farm," Jeff said. Sharing

information and trial data is a proven way to shorten the learning curve.

Justin is entering his second year as a dealer for West Bred. Anyone interested in seeing these and other irrigated and dryland strip trial results is welcome to call him at 406-489-2188.


Initial Private Applicator Training March 5-6







USDA Releases 2022 Census Of Agriculture Data Agritourism

Agricultural statistics provided down to the county level

munications Officer Helena - The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) has announced the results of the 2022 Census of Agriculture, spanning more than 6 million data points about America's farms and ranches and the people who operate them down to the county level. The information collected directly from producers shows a decrease in the total number of Montana farms. The data shows an increase in the number of new and beginning (operating 10 or fewer years on any farm) as well as young (under the age of 35) producers in Montana. The full Census of Agriculture report as well as publication dates for additional ag census data products can be found at nass.usda.gov/ AgCensus. Ag census data can also be found in NASS's searchable online database. Quick Stats.

"We are pleased to provide updated Census of Agriculture data to all those who serve U.S. agriculture, especially the producers who gave their time to complete the questionnaire. Census of Agriculture data tell a story. This comprehensive snapshot every five years helps data users to see trends, shifts in the industry over time, and helps producers do business," said NASS Administrator Hubert Hamer. "Overall, though there are always changes across U.S. agriculture, the data remain largely consistent with the previous ag census. Data users will also notice some new data on the topics of hemp, precision agriculture, and internet access."

Ag census data provides a valuable insight into demographics, economics, land use, and activities on Montana farms and ranches such as:

- There were 24,266 farms and ranches in Montana, down 10.3% from 2017 on 57.6 million acres a decrease of 1%.
- Family-owned and operated farms accounted for 92.8% of all Montana farms and operated 80% of land in farms.
- Montana farms and ranches produced \$4.54 billion in agricultural products, up from \$3.52 billion in 2017. The majority (55%) of the sales were from crop sales. The grains, oilseeds, dry beans, and dry peas category led with 43.0% of all sales, followed by cattle (38.6%). With farm production expenses of \$4.36 billion, Montana farms had net cash income of \$1.14 billion. Average farm income rose to \$46,889.
- 83.6% of Montana farms had internet access in 2022, a slight increase from 81.4% in 2017. However, 78.7% of farms and ranches

across the United States had internet access.

 A total of 2,544 Montana farms and ranches used renewable energy producing systems compared to 2.555 farms in 2017. Nearly all the Montana farms (85%) with renewable energy systems reported using solar

- In 2022, 931 Montana farms sold directly to consumers, with sales of \$15.7 million. Value of sales increased .3% from 2017.
- · The 1,080 farms with sales of \$1 million or more were 4.5% of Montana farms and represented 98.7% of sales and government payments. The 13,723 Montana farms (57%) with sales of \$50,000 or less accounted for 2.6% of sales and government payments in Montana.
- · The average age of all Montana producers was 59.3. The average age in 2017 was 58.2 years.
- There were 11.724 Montana farmers with 10 or fewer years of experience, an increase in the number of beginning farmers from 2017 of 7%. Beginning farmers in Montana are younger than all farmers, with an average age of 46.9.
- · The number of Montana producers under age 35 was 3,689, comprising 8% of all Montana producers.
- · In 2022, 17,830 female producers accounted for 40% of all Montana producers, compared to

36% of all U.S. producers. Sixty-seven percent of all Montana farms had at least one female decision maker.

"The 2022 Census of Agriculture can be used to help communicate the story surrounding Montana agriculture as it stands today and its pace of rapid change," said Montana Department of Agriculture Director Christy Clark. "This data helps farmers and ranchers make vital decisions on their operations as well as helping direct us as a department towards providing top tier support to our producers through our programs and services."

The national response rate for the 2022 Census of Agriculture was 61%; more than 40% of responses were submitted online. Montana's response rate for the 2022 Census of Agriculture was 59.3%; more than 40% of responses were submitted online. First conducted in 1840 in conjunction with the decennial Census and conducted since 1997 by USDA NASS, the federal statistical agency responsible for producing official data about U.S. agriculture, the Census of Agriculture remains the most comprehensive agricultural data for every state and county in the nation.

Help Keep Montana Free Of Wild Pigs

Wild pigs/feral swine are swine that have either escaped or were released intentionally, creating free-ranging swine populations. Wild pigs/feral swine can be found in 38 states with an estimated population of over six million animals. Wild pigs/feral pigs are also found in Canadian provinces bordering Montana. Prolific breeders, they can produce four to eight babies per litter. Wild pigs/feral pigs are highly adaptable, but prefer habitats with an abundant supply of water and dense cover. They are aggressive



cal, economic, and health

Currently, there are no known wild pig populations in Montana.

Wild pigs/feral swine harbor diseases (swine brucellosis, pseudorabies, tuberculosis, and others) and parasites, which can impact the livestock industry. Wild pigs/feral swine most commonly carry brucella suis and can cause false positive test in cattle for brucellosis and require temporary quarantine and operation interruption. They also carry zoonotic diseases and parasites that pose a risk to humans. Wild pigs/feral swine can and will cause extensive damage by fouling water sources for native wildlife, livestock, and humans. They

will consume and jeopardize native wildlife and plants and compete for food and habitat resources with native animals. Rooting by wild pigs/feral swine causes erosion and can compromise sensitive ecosystems as well as render some areas im-

passable for farm machinery. Wild pigs/feral swine will prey on the young of livestock and wildlife such as kids, lambs, deer fawns, and ground-nesting birds.

Due to their reproductive efficiency, and movement behavior, wild pigs/ feral swine cannot be eradicated by simple hunting practices. Hunting pressure that fails to eliminate all animals in a group (sounder) can result in further dispersion of animals. Wild pigs/ feral swine that have experienced hunting pressure become more difficult to hunt and are harder to eradicate.

In the state Montana. feral swine/wild pigs are regulated by the Department of Livestock. Montana's definition of feral swine includes animals living in an untamed or wild state, as well as swine that appear to be contained for commercial hunting or trapping. Introducing/transporting/ releasing feral swine or wild pigs in Montana is illegal. Private land owners and public land users must notify the Department of Livestock immediately following a sighting of feral swine or wild pigs. Penalties for violation of Montana law includes fines of at least \$2,000 but not more than \$10,000 for each violation.

The Montana Department of Livestock has partnered with Montana Fish, Wildlife, and Parks; USDA Wildlife Services; Montana State University Extension; Central & Eastern Montana Invasive Species Team; and the Montana Invasive Species Council on outreach efforts and response to reports of feral swine.

Wild pig/feral swine sightings must be reported within 24 hours. Reports should be made to the De-


