Subzero Temperatures Cause Water Main Break At Richland County Fairgrounds

A water service main deep within the Richland County Fairgrounds compound gave in to the extreme cold and ruptured on Monday, Jan. 15. The torrent went undiscovered until the following day.

It was a federal holiday so there was no one in the fairgrounds office to notice the drop in water pressure or water gathering on the midway. The fairgrounds were not completely deserted. Staff were in the event center, one of the buildings located on the south side of the property, cleaning up after an event over the previous weekend. The ruptured pipe was in a utility room on the back side of the bathrooms between the Sons of Norway and the 4-H food booths, on the north side of the fairgrounds. They had no way to see the destruction that was ensuing. City staff were alerted to a 500-600 gallon per minute leak occurring early on Monday afternoon, knowing a water break was probable, but were unable to locate the problem. The water department staff were out until 11 p.m. that night to find the leak, but found none. Tues-

day morning, city staff were back on the hunt. Finally, a water department staff noticed a plume of steam rising from the fairgrounds as they drove past. Fairgrounds staff were alerted to the problem when the city water department notified Josh Johnson, County Public Works, of the water leak.

Johnson shut off the water, searched the building, and soon found the room and the problem. A ball valve in the water main had broken, causing a pipe to rupture. Water had flooded the entire building, dousing a washer, dryer, water heater, and a number of outlets and light switches in water. It flowed out of the building into the grass then flowed further north to gather into a decent sized pond at the horse hotel before freezing. An indeterminable amount of water had flowed onto the midway but the three nearby drains had kept the water from gathering too much before freezing.

At the end of January the total cost of the destruction was still unknown as the known damaged valve and pipe needed to be replaced before the rest of the line could be tested for damage





and the fairgrounds staff were still waiting on parts. The City of Sidney estimates that over 600,000 gallons of water were lost in the incident.


MonDak Ag Days & Trade Show is scheduled for March 7-8 at the Richland County Event Center Sidney.

MonDak Cropping Seminar To Be Held Feb. 20

The northeast group of Montana State University (MSU) Extension Agents are planning the MonDak Cropping Seminar, formerly known as MonDak Pulse Day, for Tuesday, Feb. 20 in Wolf Point, MT. This event will feature a wide range of topics and a great lineup of speakers. The event will be held at the Elk's Lodge at 304 Main Street with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m. There is a \$20 registration fee and lunch will be included. There will be a total of four pesticide points available during the MonDak Cropping Seminar, two available in the morning and two in the afternoon. Thank you to our event sponsors, Pro-Coop Ag Center and Ag Partners, LLC.

The program will begin at 9 a.m. with Dr. Weaver, MSU professor of entomology, presenting on Wheat Stem Sawfly Integrated Pest Management. Dr. Weaver's research focuses on developing new techniques and tools for wheat stem sawfly management. At Shelley Mills will be discussing Grasshopper Management, including grasshopper biology and management strategies including cultural, mechanical, biological, and chemical at 10 a.m. Mills is the MSU Extension Valley County agriculture agent, and her areas of expertise include crop production, invasive weed management, horticulture, pesticides, beekeeping, pollinator protection, and pest and plant identification. To conclude the morning session, Tyler Tjelde, NDSU Williston Research and Extension Center (NDSU-WREC) irrigation agronomist, will present on Soybean Production in the MonDak. where he manages the Nesson Valley Irrigation Research and Development Project 25 miles east of Williston. He has worked for NDSU-WREC for 15 years and in those 15 years has done a lot of research on soybean production and continues to see expansion of soybean acres throughout the MonDak region and the important role that they have in our cropping system. He also farms and ranches in western North Dakota and soybeans have become an important rotational crop in his operation both irrigated and dryland.

Following lunch at 1 p.m. Charlie Lim will present on Herbicide Modes of Action and Injury to Crops. Lim is the NDSU Extension weed specialist at the Williston Research and Extension Center where his research is focused on weed control and integrated weed management, the mitigation of herbicide-resistant weeds, and other topics related to weeds. Wrapping up the day will be Dr. Weaver discussing Best Practices for Management of Insect Problems in Stored Grain. In addition to wheat stem sawfly, Dr. Weaver's other key research focus is on pests of crops and stored grains.





Industrial Commission Awards \$21.8 Million In Grants & \$153 Million In **Loans In Latest Clean Sustainable Energy Program Grant Round**

The North Dakota Industrial Commission, consisting of Gov. Doug Burgum, Attorney General Drew Wrigley and Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring, approved \$21.8 million in matching grants and \$153 million in loans during the latest grant round for the Clean Sustainable Energy program. The Clean Sus-

tainable Energy Program was established in 2021 to advance the commercialization of low-emissions technologies for North Dakota's energy industry and is funded by a combination of oil tax revenue and stateowned mineral royalties.

The eight approved Clean Sustainable Energy Program projects included:

· A \$7 million grant to Scranton Holding Company to support a low-carbon pig iron production facility in McLean County.

· A \$2.5 million loan to Wellspring Hydro to support an oilfield produced water recycling facility in Williams County.

· A \$3.3 million grant to the Energy and Environmental Research Center and Marathon Petroleum to support the expansion and production of sustainable aviation fuels at its Dickinson refinery.

· A \$2 million grant to Dakota Lithium for a demonstration facility producing low-carbon, long-duration lithium-ion batteries in Grand

· A \$17 million loan to Packet Digital to support its battery manufacturing facility in Fargo.

· A \$9.5 million grant and a \$8.5 million loan to Cerilon to further support construction of a natural gas-to-liquids production facility in Williams County.

Additionally, the Commission accepted the recommendation of the Clean Sustainable Energy Authority (CSEA) and approved the following fertilizer projects for forgivable loans:

· A \$50 million loan to NextEra Energy Resources for a fertilizer production facility in Stutsman County.

The fertilizer loan was authorized by House Bill 1546 during the November 2023 special session, which also directed the CSEA to forgive the loan "upon completion of construction of the fertilizer production facility." The forgiven loan will be paid from the Strategic Investments and Improvement Fund, which receives its funding from oil tax revenue and royalties from stateowned minerals.

"The projects approved represent an exciting new chapter for our state," the Commission said in a joint statement. "By leveraging state energy tax dollars and private sector investments, we can address the rising regulatory burden that our industries face while ensuring that our energy portfolio remains resilient and reliable. We commend the Clean Sustainable Energy Authority for thoroughly vetting the many great applications we received, and we thank the applicants for their investments in North Dakota."

Bozeman — Sulfur's role as an agricultural nutrient is often overlooked, but including it in soil fertility programs can positively impact crop yield, quality, and economics, according to a Montana State University Extension specialist.

Clain Jones, MSU Extension soil fertility specialist and professor in the Department of Land Resources and Environmental Sciences, said that modern phosphorus and potassium fertilizers contain less sulfur as a manufacturing byproduct than they historically did. Coupled with higher-yielding varieties and more intense cropping, leading to more sulfur being removed from fields, there is an increased chance for sulfur deficiencies. Sulfur-deficient plants are often stunted with yellow upper leaves, in contrast to yellow lower leaves, which indicates a nitrogen deficiency.

"Crops can respond to sulfur additions in a manner similar to nitrogen," Jones said,

"Sulfur, like nitrogen, is a building block for proteins. If sulfur is deficient, crops may not use nitrogen fertilizer as efficiently, resulting in less than optimum grain protein and yield. By applying sulfur and increasing the efficiency of nitrogen use, farmers can also decrease nitrate leaching and soil acidification, and possibly lower the amount of nitrogen needed."

Testing

Jones said there is no single recommended sulfur soil test as there is with nitrate. That's partly because soil sulfur availability is often highly variable across a field. Coarse-textured soils with low organic matter are the most susceptible to sulfur deficiencies. He noted that when six to 10 soil samples from across a field are mixed for laboratory analysis — which is the standard in Montana — one or two high-sulfur samples could skew the results and suggest the field doesn't need sulfur when most of it is deficient.

"Although more expensive in the short term, it can be highly beneficial to learn which parts of a field have low sulfur through 'grid sampling' instead of mixed samples," he said.

Jones recommends learning what sulfur test a laboratory uses. He said numerous soil tests are available, and each can produce very different results.

"For example, the Mehlich-3 test, which is used in midwestern and eastern states, greatly overestimates sulfur availability in higher-pH Montana soils," Jones said, "Calcium phosphate extraction tests are recommended for western soils, but other extracts might do an adequate job of assessing available sulfur, too."

In addition, Jones recommends testing sulfur fertilizer in strips within fields and conducting plant tissue sampling to learn if crops have sulfur deficiencies. Plant tissue testing should be done early in the season so that a "rescue" sulfur treatment can be applied to nitrogen-deficient areas.

Fertilization

Jones recommends considering the "4Rs" - right place, right rate, right time, and right source for fertilization.

Because sulfur is needed early in the growing season, it should be applied at seeding, either in the furrow or side-banded. Side-banding avoids the risk of fertilizer damage to the seedling when high rates are placed in-furrow, he said. Sulfate is mobile and can also be applied as a surface broadcast application if ammonium sulfate is used.

Gypsum is less acidifying than ammonium sulfate, so Jones recommends using it on acidic soils, even though it's somewhat less soluble. Elemental sulfur, on the other hand, becomes available too slowly for in-season use and needs to be applied a year or two before it is needed. Fall applications of sulfate are not recommended because sulfur, like nitrogen, can be leached easily by fall-to-spring precipitation.

Unlike other major nutrients, there's limited guidance for sulfur fertilization rate requirements of Montana crops. Oilseeds, including canola and yellow mustard, need far more sulfur than cereals like wheat and barley, Jones said. He noted that in high-yielding oilseed fields, 20 lbs. of sulfur fertilizer per acre should prevent sulfur deficiency, regardless of soil test results.

Alfalfa is also a large user of sulfur, needing about 22 lbs. of sulfur per acre for a 4-ton per acre yield. Cereals and pulse crops, like lentils, chickpeas, and peas, likely need only 5-10 lbs. of sulfur fertilizer per acre, with the higher amount needed on fields with high yield potential.

Research

A recently accepted research paper by Perry Miller, MSU Department of Land Resources and Environmental Sciences professor, to be published in the Agronomy Journal, found that only 5 lbs. of added sulfur per acre increased lentil grain yield in 20% of sites in Montana and North Dakota. Due to the low cost of sulfur fertilizer, the average increased grain yield easily offset the sulfur fertilizer cost, even when accounting for sites where lentil grain yields did not increase, Jones said.

Jones is currently conducting research funded by the Montana Fertilizer Check-off with colleagues Miller, Pat Carr and Justin Vetch with the MSU Department of Research Centers to determine the sulfur needs of spring canola, pea,

and wheat, and to evaluate different sulfur soil tests, following previous MSU studies on the effects of sulfur on lentil crops. In addition, there are ongoing Montana sulfur studies on winter canola led by Miller and on cereal forages led by Hayes Goosey, MSU Department of Animal and Range Sciences.

Goosey noted that adeauate sulfur levels can decrease forage nitrate levels in cereal forages.

"Forage nitrate is a concern for livestock owners because it causes early-term abortions and other reproductive issues in pregnant animals," Goosey said.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers




CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/ month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

CenturyLink also participates in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), which provides eligible households with a discount on broadband service. The ACP provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands.

For both programs, a household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.

them, grow.




