### Maintaining the Quality of Stored Grain

By Tie Shank On Friday, January 16 at 10:15am, Kenneth Hellevang

will be presenting on "Maintaining the quality of stored grain."

Ken Hellevang has a Ph. D. degree in engineering, is a registered professional engineer, and has obtained the academic rank of tenured Professor at North Dakota State University. As an Extension (outreach) Engineer of Agricultural & Bio systems Engineering at North Dakota State University, he has provided education and technical assistance in grain drying and storage, structures with a focus on energy efficiency, indoor environmental engineering primarily related to moisture and mold, and flood preparation and recovery to farmers, agribusiness, and professionals across the United States and internationally since 1980.

He has authored or co-authored more than 200 publications and numerous resources on the web. These include technical papers, proceedings, professional standards, chapters in handbooks, and peer reviewed Extension circulars and bulletins distributed by private business, professional societies, and universities internationally. Ken has served as a grain drying and

storage-engineering consultant internationally.

He has conducted research on numerous grain drying and storage topics including moisture content changes in stored grain during summer, drying and storage of dry edible beans, air temperature increase due to grain drying and aeration fans, and aeration duct design. He has conducted numerous grain dryer energy audits.

He is active in the American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE -The Society for engineering in agricultural, food, and biological systems) having served in numerous leadership roles and is a member of the Grain Elevator and Processing Society. He has been recognized with the grade of Fellow by ASABE, the highest honor bestowed on 0.2 percent of members annually.

When asked what attendees should expect to hear and to take away from his presentation, Hellevang stated, "The presentation will cover the key aspects of stored grain management. It is critical to understand how to apply the principles of stored grain management to protect the value of their grain. A bin of grain represents a whole years labor and investment, so it is imperative to protect it."

# The Latest & Greatest on Food Preservation

On Friday, January 16, 2015 at 1:15 pm, Sheridan County Extension Agent Sheila Friedrich, will educate you on the importance of proper food preservation methods to prevent food borne illness.

Friedrich says, "We are finding that there is a renewed interest in food preservation among a population of young families. The problem that may come with that is they find an old canning book that their mom or grandmother may have used and follow those instructions. Many of those resources are out of date and not current with the

USDA Guidelines for food preservation. A popular attitude seems to be "well they did it that way in the old days, and nobody died". I want to help participants understand why it is important to use scientifically proven methods for preserving foods to prevent food borne illness. My presentation is going to give information about the most current recommendations to follow when preserving. I will also show the audience many free resources available from their Extension Office or on the web that give the most current information."







# How Do Volunteers Help Emergency Responders To Handle Escaped, Injured Or Dead Livestock, AFTER The Humans Involved Are Cared For Medically?

What are the options in humanely treating, removing and securing the animals involved with the least risk to responders and the public? What are my liabilities? What if Canadian livestock are involved, do I have to treat them differently? Who do I need to call?

Come and learn some basic guidelines for responding to various types of livestock accidents and what can make a safer, more efficient response for all involved. Tailor the guidelines for your county, roads, type of traffic and "Over fifty million head of domestic and imported cattle and calves are marketed and transported for breeding, feeding, and slaughter in the United States each year. An estimated 400,000 head of livestock are on the road on any given day in the United States. As the number of livestock being transported via motor vehicle has increased, so has the number of accidents involving livestock. Currently in the United States, standard operating procedures for addressing accidents involving the transport of livestock do not exist."

Dr. Jeanne Rankin is mixed animal veterinarian with 17 years of private practice experience, 6 years in the Montana state veterinarians' office and 3 years as the MSU Extension Agro-Emergency Projects Coordinator. She is a third generation Montanan from the Sweetgrass Hills in Toole County graduating from MSU and Colorado State University and has developed a farm bio-security program called "Farm First and Healthy Herds<sup>TM</sup>" aimed at teaching producers how to minimize the risks and impacts of livestock diseases in their own operations. She currently raises registered Gelbvieh cattle and quarter horses near Raynesford, MT.





# Sugar Factory Serves Area For Almost Nine Decades PRAIRIE PACKING



The Sidney Sugars Incorporated factory has served the Sidney area since 1925, providing an outlet for farmers to grow and sell sugarbeets. In 2002, American Crystal bought the Sidney factory from Holly Sugar and the Sidney factory became part of the American Crystal Company and took the name Sidney Sugars. Sidney Sugars operates as a wholly owned subsidiary of American Crystal Sugar Company.

Each year Sidney Sugars contracts sugarbeet acres with area growers. Not only does this allow producers to grow a high value crop but it also provides employment at the factory and at the six beet receiving stations located from Powder River to Culbertson. The company generally employs approximately 60 seasonal workers for the beet receiving

stations during harvest each year and hires approximately 120 seasonal employees to work at the factory during the winter months where they produce white sugar for sale around the country. Winter campaigns generally last about four months.

Sidney Sugars has 90 year round employees and has 120 sugarbeet growers.

The company also produces approximately 50,000 tons of pressed pulp each year and 35,000 tons of molasses for sale.

Since 1996, Sidney Sugars has done a lot of renovating to improve sugar production and efficiency. These renovations and additions include ten sugar storage silos, a thick juice tank, lime kiln and slacker modification, and boiler house modification.

# NDSU Schedules Getting it Right Soybean Production Meetings

These educational meetings featuring research-based information can help producers with soybean production decisions.

Soybean producers interested in intensive soybean management should plan to attend one of four Getting it Right in Soybean Production meetings scheduled for Streeter, Underwood, Minot and Newburg.



At the meetings, North Dakota State University Extension Service faculty and staff will discuss past soybean research conducted in North Dakota and the outlook and production issues for 2015.

"Farming is very complex, and with tight budgets, it is important for producers to gain as much knowledge as possible," says Hans Kandel, NDSU Extension Service agronomist. "These soybean educational meetings featuring research-based information can help producers with soybean production decisions for the 2015 growing season.

The meeting dates are:

Tuesday, Jan. 13, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Central Grasslands Research Extension Center near Streeter. The address is 4824 48th Ave. S.E.

Wednesday, Jan. 14, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Underwood City Hall meeting room

Thursday, Jan. 15, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the North Central Research Extension Center in Minot

Thursday, Jan. 15, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Newburg Community Center Sam Markell, NDSU Extension pathologist, will provide an update on the disease outlook for 2015 and field research results conducted in 2014. Two important topics covered will be an update on soybean cyst nematodes and how to manage soybean diseases. Kandel will provide information on variety selection, and the latest information on various production issues such as the importance of good root nodulation, fertility issues and water management.

Greg Endres, NDSU area Extension specialist/cropping systems, will discuss intensive soybean management, no till and strip till versus conventional till, planting dates, plant populations and row spacing, different soybean special inputs on the market and weed management issues.

Janet Knodel, NDSU Extension entomologist, will discuss how to manage various insect pests, including spider mites and soybean aphids.

In Minot and Newburg, the program will include a crop improvement update, as well as a short business meeting. Programs in Minot and Newburg also may have some different topics and speakers.

NDSU Extension agents Penny Nester, Sheldon Gerhardt and area Extension specialist Fara Brummer (Streeter); agents Irene Graves, Craig Askim and Rick Schmidt (Underwood); agent Paige Brummund (Minot); and agent Jared Nelson (Bottineau) will be the hosts and provide local production and crop updates.

The meeting in Minot is co-sponsored by the Ward County Ag Improvement Association, while the Newburg meeting is co-sponsored by the Bottineau County Crop Improvement Association.

The Getting it Right in Soybean Production programs and lunches are sponsored

by the North Dakota Soybean Council, which oversees promotion, research and marketing programs funded by soybean checkoff dollars.

The programs are free and open to the public. Preregistration is not necessary.

# MT Dept. of Agriculture Seeks Two Producers for Australia Beef Genetics Trade Mission

### Opportunity to Expand Genetics with Second Largest Customer in May

Helena, Mont. – In a rare opportunity to participate in Montana's rapidly expanding beef genetics export market, the Montana Department of Agriculture is seeking two representatives from the Montana beef genetics industry to join in a trade mission to Australia in May.

Australia is currently Montana's second largest customer for beef semen purchases, yet Montana has never been on a trade mission to the country. "This is an exciting opportunity to grow in an important market and build on existing relationships," said Marty Earnheart, Meats and Livestock Marketing Officer.

According to a report by USDA Foreign Agricultural Service, Australia herd size is expected to fall slightly to 27.6 million head due to persistent drought in some regions of the country, with beef exports accounting for almost 70% of their production. By comparison, the United States current inventory is 95 million head with 2.55 million head in Montana.

With the recent decrease in herd size in Australia, the department sees an opportunity to expand Montana beef genetics in the region as producers look to grow in their herds in the years ahead due to increasing international demand and additional trade opportunities.

"Although Australia's herd size is only about a quarter of the United States, they are expanding their international beef trade. By showcasing Montana's high-quality


beef genetics, we see significate market potential," explained Earnheart.

The trip dates have yet to be finalized, but it will coincide with 2015 Beef Australia from May 4 - May 9. The exposition is held just once every three years and will feature more than 4,500 cattle from over 30 breeds and facilitate new trade and export opportunities.

Applicants must have a valid passport and be willing to cover half of the travel expenses.

The Montana Department of Agriculture applied for and received funds through U.S. Livestock Genetics Export, Inc. (USLGE) from both the Market Access and Foreign Market Development programs. The awarded funds will pay for the department's marketing officer's travel and expenses, and at least half of each of the beef genetic representative's travel expenses. USLGE is a not-for-profit, nationwide trade association that represents the international marketing interests of the dairy, beef, sheep, swine, and horse breeding industries.

# Community Garden Talk with Tim Fine


