Annual Field Day at the Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center (MSU-EARC) on July 18

The Annual Field Day at the Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center (MSU-EARC) in Sidney, MT, will be held Thursday, July 18. The day begins at 8:30 a.m. with coffee and rolls, greetings and introductions at 9 a.m. followed by the tours at 9:20 a.m., as well as a sponsored lunch at 12 noon.

There will be a number of guest speakers during the tour. Dr. Jerry Bergman, Director NDSU Williston Research Extension Center will speak about safflower varieties and production; Chet Hill, ag diversification extension specialist, NDSU Williston Research Extension Center will talk about alternative crops for the MonDak region; Dr. Luther Talbert, spring wheat breeder, Montana State University will educate everyone on spring wheat varieties; Dr. Tom Blake, barley breeder, Montana State University will speak about barley varieties; Dr. Gadi Reddy, entomologist and superintendent, MSU Western Triangle Research Center will give the latest on sawfly research; Diana DeYoung, Montana Department of Agriculture pesticide field contact will inform

everyone about pesticide programs; Dr. Bart Stevens, research agronomist, USDA ARS is going to talk about the sugarbeet phosphorus study; Ben Larson, agriculturalist, Safflower Technologies International will speak about soy bean production; Russ Fullmer, agriculturalist, Sidney Sugars, Inc. will speak about sugarbeet varieties; Dr. Joyce Eckhoff, research agronomist, MSU Eastern Agricultural Research Center will provide information about sugarbeet research at EARC; Dr. Tatiana Rand, entomologist, USDA ARS will talk about biology and biological control of alfalfa weevils; Dr. Dave Branson, entomologist, USDA ARS will speak about biological control of grasshoppers; Dr. Darrin Boss, beef specialist, MSU Northern Agricultural Research Center will give information on grazing over crops and Tim Fine, Richland County extension agent will talk about the community garden.

New Superintendent, Plant Pathologist Appointed for Eastern Ag Research Center

Hans Schneider, currently living in the Netherlands, will join the Montana State University faculty and be both superintendent and associate professor of plant pathology at the Eastern Agricultural Research Center in Sidney, pending approval of the Montana Board of Regents.

Schneider will assume his duties on July 15, thus he will participate in the Eastern Agricultural Research Center Field Day on July 18.

Schneider will develop a field-oriented research program that focuses on integrated disease management in pulse crops, sugar beets, and other crops under production in Eastern Montana. Additionally, he will be responsible for the administration and management of resources in sup-

port of EARC's research and outreach programs pertinent to Montana agriculture.

"We are very fortunate to have someone of Dr. Schneider's experience and abilities join our faculty," said Barry Jacobsen, long-time MSU plant pathologist and interim head of the Department of Research Centers.

Jacobsen said Schneider will bring exceptional expertise to address sugar beet diseases, as he has spent the majority of his career working on sugar beet diseases with the Institute for Sugarbeet Research in the Netherlands. He has also worked on diseases of bulb crops, potatoes and woody ornamentals, so he is well situated to address diseases of other crops important to Eastern Montana. Schneider received his Ph.D. in 1998 at Wageningen Agricultural University in the Netherlands.

Goehring Announces Sites, Dates for 2013 Project Safe Send

Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring encourages farmers, ranchers, pesticide dealers and applicators, government agencies and homeowners to bring their unusable pesticides to any of the 12 Project Safe Send collections in July.

"This is a simple and non-regulatory program to help people safely and legally get rid of unusable pesticides free of charge," Goehring said. "Over the past 20 years, thousands of people have brought more than three million pounds of these chemicals to Project Safe Send collection sites."

Project Safe Send accepts old, unusable or banned pesticides, including herbicides, insecticides, rodenticides and fungicides. The pesticides are shipped out of state for incineration. The program is funded through product registration fees paid by pesticide manufacturers.

"Check your storage areas for any unusable pesticides and safely set them aside for Project Safe Send," Goehring said. "If you find that the containers are deteriorating or leaking, pack them in larger containers with absorbent materials. Free, heavy-duty plastic bags are available from the North Dakota Department of Agriculture."

People with more than 1,000 pounds of pesticides should pre-register. No other pre-registration is required. A maximum of 20,000 pounds of pesticides per participant will be accepted. Pesticide rinse water also will be accepted. The first 100 pounds of rinse water will be taken free of charge; a fee will be applied for each additional pound.



Richland County 4-H Raising Money for New Fair Booth

Richland County 4-H clubs are holding fundraisers to earn money to build a new food booth at the Richland County Fairgrounds. The fundraising efforts are already underway and they include selling brand boards, memorial plaques and various other fundraising events conducted by the 4-H clubs in the area.

The brand board fundraiser consists of a square foot (12 inch by 12 inch) board on which area ranchers can place their personal brand. Each brand costs \$50 and will be displayed at the 4-H food booth.

The memorial plaques are sheets of stainless steel metal with engraved names and faces of a former 4-H member or leader that someone wishes to honor. The cost of each plaque is \$300 and they will be displayed on a commemorative wall at the booth as well.

Richland County 4-H club leaders ask everyone to submit their information for the plaques and the brand boards as soon as possible so they can be ready to be displayed at this year's fair taking place July 31 – August 3.

Additional funds for the new fair booth will be raised by various fundraisers conducted by area 4-H clubs. For example the Forever Buds worked the concessions at the Neal Hermanson Memorial Ranch Rodeo which took place June 22.

Many of our leaders and companies that support 4-H


are donating money, materials and man power to the construction of the new booth. "It's been a real community effort and we appreciate all the help we are getting." stated 4-H leader Lisa Gorder.

Barrel racing instructor Judy Myllymaki held a two day clinic at the Rice Ranch arena near Fairview on June 1 & 2.

Myllymaki, a former school teacher, has been involved in the sport of barrel racing for over 35 years and has conducted teaching clinics for over 25 years. She is a National Finals Rodeo Qualifier, a Montana Pro Rodeo Circuit Champion, a Montana Pro Rodeo Circuit Finalist, a Dodge National Circuit Finals Qualifier, participated in Multiple Futurity Championships and has won more buckles than she can count. Myllymaki and her husband Gene both train and sell horses from their ranch in Arlee, MT.

Myllymaki continues to compete in PRCA and WPRA rodeos. Both teaching and competing in barrel racing takes Myllymaki throughout the US and Canada and even to Australia. "Now I'm working on the award for the longest staying power in the sport," she commented.

"We are very blessed to have Judy here," said Mary Jo Brunsvold, the mother of clinic participant Jade Brunsvold.

Myllymaki shared her expertise with twenty participants from novice to expert skill levels during the two day clinic. She conducted training station exercises, breaking down patterns and isolating moves to train both horse & rider. One of the most important skills taught was how to be patient and provide proper communication between the jockey and the horse. "Just like people, your horse does not like to be picked at," stated Myllymaki.

The partnership between the horse and rider is of utmost importance in the sport of barrel racing. "A poor jockey can foul up a good horse and a good jockey can't make a bad horse great," Myllymaki said. The chemistry between human and animal can not be understated. Horse and rider must make a good match. "Opposites attract in barrel racing," Myllymaki said. "A nervous person should have an easy going horse and vise versa."

Preparation is another key to success in the sport. "You

always have to go into a rodeo with a plan. You can't start making the plan at the time of the rodeo," Myllymaki stated. "If that plan doesn't work, you make a new plan for the next rodeo," she continued.

The sport has changed quite a bit during Myllymaki years of involvement in barrel racing. "Now the riders are less cowgirls and more athletes. They are very polished," she stated.


One of Brunsvold's fondest moments as teen rodeo





Montana Stockgrowers Mid-Year Meeting Draws 175 to Missoula

The 2013 Montana Stockgrowers Association (MSGA) Mid-Year Meeting, held at the Hilton Garden Inn in Missoula, June 7-8, drew approximately 175 participants from across the state for policy meetings and MSGA's Annual Ranch Tour.

"We had an enjoyable Mid-Year Meeting in Missoula," said Tucker Hughes, MSGA President.

"Meeting new folks from Western Montana and touring the Bitterroot Valley was an enjoyable experience for all."

Here are some of the highlights from the 2013 MSGA Mid-Year Meeting:

Opening General Session speakers were Monica Lindeen, Commissioner of Securities and Insurance, Montana State Auditor, who spoke about their role in state government and Dr. John Paterson, executive director of producer education for the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, who discussed marketing beef to a new generation of consumers.

The 2013 MSGA Ranch Tour began at the Missoula Smokejumper Center where attendees had the opportunity to see how the Forest Service trains smokejumpers, as well as how they work to protect land and structures from dangerous fires. MSGA then traveled to the PEAS Farm which serves the local community, providing low-cost vegetables and fruit for low income individuals. The farm is also a community service outlet for troubled youth. The farm gave attendees a unique look into small scale, urban agriculture. Finally, the tour traveled to the picturesque Bitterroot Valley and local ranches, Sutherlin Farms and Mytty Angus.

Following the Ranch Tour, a delicious dinner was served at Lolo Peak Arena prepared by the Sutherlin family of Sutherlin Farms. Attendees were entertained by ranch humor and singing by Take Two Productions. MSGA's Research,



Education and Endowment Foundation (REEF) awarded Kelsey Haughian of Kinsey the 2013 MSGA Educational Heritage Scholarship and the "World Famous Stick Horse Race" fund-raiser.

One interim policy was passed through the policy process by the Cattle Health, Brands and Theft Committee recommending that the MSGA board develop and submit comments to the

Texas Animal Health Commission relative to their proposed brucellosis testing requirements for Montana, Wyoming and Idaho which would require a post-entry test for all breeding cattle and a post-calving test for heifers. MSGA is concerned about the precedent this could set for other states to restrict trade of Montana cattle.

The keynote speaker at the Young Stockgrowers "Advocating for Ag" lunch was Captain Peter Shinn, Iowa National Guard. Captain Shinn discussed his work in Afghanistan, building communities up with agriculture. He discussed the needs of the Afghan people and how special teams composed of Ag-savvy National Guardsmen and women worked to help the affected communities, teaching the people farming techniques. Captain Shinn said, "It's hard to have a national security without food security," and regarded the United States as the most successful pioneer of Agriculture.

MSGA members learned about updates to Facebook and how to use Twitter, Pinterest and Instagram at the Digital Café. Attendees also learned what a "meme" is and developed their own.





MSU College of Agriculture has New Wheat Variety Available for Licensing

Montana State University researchers have produced a new line of hard white winter wheat that shows potential to produce as well as one of the most popular red winter wheat varieties currently grown in Montana.

The new hard white winter wheat variety, a line

currently identified as MTW08168, is similar to the widely popular Montana variety of Yellowstone red winter wheat in yield, agronomic characteristics and resistance to prevalent races of stripe rust.

The new variety stands out from Yellowstone as having a hard white kernel versus the hard red kernel of Yellowstone. MTW08168 also has a higher grain vol-

ume weight, with about one half pound per bushel grain volume weight. It heads about two and a half days later than Yellowstone and averages close to 2 inches taller than Yellowstone.

MSU is the major supplier of new wheat varieties for Montana growers with approximately 2.5 million acres of MSU varieties grown in the state from 2010 to 2012, according to the Montana Agricultural Statistics Service.

A report on the origin, breeding history and characteristics of MTW08168 compared to other winter wheat lines is available through MSU Technology Transfer Office. The MSU Agricultural Experiment Station anticipates 200 bushels of foundation seed from current seed production. Trial lines are available for observation.

Naming of the new variety may be subject to the terms of its licensing.


Currently, MSU has 213 licenses from technologies developed by faculty and researchers. Of those, 85 licenses are with Montana companies.

Sidney Sugars Agricultural Manager Russ Fullmer was much more optimistic about this year's sugarbeet crop last week than he had been. Sunshine and warmer temperatures have the beet fields looking much healthier. "Even the little ones are growing now," Fullmer said. Even though the rains have been wonderful, the crop needs heat. The best fields should have leaves touching in the row by July 4th. That's a normal indication of the health of the crop but Fullmer said that some of the new Roundup ready varieties don't leaf out as much, making this standard a little unreliable.


There was some hail damage to approximately 300 acres, most of it slight, the week of June 19.

"We're looking at an average to above average crop," Fullmer said. Estimates taken last week were better than expected with agricultural staff making a prediction of 26.5 tons per acre for this year's crop.

Sidney Sugars staff will be busy the month of July with root samples starting the second week. Fullmer will be presenting at the Field Day in Sidney July 18, and a staff member will be attending Ag school in California.

"WILD, WILD, WEST"



MSU Extension Offering New Cool-Season Guide for Montana Growers of Peas and Lentils

Montana State University (MSU) Extension has published a new guide for growers of peas and lentils. The "Montana Cool-Season Pulse Production Guide" provides current best management practices for dry pea, lentil and

chickpea for Montana producers.

In the traditional wheat-fallow system of crop production common in Montana, the use of annual legumes, or pulse crops, in rotation with wheat can help bring agronomic and financial benefits in terms of soil health, biological ac-

tivity and overall potential productivity. As of 2012, pulse crops represent more than one-half million acres of the seven million acres in dry-land production in Montana.

"This guide provides the most recent best management practices from experts in crop production, nutrient management, weed, disease and insect control to help Montana producers successfully raise pulse crops on their farms," said Kent McVay, author and MSU Extension Cropping System Specialist.

The authors of the new pulse guide include the basics for successful production of the pulse crops as well as internet links to more detailed information. Detailed chapters in the guide address cultural practices; soil fertility and nutrient needs; recommendations by crop; weed management during growth and harvest; disease, insect, pathogen management.

The guide is available for download or in print from MSU Extension at www.msuextension.org/store, and through your local county Extension office.

FWP Surveys Hunters and Landowners on Wildlife Disease

State wildlife officials have embarked on an extensive survey of hunters and landowners to determine their opinions about Chronic Wasting Disease, a rare brain disease that is always fatal in deer, elk and moose.

CWD belongs to a family of diseases that include mad cow disease in cattle, scrapie in sheep and Creutzfeldt - Jakob disease in humans.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks is conducting the survey in anticipation of creating a new plan to impede the fatal diseases entry into Montana – and for managing the risk of spreading should it be detected here. Montana's first

CWD plan was completed in 2005.

"We're surveying more than 3,000 resident hunters and landowners to learn more about what they know about the disease and to determine what we may need to consider in a new CWD risk management plan," said Ken McDonald, FWP wildlife division chief in Helena.

After more than 14 years of testing, CWD has not been found in Montana's wild deer, elk or moose populations. About 18,000 wild deer, elk and moose, mostly harvested by hunters, have been tested for CWD in Montana since 1998.

CWD was diagnosed in 1999 in nine captive elk on an alternative livestock facility, or game farm, near Philipsburg.


All the animals there were destroyed and the facility was quarantined.

States where CWD is confirmed in wild deer or elk include Colorado, Illinois, Kansas, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Wisconsin, West Virginia and Wyoming. CWD has also been found in Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada. Most of the states and provinces have game-export regulations that Montana hunters must follow. Similarly, Montana hunters may only bring back processed deer, elk and moose when hunting in a CWD positive area in another state.

Symptoms suggestive of CWD in deer, elk and moose include emaciation, listlessness, blank facial expressions, excessive salivation, lowered heads and, in some cases, hyper-excitability and nervousness. FWP encourages hunters and others who see animals with any of these symptoms to contact the nearest FWP office.

Public health officials have found no link between CWD in deer and elk and disease in humans and say that at this time CWD poses no known risks to humans, domestic livestock or pets.

Farm Service Agency NAP Coverage Available for 2014 Annual Forage Crops

North Dakota USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Aaron Krauter announced that North Dakota FSA will offer Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for 2014 crops that are planted annually and used for livestock feed or fodder.

The Risk Management Agency (FSA) recently announced a pilot program that offers a CAT level Rainfall Index-Annual Forage Insurance Plan to producers in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma and South Dakota.

Because there is limited time for producers in these states to transition from NAP to the new RMA pilot program, an exception was made that will allow the states to continue offering NAP coverage for 2014. However, NAP coverage will not be available for 2015 annual forage crops.

Eligible producers can apply for 2014 NAP coverage at the their local FSA Office using form CCC-471, Application for Coverage. Producers must file the application and service fee by the appropriate deadline for the applicable crop. The service fee is the lesser of \$250 per crop or \$750 per producer per administrative county, not to exceed a total of \$1,875 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties.

Producers who meet the definition of a limited resource farmer or rancher can request a waiver of the service fee.

NAP provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occur due to normal disasters.

"The easiest way for producers to protect their investment is to purchase an insurance policy," said Krauter. "The past few years have proved that natural disasters are unavoidable, and producers can recover if they take the necessary precautions to mitigate risks."







FSA Administrator Urges Producers to Enroll in DCP

USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia today encouraged farmers and ranchers to enroll for the 2013 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP) before the deadline. Producers who wait until the last minute to sign up could face increased waiting time in FSA county offices.

"We understand that producers have gotten busy, but they can't forget to visit their county office and sign up for DCP," said Garcia. "Just as farmers and ranchers plan their spring plantings, producers should plan to schedule an appointment to visit their USDA Service Center at the earliest possible time. It's best to complete the paperwork now rather than to stand in line the day before the deadline," advised Garcia.

The sign-up began Feb. 19, 2013. The DCP sign up period ends Aug. 2, 2013.

The 2013 DCP program provisions are unchanged from 2012, except that all eligible participants in 2013 may choose to enroll in either DCP or ACRE for the 2013 crop year. This means that eligible producers who were enrolled in ACRE in 2012 may elect to enroll in DCP in 2013 or may re-enroll in ACRE in 2013 (and vice versa).
