

Montana Gives Donors Tax Credit

for Gifts to Charitable Endowments

The oil boom in the MonDak area has given our area an economic boost and the lowest unemployment rate in America. Montana is one of the few states in the country to offer a state tax credit to individuals or businesses that make endowment gifts to in-state charities or foundations like the Foundation for Community Care.

These credits are especially popular in rural states and in states with plenty of natural resources. Three other states with endowment credits are lowa, Kentucky, and North Dakota, and community funds in Minnesota are lobbying for them now.

The tax credit is a way to ensure some of the profits on the state's oil, gas, or coal end up in endowments that will permanently help foundations and other charities. The tax incentives are also a way to help keep family wealth instate, rather than watching it migrate away as younger residents move to urban areas, taking their inheritance with them

The 40% Montana tax credit has helped secure \$123-million for permanent endowments since the credit was enacted in 1997.







Mon-Dak Feeders tour set for February 2

Montana-Dakota "Silver Aniversary" Livestock Feeders Tour in Fairview will be held Saturday, February 2, with a full days of events scheduled.

Highlight of the 25th Annual Feeders Tour will be the appearance of Eastern District Congressman, John Melcher, as a guest speaker at the tour banquet to be held at the Fairview High School cafeteria. Master Ceremonies will be Ed Agre at the lamb, beef and pork dinner to be served by the Altar Society of St. Catherine's Catholic Church.

Events of the day are as follows: Registration opens at 8:30 a.m. at the Fairview Civic Center, with free coffee and doughnuts being served.

The tour gets underway at 9:30 a.m. with buses available for those who wish transportation. The first stop will be at the Sundheim Corporation Farm to inspect 500 head stock cows and 500 calves on feed. At 10:15 the tour continues to the Dallas and Duane Ullman farm to see 350 head of hogs on feed and inspect 110 stock cows

and 80 calves on feed. Coffee and doughnuts will be served at this stop. At 11:15 the tour continues to the Harold Schlothauer farm to inspect 2000 head of lambs

Weight guessing contests will be held at each tour stop. Winners must be present at the afternoon program. A trophy will be presented to the jackpot winner during the evening banquet.

At noon the caravan will arrive at the East Fairview School for a free noon lunch sponsored by the Feeders Tour Committee and served by the East Fairview PTO.

A feed discussion and management panel will be held starting at 1:00 p.m. with Ellis Williams, Richland County Agent, and Kermit Toepke, McKenzie County Agent, in charge.

The days events will close with a Smoker from 5:30 to 6:30 and the banquet. The banquet tickets, good for both the Smoker and the banquet, are on sale by Feeders Tour Committee members and at several local business establishments.
