

With an early McKenzie County Fair causing it to be difficult for locals to grow produce and show off what they have grown and with the scarcity of area harvest festivals, the Arnegard North Dakota Park District will hold its first annual Arnegard Spud Fest to celebrate the harvest and the area's rich agricultural heritage.

Along with the usual harvest festival festivities, the 2023's Arnegard Spud Fest will have food, live music, vendors, face painting, a style show, free games, crafts, hayrides, pumpkins, raffles, potato sack races, and open horseshoe and cornhole tournaments.

Gerry followed in his father's farming footsteps. Known for hard work, he helped several local farmers - learning from them as well, but not until after the family farm work was finished. He still found time to join the Fairview Boxing Club. Under the tutelage of Bud Starr, Gerry, along with several local stars helped put Fairview on the national map by bringing home a 1963 Heavyweight Golden Glove Championship.

In 1964, Gerry married a local girl - Beverly Ann Biehl. They bought a farmstead in 1966 and started their family.

Gerry was chosen to be the honored "Old Timer" at 2023's Fairview Old Timer's Festival, which was his most cherished achievement. He was an active pillar of the Fairview community, participating in the Jaycees, school and church boards, and awarded multiple Key Man awards.

Gerry was preceded in death by his parents, Ewald and Charlotte, and two daughters: Lori age 17 and Lisa at birth.

Surviving Gerry are all his siblings, loving wife Beverly, son Bret Reichenbach and his children Dane, Garett and Reed; Lynda and KC Snyder and their children Mackenzie, Ty and Taysha; Brenda and Jeris DeBoer and their children Chase, Alexis, Faith, and Nevaeh; a supporting community of friends, and a mournful flock of 50 some sheep in summer pasture.

Mike and Marlene were set up by their friends Donny and JoAnn Rosaaen in 1966 and in Mike's words - "The rest was history." They were wed on Jan. 28, 1967, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Miles City, MT. Marlene's family had their doubts and said they wouldn't last a year, but 56 years later here we are. To this union came Chelley in 1970 and then by surprise came Missy, 17 months later in November 1971.

Marlene served as St. Bernard's Altar Society secretary-treasurer for 35 years. Mike and Marlene drove school bus for 13 years. It was not long after Missy was born that Marlene would start selling Avon. She was known as the local Charley Creek Avon lady for roughly 40 years or more. They would rummage through her Avon bag while often enjoying a cold beverage and snack.

Marlene then substituted off and on at the school before taking a full-time teachers' aide position in the special ed room. By the time she retired she had dedicated 30 years to Poplar Schools.

Marlene's life really started when Sam and Ty came into this world in 1994 and 1997. They were her true pride and joy. Mike and Marlene traveled all over eastern Montana to watch them in baseball, softball, and other school activities. They never missed a thing and enjoyed many summer trips with the kids as they spent many summers with them while

She may have enjoyed her grandchildren, but her great granddaughters, Leighton and Laynie, also brought her so much pride and joy. She loved the chaos they brought to the house when they visited. We truly believe they are what kept her going during her final years.

In January 2021 Marlene suffered a massive stroke and was flown to Fargo, ND, where she was treated, then she was sent to Billings, MT, for rehab therapy. That was the start of all the therapy and hospital visits related to the stroke.

Marlene gained her angel wings peacefully on the morning of Aug. 25, 2023, in her home, with Mike, Chelley, and Missy by her side.







establish a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone stealing cattle, horses or mules in North Dakota.

As the association grew older, members found value in banding together on other issues, so the mission expanded to what it is today: to unite, protect, promote, educate and serve the state's beef cattle industry.

Unsafe Road Restricts Vehicle Access At Black Bridge FAS

Walk-in traffic allowed until repairs are completed Miles City - Beginning this week, vehicle access to Black Bridge Fishing Access Site near Glendive will not be permitted until road repairs can be made. The FAS remains open, but the entrance gate is closed and visitor access will be walk-in only.

The Yellowstone River has significantly undercut and eroded the access road to the site, creating a public safety issue. Fish, Wildlife & Parks staff had attempted to allow limited vehicle traffic on the downstream end of the site, but visitor compliance was poor. Visitors repeatedly removed signage and barriers and drove on unsafe roads or drove off road, which caused resource damage.

Road repairs are being planned and vehicle access will be restored when the project is completed.





Drive-Thru Flu Clinic Scheduled Sept. 28 Sidney

The Richland County Health Department's annual Mass Flu Shot Clinic continues as a drive-thru format, scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 28, from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. at the Richland County Fire Hall, Sidney.

The Drive-Thru Clinic will serve adults only, and offers both regular and highdose flu shots. No other shots will be given during the clinic. No appointment is needed. Flu shots cannot be given to those who have animals in their vehicles. Children may be in the vehicle, but may not receive flu shots. Follow traffic signs

to enter the fire hall from the north side.

There are no COVID-19 vaccines available at the clinic, and the flu shot does not contain COVID-19 vaccine

The Health Department carries quadrivalent, pre-filled syringes that contain no preservative. The price of flu vaccine will vary from \$45-\$85, depending on the individual's age and the type of vaccine used. Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance may be billed for those who bring their cards. For self-pay clients, only cash or check can be accepted.

Flu clinic paperwork may be printed from www. richland.org/rchd, the Richland County Health Department Facebook page, or obtained the day of the

drive-thru clinic.

Flu shots, as well as other vaccines, for children and families will be available during regular clinic hours, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 10 a.m.-4:30 p.m. by appointment. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month, from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. and 1-4 p.m. by appointment.
