Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial Update Fall, 2015

The Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial Fund, Inc. was incorporated in 2013, after two years of extensive background work for one purpose: To promote, develop and fund, design, build and maintain a world class veterans memorial for nine Northeast Montana Counties

It is located in the center of Fort Peck on land the Town of Fort Peck transferred to the Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial by permanent easement.

Construction began on phase #1 of the Memorial in May 2015. Phase #1 includes all preliminary surveys, soil tests, architecture, design and construction engineering, entries and flat work, the main monument, entry sign, flagpoles, vigil area foundations, basic electric, irrigation, sod, trees, shrubs, an eagle sculpture on an entry kiosk and 10 Walls of Honor.

LSC Contractors of Fort Peck is building the Memorial and the Fort Peck office of Interstate Engineering provided the engineering, with professional input from Norval Electric, G&D Electric, Mike Kaiser Associates, and Fossum Ready Mix. Aakres of Green Grass and Mogan Lawn Service plan to irrigate and sod the site, weather permitting. DBA Architects of Minneapolis created the design. Volunteers have planned and directed the

project. There are no hired employees.

To date individual, organization, professional and business donations have funded the project through the sale of Wall of Honor tiles, raffles, and general fundraisers. Grant applications are pending. There has been no budgeted government funding.

The By Laws establishing up to a nine-member Board of Directors were approved in 2012. We are encouraging Board of Director applications at this time. Board members may reside in any northeast Montana county.

The Memorial is a qualified 501(c)19, as a non-profit for taxdeductible contributions. The Montana Legislature passed HB 0578 in the 2015 session requiring that the Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial Park in Fort Peck be designated on official Montana State Maps. With the exception of landscaping, work was completed on Phase #1 in November of 2015.

The Memorial will be dedicated on the day before Memorial

Letter to the Editor

It has been a privilege to watch the progress as the Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial takes shape in Fort Peck. This summer, with the help of some heavy equipment, cleared and leveled ground gave way to the 38-foot high main monument, 10 walls of honor, pathways, and bases for sculptures. The dedication on May 29, 2016, will fulfill five years of planning and work by scores of Northeast Montana volunteers.

On that day next May, nearly 900 black granite tiles carrying the names of veterans and their branch of service should be placed on the Walls of Honor. The American flag, state of Montana, POW flags, and one for each branch of service will surround the main monument. An entry sign will lead visitors to an entry kiosk topped with a freedom eagle sculpture. Beginning landscaping of sod, trees, and shrubs should be in place.

All the bills are paid, no money is owed, and the budget is on target and expected to stay that way through all of Phase #1.

When the Memorial is dedicated, will it be fully functional? Yes. Will it be complete? No. There are still goals to be met to fully complete the site. Under consideration are KIA and MIA vigil areas, a water feature, and additional sculptures. A Wall of Honor directory and a Taps bugler sculpture created by Pamela Harr and Harvey Rattey are in future plans.

We sincerely hope the friends of this memorial will keep this project in mind when planning Holiday giving. Wall of Honor tiles make a perfect holiday gift for a veteran. We have room for 2,800 more tiles on existing Walls. Applications are available on line and at most area banks. All veterans from all branches of service, including National Guard and Reserves, can be honored on the Wall. Any veteran who is important to a NE Montana resident can be included on the Wall regardless of where they live. A qualified Veteran is anyone who has served at least 6 months and has been honorably discharged.

We should also note that benches, tables, flags, and signs are available for sponsorship and are appropriate donations for individuals and organizations. Donations are still extremely important and especially welcome.

Despite the loss of some of our veterans, the Northeast Montana Veterans Memorial preserves a loving memory, showing the highest respect and honor for the sacrifices of all veterans. It forever preserves our appreciation, and gives appropriate honor to their service.

It has been our goal to work on behalf of all veterans, and to do this memorial right.

Our intention is also to provide this memorial as an educational resource for future generations.



Fish & Wildlife **Commission To Meet** In Helena Nov. 12

Submitted by Montana FWP

Montana's Fish & Wildlife Commission will meet Nov. 12

The meeting will begin at 8:30 a.m. at Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks' Montana WILD Education Center, 2668 Broadwater Ave. Commissioners will take final action on 2016 fishing regu-

lations; elk hunting shoulder seasons pilot projects beginning in late November in up to seven hunting districts; duck-hunting zone adjustments in Montana's portion of the Central Flyway; and an addition to the Wall Creek Wildlife Management Area near Ennis.

On land matters, commissioners will be asked to endorse a lease agreement for the Round Up Fishing Access Site on the Blackfoot River; and additions to the Blackfoot-Clearwater WMA west of Ovando, the Fresno Tailwater WMA near Havre, and the Three mile WMA near Stevensville.

FWP also will ask the commission to endorse a timber sale on the Blackfoot-Clearwater WMA and the translocation of sage grouse from Montana to Alberta, Canada.

Commissioners also will consider a proposed biennial rule for public comment that would allow FWP to prohibit floating near the Supply Ditch on the Bitterroot River when river conditions are unsafe for public use.

The meeting will end with an informational session on Montana's upcoming biennial hunting season setting process. For the full agenda and additional information, visit FWP's



How You Can Stay Warm this Winter, Or Help Someone **Stay Warm MNAXLP**

Are you or someone you know worried about how you're going to pay those home energy bills this winter? Energy Share of Montana is accepting applications for emergency heating assistance at Action for Eastern Montana in Glendive, which serves residents in the 17 eastern Montana counties. You can reach Action for Eastern Montana at 406-377-3564.

Energy Share is a private nonprofit organization that was established in 1983 to help Montanans who are facing financial difficulties that may result in loss of heat or lights in their home due to circumstances beyond their control. A local volunteer Energy Share Committee works with Action for Eastern Montana to review the applications. Energy Share helps people no matter what their heat source, but the assistance is usually only once every ten years or so because the organization is truly a source of emergency funds, intended to complement government assistance programs


Energy Share helps an average of about 2,500 families per year. The organizational structure is unique because the applications are reviewed individually, allowing people in need of help with their energy bills to explain the difficult circumstances they are facing. Situations that compel people to apply for help with their energy bills through Energy Share could include extreme medical issues, unemployment or reduced wages/hours, or a wide range of other issues that create financial difficulty.

The only way Energy Share can provide the individual attention it does to each application is through a cooperative effort. While all of Energy Share's stakeholders are involved at some level, the nuts and bolts of Energy Share "happens" with the ten Human Resource Development Councils (HRDCs) and the volunteer Local Energy Share Committees that each HRDC coordinates. Committees across the state vary as dictated by the specific needs of the community. These

Committee members donate many hours on behalf of the organizations they represent.

Supporting this entire organization is, of course, Energy Share's donors. Individuals, small businesses, utility companies, electric cooperatives, propane vendors, and large electric users all provide the means by which the mission is accomplished. 






It is with great pleasure that we begin this thank you to all those concerned people of Richland County who supported our efforts in obtaining the financial support we needed to provide education on the dangers of drug usage to Sidney and everyone in Richland County!

This entire event was created to spread the message about drug usage not only to the students during the National Red Ribbon Campaign Week, but to an entire community. Dr. Gary Dale, former State of Montana Medical Examiner and Kat Perkins, top 5 winner of Season 6 of "The Voice", were essential tools to the assemblies for the students, parents, grandparents, business owners/managers and for everyone in our community. Our goal was to teach and show everyone about drug usage and what we are facing if we don't do something about this epidemic that is not only hitting our community but everywhere.

We have four types of children affected by this assembly. Students and parents who do not do drugs, Students who do not use drugs and the parents do, Students who do drugs and the parents do not, and unfortunately the hardest one is our students and parents who both do drugs. The inner turmoil that the graphic images created inside each of these students and community members were very difficult. As Dr. Dale noted several times during his presentation, these images were not meant to shock the students but rather to educate them. Students begin noticing the drug availability at about 11-13 years old. About 11.2% of the overall first time users of illegal drugs are between the ages of 16-17 and about 10.4% between the ages of 18-20. And to think that in 2014, 70 fatal accidents in Montana were due to alcohol and 50 were from drugs. Illegal use of prescription drugs is on the rise with 100 prescription drug related deaths per year in Montana.

As Governor Steve Bullock mentioned in his letter of support for this event, "Drugs strain the resources of communities, hospitals and local police departments. They tear apart families and ravage the bonds that tie communities together. Promoting





Local Ranchers Look for Opportunities in the Aleutians



It's a rancher's dream.

Over a million acres of land. Fresh water in abundance. Thousands of cattle belly deep in rich, lush grass. No predators,

Except...

The ranch is in the Aleutians, on Umnak Island, south of Dutch Harbor where storms are frequent and the only transportation is by small plane or helicopter. Howard Rambur, owner of Rambur Charolais and Ryan Obergfell representing Prewitt and Company visited Bering Pacific Ranches on Umnak Island in late August. They flew from Billings to Anchorage, to Dutch Harbor, then to the ranch in an old 1964 172 four seater.

What they found was a primitive operation based in Fort Glenn, a WW II air base rich in history, which housed 12,000+ troops and was abandoned many years ago. There were about a dozen people there, mostly young workers from all over the U.S. looking for a summer's adventure in Alaska. The only communication is by satellite phone, there is no electricity, and no parts store or mechanic down the street to fix anything. All the workers will leave by November 10 every year.

A helicopter ride on the first day gave the men an overview of the huge ranch and its breathtaking terrain. Bordered by the Pacific Ocean on one side and the Bering Sea on the other, the island features majestic mountains, vast grasslands, abundant flowing water and an active volcano, which last erupted in 2008. "It's the most productive piece of ground I've ever seen," Obergfell said. They flew into the vast caldera on Mount Okmok, where extreme turbulence had them dropping a heart stopping 100 ft. and stopped Rambur's attempts at videoing the experience. Herds of caribou, wild horses, and wild cattle could be seen from the air. The cattle are in groups of up to 80 animals and range freely all over the island.

On day two, the men continued their tour on ATVs. While the helicopter the day before could only get within about 200 yards of the cattle, Rambur was able to approach as close as 50 yards on foot. The cattle are wild, left after World War II with little or no management. There are just as many bulls as cows. A lot of the cows are packing two calves, this year's calf and last year's calf, if they haven't left on their own. The herd is made up of 80% Hereford Horned and Polled the remaining balance being Charolais cross, due to an AI program they had in the 70s. They feature moderate frame and good muscle pattern. Bulls weigh in at 1,800-2,000#, cows in the 1,200# range. Rambur states, "Mother Nature has created the best EPD, over the years only the aggressive muscled bulls bred most of the cows. If they couldn't calf, had any problems with bad eyes or udders, week feet/legs they didn't produce offspring, over the

years developing a strong athletic animal."

The cattle are naturally organic, with no antibiotics, no hormones, no worms or lice, just natural grasses and water. In the winter, the cattle survive by eating the Kelp off the beaches. During tough winters, 20% of the cattle can perish due to high snow fall on the island but most of the time winters in eastern Montana have a lower temperature than in the Aleutians.

Marketing is what prompted Rambur and Obergfell to visit the ranch. Rambur is in contact with American Foods on a weekly basis, mostly about kill bulls. In one of their conversations, American Foods mentioned a call from someone wanting them to buy organic cattle from Alaska. The same week Rambur purchased a bull in Canada and mentioned the Alaska call. A gentleman at the table said it was his uncle who leases the ranch. The next morning Rambur got a call, and an invitation, from Pat Harvie.

Prewitt & Co. is interested in bringing natural feeder cattle to US feedlots.

The logistics are staggering as are problems with so many unknowns from helicopters, to barges, and adapting to different climates, with health a major issue. Currently facilities for holding and shipping the animals are lacking with the dock in disrepair. Cattle could be shipped by barge or by air without any regula-

tory issues as long as they are U.S. carriers and don't have to stop in Canada. A barge would hold 1,300,000 lbs of cattle and take approximately seven days to come down the coast. Based on potential losses by sea, Rambur would consider shipping by air instead, since Fort Glenn has huge runways available from the war.

A trip of a life time to a place that very few people in the world know about, or have seen since World War II, may be repeated as both men plan to return, maybe as soon as next year, for more adventures, and to pursue opportunities with the quality animals on Umnak Island. Montana Agriculture in the Classroom Releases the Montana **Invasive Species Education Project**

The Montana Agriculture in the Classroom program has released a comprehensive educational project on invasive species to help increase public awareness, identification, and reporting procedures.

Species that are non-native to Montana, interfere and often destroy native plants, wildlife and livestock habitat, forests, waterways, and food crops. These species, which may not harm the environment in their native area, can cause destruction and major problems when introduced to a new environment. "The impact to agriculture and the environment can total in the millions of dollars once an invasive species is introduced. The best defense is to prevent their introduction in the first place. Where introduction does occur, we need to increase our ability to respond with education to identify and report threats from potential invasive species." said Director Ron de Yong.

MNAXLP

Invasive species addressed in this project include: insects, plant diseases, nematodes, snails, clams, mollusks, crustaceans, reptiles, amphibians, fish, and noxious weeds. Over the past hundred years many plants, insects, and animals have been introduced into North America. Not all of them become invasive and push aside native varieties, but when they do, it can be devastating for the environment and economy, and even

impact human health. Invasive species use every trick in the book to hitch a ride to a new land - some have been spotted for sale on the internet, brought in as pets, or sold for ornamental landscaping. Step one is to learn about potential invasive alien invaders in your area. The Montana Invasive Species Education project includes identification cards, a poster, pocket guides, and other resource materials. Educators will be provided with lesson plans, a curriculum book on invasive species, and other materials aligned

to state learning standards. The project is available on the website or by contacting Lorri Brenneman at LBrenneman@





TESORO Contributes \$5.3 Million To Housing Incentive Fund Housing Incentive Fund More Than 70 Percent Capitalized

BISMARCK, ND -Tesoro Corporation today announced a substantial contribution to the North Dakota Housing Incentive Fund (HIF). Company representatives presented Gov. The HIF provides lowcost financing to developers of affordable rental housing. The Industrial Commission, consisting of Dalrymple as chairman, Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring and Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem, oversees NDHFA, the fund administrator.

"We are proud to support North Dakota Housing Finance Agency and its mission to make housing safe and affordable for the state's workforce and its aging population," said Casey. "We believe this initiative will make North Dakota communities stronger and will help spur continued economic growth in the state."

NDHFA began accepting HIF contributions in July. To date, the agency has received \$21.5 million.

"It would be wonderful to say that we are done, but we aren't," added Kline. "We have projects in communities large and small, in the east and in the west that still need support. For many individuals and families, this program is their







Find Your Deer License

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department reminds deer hunters to find their license and check it for accuracy.

Every year the Game and Fish Department's licensing section receives last-minute inquiries from hunters who can't find their license. When that happens, it's difficult to try to get a replacement license in time for the season opener.


Another reason to check the license now is to make sure the unit and species is what was intended.

Deer hunters in need of a replacement license can print out a duplicate (replacement) license application from the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, or can call 701-328-6300 to have an application mailed or faxed. Hunters who obtain a duplicate license at a Game and Fish district office must pay by either a check or money order which is available at most convenience stores. Cash or credit cards are not accepted.

The form must be completely filled out and notarized, and sent back in to the department with a fee.
