# SHS Class Project Shoe Drive Extended To End Of January

Earlier in December, the eight members of the leadership class at Sidney High School had to split into two groups and come up with a plan for their semester project. One group chose to attempt to change school policy about decorating graduation caps, but the other decided to hold a shoe drive.

Corbin Steinbeisser, Corben Holler, Hailey Holzworth, and Treyce Bower looked around at the world around them. They noticed that several of their classmates had shoes that had holes in them, were very dirty, or just falling apart. Holler said he even had a cousin that needed new shoes. They noticed that there are organizations around Sidney that hold food drives, toy drives, and clothing drives yearly but no one holds shoe drives. They decided that holding a shoe drive would not only be a good semester project, it would also benefit the community around them. They set up a drop-off box in the main entry of the high school and left flyers with a number to call if someone wanted them to pick shoes up from their home or office. They started taking shoes on Dec. 12 and planned to finish on Dec. 19 but quickly realized that seven days is not enough time for a drive of

any kind. Now, even though the class ended in the fourth week of December, they plan to continue to take shoes until Jan. 31.

Once the drive is over, the group first plans to go to the school administration and see if they know of anyone in need of new shoes. From there, they will take some to the Salvation Army and shelters in Sidney. If there are any more left the (Continued on page 3A)

# **MOGA Applauds Montana Fish** & Wildlife **Commission For Strategic Hunting** Season Changes

Helena - The Montana Outfitters and Guides Associ-

ation has recognized the Montana Fish and Wildlife Commission for making important changes to the state's hunting season rules and regulations. The Commission's actions strike a delicate balance between wildlife management, conservation efforts, public access, and hunter opportunity.

Speaking on behalf of MOGA, Mac Minard, executive director, emphasized the critical nature of these changes. "These are pivotal adjustments designed to protect mule deer populations, enhance hunting opportunities in specified regions, and re-establish vital boundaries," stated Minard. "The commission demonstrated careful consideration in addressing concerns related to hunter overcrowding and took proactive measures to tackle issues like the alarming decline in mule deer numbers. These changes underscore the commission's commitment to striking a balance between managing wildlife populations and habitats while supporting Montana's hunting community."

MOGA recognizes the importance of these amendments in supporting sustainable hunting practices and ensuring the long-term health of Montana's wildlife. The association recognizes the commission's ongoing efforts to preserving the state's resources and providing a fulfilling hunting experience for residents and visitors alike.

Examples of specific changes were:

· Conservation efforts for mule deer in Regions 6 and 7 by limiting doe mule deer harvests

· Improved antelope management precision and hunter distribution to reduce crowding

· Improved elk hunting opportunities in HD 314

· Addressed mule deer declines in HD 417 while balancing hunter opportunities

· Took initial steps to preserve Wild Sheep hunting in the unlimited areas while addressing hunter crowding

"This suite of changes, passed unanimously, represent significant conservation achievements for mule deer and antelope and will help distribute elk and antelope hunters across the state," added Minard.



of the success of the Hardin team under his coaching, helping them to a record of 21-10 in those three years, including many firsts for the program.

In 2009, the family made the move to Fairview where Gackle is principal at East Fairview School while his wife teaches high school math at Fairview. He became assistant coach of the Warriors in 2010, then head coach in 2013. In 2014, he left the job mid-season but returned as 5th and 6th grade coach in 2017 when his son, Deacon, started to play. In 2021, he resumed the position as head coach of the high school. Because Gackle started coaching the kids who are now seniors and juniors while they were in elementary school, he was able to build the program from the ground up and had a good idea back then that the team would be good. "The talent was there," he said. He is extremely proud of his players and credits their success with their work ethic, saying that they didn't just play football three months of the year, but put in the work year-round. Gackle said that losing the semi-final game, last year, motivated them and proved to the players that they were good; they just needed to keep working hard. "They're also a joy to be around," Gackle said. "There's no 'me first', no drama. They play for each other, it's We, not Me." Even the long road trips were a treat. Gackle said, "The players knew they had a shot to be good and didn't waste that opportunity." "It was fun watching the kids get better and realize their potential," he continued. pants for a focus group on infrastructure safety in Williston. The effort is part of the Infrastructure Safety Action Plan for which the City of Williston, with assistance from SRF Consulting and Interstate Engineering, has received funding from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).

The Infrastructure Safety Action Plan will combine data about crashes and other transportation information with community input. This information will be used to prioritize transportation infrastructure projects that address safety challenges for those traveling in the Williston area and to support future funding opportunities for safety projects.









Fritz's big event of the year is going back to Lambert for the 4th of July celebration. At the last all school reunion he won the award for being the oldest one there. He was 92.
