By Jaymi Mozeak According to Badlands Search and Rescue Service, in a Facebook post Sept. 17, on Sept. 16, Badlands Search and Rescue along with the Dawson County Sheriff department performed ground searches in an attempt to locate Renee Arcand. To date, there is still no sign or clues that have been found that definitively point to Arcand's disappearance On Sept. 16, Badlands Search and Rescue members searched a total of 19.25 miles of roadway on Dawson County Rd 551 and Montana State Highway 16 from the junction with CR 551 north to the Dawson/ Richland County line and south to the Thirteen Mile Creek crossing before concluding operations due to loss of light. Back on June 26, Arcand disappeared from Intake. She was last seen at the Intake campground. After searching for her for a few days, her companion reported her missing on July 1. On the evening of Aug. 13, a Richland County resident found what they felt were human skeletal remains along the Yellowstone River, downstream from Intake, while participating in recreational activities, but the identity of those remains are still being investigated by the state crime labs. In Badland's post they expressed their appreciation of the motorists that slowed down and proceeded with caution upon seeing the emergency lights ahead and their personnel on foot. They are also asking hunters, anglers, boaters, and anyone else on the Yellowstone River if they find anything in question to leave it and call 911. There are additional searches planned to be performed by Badlands Search and Rescue in collaboration with Dawson Sheriff Department and Dawson County SAR before the winter weather hits MNAXI P

### Badlands Cattle Conference at Regency Acres Angus Ranch, Oct. 4

AgPro Solutions & Purina Animal Nutrition in partnership with Thiessen's Regency Acres Angus Ranch will be hosting the inaugural Badlands Cattle Conference this fall. The event will be hosted Wednesday, Oct. 4 at Russell and Jill Thiessen's ranch located 8½ miles south of Lambert and 16 miles west of Crane.

Registration begins at 9 a.m. with speakers lined up to start their presentations at 9:30 a.m. Mark Voll, Zoetis Animal Health, will be speaking about biosecurity threats and calf health at weaning. Dr. Chad Zehnder, Purina Animal Nutrition, will be discussing fetal development and emerging technologies for weaning calves. Dr. Chris Zellmer, Diamond V will present weaning management tips and rumen health and Jon Scofield, Zinpro, will talk about lameness in cattle and the role of trace minerals.

Tri-tip sandwiches will be served at 12:30 p.m., and there will be time that afternoon for questions and observations of cattle on display. Dinner will wrap up the event at 6:30 p.m., with brisket on the menu. Beef and sides are courtesy of Russell and Jill Thiessen.

"I trim sale bulls in the winter and that was how I connected with Russell. We started talking about feed and one thing turned into another discussing a possible field day," said Purina Livestock Production Specialist Austin Buzanowski, Glendive. "We thought it would be a great way to showcase their operation, the feed program, and the partnership between us."

The Badlands Cattle Conference will provide valuable information to those in the industry. They are hopeful that attendees will take home new ideas to apply to their operation. It will additionally serve as an opportunity to network with other cattlemen from the area.

"Our main goal is to provide a lot of worthwhile knowledge. The cattle market is great and feed should be plentiful this fall, so it is a good time to invest in areas that have not been focused on before," Buzanowski explained.



Holden represented the southeast corner of Montana in the state senate for eight years before term limiting out at the end of the 2002 special session. Holden returned to the family ranch to continue with his ranching operations and insurance claims business, since that time

Holden's old senate district contained Dawson, Wibaux, Fallon, Carter, and Powder River counties. The Holden ranch is close to the town of Terry Montana in Prairie County.

This past summer Senator Holden met with and talked to many former colleagues and local area folks that have been active in conservative Montana politics.

Early reports indicate that the eastern half of Montana is ready to send a representative back to Washington, DC, who is active in livestock and farming agriculture.

The Holden family has been running farm and ranch operations in Dawson County for the past 33 years. Ric and his wife, Jan, have a diversified ranch business including sheep, cattle, corn, alfalfa, and grain crops. As a state senator, Ric received "A" ratings from farm organizations on his legislative report cards. He also served as the senate agriculture chairman while in Helena.

Holden said, "There are many issues that are currently stopping our young people from getting ahead in today's current economic climate." Holden went on to say that, "The lack of energy development right here in Montana has been apart of the failed Biden administration policies to attack Montana oil and coal production." These industries are a major part of the eastern Montana economy. Holden continued, "Once these industries are given a chance to produce again, like they were four years ago, our situation in Montana will greatly improve." Holden said that "A rising tide raises all boats and so goes our agricultural and energy sectors so goes the Montana economy."

No other shots will be given during the clinic. No appointment is needed. Flu shots cannot be given to those who have animals in their vehicles. Children may be in the vehicle, but may not receive flu shots. Follow traffic signs

to enter the fire hall from the north side.

There are no COVID-19 vaccines available at the clinic, and the flu shot does not contain COVID-19 vaccine

The Health Department carries quadrivalent, prefilled svringes that contain no preservative. The price of flu vaccine will vary from \$45-\$85, depending on the individual's age and the type of vaccine used. Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance may be billed for those who bring their cards. For self-pay clients, only cash or check can be accepted.





# Now Available: Draft Missouri River Operating Plan; **Possible Fort Peck Test Flow; Fall Public Meeting Schedule**

Ahead of fall public meetings, the Draft Missouri River Mainstem Reservoir System Annual Operating Plan for the 2023-2024 runoff season is now available for public comment.

The Missouri River Water Management Division has made the draft 2023-2024 Annual Operating Plan available at: https:// www.nwd.usace.army.mil/ MRWM/Public-Meetings/.

The public comment period on the draft plan will close Nov. 30.

The draft plan will be presented to the public in six meetings to be held in early November.

Included in the plan is the possibility for test flows from Fort Peck Dam.

"The purpose of the test flows is to evaluate the potential for achieving

Pallid Sturgeon spawning and recruitment in the upper Missouri River using periodic forecast releases that better replicate historic flows and temperatures and would be conducted to comply with the 2018 Biological Opinion," said John Remus, Missouri **River Water Management** Division Chief.

The basic forecast shown in the draft Annual **Operating Plan indicates** the reservoir may be above the 2227-foot elevation next spring, which is necessary prior to the initiation of the test flows.

Staff from the Omaha District will be available at the public meetings to answer questions related to implementing and monitoring of potential test flows.

Fall public meetings provide an update on current year's runoff and reservoir operations as well as planned operations for the next year's runoff season.



# State Agencies Issue Consumption Advisory For All Fish Species On Yellowstone River Near Train Derailment

Billings - The Fish Consumption Advisory Board, consisting of representatives from Montana Department of Public Health & Human Services (DPHHS), Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks (FWP), has issued a consumption advisory on all fish species in the Yellowstone River from Indian Fort Fishing Access Site (FAS) near Reed Point to the Highway 212 bridge in Laurel. Various polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, or PAHs, were detected at levels high enough to warrant this advisory for all fish species, both game and nongame.

Sampling Results

FWP crews collected

longnose suckers, shorthead redhorse, rainbow trout, brown trout and mountain whitefish from areas upstream and downstream of the June 24 train derailment site at Twin Bridges Road railroad bridge. Multiple species showed levels of various PAHs high enough to warrant an advisory to avoid all consumption. Specific PAHs found in these fish include naphthalene, found in multiple species, and 1- and 2-methylnapthalene and acenaphthylene found only in mountain whitefish. Fish were collected 6.5 river miles upstream of the derailment site near Indian Fort FAS, and 6.2 river miles downstream near Holmgren FAS

### Montana 4-H Enrolling New Members, Seeking Volunteers

Bozeman — Youth across Montana who would like to enroll in Montana 4-H are invited to do so during the month of October.

Montana 4-H is the youth development program of Montana State University Extension. It offers a range of choices and opportunities for youth to learn and grow, such as cooking or sewing, learning about conservation and robotics, or raising an animal, while instilling employable life skills. In all, Montana 4-H offers more than 200 different projects and experiences that engage youth in learning. It is the largest out-of-school youth development program in the state, reaching nearly 20,000 youth in all 56 counties each year.

In general, individuals aged eight to 18 are eligible to participate in Montana 4-H. Some counties also offer a program known as Cloverbuds for children ages five to eight.

The cost to join varies by county; in many counties in Montana, it is about \$20. More information is available at www.montana.edu/extension/4h/join/index.html.

Montana 4-H is also seeking adult volunteers to work with 4-H youth as partners in hands-on learning. Volunteer enrollment is ongoing.

According to Todd Kesner, director of the 4-H Center for Youth Development, volunteers are vital to carrying out the program's mission and vision. Montana's 4-H youth development program relies on volunteers with varying schedules and interests to:

• Provide expertise in educational project areas such as photography, agriculture, food and nutrition, rocketry, robotics, public speaking and more. mountain whitefish from the Yellowstone River below the derailment site to assess human consumption restrictions as a follow-up to the train derailment. This sampling showed elevated levels of phenanthrene, another PAH, in mountain whitefish and a consumption advisory was put in place on Aug. 11 to avoid all consumption of this fish species and motivated the agency to conduct additional sampling. Phenanthrene was not found in any fish during the most recent sampling

Many species of fish, especially brown and rainbow trout, found in this section of the Yellowstone River migrate seasonally for spawning and to find colder water in the warmer summer months. Out of an abundance of precaution and unknown conditions in adjacent sections of the river, those with specific concerns may want to avoid consuming all species of fish from the Yellowstone River at any location until more is known on the severity and prevalence of this contamination.

#### Next Steps

The source of the PAHs remains unknown. Determining a specific source could be challenging, as PAHs, including those found in these fish, are present in many common materials. Some PAHs occur naturally in the environment, especially in the shale rock common in the Yellowstone River Basin. PAHs are also found in products such as oil, gas, plastics, and pesticides; and are produced through combustion of these products.

Further testing is still needed to determine the potential contamination source and long-term guidance. FWP plans to expand sampling on the Yellowstone River to further understand the extent of PAHs for human consumption concerns. Final plans for this additional sampling are still being discussed by FWP, DEQ, and DPHHS, but will include sampling fish from locations on the Yellowstone River further upstream and further downstream of the derailment site

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the International Agency for Research on Cancer have classified naphthalene, 1-methylnaphthalene, and 2-meth-

vlnaphthalene as possibly cancer-causing in humans. The other two PAHs that have been detected in fish tissue samples, phenanthrene and acenaphthene, have not been classified as cancer-causing chemicals. Other health effects from ingesting high levels of PAHs that have been shown in animal studies include effects on the gastrointestinal system, immune system, reproductive system, kidneys and skin. These effects from eating fish have not been recorded in humans.

### North Dakota Waterfowl Season Underway

North Dakota's waterfowl season opens for residents Sept. 23, while nonresidents may begin hunting waterfowl Sept. 30.

The season for swans opens Sept. 30 for both residents and nonresidents who have purchased a swan license.

Hunters may take six ducks, including mergansers, per day, with the following restrictions: five mallards of which two may be hens, three wood ducks, two redheads, two canvasbacks, one scaup, and one pintail. Mergansers are included in the total duck limit, with no species restrictions. Hunters can take two additional bluewinged teal Sept. 23 through Oct. 8.

The hunting season for Canada geese will close Dec. 16 in the eastern zone, Dec. 21 in the western zone and Dec. 29 in the Missouri River zone. The season for whitefronts closes Dec. 3, while the season for light geese is open through Dec. 29.

Shooting hours for all geese are one-half hour before sunrise to 2 p.m. each day.

Extended shooting hours for all geese are permitted from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset on Saturdays and Wednesdays through the end of each season. Starting Nov. 26, all day hunting is also allowed on Sundays through the end of each season.


The bag limit for Canada geese during the regular season is eight daily and 24 in possession, except in the Missouri River zone where the limit is five daily and 15 in possession.

The daily limit on whitefronts is three with nine in possession, and light geese have a daily limit of 50 with no possession limit.

In accordance with state law, nonresidents are not allowed to hunt on North Dakota Game and Fish Department wildlife management areas or conservation Private Land Open To Sportsmen areas from Oct. 7-13, with the exception of nonresidents hunting on PLOTS land they own.

Hunters who do not HIP certify when they buy a North Dakota license can add it through the Game and Fish website at gf.nd. gov. Those who registered to hunt North Dakota's spring light goose season or August Management Take/Early September Canada goose season do not have to register with HIP again, as it is required in each state only once per year.

Hunters should refer to the *North Dakota 2023-24 Hunting and Trapping Guide* for further details on the waterfowl season.

### Youth Pheasant Weekend Sept. 30-Oct. 1

North Dakota's two-day youth pheasant season, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1, is a great opportunity to introduce a new hunter to the outdoors, with limited competition.

That's when legally licensed residents and nonresidents 15 and younger can hunt rooster pheasants, statewide. An adult, at least 18, must accompany the youth hunter in the field. The adult may not carry a firearm.

A general game and habitat license is required, and hunters 12 and older need to have passed a certified hunter education course or obtain an apprentice hunter validation, which allows an individual to hunt small game for one license year without completing hunter education.

The daily bag limit and all other regulations for the regular pheasant season apply. See the North Dakota 2023-24 Hunting and Trapping Guide for additional information.


