Although Micah-Zane was the first baby born in 2017, 2016 was a busy year for the obstetric department. In the past year, 132 babies were delivered at Sidney Health Center averaging 11 babies per month. Seventy of the babies were girls while sixty-two were boys.

Sidney Health Center's female Obstetrician Gynecologists provide essential obstetrical services to women living in the MonDak region including preconception counseling, genetic screening and diagnosis as well as management of both low and high risk pregnancies through delivery and follow-up care. Dr. Lisa Ross and Dr. Maula Tambi have been practicing in Sidney

since summer 2016.

The Sidney Health Center obstetric and newborn units feature Labor, Delivery, Recovery, Postpartum (LDRP) rooms. These rooms are equipped with Jacuzzi tubs and Hill-Rom birthing beds. During labor, options for pain medication are offered. A trained and experienced OB and Nursery Staff is available 24 hours a day.

The obstetric department also offers a One-Day Childbirth Class four times per year with the first one in 2017 scheduled for February 4 in the hospital classroom from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Instructors, Joyce Schulz, RN and Katharine King, RN will review the following topics: relaxation, anatomy and physiology of childbirth, types of delivery, anesthesia, breast feeding and child care. The session

is free of charge; however, donations up to \$25 are gladly accepted to cover expenses.

A new option for those parents who cannot attend conventional prenatal classes or would like home-based education, is the eLearning Childbirth Education Program. It may also be used as a "refresher" course or to reinforce what you learned in class. City Deputy Terminated

Lt. Michael Schmitz was fired on December 30 by the interim sheriff of McKenzie County, Matthew Johansen. The deputy had already been suspended from the department in October.

Schmitz, a three year veteran of the department, was scheduled for a hearing with the McKenzie County Commission to address allegations of bullying made by an independent firm that had done a workplace investigation within the department in the summer of 2016. Before the scheduled hearing could commence, however, Schmitz was relieved of duty after new findings of misconduct were reportedly discovered.

McKenzie County human resource manager, Amanda Willis, stated that the Bureau of Criminal Investigation is looking into the new allegations against Schmitz, but stopped short of specifying details of the offense.

The recent discoveries that led to the firing of Lt. Schmitz do not bode well for embattled Sheriff, Gary Schwartzenberger, who faces similar allegations as those that initially led to the deputy's suspension. Just as Schmitz faced allegations of bullying, Schwartzenberger was similarly accused of angry tantrums and unnecessary rigidness. The accusations against Schwartzenberger led to the North Dakota state's attorney, by petition of the McKenzie County commissioners, to request that then-Governor Jack Dalrymple remove Schwartzenberger from office. The state Attorney General's office then approved the request and removal proceedings are currently being conducted by a special prosecutor.

Starting on December 19, an actual hearing in the case will possibly not finish until early spring. Both the special prosecutor, Bill O'Driscoll and Schwartzenberger's defense attorney, Michael Geiermann. have requested 90 more days to fully prepare for the hearing.

Once the hearing concludes, a special commissioner will have ten days to send a recommendation regarding Schwartzenberger to Governor Doug Burgum. A petition circulated locally to retain the Sheriff has reached several hundred signatures, but ultimately the North Daktoa Governor will have final say regarding whether or not Schwartzenberger continues as McKenzie County Sheriff.





The Cold is **Upon Us**

As all of us know in our region the last few weeks have been cold, windy and full of snow. This article is going to be discussing safety while traveling and home insulation. Traveling in winter is something that will always have to be done, but we have to be safe about it. Of course taking your time and driving where roads are plowed are common thoughts when driving in winter, but what about a snow emergency kit? A shovel, snow brush, warm blankets, food, and winter clothes are important items to keep in your vehicle. Another item that may come in handy is sand/ cat litter to help with a tractor when stuck. Yes, these items take up room but may become extremely helpful if you were ever to get stranded. Putting a good weather app on your phone is important, to know the updated weather for each area of the state you might be traveling. As we have seen, weather and wind can play a huge factor in traveling the

last few weeks. Remember to always have a fully charged cell phone with you, the cold can sometimes draw battery on your phone.

Keeping your house warm is sometimes a challenge, especially with older homes. Some of the items I am going to mention can't be done in the winter. If you are remodeling or residing, that is a great time to add new insulation to your home. In the attic of your home R-49 to R-60 is what is recommended, while R-13 to R-21 is recommended. Fiberglass batt insulation, for example, has an R-value of 3 to 3.5 per inch, so 3.5 inches of insulation would equal approximately R-13. Ken Hellevang, NDSU Extension Service Agricultural Engineer notes it is difficult to increase that in an existing 2 by 4 stud wall. Typically you're looking at opening up the walls, either internally or externally. Even with a reasonable indoor temperature. homes can feel colder due to insufficient insulation. Homeowners also should be aware of gaps in the insulation. It is easier to insulation the middle portion of your attic, but once

edges and corners, it becomes a challenge. This information is from Adequate Insulation Keeps Home Warm, Saves Money from NDSU Agriculture Communication News. Another option to help keep your home warm is window treatments, before considering window treatments you can caulk, weatherstrip, air seal and insulate attics. Window treatments need to have insulating properties to reduce the U-factor but increasing the R-value. In order for a window treatment to achieve the intended insulative value a tight seal all around the window is needed to trap air Multiple layers of shades and/ or drapes can help achieve this effect. Draft stoppers filled with sand help block drafts at the bottom of the window treatment. Open weave fabrics, reed or bamboo shades filter direct sunlight but have little insulation value. 



Who can protest this license? Protests will be accepted from residents of the

county of the proposed location (Roosevelt), residents of adjoining Montana counties (Daniels, Valley, McCone, Richland, Sheridan) and residents of adjoining counties in another state if the criteria in 16-4-207(4)(d), Montana Code Annotated (MCA), are met.

What information must be included?

Protest letters must be legible and contain (1) the protestor's full name, mailing address, and street address: (2) the license number (17-212-6839-302) and the applicant's name (Black Horse Hotel & Casino LLC.) (3) an ndication that the letter is intended as a protest (4) a description of the grounds for protesting; and (5) the protestor's signature. A letter with multiple signatures will be considered one protest letter.

What are valid protest grounds?

The protest may be based on the applicant's qualifications listed in 16-4-401, MCA, or the grounds for denial of an application in 16-4-405, MCA. Examples of valid protest grounds include: (1) the applicant is unlikely to operate the establishment in compliance with the law; (2) the proposed location cannot be properly policed by local authorities; and (3) the welfare of the people in the vicinity of the proposed location will be adversely and seriously affected.

How are protests submitted? Protests must be postmarked to the Departmen

of Revenue, Office of Dispute Resolution, P.O. Box 5805, Helena, Montana 59604-5805 on oil before January 23, 2017.

What happens if the transfer is protested? Depending on the number of protests and the

protest grounds, a public hearing will be held in Helena or Bainville. All valid protestors will be notified of the hearing's time, date and location. Hearings typically are scheduled vithin 90 days. A protester's hearing testimony is limited to the grounds in the protester's letter. Following the hearing, the Department of Revenue will notify the public whether the license transfer is approved or denied.
