# **Dominos Pizza To Open In Sidney**

Twenty years ago, two young men from Cody, WY took a leap of faith and purchased the Dominos pizza store in their hometown. Allan Erwin had been delivering Dominos pizza while attending college in Bozeman, while Bill Leiker was fresh out of the military. With an incredible amount of work and business savvy, as well as a successful brand, the pair quickly expanded to stores throughout Wyoming, Rapid City, SD, Montana and North Dakota. By 2015, they were one of the top operators in the Dominos family, with the largest geographical area to cover. They were recognized for outstanding operations at the Domino's convention in Las Vegas and asked to expand their operations to New York State, primarily in the Rochester and Buffalo areas. They bought six stores initially, have built seven more to date, and are building five more per year in the smaller locations in the area. The Sidney store will make number 36. "We grew up in a small town, went to school in Cody. We mostly build in small towns," Leiker explained.

Their latest small town venture is in Sidney at the Shops at Fox Run with the restaurant scheduled to open by the end of the year. The store will feature inside seating for 25, plus take out and delivery up to nine minutes away. Dominos boasts an average delivery time of 22 minutes from when the order is placed to at your door, ensuring hot, fresh pizza. Sandwiches, buffalo wings, salads, pasta and desserts are also on the menu.

The Sidney location will honor all nationally advertised offers and also has an online rewards program with a free medium pizza after six visits totaling at least \$10. Plan to watch the game on two big screen TVs as well.

Customers will enjoy the pizza theatre where they can watch the pizzas being made and going through the ovens, and a child step -up allows your kids to be "pizza inspectors." Kids can get creative on the huge chalk wall too, making their experience even more special.

Birthday parties are special at Dominos since, with advanced notice and timing, the birthday child can actually make their own pizza. Tours are available for elementary students and daycares, and non-profit organizations are encouraged to ask about fundraising ideas.

Shane Aust, supervisor for the Dickinson and Williston stores, will temporarily mange the Sidney store but applicants for all positions are now being sought, with a total of about 20 positions to fill.

Dominos calls itself "Happy People Pizza LLC" and promotes teamwork, fun and integrity. Its mission is to create opportunities for it's team members by being the #1 pizza company in every neighborhood. Leiker said that 90% of Dominoes franchisees started as delivery drivers or pizza makers. "We're living the American Dream," he said. "Two poor kids with some college, lots of hard work and ambition, and this is where we are now."

Leiker, his girlfriend Heather and his mom Nancy build the stores since local contractors are not always easy to come by. Erwin, his best friend since the 5th grade, is Franchisee; David Shearer, who started as a delivery driver and manager, from Sturgis, is the director of operations for the western region.

Leiker and his team are excited to bring Dominos to Sidney and look forward to offering you the best pizza experience in the area very soon.

# **Burrito Bros. Brings Food to Fuel Adventure to Watford City**

According to owners Ryan Seigfried and Nick Ybarra, their new Watford City restaurant offers "food to fuel your adventures." The new restaurant offers an array of burritos, bowls, salads and nachos made from fresh ingredients. Located at 113 South

Main Street in Watford City, Burrito Bros. replaced the Siggy's sandwich shop, and is the third of Seigfried's Watford City area restaurants. Seigfried and Ybarra's partnership was born out of a love for extreme experiences. Ybarra is the founder of the Save the Maah Daah Hey non-profit, which encourages the use and preservation of North Dakota's Maah Daah Hey Trail through extreme races. According to Ybarra, Seigfried specializes in "extreme catering", having catered several Maah Daah Hey races over the years. "At one of the races, I watched him cater food for over 300 people, at the finish line from sun up to sun down all by himself," Ybarra said of his now business partner. When Ybarra asked Seigfreid why

he would put himself through such a challenging day without any help he simply responded, "Just like you like extreme mountain biking, I like extreme

Seigfried and Ybarra developed Burrito Bros. based on the idea that food is fuel. "We wanted the kind of food that we wanted to eat-something used as fuel for hard working people," Ybarra explained. "I view food as not only an enjoyable necessity of life, but something that fuels me for my job and adventures," including hosting and riding 100 mile races on the Maah Daah Hey. "You can come and eat in, or take it to go. It's fast, easy and healthy."

Seigfried feels that Burrito Bros. is filling a void in Watford City. "We serve both ends of the spectrum. Our burritos are over a pound. There are a lot of people out working hard, so it makes it easy to fuel yourself with combinations of our rice, beans, meat and other additions," he explained. Ybarra added, "You can have the biggest, baddest truck in the Bakken, but if you don't put the right fuel in the tank, it isn't going anywhere, people

are the same way."

Seigfried said the most popular menu item is the California burrito, made with steak, fresh, made-daily guacamole and pico de gallo, and monterrey cheese, topped with French fries. Other offerings include a 'choose your own adventure' option, with a selection of rice, beans, and fresh toppings, as well as other specialties, including a 4-pound 'Brorito,' which comes with a Burrito Bros. trucker hat. Finish the 'Brorito' in under an hour and you get your picture on the Brorito Wall of Fame.

The restaurant is family-friendly, Ybarra said. "We both have daughters, and we know what it's like to eat out with kids," he said. "The first thing we did was add a baby changing station in the bathroom. I know what it's like to be a dad and have to change a diaper in your lap, leaning against the wall.'

The interior décor includes lots of locally reclaimed wood, saved from the landfill and other industrial accents. "We wanted to take the existing space and not only give the community another good

food option, but also make a small part of Main Street a little more useable and enjoyable,"

Ybarra said. The restaurant, which opened in late October, was well-received in the Watford City community. Their Facebook page includes customer reviews boasting "Totally mouthwatering cuisine," and "great service and a welcoming environment," as well as photos of their fresh ingredients, and a selfie of Ybarra himself, fueling his Maah Daah Hey adventure with Burrito Bros.

Though the first week they were "crushed," having actually run out of food, said Seigfried, they've adjusted a few things, and "now it's going really well."

Matthew Johansen unseated incumbent sheriff of McKenzie County, Gary Schwartzenberger, and did so by a wide margin. With 2,496 votes accounting for 60.89 percent of the votes cast, Johansen's win amounted to an electoral landslide. Johansen had previously served as McKenzie County's interim sheriff.

The Roundup spoke to Johansen after his victory about his campaign win and his plans for the future of the McKenzie County Sheriff's Department. Johansen explained that his immediate plans were more practical, but would grow as his inauguration approaches.

Johansen explained, "Well, I've got to take signs down today. But I'm just starting to make some plans and I'm looking forward to January 1. I'll be getting people in place for the positions that need to be filled administratively."

When asked if Schwartzenberger would be retained as a deputy, Johansen responded, "I don't have any plans for that, but I wish him well in the future."

Johansen also suggested that it would be likely some past deputies, who left during Schwartzenberger's tenure, would want to return. He said, "Some have expressed interest in return. Others would like to, but can't just uproot and move back because they have families. There are some, I believe. I won't know for sure until after January 1."

"We're going to try to get our staffing taken care of and where it's supposed to be. And then, hopefully we can schedule so we get the coverage we need in the county. And that should include the western part of the county as well."

Johansen, who had a small get-together the night of the victory but says it wasn't a party per se, said his victory is still

sen told supporters, "I wanted to take just a few minutes tonight and say thank you to the citizens of McKenzie County. I'm humbled by your confidence in me, and honored to be your Sheriff-Elect. We have a great future ahead of synergy between the law enforcement agencies, a department filled with capable leaders, and fiscally accountable standards, as well as making sure our outlying areas get the service they have been lacking."

He continued, "There is a lot of work to be done. I look forward to the future and invite you to join me and move beyond the troubles of the past to build a stronger and safer McKenzie County."

### **Montana and Wyoming Malt Barley and Sugar Beet Symposium set** for Jan. 8-9 in Billings

BOZEMAN — Registration is now open for the 2019 Montana and Wyoming Malt Barley and Sugar Beet Symposium, which will be held Jan. 8-9 at the Billings Hotel and Convention Center in Billings. The event is hosted by the Mountain States Crop Education Association, or MSCEA, which is comprised of industry representatives as well as Montana State University Extension faculty members.

The first day of the event will focus on barley production topics related to seed treatments and grain storage, as well as soil conservation and precision agriculture. Featured speakers include Raj Khosla, professor of precision agriculture at Colorado State University, and Frankie Crutcher, plant pathologist at the MSU Eastern Agricultural Research Center. The second day will focus on sugar beet production, with Luther Markwart, executive vice president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, serving as the keynote speaker.



# Forward to the Past

Sometimes enough is enough. I'm thinking specifically here of cell phones. My husband and I both have used Tracfone for years; you maybe remember, those old-fashion flip phones that don't do much else other than allow us to dial out and to receive calls. Incidentally having a phone, not a mini computer, is our sole purpose in having a portable communications device we can carry in our pockets. We do not text, we don't want to check weather, access the Internet, nor do we feel the need to keep in constant touch with anyone via Facebook or by any other electronic method. If I want a camera, I own a very good one that takes great pictures and does nothing else, which suits me just fine. I have no wish to carry around a smart phone to order and organize my life for me.

A month or so ago my husband's flip phone quit working in the house. He still got great service outside the cabin, but inside the cabin, his phone told him he had no service. My cell still worked just fine in the house so we figured something in his phone decided to stop working and probably he needed a replacement.

What an eye-opener we encountered when looking for a new phone. The first surprise came when we discovered no one wants to sell us a flip phone any longer. Companies want to sell phones that do it all, and of course the price they want for such devices makes me snort in disbelief. We do not WANT a phone that does it all. The second shock of course involves the price of these contraptions. We have no intentions of paying the amount of money that companies want for these phones. Some of them cost more than a desk top computer. I don't care if these phones can simultaneously sing the Hallelujah chorus, dance on the tabletop, get rid of salesmen, and dust my furniture while also splitting and stacking wood for the wood stove. This old gal will NOT pay that kind of money for a phone.

We searched high and low for a new phone for my husband, and with great trepidation I ordered one that was on sale, had next to no additional features, and that cost \$50. I figured the phone would not be too 'smart' and that my husband only needed to use the call in and out features.

When the phone arrived, I went through Tracfone to get it set up, only it didn't work. I wasted three evenings talking to various Tracfone representatives, and no one could get this phone to operate. An 'expert' finally told me that the new phone did not recognize its own SIM code. "So, this phone is a dud?" I inquired, and the hesitant voice on the other end of the line assured me that yes indeed, my new phone was worthless and I would have to send it back. So I then asked that this genius of technology please strip the information from the new phone and put it all back on my husband's old original phone, and we would just continue to use that one.

Hah. With all this modern technology, the expert informed me that they had cancelled the SIM card on the old phone, and that no, they could not resurrect that old SIM number, but they could issue a new SIM card that would take five business days to reach us, and at that point we could reestablish information and use the old flip phone.

Needless to say, we were not amused. We waited several days for the new SIM card to arrive in the mail. When it arrived, I again contacted Tracfone to get the information put back on the old phone and to get it up and working again.

The technician who helped me was thunderstruck that we wanted the new 'smart' phone disconnected and to resume service on the old flip phone. "You are putting your information on this old flip phone," he asked incredulously.

You bet. My opinion of the newfangled phones couldn't sink any lower.

The technician reestablished service on the old phone within minutes. My husband now has his old phone in working order again, and of course it still doesn't work in the house.

We did some research, talked to a few people, and have come to a few conclusions. We discovered that others are becoming disillusioned with cell phones as well. We are not alone.

We also learned that companies continually upgrade the towers so these towers will no longer support outdated phones (or antiquated people who have no wish for a phone that does it all). Cell phone companies continue to 'improve' their products, add more features, and then expect users to happily embrace newer models at ridiculously inflated prices.

Not this old couple. We won't allow a cell phone company to coerce us into purchasing crap we don't want, won't use, and certainly don't need.

My husband and I have reached a decision. When our outdated cell phones quit working for whatever reason, we are done with them altogether. We will cease to carry cell phones and will return to our past by installing a land line phone. We already made good on our decision by having the land line installed, and if anyone wants to reach us, they can call the land line, leave us a message on that device called an answering machine, and we may or may not choose to get back to them. The local cooperative supplies land line service for less than a dollar a day, our phone has three handsets so we have one in the cabin, one in my office, and the third one in Rod's shop. Less than a dollar a day beats the prices of cellphones and the contracts that go with them.

I will do nothing to hasten the demise of my cell phone, but I certainly will not miss it in any way, shape, or form when it ceases



gas gathering and processing facilities in the Williston Basin. Headquartered in Tulsa, Oklahoma, but with an operation center in Sidney, Montana,

ONEOK has a large and growing operation in the Bakken oilfield. That operation is set to grow even larger with an additional project in the area that will increase pipeline capacity and natural gas processing capacity exponentially.

Expecting to spend \$410 million dollars on the new project, ONEOK is beginning the Demicks Lake II natural gas processing plant in McKenzie County, North Dakota. It is slated for completion in early 2020.

Demicks Lake I, the project's predecessor, is a gas processing plant that was suspended from completion during the 2015 oilfield downturn, and it was just announced in March of 2018 that the project is again being continued. That plant was deemed as especially important given its location in Fort Berthold, which has to flare more than 80 percent of the gas released from wells in-

stead of it being captured and utilized. That location is also central for Bakken production. Demicks Lake I is supposed to be online by the end of 2019, but will soon be operating at capacity, making the Demicks Lake II addition a necessity.

Demicks Lake II will increase ONEOK's capacity in the Bakken, effectively doubling their ability to process natural gas at this location. Upon completion, ONEOK's natural gas regional processing capacity will increase to more than 1.4 billion cubic feet per day. The completion of both projects is already approved by the Public Service

Commission.

ONEOK is also expanding in other regions with new projects, including the Arbuckle II pipeline in Texas and Oklahoma, which will increase their natural gas capacity by 100 thousand barrels per day.
