



## Local **Artist Trish** Stevenson To Draw In Alexander

Local artist Trish Stevenson will be the featured artist at the Alexander Farmer's Market on Saturday, July 15.

Stevenson will quick draw a piece that will be auctioned at the Farmer's Market. A quick draw is where an artist spends a short amount of time to produce a work, and is a type of art performance. "I do a lot of quick draws. It's something to entertain a crowd and it demonstrates your artwork so people can see how your process is completed from start to finish," Stevenson explained.

For this piece, Stevenson will use pastels, and anticipates spending an hour on the artwork, though she has completed quick draws in less time. "In Miles City, they give us half an hour. This one I'm thinking more like an hour," she said.

Stevenson has been a professional artist for many years, and her work has been displayed in exhibits all over the region. Most recently, she won the Stampede Purchase Award at the 2017 Stampede Western Invitation Art Show in Greeley, Colorado, with her painting, "Gettin' Sideways". "It was a huge honor and it'll be in their permanent collection and featured on the 2018 show poster and marketing materials," Stevenson said of the accomplishment.

The Farmer's Market is sponsored by the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum, and has run each summer in the Alexander City Park for decades. The local Lion's Club serves burgers, local producers sell their products, and entertainment is included. Stevenson is excited to be part of the activities and is supportive of the mission of the Trail Museum. "It's a really good cause. It's just a treasure to go in and see how people lived back in the day. It's very interesting to see how things progressed with farming over the years," Stevenson said.

The winning bidder will receive the original western-themed painting after it is framed.


Proceeds will benefit the activities of the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum. The Farmer's Market begins at 6 p.m. on July 15.

#### **SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available to Montana Small Businesses**

Small nonfarm businesses in eight Montana counties and five neighboring counties in North Dakota and South Dakota are now eligible to apply for low-interest federal disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by drought in the following primary counties that began June 27, 2017, announced Director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

Primary Montana counties: Dawson, Fallon and Wibaux; Neighboring Montana counties: Carter, Custer, McCone, Prairie and Richland;

Neighboring North Dakota counties: Bowman, Golden Valley, McKenzie and Slope;

Neighboring South Dakota county: Harding.

"SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster," Garfield said.

Small nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

"Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 3.215 percent for businesses and 2.5 percent for private nonprofit organizations, a maximum term of 30 years and are available to small businesses and most private nonprofits without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Garfield said.

By law, SBA makes Economic Injury Disaster Loans available when the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. The Secretary declared this disaster on July 6, 2017.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance in drought disasters.

Applicants may apply online, receive additional disaster assistance information and download applications at https:// disasterloan.sba.gov/ela. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for information on SBA disaster assistance. Individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing may call (800) 877-8339. Completed applications should be mailed to U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

The deadline to apply for these loans is March 6, 2018.

For several years, Sidney Health Center has offered a Birthday Month Health Screen to individuals 18 years and older that are registered as a Birthday Club Member. The Annual Health Screen includes a chemistry panel that evaluates kidney and liver function, blood sugar and electrolytes, a blood count which identifies anemia or infection as well as a lipid (cholesterol) panel.

Birthday Club Members receive a reminder card/certificate in the mail to have their blood screened at a reduced rate during

their birthday month. Participants then follow the simple instructions on the card to take advantage of the cost-effective Birthday Month Health Screen.

During their birthday month, members take the postcard certificate to the admissions desk at Sidney Health Center, fill out the necessary paperwork, and are directed to the lab to have their blood drawn. Payment in full is required upon completion of paperwork and no insurance is filed for this community benefit

The results of the tests and a general explanation sheet are mailed to participants following the blood draw as well as delivered through My Chart. It is the responsibility of the patient to review the results with their provider. Follow-up testing should be based on personal and family history and by recommendation of their personal primary care provider.

Patients are encouraged to get a baseline blood test screening done by age 20 to identify early risk factors. The







## Hunter **Bonus Points**

Submitted by Montana Fish Wildlife & Parks

Hunters who did not apply for bonus points during this years big game drawings or who are new to hunting, can now purchase a bonus point until September 30 to help in next years drawing.

This new feature at Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks was set up by House Bill 623, introduced by Rep. Kerry White during the 2017 Legislature, and allows anyone who missed applying for bonus points to still participate in the program by purchasing a bonus point for the drawings.

The legislation also ensured any bonus points accumulated will not expire, allowing hunters the ability to plan better and still be competitive in the bonus point program. It does not provide additional opportunity to gain bonus points because you cannot apply for and purchase bonus points in the same year.

In Montana, every hunter who applies for a special license through a big game drawing can participate in the bonus point system for an extra fee. Bonus points essentially allow more opportunities to get licenses through the drawing.

The fee to purchase a bonus point without applying for a license is \$15 per species for residents and the nonresident fees are \$25 per species except for moose, sheep, and goat which are \$75 per species. Hunters can purchase bonus points for species which they have not yet applied for already. For instance, if you've never applied for a moose license, you can purchase a moose bonus point.



## Montana **FSA: USDA Authorizes Additional** Flexibilities for **Producers in Northern Great Plains**

USDA authorized emergency grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres during the primary nesting season in North Dakota, South Dakota, and Montana in the counties meeting D2 or greater, as indicated by the US Drought Monitor. Since that time the drought has continued to deepen and the forecast is for hot, dry weather in the upcoming week in the northern plains. As such, USDA is authorizing emergency grazing of CRP for any county in which any part of its border lies within 150 miles of a county approved for emergency grazing of CRP.

In addition, for any county in which any part of its border lies within 150 miles of any county approved for emergency grazing of CRP, USDA will allow CRP contract holders who hay their acreage according to their mid-management conservation plan to donate their hay to livestock producers. CRP contract holders still have the ability to sell their hay with a 25 percent reduction in their annual rental payment as they've been fully authorized to do in the past.


Emergency haying is not authorized at this time. USDA will continue to monitor conditions and will consider expanding emergency authority if conditions worsen.

Eligible CRP participants can use the acreage for grazing their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage. There will be no CRP annual rental payment reductions assessed for acres grazed.

Producers must contact FSA for written approval prior to beginning any emergency CRP activity.



several studies on Fusarium head blight this year. She will be giving recommendations

on how to prevent Fusarium head blight and vomitoxin grain contamination. She also has some fungicide studies for control of Ascochyta blight in chickpeas and field peas. She will also provide and discuss recommendations for detection and fungicide application.

"After last year's Fusarium head blight outbreak in Eastern Montana, there have been many questions about how to detect and control the disease. We have both fungicide studies as well as spring wheat, durum, and barley breeding lines in the Fusarium head blight experimental plots. We will use the results we get Crutcher has conducted from these experiments over the next couple of years to develop more tools for growers to lower vomitoxin levels

#### MSU Researcher Attunes Environmental Factors To Pea Genetics To Increase Montana Crop Yield And Performance

Farmers in Montana, and other parts of the Northern Great Plains, are shifting from cereal-only cropping to a cereal-dry pea cropping system. This transition is not without its share of unknowns, however,

Scientists say yield and performance of pea crops depend on both their genetics and the environment. Environmental factors such

as temperature and rainfall can vary greatly. Farmers in different parts of the Plains need to know which varieties of pea will do well in the area

they are farming. Chengci Chen of Montana State University's College of Agriculture and the Montana Agricultural Experiment Station, is working to generate that information. He has been studying how pea genetics interact with the environment to affect crop yields, and pea protein and starch content.

"Ultimately, I hope to be able to recommend which pea varieties to cultivate to growers in various environments," Chen said.

To do that, Chen and his colleagues tested how nine different varieties of pea performed when grown in five locations across Montana. These locations were spread across the state and had different soils and climatic conditions.

Chen examined yield and protein and starch content of the different pea varieties.

"These are characteristics that are important to growers and end users," he says. Pea varieties that have higher yield can bring more profits to producers. Varieties that have higher protein or starch contents interest different end

users. For example, "dry yellow peas are fractionated into protein, starch and fiber. These components are widely used in food ingredients, especially by health-food businesses," Chen explains. "The market for pea protein is growing rapidly because it is non-dairy and

allergen-friendly." When the researchers evaluated the nine pea varieties grown in different environments, they found that "pea yield is affected by both genetics and environment, but environment has the larger effect," Chen said. Pea protein content is largely affected by environment as well. However, one kind of starch - resistant starch - content is mainly con-

trolled by genetics. "Resistant starch is important because it is beneficial to human health," Chen said. "It's a type of starch that escapes digestion in the small intestine. Instead, it is fermented by intestinal bacteria in the large intestine into short-chain fatty acids. "These short-chain fatty acids can be absorbed by the colon or used by bacteria as energy, which provides many benefits to the colon and

to the body," Chen said. Also, since resistant starch does not release glucose within the small intestine, it helps balance the body's blood sugars. That helps everyone, especially individuals with diabetes," Chen added.

Growing pea crops benefit the environment as well," Chen said.

"Pea is an excellent rotation crop for wheat. It helps control weeds, diseases, and insects. It also fixes nitrogen from the atmosphere."

Pea crops require very little nitrogen fertilizer as a result, which reduces energy cost and greenhouse emissions," he said.

Finally, "pea-wheat rotations produce higher yield," Chen said. "They provide farmers with more net returns than traditional cereal mono-cropping in the Northern Great Plains."

Chen hopes his research will help guide growers on which varieties of peas will grow best in different environ-

"Our findings will help farmers identify site-specific varieties of pea or select general varieties for a broader area," Chen said. "Also, growers will be able to choose pea varieties with a specific trait, such as higher resistant starch content, and grow them for different end users."

Chen continues to work with plant breeders to develop new varieties of pea with higher protein or resistant starch content. He also aims to overcome limiting factors to help peas thrive for optimum yield.

#### Catch A Sugar Beet Update At EARC/MSU Field Day July 19



#### By Stephanie Ler

Duane Peters, Agricultural Manager for Sidney Sugars, will speak to attendees at the 2017 EARC/MSU Extension Field Day on Wednesday, July 19.

Peters calls his update "short and sweet", but plans on discussing sugarbeet variety selection based on the latest research, and give an update on current agronomic issues.

Currently, there are about 32,500 acres of beet planted in the area, down about 1,200 acres from the 2016 season. The reasoning, Peters explains, is that "yields are higher so less acres are needed. Back around 1995, we'd get 22 to 25 ton crops. Now, we're aetting 30 to 32 ton crops.

Though there are fewer acres, the beets aren't any less sweet. In 2015, sugar yields were 18.5%. Last year, yields were 17.5%. "That's

what we want to see."

Though the Sidney area is known for high quality, high yield sugar production, Peters credits some of the success to science. "It's the genetics going into the seeds-we're seeing good yields." Current seeds are resistant to the herbicide Roundup, so "Roundup kills the weeds, so the beet crop is using all the nutrients," Peters said.

Seed development takes nearly a decade to complete, including 3 years to test the crop. Sidney Sugars and the EARC conduct code test trials, where the variety of the seed planted is unknown to the researcher. In November of the test year, the code is broken and the variety revealed. The variety that produced the best crop is then sold as seed for the next year's production.


Current concerns include leaf disease Cercospora leaf

spot, which produces brown spots on the leaves of the sugarbeet and can reduce yield by up to half, and Rhizoctonia Solani, which causes root rot. "Ideally," Peters said, "the best crop would be resistant to both."

Additional potential topics include the current Farm Bill, which Peters says is always a hot topic. Peters encourages farmers to contact Congress and their Senators to provide input, and credits Senators Tester and Daines for being very active in the area.

#### MSU Soil Fertility Specialist Recommends Methods To Boost Wheat Grain Protein Mid-Season

Clain Jones, Montana State University soil fertility Extension specialist, suggests Montana irrigated wheat famers consider providing additional nitrogen to their crop, calling it the most important management factor to produce high protein levels

In an effort to maximize the amount of nitrogen absorbed by the crop and increase protein for the 2017 harvest, Jones recommends several nitrogen application methods for Montana farmers. In general, Jones said, protein is more likely to increase with late-season nitrogen. He said the decision to apply late-season nitrogen to increase protein depends on whether nitrogen can be applied without substantially damaging the crop and if the expected protein response and discount are sufficiently high to justify the cost of fertilizer and application.

Jones, who manages MSU's Soil Fertility Extension Program in the Department of Land Resources and Environmental Sciences in the College of Agriculture, encourages agricultural producers to consider using nitrogen to boost protein sooner rather than later.

"Timing of in-season nitrogen application should be based on plant growth stage rather than a particular date," Jones said. "The weather is also an important factor. It's not recommended growers apply nitrogen for dryland fields, unless significant rainfall is predicted."

Nitrogen applied before heading will most likely improve yield if soil moisture is available, while nitrogen taken up during and after heading should increase protein, he said.

The ability to incorporate nitrogen fertilizer with rain or irrigation is more important than application exactly at flowering, according to Jones. The later that foliar nitrogen is applied, the greater the risk of leaf burn, Jones said.

"A consideration of nitrogen application with irrigation water is the risk of scab, which increases with irrigation within five days

of flowering," he said.

Nitrogen concentration in the flag leaf (uppermost leaf of the stem) at heading can be measured to determine whether a late-season nitrogen application will boost protein, according

"Based on Montana research, grain protein is likely to increase with late-season nitrogen if the flag leaf nitrogen concentration at heading is less than 4.2 percent," he said. "The potential response to nitrogen increases as the flag leaf nitrogen concentration decreases, but low flag leaf nitrogen concentrations also mean it will take more nitrogen to make high protein."

The ratio of fertilizer cost to protein discount may influence whether applying additional nitrogen is justified at a given flagleaf concentration. For example, according to Jones, with a 45 cent discount per one percentage point protein and urea at \$433 per ton, the flag leaf nitrogen concentration needs to be below about 4 percent to cover the fertilizer expense. If either the protein discount is lower or the cost of fertilizer higher, then the critical flag-leaf nitrogen needs to be lower yet, to justify additional nitrogen, Jones said.

"Unfortunately, flag-leaf analysis cannot tell you how much nitrogen to add, or the final protein level," Jones said. "More late-season nitrogen is required to increase protein by a point as yield potential increases."

For example, 30 pounds nitrogen per acre is expected to boost irrigated wheat protein by about one point for a 60 bushelper-acre yield, but only half a point for a 120 bushel-per-acre yield, according to Jones's review of the research pubished in the MSU Extension bulletin, Practices to Increase Wheat Grain Protein http://msuextension.org/publications/AgandNaturalResources/EB0206.pdf.

However, Jones cautions that there may be a limit to how much late-season nitrogen can be applied to boost protein due to increased risk for lodging and leaf burn at high nitrogen rates.

Applying liquid nitrogen with fertigation is the best mid-tolate-season application option to limit stand damage and prevent leaf burn, Jones said. If nitrogen is applied with a flat fan, Jones suggested that no more than 30 pounds nitrogen per acre of urea ammonium nitrate solution, or 45 pounds nitrogen per acre of liquid urea, should be applied to minimize burn and yield loss.

"Little nitrogen is actually taken up through the leaf surface," he said. "Foliar nitrogen needs to be washed off the leaf and moved into the soil by a half-inch of water in a single event. For this reason, combined with a hot and dry forecast through at least July 13, 2017 additional nitrogen is not recommended on dryland fields unless the chance for rain greatly improves."

Response to nitrogen is also dependent on sufficient sulfur,

"If a grower sees yellowing upper leaves, the crop may be sulfur deficient, whereas nitrogen deficiency shows up as yellowing lower leaves," Jones said. "A foliar application of three to five pounds sulfur per acre as ammonium thiosulfate or ammonium sulfate should correct the problem, but, as with nitrogen fertilizer, foliar sulfur is dependent on sufficient rain or irrigation water to wash the sulfate into the root zone."

While nitrogen for boosting protein should be addressed now, especially on spring wheat fields where yield goal will likely be met or exceeded, Jones recommends reading an issue of The Soil Scoop, "Nitrogen Management for Grain Protein<a href="http://">http:// landresources.montana.edu/soilfertility/documents/PDF/sscoop/ N4GrainYieldSS.pdf," which presents a synopsis of overall management practices to improve grain protein in the future on both dryland and irrigated fields. ## Fort Peck Reservoir Walleye Spawn Egg-take Effort a Success, Stocking Fair

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks annual walleye spawn egg-take on Fort Peck Reservoir was completed at the end of April. In addition, stocking efforts were completed in June.

With the help of FWP personnel and over 95 volunteers, the egg collection goals were exceeded. Volunteers, Fort Peck Reservoir Biologist Heath Headley says, are key to the operation. "We wouldn't be able to set all the trap nets, collect fish, and spawn them on a daily basis unless we had help," he explained. "Volunteers are the main reason this has been so successful over the years."

A total of 2,261 walleye were captured in trap nets, with approximately 81 million eggs collected.

"The condition of some of the larger walleye was very impressive this spring," said

Headley. "This is likely due to the high numbers of cisco, an important forage species, which we've had over the last couple of years. This abundance of food led to good growth and excellent egg production."

"One particular female walleye collected measured 29.8 inches, but weighed a whopping 14 pounds," said Headley. "We also observed a good number of mature walleye in the 20-25 inch range."

Roughly 45 million eggs remained at the Fort Peck Multi-Species Fish Hatchery, with about 36 million eggs going to the Miles City Hatchery. Combined stocking efforts from the Fort Peck and Miles City hatcheries resulted in approximately 26 million fry stocked back into the reservoir this spring.

In addition, approximately 1.8 million fingerlings from the hatcheries have been released into the reservoir recently.

Unfortunately, the production of fingerlings from the large numbers of eggs collected were not as successful as anticipat-

ed. According to Wade Geraets, the hatchery manager at the Fort Peck Multispecies Fish Hatchery, the warm, dry spring and summer in eastern Montana did not bode well for the final stages of walleye development at the Fort Peck hacchery.

"The weather made it difficult to keep the water temperatures at a safe level for these young fish at the hatchery," said Geraets. "Warm surface water temperatures, wind, and difficulties with our current water system resulted in the loss of some fish."

The hatchery has been looking at options to obtain cooler, more consistent temperature water from other sources, such as directly from the powerhouses at Fort Peck Dam. However, getting this potential change to happen has been taking some time.

"Presently, hatchery water is obtained from the Dredge Cuts, which can warm up quite quickly in the spring," said Geraets. "We have really struggled with our current water system this year."

## Record Number of Walleyes Stocked

North Dakota Game and Fish Department fisheries personnel are wrapping up a record year for stocking of walleye fingerlings in more than 130 waters across the state.

Jerry Weigel, fisheries production and development supervisor, said more than 12 million fingerlings were stocked, besting the previous high by more than 1 million fish.

"Considering not many went into Lake Sakakawea, this included an unprecedented stocking of nearly 7 million fingerlings into the smaller fishing waters across the state," Weigel said.

With more than 50 new walleye lakes in North Dakota, Weigel said the demand to stock these waters, along with the larger, traditional fisheries, has greatly increased the demand from the hatcheries.

Valley City National Fish Hatchery produced more walleye this year than in any other year in its 77-year history, Weigel said, and in its 54 years of raising fish Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery shipped a record number again this year.

"Both hatcheries have been outstanding in helping address our demand for walleye fingerlings," Weigel said.

Stocking conditions were optimal, Weigel said, with cooler weather at the time most of the fish were shipped. The 30-day-old fingerings averaged about 1.25 inches in length.

"They should find lots of food and good survival conditions, which bodes well for future fishing opportunities," Weigel added. "Later this fall fisheries personal will sample walleye lakes to assess success of this year's walleye stocking, as well as what Mother Nature provided."

One common observation fish haulers noted while traveling across the state, Weigel said, was the amount of fishing taken place, both from shore and from boats. "There has never been a better time to fish for walleye," he added. "Statewide, there are a lot of great opportunities, and a good chance of success."

## Aquatic Vegetation Deserves Attention

Extensive vegetation growth along docks and boat ramps serves as a good reminder for anglers and boaters to follow aquatic puisages species regulations

aquatic nuisance species regulations.

North Dakota Game and Fish Department ANS coordinator

Jessica Howell said the Department has received reports of

increased vegetation in local waters.

"Aquatic plants can be the most abundant in the warmer months due to a combination of available nutrients, light and steadily increasing water temperatures," Howell said.

State regulations require all aquatic vegetation be removed from boats, personal watercraft, trailers and fishing equipment such as fishing rods, bait buckets, lures and waders before leaving a body of water. Howell said that means "vegetation free" when transporting watercraft and/or equipment away from a boat ramp, landing area or shoreline. She said time out of the water needed to remove aquatic vegetation at the immediate water access area is allowed.

"Some plant species are highly invasive, and other ANS can hitch a ride in vegetation as well," Howell said.

In addition to removing vegetation, other ANS regulations require:

·All water must be drained from boats and other watercraft, including bilges, livewells, baitwells and motors before leaving a water body. Anglers can transport fish on ice in a separate container.


· All drain plugs that may hold back water must be removed, and water draining devices must be open, on all watercraft and recreational, commercial and construction equipment bilges and confined spaces, during any out-of-water transport of same.

· All legal live aquatic organisms used by anglers, including legal baitfish (fathead minnows), amphibians (salamanders and frogs), invertebrates (crayfish and leeches) and insects must be purchased and/or trapped in North Dakota. Anglers can transport live bait in water in containers of five gallons or less in volume. The only exception is that anglers may not transport live bait in water away from the Red River (Class I ANS infested waters). At Class I ANS infested waters, all water must be drained from bait buckets as anglers leave the shore, or remove their boat from the water. Anglers must properly dispose of unused bait away from the river, as dumping bait in the water or on shore is illegal.
