# Sidney Health Center Cancer Care Celebrates 10 Years

Sidney – January 2021 marks the 10th year anniversary of Sidney Health Center's Cancer Care radiation therapy services. In 2011, Sidney Health Center expanded its outpatient cancer services to include radiation therapy when it opened Phase I of the Cancer Care suite with the installation of a TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation system. This was the first of its kind in Montana.

The strategic decision to expand the cancer care services to include radiation therapy was the brainchild of Dr. Brett Bennion, Sidney Health Center otolaryngologist and Dr. Lyle Harrison, a radiation oncologist who was working in the area at the time. Following a feasibility study, the project plan was presented to the board of directors and groundbreaking ensued in July 2010 on the \$3 million construction of Phase I to build a vault for the radiation equipment, waiting area and exam rooms.

"The expansion of our cancer care services to include radiation therapy has proved to be a vital and necessary service, serving more than 600 area cancer patients living in the MonDak region in the last 10 years," stated Dr. Ralf Kiehl, SHC radiation oncologist, who transitioned from providing temporary coverage since 2011 to joining the medical staff full-time in 2018.

In fiscal year 2020, Sidney Health Center Cancer Care reached nearly 2,700 clinic visits despite the coronavirus pandemic including 1,708 medical oncology and 979 radiation oncology appointments respectively. In addition, there were 1,780 chemotherapy/IV therapy

treatments and 1,957 radiation therapy treatments during this timeframe.

"We treat most of the common cancers at our facility and have begun treating an increased number of less common and more complex cancer patients. Through the utilization of our tumor board that includes representatives from each specialty we are able to discuss and effectively treat and manage these more complex patients." Stated Robert Beery, Sidney Health Center Cancer Care Director.

Over time, Sidney Health Center Cancer Care has gone through various transformations to continue to meet the needs of those requiring treatment in the MonDak region including the completion of Phase II in 2012. Thanks to many people who donated to the Foundation for Community Care's Cancer Care Campaign, construction of Phase Il became a reality - centralizing outpatient medical and radiation oncology in one-convenient location.

Prior to the completion of Phase II in October 2012, medical oncology patients received outpatient chemotherapy and IV therapy treatments through the emergency room department. For more than 25 years, Sidney Health Center's oncology nurses worked closely with medical oncologists from Billings Clinic allowing patients to receive their treatment close to home

to home.

In November 2017,
Sidney Health Center successfully recruited a full-time medical oncologist when Dr.
Chad Pedersen joined the cancer care team. With the addition of Dr. Pedersen, area cancer patients have the ability to connect with a local medical oncologist



upon receiving a cancer diagnosis. As part of the multi-disciplinary team, Dr. Pedersen and Dr. Kiehl work with area physicians, advanced practice providers, and clinical staff to provide comprehensive cancer care close to home.

"We are on a journey to become a rural cancer care center of excellence on a national level," stated Sidney Health Center CEO Jennifer Doty. "In 2018, we partnered with the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) to evaluate our work flows including access to care in rural America. This partnership has brought to light what is going well, recommendations for improvement, and the desire to become a nationally accredited cancer care center. I am excited to see where the next 10 years takes us in treating area cancer patients.'

The Cancer Care team

is comprised of full-time, board-certified medical and radiation oncologists, a nurse practitioner, medical physicist, nurses certified in chemotherapy administration, radiation therapists and administrative support staff who take time to understand and guide patients through

their care plan. The team is rounded out with support from pharmacy, laboratory, radiology, surgery and rehabilitation services.

# City Of Williston Mayor Extends Mask Order

Williston – The citywide Mask Order introduced on Monday, Nov. 9, 2020 by Mayor Howard Klug and approved by the City Commission remains in effect following the expiration of the statewide mask mandate on Monday, Jan. 18.

"While our COVID-19 numbers for Williams County remain under 100, until more vaccines are distributed, it is important that we continue to keep what has worked in place," emphasized Mayor Klug.

The order will remain in effect until the current state of emergency ends. Currently, Executive Order 2020-03 which declared a State of Emergency for North Dakota is still active; thus, the citywide Mask Order remains until further action from the City Commission.

As a reminder, the Mask Order states:

six (6) feet or more cannot be assured and in all outdoor settings where there is exposure to non-household members, unless there exists ample space of six (6) feet or more to practice social distancing."

These measures are being mandated with the strongest possible recommendation; however, there is no penalty for non-compliance with the order.

This order does not prohibit law enforcement or local officials from enforcing trespassing laws or other applicable laws in removing violators at the request of businesses or property owners.

The City of Williston's internal COVID-19 Tiered Response Guidelines also remain in effect at the High Level.

Measures taken at the High level include:

• Office vestibules and reception areas remain open to the public, but masks are required for all visitors and shall be provided at entry points. Staff meetings are by appointment only.

 Until further notice, all public meetings will be offered virtually.

 Hand sanitizer will be made available in all office vestibules, reception areas, and conference rooms for staff and public use.

spread through appropriate

social distancing, respecting posted guidelines for businesses, and taking advantage of the opportunity to be tested.

Currently, the Upper Missouri District Health Unit (UMDHU), in conjunction with Williston State College (WSC), continues to offer Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) testing on Mondays from 4-6 p.m. in the Art Wood building at WSC.

The City of Williston, in conjunction with Williams County/Williston Emergency Management, will offer future BinaxNOW Rapid Antigen screenings but dates and times are subject to

Testing is free and takes only minutes, with walk up and drive thru options avail-

able. Pre-register for testing

at testreg.nd.gov to minimize waiting time and expedite testing. Pre-registration is not required if an individual has previously been tested.

Greetings from Helena! We are starting to see more bills come before the committees and onto the floor. A couple bills we heard in Senate Health and Human Services committee were SB100 and SB108, SB100 deals with the corruption involving welfare benefits. DPHHS has the biggest budget in state government. SB108 takes power away from unelected officials (county health departments) and gives it to elected of-

In Senate Fish and Game, we heard SB115, which spreads the authority to approve Conservation Easements, and disperse millions of dollars, to five elected officials (the Land Board) instead of just one (the Governor).

One of the longest hearings we have had was on the Convention of States bill that we heard in Senate Judiciary Committee (SJ2). COS deals with Article V of the US Constitution. A lot of people are concerned about how much overreach the Federal Government is trying to have over state governments and its citizens. That sentiment was reflected in this commit-

The new administration in DC while talking about

unity wasted no time in trying to change our values in this country. Some of the things that happened on the first day via executive order were: shut down the Keystone Pipeline (which potentially could have been \$100 Million in taxes per year for Montana, mostly eastern Montana), opened the door for transgender athletes to compete against the opposite sex (boys against girls), joined Paris Climate Accord (giving India and China a big advantage over America), and many others. I am proud to live in SD 18 where this President got only

like these values. These are things we must think about as we consider legislation in Helena.

This week's scare about the "far right" causing problems during the administration change was a farce. However, ANTIFA and BLM from the far left did lots of damage in Portland, Seattle, and other cities in the United States. Many people contacted us concerned about our safety but there were no problems here.



### Anita Louise Ellefson Wagner, Chaska, MN formerly of Watford City, ND



She passed away on Jan. 24, 2021 in Excelsior, MN. The funeral is 2 p.m. Mountain, Saturday, Jan. 30, 2021, at Hettinger Lutheran Church, Hettinger, ND.

The "twins" were inseparable as they grew up in this wonderful little town, were quite recognizable, and well thought of by most residents. Anita's childhood years were spent having fun with her siblings and neighbor kids in the area surrounding their house on the northern edge of Hettinger, where they played in what was called the "pasture" behind their house. She attended Hettinger Public School and graduated in 1958.



# ANOVA Family Health Center Offers Watford City Middle School Rapid COVID-19 Drive-Thru Testing

By Anna Dragseth

The ANOVA Family Health Center, 301 12th St SE, Watford City, ND, has been offering COVID-19 drive-thru testing since March, but more recently, they have been providing rapid COVID-19 testing. The clinic performs up to 60 tests Monday-Thursday and up to 30 on Fridays.

If someone suspects they have COVID-19, they can schedule a time to be tested by giving the clinic a call. "When they call the clinic, we do a North Dakota Department of Health intake on them. Once that is complete, we input the information into our computer system and schedule a time to come through our drive-thru testing facility," explained Dori Sparby, ANOVA Family Health Center Clinic Manager.

When patients arrive, Dr. Anita Pedersen DNP, FNP-BC, comes out in full PPE, goes over paperwork with the patient, and then swabs the inside of the patient's nostrils. "The sample

is then processed with our machine; this process takes around 15 minutes. Once we have the results, the patient is called and informed of their results, and then we send the results to the North Dakota Department of Health," added Sparby.

ANOVA staff members are dedicated to serving not only the Watford City community but the northwestern region of North Dakota. Sparby said, "Prior to ANO-VA performing drive-thru testing, Dr. Anita Pedersen had been doing research and had our clinic and staff preparing for it by obtaining PPE and cleaning supplies.

Once we began testing, Pedersen lived in the clinic for almost six weeks to make sure that she did not take anything home to her family members as some have underlying health conditions."

Sparby explained that the goal of testing is to try and limit the spread of COVID-19. She said, "We recommend that everyone, even if they have a negative test but are sick, that they stay home for at least 48 hours or until they are symptom-free. We continue to recommend social distancing, wearing masks in social settings, and washing your hands.'






American Hockey League's Central Division.


Dodds has been playing hockey since the age of four and explains that his favorite part about hockey is the opportunity to let loose and have fun with his friends.

# **McKenzie County Healthcare Systems Now Offers Suboxone Clinic**

McKenzie County Healthcare Systems Inc. (MCHS) has added many different services to their clinic, and more recently, they have implemented a Suboxone Clinic. This is a program offered to people who are seeking treatment for substance abuse. Anyone who struggles with pain medication addiction or physical or psychological dependence with morphine, dilaudid, methadone, heroin, kratom, codeine, oxycodone, or opioids is encouraged to take advantage of the Suboxone Clinic.

The idea for establishing this program stemmed from a passion of MCHS Dr., Warren Looney, M.D. He started the Suboxone Clinic to help people in Watford City and western North Dakota who have challenges with substance abuse. Dr. Looney said, "I want people to know there is help and resources available out there for those who struggle with substance abuse and there are opportunities that can help them live a normal life without those substances."

According to www.rehabcenter.net, suboxone is a medication used to alleviate or reduce withdrawal symptoms from heroin or other opioids. Suboxone contains both buprenorphine and naloxone. Buprenorphine is an opioid medication, and naloxone blocks the effects of opioid medication, including pain relief or feelings that can lead to opioid abuse. "Opiates are one of the hardest drugs to get off, and most people who try to get off of them experience bad withdrawal symptoms, so Suboxone is made to help alleviate some of the withdrawal symptoms that users will experience when coming off of an opiate."

The Suboxone Clinic is designed to help patients get their lives back while being part of a practical, doable, and effective treatment program that allows the patient to maintain their day-to-day relationships and lifestyle. "Addiction is a very dysfunctional disease; it does not only affect the individual - it affects almost every aspect of their life. Substance abuse is not an issue of will power - they cannot stop on their own - when it comes to this "disease" they need help," explained Dr. Looney.

Like the Suboxone Clinic, medically assisted treatment programs have been shown to be the most effective way to treat addiction. Dr. Looney explained, "It is becoming more and more popular nationwide as it is determined to be the most likely avenue for a successful recovery. But in order for the program to be effective, patients have to be compliant and be willing to make their appointments."

Dr. Looney added, "Suboxone Clinic programs have resulted in many success stories, and we hope that this program at MCHS will produce many more of them." To schedule an appointment for an initial
