Johnston was Found Guilty of Deliberate Homicide & Tampering with Physical Evidence

Cody Wayne Johnston was found guilty of deliberate homicide and tampering with physical evidence on Thursday. Charges were brought against him and he was arrested by Richland County law enforcement on Sept. 24, 2015 in connection with the disappearance of his estranged girlfriend Nicole Waller. Waller was last heard from on Feb. 14, 2013 while visiting Johnston at his then-residence in Fairview, MT. Her vehicle was later found abandoned on MT State Highway 2.


Johnston testified in his own defense, admitting that he had left Waller's vehicle alongside the highway, and that he had lied to law enforcement about his involvement and whereabouts during the initial investigation, but maintained his innocence. Cell phone records and the signals picked up by cell phone towers from Johnston's phone during that time provided incriminating evidence that Johnston had lied about being at work on the day in question. His former co-workers had testified that Waller had asked them to lie to law enforcement and tell them that he was at work that day.

It was a fast-moving trial, and despite the fact that Waller's body has never been recovered, the jury felt there was enough evidence to convict. Waller has not contacted her family or accessed her bank account since she was last heard from. She was also receiving medical treatment and taking medication at the time of her disappearance, and there is no evidence that she has received either since she was last heard from.

Johnston is being held in custody in Richland County until sentencing.







Three Montana Farm Bureau members participated in Senator Jon Tester's Farm Bill listening tour October 17 in Billings. Tester is holding listening sessions to hear farmers' hopes and concerns for the new Farm Bill.

Montana Farm Bureau Vice President Hans McPherson, who served on the livestock panel, said one of the difficulties livestock producers have is simply asking for help. "Livestock producers aren't inclined to visit FSA offices to fill out forms. They aren't in the habit of signing up for programs and completing reports. When there is a drought that heavily reduces grazing or haying, and a county is declared a disaster, it's more difficult for them to get immediate assistance. There needs to be some outreach and education so livestock producers can readily use the programs if necessary." McPherson expressed Farm Bureau's support for keeping the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in the Farm Bill. "I also mentioned the best way to get farmers and ranchers continuing to work on conservation practices is to use carrots, not clubs," the Ravalli County rancher said. "Taxpayers need to realize they must fund conservation

practices. Farmers and ranchers are conservation-minded to start with, and if they can get rewarded for their work on land improvement, it's better for everyone and everything." Jillian Streit, the Hill-Liberty-Blaine Farm Bureau county president who sat on the crop and pulse crops panel, explained rural communities must have the funding to expand value-added concepts in Montana. "This way, farmers and ranchers can capitalize on the products we produce at home," said Streit, who is a partner in Stricks Ag, LLC in Chester. "It's important that federal crop insurance supports the American farmer. It must remain intact for grain and pulse crop farmers. I mentioned farmers need ARC (Agriculture Risk Coverage) and PLC (Price Loss Coverage) payments to be in the same fiscal year. If they can't be in the same fiscal year, at least receive payments earlier, such as during seeding, when a farmer needs it. Often you don't get these payments for about 16 months and by then, it's often too late to save someone's crop or farm." Megan Hedges, a wheat

Megan Hedges, a wheat farmer from Chester, served on the crop and pulse panel, as well. "The top priority on our farm should be maintaining our current crop insurance levels," Hedges explained. "Crop insurance is vital to our

survival in agriculture, as well as being the only way new producers can begin farming. I agree with Jill about keeping the ARC and PLC opportunities, along with adjusting how the county yields are derived, as well as the timing of those payments."

"Certainly assistance for rural development, infrastructure and leadership in Montana's rural communities needs to be in the next Farm Bill, too," Hedges noted.

All three participants found the listening session valuable. "It was educational hearing other farmers and ranchers," noted Streit. "This was a great group with diverse opinions about Montana agriculture. I certainly learned much, and feel humbled to have served on that panel. I appreciated listening to the others. I don't have livestock so it was interesting to hear their concerns. I'm impressed Senator Tester is thinking ahead about the upcoming

Hedges agreed. "I appreciated Senator Tester taking time to meet with farmers and ranchers to get input on what's working and what's not. It shows he values our opinions and our industry." McPherson echoed Streit and Hedges, adding, "I thought it was very worthwhile. I certainly will do it again if asked."

Work on South Meadows Softball Complex Nears Completion

Work on the South Meadow Softball Complex is in its final phase. The city is in the process of installing new fencing and completing some concrete work which will wrap up the project. Revitalizing the South Meadow Softball Complex began about a vear ago with the development of a new and improved layout for the softball fields that would allow for an alley way between them and additional seating.

The fences and dugouts were in disrepair and in Sept. the City of Sidney, in cooperation with Sidney Public Schools Superintendent Daniel Farr, held a workday where high school students from Mr. Merritt's high school construction class worked with city staff to demo the former structures.

Since then, the city crew has built new dugouts, imported new infield material, and installed new bases and fences. To prevent scheduling conflicts, demo and construction had to wait until Aug. as Youth Softball was still using the field. Quick progress has since been made to complete the project before winter.

Girls Class A Softball will be holding their state tournament on the new fields May 25 - 27 of 2017, which was a big push behind the \$65,000 project.

Part of the funding was provided through the Tourism Business Improvement District (TBID); TBID supports events that help to grow and benefit the community by partially sponsoring projects that will bring over-night guests. Other sponsors include the Dayton Foundation, Olson Foundation, Mr. John Olson (Blue

Rock Products), Sherry Arnold Tournament Fund, Richland County Commissioners, and the Sidney School District. The Eagle Foundation also has available funding should it be needed.

"The donation from the city was mainly in time and labor," commented Public Works Director Jeff Hintz. "Daniel Farr has done a great job in finding the needed funding for this project. The TBID Grant is meant for these types of things that are going to bring people to Sidney."

Expanding the venues and accommodations for the city helps to promote Sidney as a great place for sporting events, festivals, and business conferences, and the work done at the South Meadow Softball Complex has provided one more amenity to the Sunrise City.

Examples of valid protest grounds include: (1) the applicant is unlikely to operate the establishment in compliance with the law: (2) the proposed location cannot be properly policed by local authorities; and (3) the welfare of the people in the vicinity of the proposed location will be adversely and seriously affected.

How are protests submitted? Protests

must be postmarked to the Department of Revenue. Office of Dispute Resolution. P.O. Box 5805, Helena, Montana 59604-5805 on or before November 7, 2016.

What happens if the transfer is protested?

Depending on the number of protests and the protest grounds, a public hearing will be held in Helena or Bainville. All valid protestors will be notified of the hearing's time, date and location. Hearings typically are scheduled within 90 days. A protester's hearing testimony is limited to the grounds in the protester's letter. Following the hearing, the Department of Revenue will notify the public whether the license transfer is approved or denied.



County Agent Update

Long-term Cropping Study

Over in Carrington, the North Dakota State University Carrington Research Extension Center has just released its results of a cropping systems study that started in 1987. The following information is taken from the Carrington Research Extension Center's website and written by Ezra Aberle, Agronomy Research Specialist. The study consisted of three sets of 4-year crop rotations that are replicated three times each year. The eight cycle ended in 2015. This post discusses some of the effects of using composted beef manure on soil properties and selected crop yields. This study is located on a Heimdal silt loam soil, according to the Natural Resource Conservation Service the Heimdal series consists of very deep, well drained, moderately permeable soils that formed in calcareous glacial till. Slope ranges from 0 to 40 percent. Mean annual air temperature is 40 degrees F and mean annual precipitation is 17 inches. In Williams County, most soils are part or similar to the Williams series which consists of very deep, well drained, moderately

slow or slowly permeable soils formed in a calcareous glacial till. Slope ranges from 0 to 35 percent. Mean annual air temperature is about 40 degrees F, and mean annual precipitation is about 40 inches. The following information is for a soil type not found in our area, but still great information for those that add manure.

The plots are 180 ft. by 300 ft. so field scale equipment is used. The fertilizer treatments are: (1) urea broadcast applied each spring to all plots, except field peas and soybeans, at 0, 50, 100 or 150 pounds of Nitrogen per acre and (2) composted beef feedlot manure applied once at 200 pounds of Nitrogen the first year of each 4-ear cycle. These treatments are imposed in strips perpendicular to the three tillage systems: conventional, minimal tillage, and no till resulting in 12 sub-plots within each crop. The plots are soil sampled every year and phosphorous and sulfur were blanket applied to all non-manure plots when they fell out of the medium test range. Composted manure plots have significantly higher soil organic matter content. As you might expect, the increase in soil organic matter is due to the additional carbon compounds provided in the composted manure. Along with higher organic matter, these plots have significantly higher soil pH. Chemical reactions in the soil as the urea changed into available forms of Nitrogen increase the acidity of soil (lower the pH). Compost beef feedlot manure is an excellent economical fertilizer if available. Crop yields are equal to and some times greater than equivalent amounts of commercial nitrogen fertilizer. This is Richland Pump & Supply's 17th year providing supplies and service to the oilfield. Scott Ramus and Dave Williams opened their doors on Sept. 15, 1999; both had extensive experience in different areas of the oil field and both had been working

for supply company Continental Emsco when the business was bought out by Wilson Supply. Wilson Supply kept the Sidney location open for only ten months before closing-up shop, and at that point, Ramus and Williams decided to start their own company. In the spring of 1999, they

applied for a SBA loan, and once approved, kept newly founded Richland Pump & Supply at the same 1511 South Central Ave location that Wilson Supply and Continental Emsco had operated out of. With Ramus building and serving down-hole sucker rod pumps, and Williams handling the supply side of the store, the two spent long hours at work.

"We worked 16 hours a day, seven days a week at first." remembers Ramus. "A lot of times our families would come down to the shop to have dinner with us because we were working so much. The first day we took off was Thanksgiving."

In March of 2000 they hired two employees and ran the company with a four-per-

field activity started picking up. Today, Richland Pump & Supply has two stores, one in Sidney, MT and the other in Stanley, ND with a total of 21 employees, plus themselves. The second store was opened in 2006 after a long-time customer decided to open his office in Stanley, closer to where he was drill-

"Having the second location has helped us better serve our customers, but I remember at the time this guy telling me that the first one to Stanley wins," Ramus said laughing.

The business expanded in 2014, buying the building next to them for office space and additional storage.

When the last boom ended, it was like one day production was shut down and everybody was gone; this time there's a lot of wells that are still pumping even though there's not much drilling. Those wells need to be maintained and that has been

really helpful." One striving point both owners have had is avoiding layoffs, which has been successful. Not one person has lost their job with the compa-

Ramus noted that they can keep their staff busy most of the time, serving the entire Williston Basin. The company supplies and delivers down hole sucker rod pumps, tubing anchors, Gates hydraulic hoses and belts, Balon ball valves, line pipe, tubing, fittings, Norris sucker rods and fishing tools. "I hope oil activity goes back up, but I don't think it will ever get back to where it was," Ramus added.
