

entrance to this world began in the back of a pickup at Swanson Field during a Sidney Eagles football game. We always wondered if that is how she acquired such a competitive spirit. She grew up attending Sidney Public Schools and started her sports career in the 2nd grade. After a couple of years of being her big brother's athome training dummy (often against her will) she made it official and joined the Sidney Wrestling Club and tried her hand on the mats for a year. This was the beginning of Janae making boys cry! She also began little girls softball in the 2nd grade and continued in softball until she graduated. Her life-long passion, basketball, began in the 4th grade playing in the school leagues. Starting in the 7th grade in addition to the school leagues, she started playing on the Shooting Starz traveling team coached by Kevin and Ira Lake. She always credited Kevin and Ira with much of her success in her career and cherished their very special relationship, she loved them both very much. This is also where many lifelong friendships with her teammates began. As a freshman she made the Eagles varsity squad and became a starter early on and continued as a starter all four years, never missing a game. Her only missed time was due to her aggressive playing style, getting herself into foul trouble often when she was younger. Opposing teams learned quickly that if you stole the ball from Janae, you were probably going to be fouled. As a junior, she was proud to be part of the 2010 Lady Eagles Eastern A Conference Champions and Montana Class A State runner-up basketball team. Janae lettered all four years in softball and basketball, received numerous awards: Softball: two years, All-Conference 2nd Team; Basketball: three years, All-Conference, one year 1st Team All-Conference, one year All-State Selection; Senior year, Most Outstanding Senior Girl Athlete of the Year Award. She also excelled academically, being on the Honor Roll all four years. Other clubs she was involved in were FCCLA, Leo Club, National Honor Society and Close Up. During and after high school she worked at Pizza House, M&M Café, Dairy Queen, Eagle Oilfield Services and South 40 Restaurant. Her last job was working at the South Rock Creek Marina at Fort Peck Lake. Fort Peck was her favorite place for a lot of reasons: she enjoyed the quiet time she had staying at a cabin at North Rock Creek where she was able to get closer to The Lord, reading, doing her daily running and conditioning to prepare herself for her junior year of college basketball, boating, wake boarding and tubing with her family and friends. She began her college career following high school at Dickinson State University, playing for the Lady Blue Hawks Basketball Team. She was awarded the Theodore Roosevelt Honors Leadership Program Scholarship, and worked hard to maintain her high GPA even while conditioning and playing her favorite sport. She made the Dean's List both years she attended. After her sophomore year, Janae was ranked 20th nationally in the NAIA Division I in field goal percentage. She also led her team in rebounds, points per game, field goal percentage and steals per game. She cherished all her teammates and loved them as her sisters, always having their best interests at heart.

Yellowstone Valley Citizens Demand Exxon Pay Full Oil Spill Fine

With cries of "Beep beep, toot toot. Hey, Exxon get off that loot," more than 50 Yellowstone County citizens rallied recently at Coulson Park in Billings to tell ExxonMobil to pay a \$1.7 million dollar fine for spilling 63,000 gallons of crude oil into the Yellowstone River two years ago.

Members of the Northern Plains Resource Council, National Wildlife Federation, Montana Conservation Voters Yellowstone Chapter, Yellowstone Valley Citizens Council, and the Montana Laborers Union said Exxon needs to pay the fine levied by the U.S. Department of Transportation Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) for the Silvertip Pipeline break beneath the river near Laurel on July 1, 2011.

A new Facebook page asking Exxon to pay its fine had 1,000 "likes" in one month. A petition of sorts, "Exxon, Pay Your Yellowstone Oil Spill Fine" can be found at www.facebook.com/PayYourFineExxon.

"Exxon certainly deserves the fine," said Eileen Morris of Yellowstone Valley Citizens Council. "We want Exxon to be good neighbors and be accountable for its actions."

On May 13, 2013, ExxonMobil Corp. challenged the \$1.7 million in penalties proposed by PHMSA, which faulted the company as responsible for the crude oil spill. The oil spill contaminated more than 70 miles of riverbank, killing fish and wildlife, threatening water supplies, and damaging landowners' property along the river.

"If I drive, break the law, and get caught by the police, I certainly would pay my fine," said Rep. Margaret MacDonald, whose district borders the Yellowstone River. "Exxon needs to pay its fine for violating our natural resources. As far as corporate responsibility, Exxon posted \$9.5 billion in profits for the first quarter of this year, it certainly can be a good neighbor and pay its fine."

"Sop, Exxon doesn't want to pay its fine," said Alexis Bonogofsky, a riverfront landowner impacted by the spill. "Well, I didn't want to see my family's fields and pastures flooded with oil. I didn't want to go to the hospital with acute hydrocarbon exposure. And my family didn't want to look down the next morning and see our hay field covered in oil. My family has been dealing with the mess that Exxon made for two years.

"This isn't about the money to Exxon. God knows they have enough. What it is about is responsibility and accountability. They need to be held accountable for this spill.

"We didn't choose this fight but we will make sure that our federal government and elected officials do not allow Exxon to negotiate away their responsibility. So what we need you to do is tell Senator Baucus, Senator Tester and Representative Daines to support PHMSA's full fine against Exxon and not to negotiate."


On July 17, a hearing will be held in Washington, D.C,. with PHMSA to address Exxon's protest of the fine.



In-Season Foliar Applications Of Nutrients With Limited Soil Mobility Can Improve Yields

In addition to nitrogen and sulfur, several soil nutrients can be applied in-season to help improve crop yields. Early to mid-season application of nutrients such as phosphorus, potassium, or metal micronutrients such as iron can benefit yields when crops are stressed by cold, dry or very wet conditions.

The best bet for ensuring optimal yields is balanced soil fertility going into the growing season. However, cold, dry or flooded conditions may limit plant root growth, as well as nutrient mobility and availability in soil.

"If soil nutrients are marginal, and root growth is slow due to cold or very wet conditions, then roots might not come into contact with a sufficient amount of nutrients," said Clain Jones, Extension soil fertility specialist in the Department of Land Resources and Environmental Sciences at Montana State University.

Foliar application, especially of micronutrients and immobile macronutrients such as phosphorus, is most beneficial if applied when there is enough leaf area to catch the liquid fertilizer. If immobile nutrients land on the soil surface, they will likely not be readily available to the roots.



Phosphorus is relatively immobile in soil and cold- or moisture-stressed crops' roots may not access sufficient phosphorus. If plants appear dark green and stunted and the older leaves become somewhat purple, then foliar phosphorus may be warranted. Jones noted that foliar phosphorus can be a good route to get phosphorus into stressed crops. Up to 16 pounds of foliar P2O5 per acre applied to wheat between early stem elongation and near-heading may increase yields if plants are deficient.

"Applying foliar phosphorus later, near flowering, may increase yields due to delayed leaf senescence. However, this only works if there is minimal moisture stress, that is, in high yielding conditions," said Jones.

Water-logged soils may actually have increased phosphorus availability. Therefore, if soil phosphorus levels were adequate for average yields, additional phosphorus may not be needed for higher yield potentials in regions of Montana that received heavy rains this spring.

Cool or dry weather is known to limit potassium availability. Potassium is important for nitrogen uptake, minimizing drought stress and speeding crop maturity. Potassium-deficient plants appear stunted with 'burned' leaf edges, and potassium-deficient small grains may produce excessive tillers.

"If small grains appear potassium-deficient, then foliar potassium chloride application may be beneficial as late as the flag leaf stage," said Jones.

Most micronutrients, like copper, zinc, and iron are only needed at very low rates (for example, less than two pounds copper per acre). Therefore, seed row fertilizer applications will result in one to two foot gaps between granules or liquid drops along the row. If roots are stressed by cold, dry, or water-logged conditions, they may not reach sparsely distributed fertilizer early enough in the growing season to meet the crop need. Jones has seen quite a few iron deficient plants this year, recognized by "interveinal chlorisis," likely due to waterlogged soils that limit root growth and iron uptake

Foliar application of micronutrients may be beneficial, but only on the recommendation of a crop or soil professional.

Plant deficiency symptoms are illustrated in "Nutrient Management Module No. 9", and timing of foliar applications

are in a recent presentation by Jones. Rescue treatments for nitrogen, sulfur and chloride are given in a recent press release. All of these are available on Jones' website http://landresources.montana.edu/soilfertility. Contact your Extension agent or crop adviser for help in determining fertilizer rates.



North Dakota Sees Record Fishing License Sales

Years of rising water, a record number of fishing lakes and aggressive fish management in North Dakota have helped produce fishing license sales.

State Game & Fish Department fisheries chief Greg Power said in 2012-13 virtually every license category established a record high, or at the least had a substantial increase. "Even more impressive is this was spread throughout the state, and not just in the rapidly growing counties of western North Dakota," Power said.

Boat North Dakota Course

North Dakota boaters are reminded that children ages 12-15 who want to operate a boat or personal watercraft must take the state's boating basics course.

State law requires youngsters ages 12-15 to pass the course before they operate a boat or personal watercraft with at least a 10 horsepower motor. In addition, major insurance companies give adult boat owners who pass the course a premium discount on boat insurance.

The course is available for home-study from the North Dakota Game & Fish Department's Bismarck office. Two commercial providers also offer the course online, and links to those sites are found on the department's website at gf.nd.gov.

While the home-study course is free, students will be charged a fee to take it online. The online provider charges for the course, not the Game & Fish Department. The fee stays with the online provider.

Upon completion of the online test, and providing a credit card number, students will be able to print out a temporary certification card, and within 10 days a permanent card will

The course covers legal requirements, navigation rules, getting underway, accidents and special topics such as weather, rules of the road, laws, life saving and first aid.

Statistics compiled by the Game & Fish Department revealed more than 218,000 fishing licenses were sold last year, 20 percent higher than the previous record set in 1982. A total of 159,500 resident fishing licenses were sold last year, also breaking the record set 30 years ago. In addition, nearly 59,000 nonresident fishing licenses were purchased last year, easily surpassing the previous high set two years

"North Dakota remains near the top in the country in terms of per capita residents who fish," Power said.

In terms of actual individuals participating in fishing, the past year was again record-setting with more than 200,000 active anglers and about 2 million days of fishing. Both open water and ice fishing activity experienced substantial increases. Lake Sakakawea, Devils Lake and Lake Oahe/Missouri River remained the top three fisheries in the state.

USDA Extends Acreage Reporting Deadine for FSA to August 2, 2013 Risk Management Deadline Remains Unchanged

USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia today announced an extension of FSA acreage reporting deadline. Farmers and landowners have an additional 18 calendar days to submit their annual report for acreage to their local FSA county office with the deadline extended from Monday, July 15, 2013, to Friday, August 2, 2013. Only the FSA reporting deadline has been extended. The acreage reporting requirement for crop insurance has not changed and remains July 15.

"We want to ensure our producers maintain their program benefits by filling their reports accurately and in a timely manner for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage," said Administrator Garcia.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-cyclical program (DCP); the Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE); the Conservation Re-

serve Program (CRP); and the Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

Acreage reports for FSA are considered timely this year when filed at the county office by the new applicable final crop reporting deadline of August 2, 2013. Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines.

While FSA is able to extend its deadline, Risk Management Agency (RMA) Administrator Brandon Willis emphasized today that RMA's acreage reporting date remains July 15, 2013, for most spring planted crops in the country. Farmers are reminded to report any loss within 72 hours of discovery to their insurance company, in writing, within 15 calendar days after the final planting date. Losses must be reported and an insurance adjuster must view and release the crop before the crop is destroyed. Farmers are also reminded to contact their insurance agent if they have any questions about coverage, prevented planting, or for reporting and processing a claim.

Crop insurance is sold and delivered solely through private crop insurance agents. Contact a local crop insurance agent for more information about the program. A list of crop insurance agents is available at all USDA Service Centers or on the RMA web site at www.rma.usda.gov/tools/agents/.

Producers also should visit their USDA Service Center to complete acreage reporting for FSA. For questions on this or any FSA program, producers should contact their FSA county office or seek information online at www.fsa.usda.gov.

Initial Estimate of ND Cropland Prevented from Planting Placed at 4.4 Million Acres

Late spring storms and heavy rains throughout the planting season caused an estimated 4.4 million acres of cropland to go unplanted this year, based on an early estimate by USDA Farm Service Agency's North Dakota State Office. The estimate was compiled in response to a request from Senator Heidi Heitkamp to gauge the impact of wet weather on North Dakota producers.

Aaron Krauter, State Executive Director for Farm Service Agency's North Dakota State Office says the estimate provides a good first look at disaster impacts for 2013. "The acreage reporting deadline has been extended to August 2nd and it will take some time to compile the final numbers," Krauter said. "The survey of FSA County Executive Directors gives us an opportunity to be proactive in delivering disaster assistance for impacted producers."


Heavy winter snows, flooding along many rivers in the state, and excessive rain have combined to keep producers from planting an estimated 4.4 million acres this year. The largest amounts of affected acreage lies north of the Highway 200 corridor.

Producers with losses in counties that are designated as disasters by the Secretary of Agriculture or in a contiguous county may be eligible for low-interest emergency loans or other disaster programs as authorized by Congress.





Fullmer to Present Sugarbeet Crop Information



All signs still point to an above average sugarbeet crop. Soil samples taken last week were the second best in the past five years according to Sidney Sugars agriculturalist Russ Fullmer. The next root samples will be taken the second week in August. Farmers are irrigating regularly and Fullmer says they will need to keep the crop wet until harvest.

Although the crop looks good overall, there has been some hail damage including

88 acres north of Glendive that were severely damaged, 740 acres by Fallon with lesser damage and some acres south of Sidney that have been hit twice by hail. "The hail is a setback but the beets will come back," Fullmer stated.

Monitors are in the fields measuring temperature and humidity. No cercospera has been reported yet, but fields

are being closely watched. There are some beet diseases, probably from the rain, but those are not widespread according to Fullmer.




at 4:00 pm. To end the day a multi-generational community social will be held at the High School.



Hotel Albert Featured on 2013 Fairview Old Timer's Festival Button

The Hotel Albert, celebrating its 100 year anniversary, was elected by Fairview Festival Committee to be represented on the 2013 Fairview Festival button. The original Hotel Albert was designed to accommodate

two or three other establishments at street level with additional business rentals in the basement. In 1918, with the outbreak of the influenza, the Hotel Albert was turned into a hospital. It was the largest and most available building in the town. In 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Lew Newlon returned to Fairview to assist his sister, Mrs. Martha Cannon, in the management of the Albert Hotel. The Hotel Albert flourished and many improvements were made.

Looking, on the outside, much as it did on the day of its opening 100 years ago, the Hotel Albert exemplifies the confidence and the dedication of both its builder, Albert Philips, and all who have shared his love for this area. Through the years, Mr. Phillips had a hand in about every business or industry that came to Fairview. If Phillips was here today, he would smile and say, "I knew my old namesake wouldn't really die as I've always known that my town will perse-

vere."

Through the years, the Hotel has gone through several owners and operators such as David Spielvagel, Larry Valnes, Harold Dahl, John Cayko & sons, Mokie Dennis and Jim Bieber. In the 80s, several people and businesses joined in the effort to rebuild and remodel the Hotel Albert. Today the Hotel is owned by Jack and Debra Vaira. As the oldest operating business in Fairview, the Hotel Albert is a signature that perpe-

tuity of small town America exists and is embraced.

Fairview's 67th Annual Old Timer's Reunion and Summer Festival will feature the Hotel Albert as a part of the weekend's festivities. Other festivities include a Mardi Gras themed kiddy parade the afternoon of Saturday, July 20th, followed by the grand parade and program in the park.
