

Health Alert Regarding Confirmed Norovirus

A gastrointestinal virus or the "Stomach Flu" has been confirmed to be caused by Norovirus. Symptoms of the stomach flu had affected many Richland County residents over the last week or more. The Richland County Health Department received the report on Nov. 1 from the Montana Public Health Lab confirming a positive case of Norovirus in Richland County after stool samples were sent for testing late last week. Residents are strongly urged to take precautions to avoid continued spread.

This virus easily spreads from person to person; therefore the Richland County Health Department is urging residents to follow precautions in preventing further cases.

What to do to prevent infection: Wash hands frequently STAY HOME UNTIL completely free of symptoms for 48 hours or longer

Wash any contaminated linens with hot, soapy water

Clean non-porous surfaces with disinfectant cleaning wipes with bleach or a bleach solution of 1/3 cup bleach to 1 gallon of water.

Symptoms are usually not serious and include sudden onset nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and stomach cramping referred to as gastroenteritis. Headache, body aches, fatigue, and low grade fever may also be included. The illness begins 12-48 hours after exposure and is usually brief, with symptoms lasting only about 1 or 2 days, but in some cases longer.

In order to protect others, residents experiencing symptoms are asked to call their medical provider first if/when needed before showing up at the office feeling ill. Please contact your medical provider if experiencing severe dehydration due to symptoms.

Norovirus is usually spread from contact with an infected person - even by being near someone while they are vomiting. Norovirus can be spread by touching a contaminated surface like a door knob, contact with an infected person's stool or vomit, or by eating or drinking contaminated food or water. Avoid hand to mouth or nose contact as this is how the virus enters the body.

Please if you have any of the above symptoms; AVOID PUBLIC places, work or school until 48 hours after you, last symptom. It takes 48 hours after the last episode of vomiting or diarrhea to no longer be contagious. It is very important to stay home at least 2 days after you "feel" better.






Levi Helmuth, Lambert, receives his FFA American Degree.

Too Many People Are Being Unintentionally Injured Or Killed In Crashes!

PART 1

We can all share the roadways safely. Semis and trailers, farm equipment, pickups, cars, motorcycles, bicycles and pedestrians-by following a few simple rules and being courteous to others.

ALWAYS-ALWAYS BUCKLE YOUR SAFETY BELT WHEN IN A VEHICLE!

According to a recent study by Montana Department of Transportation, economic loss to Montana was estimated to be \$662 million, which is an average of over \$690 for every citizen in Montana (that's \$2,760 for a family of 4). The cost of traffic crashes is measured in wage loss, medical expense, insurance administration and property damage cost.

According to Montana DOT: On average, an unbelted occupant has a longer hospital stay, requires more intensive care and accrued significantly higher hospital charges at an expense of \$52,993 for the average unbuckled occupant in comparison to \$36,420 for the average buckled occupant. Nearly a quarter of 12th graders never or rarely wear a seat belt while driving. According to Montana Emergency Care: those injured pay for only 26% of the total healthcare cost, the remainder is paid by society. In a recent study, caring for unbelted patients cost over \$36.7 million each year in direct inpatient health care cost. Montana spends \$14 million in Medicaid and uncompensated care for unrestrained motor vehicle occupant inpatient hospital charges.

All drivers of vehicles:

Most Montana fatalities involve single vehicle rollovers and ejections.

According to Montana's 2010 Injury Prevention Report: "43% of all unintentional deaths are due to motor vehicle crashes". In most recent studies 23% of Montana crashes were due to inattentive driving, 21% were due to careless driving and 15% were due to failure to yield. 71% of adults report wearing their seatbelt. 64% of unrestrained vehicle occupants in Montana were ejected from their vehicle and killed. 72% of fatal crashes in rural areas involved only one vehicle - 22% involved 2 vehicles. Single vehicle run off the road crashes represent 56.3% of all fatalities.

Buckle up each time - Every time - NO Excuses & require your passengers to buckle up

Respect the space of other vehicles - the three second rule

Signal your intention ahead of time - every time Remember large vehicles take more distance and time

to slow down, stop or turn a corner Remember farm equipment moves at a slower speed

Match your speed to the traffic and road conditions (not what time you need to be there)

Never drive distracted - i.e. texting, reading, eating, reaching for articles or taking your eyes off the road





His multidisciplinary training is unique, and qualifies him to speak on a variety of topics.

Campbell notes that scientists adopt a skeptical view of the world, and don't accept something as true unless it can be proven to be so. From a statistical viewpoint, they start every inquiry with the

Null Hypothesis, which states that no relationship exists between two variables. They insist that research and statistical analysis be completed before they are willing to scientifically say that a significant relationship exists between two things - the independent and dependent variables and multiple studies are required before you can formulate a theory about "cause and effect" relationships. Campbell also notes that just because something hasn't been "proven" doesn't mean that it isn't true.






claimed that "the simplest explanation tends to be the correct one." And many people likewise want to believe that one thing leads directly to another thing. In Campbell's book that is referred to as "univariate" analysis. Science has shown, however, that "multivariate" analysis more correctly explains real life phenomena. There are multiple things, for example, that influence the population of sea otters in Alaska: food supply, sea level, water temperature, presence of predators, etc. Campbell also notes that a young man's search for "the perfect wife" also includes many variables: physical appearance, finances, capacity for fidelity, parenting skills, etc. In other words, if we don't look at "multiple variables" then we are not likely to know much about sea otters - or what it takes to enter into a successful marriage.

Campbell's book describes the statistical tools that are used to analyze natural events. This information is useful for students in all academic disciplines, but also is of interest to non-students. His writing uses many examples of things that "normal people" can relate to, and thereby reaches beyond the confines of the college classroom. His book is also bold enough to assert that Science, via deductive reasoning, can prove the existence of God. Campbell says that scientists need to broaden their intellectual horizons in order to discover new truths. And deductive reasoning for the existence of God is an example of how the gap between Science and Religion can be bridged.

Campbell offers several examples of phenomena in the material world that cannot be explained in human terms. (1) Our natural view of the world is inherently limited. The earth, after all, is not flat - as it was once thought to be. (2) The Bible has been shown to be a remarkably accurate historical record, which could not have happened (by a probability of 1 to ten million) unless it was divinely inspired. (3) Quantum Mechanics, according to Niels Bohr and Albert Einstein, proves that there are realms of existence (mass, energy, and subatomic parallel universes) that do exist - and these phenomena are well beyond a human's ability to observe. (4) Some things, like the Shroud of Turin, can only be explained by the conversion of Matter to Energy, which qualifies as a miracle. (5) Some biologic topics (like the origin of the Bacterial Flagellum) cannot be explained in Darwinian terms, and could serve as proof of Intelligent Design.





Campbell says that these five premises "provide a plausible explanation that God is light (or energy) and because God is Light, [he] is not bound by temporal limitations." Arguments of this nature might seem unnecessarily "scientific" to some, but are useful to those who have adopted Modern Man's tendency to look at Life through the microscope of scientific inquiry.

I found Hal Campbell's book to be an interesting discussion of Science and Statistics, and was impressed with his use of numerous examples to demonstrate these concepts. I feel fortunate to know Hal and Jean Campbell, and can state (with a high degree of probability) that they make Sidney a more interesting place to live in.

Public Hearing Held To Review Sunrise Village Subdivision

A public hearing was held by the City/Richland County Planning Board last Thursday night in Sidney to review the application of a major subdivision. The board unanimously approved the application for the Sunrise Village Subdivision to be built north of E. Holly Street.

Marcy Hamburg, City of Sidney/Richland County planner, read the staff report for the major subdivision. The board had previously reviewed the application for the Sunrise Village Subdivision and presented a report on the effects the subdivision will have on agriculture, agricultural water users' facilities, local services, historical or natural environment, wildlife habitat and public safety.

Brian Milne, Interstate Engineering, submitted the Sunrise Village Subdivision application on behalf of American Land Development for review in recent months. The subdivision will create 10 highway business lots, 12 commercial-light manufacturing lots, 158 residential lots, 1 lot that will consist of six apartment units (each unit will be comprised of 60 apartments), 1 lot which consists of 30 acres for future residential development and a 5-acre lot dedicated as a park. The subdivision consists of approximately 144.49 acres.

Residents and adjacent land owners were present to voice concerns and questions of such a substantial addition to the area. With the obvious housing shortage, a major subdivision is something people see the need for but have concerns with the effect it will have on the city's already stressed infrastructure.

"They [American Land Development] are here to provide a need." said Milne enthusiastically. He stated the developer wants to provide housing at a price point as realistic as possible. Rents will be as economical as possible according to material costs.

The land is in the city's jurisdiction and at present is used as irrigated farm land with an existing oil well. Concerns that the park will be located near the existing oil well site which consists of an oil pumping unit, storage tanks, electric box and a burn off flare. The developer proposes all necessary conditions for safety around the site.

TRAFFIC

Many of the public concerns were of the increase in traffic to be expected on E. Holly Street and those regarding 3rd, 5th and 8th Avenues. The subdivision will have road access via E. Holly Street and County Road 351(proposed Ninth Ave. NE), including Whitaker and Miller Streets.

The preliminary plat shows these streets as deadend roadways and the 2010 Richland County, City of Sidney, Town of Fairview Subdivision Regulations require an approved turnaround. The report stated the road design and construction is to meet City of Sidney standards prior to being turned over to the city. The application stated the developer (applicant) will incur all the cost.

General consensus was that concerns about E. Holly Street are up to the Montana Department of Transportation. The MDT is expected to mill and overlay the truck route (E. Holly Street, Ninth Avenue NE and SE and 14th Street SE) in the spring.

LOCAL SERVICES

With a subdivision of this size, the city's local services will be affected significantly but these are issues that already need addressing due to the increasing population in the area.

A Sidney resident voiced concerns about schools and law enforcement being overwhelmed. The plat proposes 30 acres for future residential development that could be used for school or church development. It was stated that an area church is willing to consider this in the future.

The report included all separate agencies involved, including Sidney Police Department, Sidney School District, Sidney and Richland County Public Works Department and Sidney U.S. Post Office with their concerns and conclusions.


Other concerns voiced Thursday night included wildlife, irrigation water and lateral ditches.

The staff report found the application does meet the 2006 Richland County Growth Policy and City of Sidney's Master Plan.

The City of Sidney's mission statement in the Growth Policy states "It encourages and supports young families to put down roots in a community with small town values and big town services."

The Goals in the Growth Policy state: Housing - "Expand housing stock in good condition to meet needs" and Economy -"Develop Sidney's economy in ways that can build small town character and big town services" and Population - "Promote population growth to sustain new businesses and schools at a rate that can be supported with government services and infrastructure."

Approval of the subdivision is conditional and the applicant is required to meet several conditions along with requirements outlined in the Subdivision Regulations recommended by the planning board. Construction of the subdivision will begin as soon as the applicant meets a conditional approval from all governing bodies.






