# MonDak Energy Alliance Meeting Held in Sidney

The MonDak Energy Alliance, which is made up of individuals and businesses interested in developing energy within the MonDak region, met Feb. 28th in Sidney. The alliance meets quarterly, switching between Sidney and Williston, and hosts speakers covering topics concerning the area.

During the Feb. 28th meeting, the alliance heard speakers concerning topics including: highway concerns, rail depot development, oil lease advisement, the oil well drilling in Sidney, and a look into the Governor's office.

Tim Baker, Governor Steve Bullock's Natural Resources Advisor, spoke on the Governor's views concerning oil country. Baker stated that Governor Bullock, "made clear he supports oil and gas development." Not only does he support the oil and gas industry, he is also working to strengthen the rights for land owners.

Also speaking on land owners rights was Dennis Trudell with the NE Montana Land and Mineral Owners Association. Trudell spoke concerning oil leases and the importance of the wording included. He pointed out the main things that should be looked at within an oil lease include: the amount per acre, the royalty rate, the amount of time, and to use very specific language within the lease. Trudell suggested the surface owners try to pair up with the mineral owners to get surface damage compensation included in the lease. He also stated that if your not comfortable working out the lease that you should seek help from either a lawyer or someone who has dealt with them before.

Speaking on other concerns in the area was Shane Mintz with the Montana Department of Transportation. Mintz informed those in attendance on the studies that have been done concerning highways within oil country. Studies showed that highway costs will average at 52 million dollars a year for the next 20 years due to the Bakken development, 70% due to truck traffic and 30% due to material cost increases. Highway improvements currently in the works are district wide rumble strips, center line rumble strips between Fairview and Glendive, speed limit change to 65 between Glendive and Fairview, and numerous traffic signals.

Transportation changes were also announced by Neil Amondson with Hunter Light concerning the new rail depot going in just North of Fairview. The new rail depot will be located at the corner of Highway 200 and Highway 58. The rail depot will be 185 acres along with a future 15 acre truck stop. The rail depot will be built with 26 tracks which can handle up to 20 rail cars each at one time. It will be used to

bring in numerous supplies and send out oil and natural gas. Although this will increase the rail traffic, it will bring down the semi-truck traffic in and out of the MonDak area.

Wrapping up the meeting, the last presentation was given by XTO Energy representative Emily Snooks. XTO Energy, who is currently the largest natural gas producer in the nation, will be drilling a well that will supply the many residents of Sidney and the City of Sidney with oil lease monies. Along with this, they also donate to many charities and organizations within the community.

The Fairview Schools will be holding a public forum on Thursday, March 14<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm in the cafeteria. The public forum will discuss the possibility of switching to a 4-day school week starting next fall. 

# Legislators Rosendale and Halvorson Visit Sidney

Local legislators Matt Rosendale and David Halvorson provided updates to the public March 1st, during the Town Hall meeting hosted by the Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. They gave a look into what bills are being discussed and what they feel the outcomes will be with them.

Sen. Matt Rosendale, SD19, emphasized his push for infrastructure funding with the understanding that many cities and towns need updates. Representing Dawson and Wibaux Counties, Rosendale can see the

struggles in the area as he stated, "I recognize we have a huge issue with housing in this area." He is addressing the permit process, whether it is a building permit or land use permit, which currently takes a long time. He is trying to streamline the process for permits so less time is lost, considering that those permits are necessary to continue expansion. Also mentioned was increase of pension, need for more highway patrol, and looking at a bypass around Sidney and Culbertson.

Representative David Halvorson, HD37, focused

ing funding. First he spoke on the reassignment of oil and gas tax revenue allowing the cities and town within oil country to address their concerns. His other main point was the issue of school funding, suggesting that the sudden increase of students should allow retention of revenue.

Sidney Mayor Bret Smelser spoke following the legislators to inform them of the issues and concerns of the city. Smelser emphasized that although getting grant monies will fix the infrastruc-

on two main points concern- ture, it will not supply enough consistent funds to pay workers. He stated that we need to improve the infrastructure in order to "support the next generation and keep the industry going."

> Along those same lines, County Commissioner Shane Gorder informed those in attendance of the current issues concerning the county roads. With the county includes 1280 miles of gravel county roads, of which many are used for oil and truck traffic causing them to need lots of upkeep and repairs.

Continuing the same idea, County Commissioner Loren Young informed every one that 1 trip down a road with an 80,000 pound semi is equal to 3200 cars traveling it. He also stated that our county roads are "main arter-

Closing up the meeting, Representative Halvorson stated that "meetings like this are very important, this is where new ideas come from."







# **MDT Proposes Traffic Signal** Installation in Sidney - Richland Co.

The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to install traffic signals at two intersections in Sidney, MT, Richland County. New traffic signals will be installed at the following intersections: West Holly Street (MT 16) and 22nd Avenue and West Holly Street (MT 16) and Lincoln Avenue.

Proposed work includes the installation of the traffic signals at both intersections, as well as, new curb, gutter and sidewalk and ADA ramps at the intersections.

The purpose of the project is to improve safety and operations at these two intersections.

Construction is tentatively planned for 2014, depending on completion of design and availability of funds. New rightof way and relocation of utilities will be required. MDT staff will contact all affected landowners prior to doing survey work on their land. Staff will again contact landowners prior to construction regarding property acquisition and temporary construction permits.

# Remove Permanent Fish Houses Soon

State law requires permanent fish houses to be removed from North Dakota waters by midnight March 15.

Nancy Boldt, water safety coordinator for the State Game and Fish Department, said anglers should exercise caution because mild weather conditions can quickly result in unstable ice conditions.

"It is always important to check ice thickness, as warm temperatures with a high sun will rapidly deteriorate ice conditions this time of the year," Boldt said.

In addition, Boldt said anglers should be aware of the amount of snow on the ice. "The pressure from the weight of the snow and ice cause water to seep around shore, as well as through cracks and fishing holes," she added. "The bottom line is that several inches of slush under fresh snow make traveling difficult because vehicles drop through the top layer and end up stuck."

# North Dakota Earth Day Patch Contest

The state Game and Fish Department's annual Earth Day awareness campaign is accepting entries for design of a 2013 Earth Day patch. North Dakota students ages 6-18 are eligible to participate. The deadline to submit entries is March 15.

The Game and Fish Department will announce a winner in three age categories - 6-9, 10-13, and 14-18. Each winner will receive a pair of Nikon 8x40 binoculars. The final patch design will be chosen from the three winners.

The winning design will be used on a patch given to members of Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4-H clubs and any school participating in Earth Day cleanup projects on stateowned or managed lands in North Dakota in April and May.

The patch should incorporate some aspect of Earth Day - celebrated April 22 - or keeping North Dakota clean. It must be round and three inches in diameter. There is a limit of five colors on the patch, and lettering must be printed. Name, address, age and phone number of the contestant must be clearly printed on the entry form. Only one entry per person is allowed.

# Montana FSA: Montana Farmers & Ranchers Reminded of Important March 15 Deadline for 2013 NAP Coverage

USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Bruce Nelson reminds Montana farmers and ranchers that the sales closing deadline of March 15 for most noninsurable 2013 spring planted and forage crops, including grass for hay and grazing, is fast approaching.

Application deadline for the 2013 Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for all non-insurable crops except for honey and value loss crops is March 15, 2013. The 2013 sales closing dates have already ended for honey (Dec. 1, 2012) and value-loss crops (Sept. 1, 2012).

NAP provides financial assistance to eligible producers

when natural disasters cause catastrophic loss of production (low yield) or prevented planting of an eligible noninsurable crop by providing coverage equivalent to the catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance. In the event of a natural disaster, NAP covers the amount of loss greater than 50 percent of the expected production based on the producer's approved yield and reported acreage.

"Montana farmers and ranchers who have not purchased NAP coverage are reminded of the March 15th sales closing date for most 2013 NAP crops," Nelson said. "In Montana, the most common NAP crops are grazing and various forage crops but all producers are encouraged to contact their local county office to determine crop eligibility."

NAP is available on commercially-produces agricultural commodity crops for which the catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance is not available. If the Risk Management Agency (RMA) offers coverage for a specific crop and intended use in the county, then NAP coverage is not available for that crop.

Eligible producers can apply for coverage using form CCC-471, Application for Coverage. Producers must file the application and pay the applicable service fee on or before the application closing date for the applicable crop. The service fee is the lesser of \$250 per crop or \$750 per producer per administrative county, not to exceed a total of \$1,875 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties.

# Dickinson Diesel Refinery To Ease Demand

In a state boasting some of the heaviest over-the-road trucking activity in the nation, the creation of a diesel refinery plant could be just what the western side of the state of North Dakota needs to help quench the insatiable thirst the area has for diesel fuel.

the demand for As diesel fuel continues to be stretched passed the limits of local capabilities, two companies are taking part in a joint venture and making plans to help meets diesel consumption needs, creating sustainable jobs in the Dickinson, N.D., area.

MDU Resources Group, of Bismarck and Calumet Specialty Product Partners. Indianapolis, Indiana, have announced that Dakota Prairie Refining, is set to become operational in late 2014, and will be capable of producing 20,000 barrels of Bakken crude oil and other hydrocarbons each Crude will be transported by pipeline to the facility where approximately 7,000 barrels of diesel will be made and used in North Dakota.

The goal is to keep as much product in the region as possible.

Ground breaking is set for April with construction expected to take about 20 months. The refinery will sit on a 318-acre site located four miles west of Dickinson, directly south of Interstate 94.

The plant's construction is expected to cost between \$280 million and \$300 million.

"This site was chosen specifically because of its close proximity to the railroads, roads, electricity, natural gas lines, water and sewer," said Rick Mattleson, Director of Communications and Public Affairs for MDU.

Once operational, the 24/7 refinery will sustain about 100 jobs and create between 400 and 500 during the peak constructionphases.Mattleson said the large amount of construction employees will also bring revenues into the economy as they utilize local services and new community members will add to the tax

The project's ability to move forward is contingent on approval of an air quality permit from the North Dakota Department of Health. The application and public comment process has already taken place.

Dennis Johnson, City Mayor said he is excited about the potential economic impact the refinery will have on Dickinson. "This will create good paying, sustainable jobs that are not subject to the ups and downs of the price of oil. It may also create spill-off jobs and entice incoming businesses to come here because of the refinery," Johnson said.

To alleviate traffic in Dickinson and accommodate fortruck flows, the North Dakota Department of Transportation is considering an additional off ramp located off Interstate 94 that will allow the truck route to tie directly into the Interstate. It will tentatively be called Exit 56. "I think the collaboration between the city and the state for this project will help provide an impetus for the state to help them with getting the bypass built and other restructuring needs," Mattleson said.

Dickinson is currently building a waste water treatment plant that is on tap for completion around the time the refinery will also be completed. It will supply approximately 175,000 gallons of grey water to the refinery for its daily use but will be capable of producing between three and four million gallons daily. Of the water supplied to the refinery, many of those gallons will be recycled through the system.



The plant is expected to emit 125,000 tons per year of carbon dioxide but will utilize the most advanced emissionscontrol technology available.

Gov. Jack Dalrymple has met with officials from MDU Resources and Calumet to discuss the refinery and told them the state would continue to assist them throughout the planning process.

"The development of another refinery has been a long-time goal of our state and with this project we are achieving that goal. The decision by MDU Resources

Group and Calumet to move forward on a new diesel fuel refinery is good news for North Dakota," the Governor said.

The Tesoro Refinery in Mandan is currently the only refinery located in the state and is capable of processing some 68,000 barrels per day. Current demand for diesel

in North Dakota is estimated at 53,000 barrels per day and is expected to increase to 75,000 barrels per day by the year 2025.

Mattleson said MDU has spent a considerable amount of time forging its strong partnership

with Calumet and is also ensuring the project meets all of the state's regulatory guidelines and requirements.

"We are very excited. It's not often this type of project lines up with a ready market where demand is tremendous. Both companies are committed to being good members of the community and one of the ways we are doing this is by keeping the lines of communication open with the pubic and letting people know we are willing to work with them," Mattleson





## A Little Bit Country **Drop Credit** – What Is It?

Recently a cattle producer asked about the term "drop credit" as it related to beef value. Drop credit (or drop charge) is the value of nonmeat items such as blood, meat, hides, fat, bones, hair, etc. The term is also applied to pork values.

Today's drop credit for a steer or heifer is approximately \$14 per cwt. live weight. Much of this value is influenced by energy prices and those parts of the animal carcass which provide energy by-products such as tallow. The weighted average price of choice white grease is about \$25-30 per cwt. Last year it was about \$13. This choice white grease is used in rations for both pigs and poultry.

Besides the talon, other drop credit items of the animal include hide, tongue, head and cheek meat, tail, heart, lips, liver, lungs, bone and blood.

# Spring/Summer Open Burning Season Starts on March 1

Spring/summer open burning season begins Friday, March 1, and the Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) reminds people that only clean, untreated wood and plant material can be burned legally.


It is illegal to burn, among other things, food waste, plastics, wood that has been coated, painted stained or treated, dead animals or animal droppings, rubber materials, chemicals, asphalt shingles, tar paper, pathogenic or hazardous wastes, and standing or demolished structures containing prohibited materials.

DEQ strongly recommends that people contact their county health departments before they start open burning to find out if there are any county air quality requirements that

apply to them, especially in Lewis and Clark, Missoula, Lincoln, Flathead and Yellowstone counties.

All burners should contact local fire control authorities before open burning any time of the year to get information on local fire safety requirements, and to notify authorities of the location and time of their burns.







# Community Health Fair Offers Something For Everyone

Sidney Health Center and the Richland County Health Department are cosponsoring and coordinating the ninth annual Community Health Fair in March. The two entities are once again joining forces with local organizations to promote various health-related topics and feature screenings to the general public.

This year's Community Health Fair is slated for March 12 and 13 at the Richland County Fair Event Center located at the Fairgrounds in Sidney. The event will kickoff Tuesday evening from 5:00 - 7:00 PM and continue on Wednesday from 8:00 AM - 2:00 PM. Coordinators of the event are anticipating a little something for everyone again this year. The health fair will feature various screenings, demonstrations, and more than 40 community booths on various health top-

Screenings are quick assessments or tests that help identify individuals who may be at risk for disease or health complications. A few of the screenings available are the non-fasting blood draws, blood pressure checks, blood sugar tests, hearing and retinal photographs.

The Sidney Health Center lab will offer non-fasting blood draw tests for thyroid function and glycohemoglobin tests at reduced rates. The Thyroid Stimulating Hormone (TSH) tests are available for \$20. The glycohemoglobin (HA<sub>1</sub>C) test checks an individual's risk for diabetes by providing a blood sugar average for the last three months. The test is available for \$25.

Demonstrations throughout the event will highlight gardening, disaster preparedness, exercise, therapeutic art and quick healthy smoothies.



Have you made any plans for March 12 or 13? No? Then drop by at Richland County's Event Center for the 2013 Richland County Health Fair. This year's Health Fair will bring about information, activities, fun and food! Is there a better combination? The theme of the upcoming fair is Farmto-Table and couldn't come at a better time.

Consuming 'real' foods, such as unprocessed fruits, vegetables, meats and milk provides us with carbohydrates, protein, vitamins and minerals we need for a healthy development. Unfortunately, the consumption of highly processed foods, such as soft drinks, frozen dinners and candies is highly popular among Americans. The Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, for example, reported that on any given day 50% of the population aged 2 and older consume sugar drinks. The consumption of nutritious produce, on the other hand, is not so popular. The Montana Department of Public Health found that only 25% of Montanans eat the recommended daily 5 servings of fruits and vegetables.

So what is the problem with that? Processed foods are often high in sugar, salt,

solid fats and calories. They can therefore contribute to obesity and chronic disease development, such as diabetes and hypertension. For instance, one cup of strawberries holds less than 50 calo-

ries, 8 grams of sugar and no sodium. On the other hand, one strawberry Pop-Tart provides 200 calories, 17 grams of sugar and 160 mg of sodium. Also, you may have noticed that the Pop-Tart lists

around 50 ingredients, while a pack of strawberries consist of one ingredient only: strawberries. What would you

There are three local certified ZUMBA instructors available to answer your ZUMBA questions or introduce you to this great party.


