Revin' Up the Richland Community Complex

to be held June 13th

Revin' Up the Richland Community Complex (RCC) will be held Saturday June 13th at the Richland County Fairgrounds in Sidney, MT, bringing the community together and raising awareness about the RCC. With some of the events being previously established, it seemed like a great opportunity to bring the community together and support multiple organizations, which is what the RCC is all about.

"The goal with the Richland Community Complex is to enhance what our community already has for all ages," said Lisa Gorder, Project Coordinator of the RCC Board. "The Complex will enhance our quality of life here; it's something that will benefit everyone."

Tentative plans for the RCC include an auditorium/ theater space for music, dance, and theatrical performances, library, daycare, theater, a fitness and wellness center with an aquatics center that includes a physical therapy pool, the space to accommodate sports such as softball, soccer, and basketball, as well as being an outlet for seniors to stay active

and involved. There will be an arena which will be able to host large events, but can also be sectioned off into three separate gymnasiums, making sports practices easier. The hope is that it will be utilized by multiple organizations such as FFA and 4-H and will be readily available to local schools, making it possible to host large tournaments for instance. Gorder explains that the more people and organizations that share walls and therein share costs, the more cost effective the building will be. The RCC will need to be able to sustain itself through memberships and events; bringing in events would then increase local economic stability. Proceeds raised during Revin' Up the Richland Community Complex will be put towards a planning study set to begin on June 16th. The planning study will serve as a road map for how to proceed with the building project.


The event will be a funfilled day with something for just about everyone beginning with a community breakfast hosted by the Cutting Edge Dance Studio from 6am until 11am. The Neal Hermanson Memorial Ranch Rodeo starts at 8am with the Ranch Horse Competition and the rodeo will follow at 2pm.

Registration for the Darren Linde Memorial Run will be at 10am at the National Guard Armory and the run will start at 11am. There is a \$25 registration fee for individuals or \$50 for family registration. Strollers and children five and under are free.

From 11am until 4pm cars, trucks, and motorcycles will be drivin' in and revin' up for the Car Show. The Doug Filler Memorial stereo competition takes place from 4pm until 8pm, judged by the US Autosound Competition Team.

The Grammy nominated band will be joined by special guests Dan Hunthausen & the Trainwrecks. Tickets are \$25 and include car show admission, but hurry because there are a

May Is Asthma Awareness Month

DPHHS Asthma Control Program Offers Tools And Resources To Help

Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) officials say that nearly 1 in 12 people in Montana currently have asthma.

Further, 6 out of 10 adults and children with asthma report the condition limits their activities

However, the DPHHS Asthma Control Program is working with certified asthma educators and other health care providers, childcare professionals, home visitors, and community members across the state to help people better understand how to make changes in their day-to-day life to control their asthma. These are changes such as accessing quality, guidelines-based care for asthma, gaining skills to improve inhaler technique, and identifying what triggers

asthma and how to remove triggers from home, work, or school.

According to Jessie Fernandes of the Montana Asthma Control Program, the key is learning how to self-manage the disease. "It is important that a person knows their triggers and their medications and knows how to respond early to an attack," she said. "The program works to help Montanans have better control of their disease and better quality of life."

She said this is all information that can be developed into an Asthma Action Plan with a primary care provider. An Asthma Action Plan provides information about what medications to use when, and how to respond to signs of an asthma attack.

Even though asthma can be controlled, many people with asthma in Montana live with frequent symptoms, activity limitations, and poor quality of life; about half (52%) of adults and one third (36%) of children with current asthma in Montana report asthma symptoms indicating that their asthma is not well or very poorly controlled. "Well-controlled asthma shouldn't limit activities," Fernandes says.

The Montana Asthma Control Program conducts various activities around the state, many of which focus heavily on providing asthma self-management education. One activity, the Montana Asthma Home Visiting Program (MAP), has demonstrated that upon completion, the percent of enrolled children with good inhaler technique increased from 26% to 93%, the percent having an Asthma Action Plan increased from 25% to 89%, and the percent of children having symptoms on all 30 days of the last month decreased from 23% to 4%. Other activities, conducted with health care facilities and school nurses, work to achieve similar results.

May is National Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month and May 5 is World Asthma Day. "Now is the peak season for asthma- and allergy-related medical problems, so it's a great time to educate and spread awareness," Fernandes said.

Suicide Prevention Is A **State And Community** Responsibility: SMR Team **Works At State Level** While Upcoming ASIST **Workshop Provides Local** Suicide First Aid Training

In 2012 Montana was the first state to form a Suicide Mortality Review (SMR) Team. After volleying with Wyoming year after year for the highest suicide rate per capita in the nation, the legislature moved to do something about it on a government level. Reverend Vicki Waddington of the Lonsdale United Methodist Church in Sidney serves on that review team, made up of clergy, law enforcement, social services, mental health professionals, and coroners. Her husband, Mark Waddington, wrote a letter to the Governor recommending her for the position. Vicki Waddington, caring by nature and in the business of helping others, had been involved in suicide awareness for eight years prior to this, adamant that no one should suffer to the point of taking their own life.

Todd Bergerson, Waddington's son, is described as a great kid with a great sense of humor. He had good friends, played football, loved biking and fireworks, and was developing a deep interest in music, playing the tuba and bass guitar and singing in the church choir.

"He had a beautiful singing voice. He used to come up behind me and flip the back of my hair.... It drove me nuts," Waddington fondly recalls. "He was starting to grow into a teenager with a heart for other people."

On August 31, 2000, at 13 years, 5 months, and 15 days, Todd Bergerson passed away, having died by suicide. Waddington recounts that they had no idea that anything was wrong and discussed "fogging", a behavior displayed by

"Fogging" refers to seemingly normal behavior displayed in an attempt to protect those around them from knowing the truth, and to prevent burdening them with the severity of the

Three years later, Waddington was asked to speak at the Jr. High School in Miles City, which happened to be on her son's birthday, and she could see that it hit close to home for her audience; some of the students had known Bergerson.

"You could see that they needed to be allowed to grieve, ask questions, and be angry. People don't want to talk about it but they need to, especially kids because they are too young to deal with the pain themselves. We have to be willing to learn how to talk to them because children grieve differently than adults; your grieving isn't over when the funeral is over," said Wad-

Today she is part of the SMR Team, which reviews every suicide in the state and compiles information on everything from education level to relational status to the day of the week it occurred on, identifying risk factors, patterns, trends and figuring out where the 'gaps' are.

'The SMR team is a statewide effort to identify factors associated with suicide in an effort to develop prevention strategies... The purpose of the review team is to determine if a suicide was preventable and the factors associated with the suicide. The prevention of suicide is both the policy of the state of Montana and a community responsibility.' - Suicide Mortality Review Team

comes with suicide and I want to work towards ending that stigma," Waddington stated. "This area tends to have a 'cowboy-up' mentality and people are always afraid of what they don't understand, but it is an illness that can kill you just like cancer and diabetes. We work to prevent and treat those illnesses, so why not this one? This is a matter of compassion and medical science."

According to the Summary Report for January 1, 2014 - August 31, 2014 (compiled by the SMR Team), it seems clear that so little is known about the facts of suicide, there are many common misconceptions. For instance, more than half of those that die by suicide don't leave a note, the most common drugs in a person's system are caffeine and tobacco, with 41% having alcohol and 9% having methamphetamines in their system. Veterans made up 28% of state-wide suicides, 40% of all suicide victims had identified mental health disorders and of those 66% suffered from depression. Males made up 85% of victims, white males ages 45-64 are the largest suicide demographic with health, mental health, and relational loss all seeming to be contributing factors and unfortunately, of all the suicides reviewed, 75% had warning signs identified. Tragically, those affected by suicide are 4-7 times more likely to die by suicide themselves.

One of the most important factors in suicide prevention is community involvement. District II Drug & Alcohol will be providing suicide first aid skills to the community through an Applied Suicide Intervenworkshop. The no-cost ASIST workshop will be held June 8th and June 9th at the Assembly of God Church, 414 E Main Street in Sidney. Participants will learn how to identify suicidal behavior and will develop skills in preventing suicides. Books, materials, breakfast, and refreshments will be provided each day and continuing education credits are available. "People don't know what to do and if they should take someone seriously when threats are made, but it's better to have that person mad at you than for them to end up dead. Asking if someone is thinking about committing suicide isn't going to put the idea in their head and if someone has a plan, a means, and an opportunity, they are in immediate danger and you need to call 911. I had no reason to believe that Todd was in danger of taking his own life because I just didn't know what to look for. You don't have to be someone's best friend to help them. You just need to care enough to help someone when you see them suffering," Waddington explained.



Open Season Launched For Bakken Crude Oil Gathering System In Mckenzie County, North Dakota

DENVER: American Midstream Partners, LP (AMID) (the "Partnership") announced on Friday that American Midstream Bakken, LLC, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Partnership, is conducting a binding open season for a proposed approximately 50-mile Bakken crude oil gathering and transportation system in the core of McKenzie County, North Dakota (the "Bakken System") to transport up to 40,000 barrels per day (Bbl/d) of crude oil for delivery to

major intrastate and interstate pipeline systems beginning in June 2015. As proposed, the Bakken System will have initial transportation capacity up to approximately 15,000 Bbl/d with the ability to expand up to approximately 40,000 Bbl/d.

During the binding open season, potential shippers have the opportunity to obtain crude oil transportation service on the Bakken System on a committed or uncommitted basis at various tier-based rates according to volumes transported. Parties interested in becoming Committed Shippers can do so by making long-term acreage or volumetric dedications for crude oil gathering and transportation service on the Bakken System. The open season will also provide potential shippers with the opportunity to deliver volumes into the system via a truck rack. The open season will last approximately 30 days, closing on June 22, 2015.

Shipper Inquiries Bona fide potential shippers that would like to receive copies of the open season tariff(s) must first sign a confidentiality agreement. During the binding open season, comments, questions, or changes to the general terms and conditions of the proposed tariffs, services and/or routes are due in writing by noon Central Time on June 22, 2015. Interested parties will have the opportunity to execute committed agreements for crude oil transportation service on the proposed gathering pipeline

Sidney ARS Field Days To Feature 'Drones 101' Workshop

Both the dryland field days co-sponsored by the USDA Agricultural Research Service's Northern Plains Agricultural Research Laboratory in Sidney, MT will include a special hour-long "Drones 101" workshop designed to acquaint tour goers at both sites with the basics of the machines. Formally known as unmanned aerial systems (UAS), these small aircraft hold big promise for agriculture. Two models will be featured at the Sidney ARS Dryland Farm Field Day to be held on Friday, June 19th, as well as at the annual Froid Research Farm Field Day on Thursday, June 25th.

Speakers for the "drones 101" workshop include Brian McGinnis of Sidney who has

been working with drones for the past three years as a hobbyist. In addition to discussing the rules and regulations required for flying drones, he will also demonstrate his latest quadcopter. McGinnis owns Exdivio Solutions, Inc., a computer consulting firm in Sidney. Joining him at the June field days will be Roger Meyer PLS, a Registered Land Surveyor, of Lambert who will demonstrate the Trimble UX5, a fixed wing UAV. Meyer, of Montana Land and Aerial Surveys, is one of only a few Montanans that have applied for and received a Section 333 exemption from the Federal Aviation Administration that allows him to use his craft for commercial operations.

"We're pleased to have Brian and Roger share their information and expertise at these upcoming field days," Sidney ARS dryland Agronomist Brett Allen said. "The drone technology is still new in agriculture, but it holds a lot of promise for the future. These basic presentations will give interested producers and others the opportunity to see a drone in action and ask questions of the operators."

Again, the two field days featuring the drone workshop





"I think everyone is going to miss her. She was not just a co-worker who wore so many hats, but a friend, a supportive person, someone to look up to who was great at what she did, and always did it with her fiery passion," said Amber Bond, Clinic Coordinator.

Summer Safety on the Water

Failure to wear a personal floatation device is the main reason people lose their lives in water recreation accidents.

North Dakota Game and Fish Department boat and water safety coordinator Nancy Boldt said safety begins with wearing a personal flotation device, and knowing what's below the surface of the water.

"Water recreationists need to be alert and safe." Boldt said. "Swimmers need to know the water's depth, as serious injuries can occur from diving into water. Large objects hidden below the water's surface can lead to significant injury."

North Dakota law requires all children ages 10 and younger to wear a personal flotation device while in boats

of less than 27 feet in length. The law also requires all personal watercraft users to wear a life jacket, as well as anyone towed on skis, tubes, boards or other similar devices.

Water users should make sure to wear life jackets that are the appropriate size, and in good condition. It is also important that children wear a PFD while swimming.

Water skiers and tubers should wear a life jacket with four nylon straps rather than one with a zipper, because straps are stronger than zippers upon impact with water. Anglers or persons paddling a canoe should opt for a PFD that is comfortable enough to wear for an entire outing.

Water skiers and tubers are reminded it takes three to ski and tube. When a person is towed on water skis or a similar device, an observer other than the operator is required on the vessel.

North Dakota boaters also are reminded that marine VHF radios are an important part of boat safety that should not be improperly used by operators. These radios are intended for boat operators who are in distress and facing an emergency situation.

Regulations to help ensure safe boating this summer are found in the 2014-16 North Dakota Fishing Guide. A more comprehensive listing is available in the North Dakota Boat and Water Safety Guide or the Boat North Dakota education book. These guides are available online at the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, by email at ndgf@nd.gov, or at a local Game and Fish Department office.

Dam Safety A Shared Responsibility

HELENA, Mont. -The Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC) will observe the 30th anniversary of the Montana Dam Safety Act on May 31, 2015, which is also designated as National Dam Safety Awareness Day.

Laurence Siroky, chief of DNRC's Water Operations Bureau and one of the original architects of the 1985 Dam Safety Act, noted the law was aimed at protecting Montanans from dam failure and encouraging responsible use and maintenance of dams.

"Under this law, dam

owners are responsible for scheduling an engineering inspection of their dam at least once every five years," Siroky said. "They're also required to perform proper maintenance and have an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) that outlines notification procedures to local law enforcement and emergency management agencies, including evacuation maps for all areas that could be impacted."

The act also requires dam owners to outline strategies for repairing a dam in danger of failing, Siroky said.

This year's Montana Legislature implemented new dam safety laws focusing on impoundment structures for mine

tailings ponds. Siroky said the law was proposed by the Montana Mining Association after a tailings pond breach in August of 2014 at the Mount Polley Mine in British Columbia. The breach released millions of cubic yards of mine waste into a local creek and lake.

"Dams provide critical water storage with a broad range of benefits for our state - irrigation, hydroelectric power, flood control, recreation and municipal water supplies, among others" said DNRC Director John Tubbs. "DNRC owns and manages 20 water-storage projects statewide and we place a premium on dam safety and maintenance."

Along with managing its

own water projects, DNRC also operates the state's Dam Safety Program, which regulates the construction, operation and maintenance of Montana's dams to protect life and property. The program provides training and outreach to dam owners and engineers, and assists with emergency preparedness activities.

Of the thousands of dams in Montana, an estimated 185 are structures that could pose a threat to downstream residents. Siroky said there are two or three incidents each year involving dam malfunctions; most of these involve small dams and are caused by deterioration of the outlet

It's a shared responsibility between state and federal agencies, dam owners, emergency responders and citizens to know their roles in the event of an emergency. For the estimated 160,000 Montanans and businesses living downstream of a dam there are actions they can take for their own safety, including:

 Knowing the benefits and risks associated with dams

 Knowing evacuation routes and areas that may be inundated by water and debris · Maintaining flood in-

 Having an evacuation plan

Siroky also encouraged

citizens to contact local law enforcement or emergency responders if they notice anything unusual or suspicious at a dam, such as significant water seepage.

National Dam Safety Awareness Day is held each year on May 31. The date corresponds to the failure in 1889 of the South Fork Dam in Johnstown, Pennsylvania. More than 2,200 people lost their lives in what is regarded as the most catastrophic dam failure in US History.

BakerHostetler Filed A Preliminary Injunction Against The BLM's Final Rule To Regulate Hydraulic Fracturing On Federal And Indian Lands North Dakota – One Of Four States In

DENVER: Baker-Hostetler, one of the nation's leading law firms, announced they have filed a request for preliminary injunction against the final rule the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) issued to regulate hydraulic fracturing on federal and Indian lands.

In a May 15, 2015 press release BakerHostetler writes, "The motion was filed in the United States District Court for the District of Wvoming on behalf of the Independent Petroleum Association of America and Western Energy Alliance. The motion details the flaws in BLM's final rule and requests that the federal district court halt implementation until the legal challenge is resolved."

Mark Barron, one of the Denver-based BakerHostetler attorneys heading the litigation states, "BLM has underestimated the cost of the final rule at every phase of development," and "Given the magnitude of expected costs and the legal flaws of the final rule, injunctive relief is necessary to protect independent producers until the court reaches

"After five years of rulemaking, BLM still has not identified a single case of hydraulic fracturing contaminating drinking water," added Poe Leggette, Co-leader of BakerHostetler's Energy and Shale practice team. "There is no excuse — as a matter of law or in the interest of good government — for the agency to continue to rely on unsupported assertions.'

While the final rule is not scheduled to take effect until June 24, 2015, independent producers are already incurring substantial compliance costs. Producers are adjusting drilling schedules, moving equipment, contracting for operational services, and training personnel. Producers

anticipate that these additional costs will exceed several hundreds of millions of dollars each year.

The motion emphasizes BLM's failure to consider relevant evidence during the rulemaking process and to justify its action with objective and technically sound support. "BLM argues that some states with hydraulic fracturing activity lack the regulations necessary to protect federal and Indian lands, but BLM is yet to identify a single harm that the agency's rule will prevent that state regulation isn't preventing already," noted Barron.

A Lawsuit Challenging New Rules For Oil And Gas Drilling On Federal Land

The Bureau of Land management (BLM) began working on a proposed rule concerning hydraulic fracturing in November 2010, when it held its first public forum amid growing public concern about the expansion of hydraulic fracturing. The new rule was the first revision to BLM's hydraulic fracturing regulations since 1988. The agency unveiled its first proposal to update these rules on May 4, 2012.

The revised final regulations for hydraulic fracturing on federal and Indian lands were published in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) on March 26, 2015 and were scheduled to go into effect June 26, 2015.

Wyoming files lawsuit:

In March, Wyoming's Attorney General's office filed

a petition for review of final court has allowed North Daagency action in federal court over the BLM's effort to regulate fracking.

Colorado and North Dakota intervene:

In April, U.S. Magistrate Judge Kelly Rankin of Cheyenne granted permission for both Colorado and North Dakota to intervene with Wvoming in a lawsuit challenging new rules for oil and gas drilling on federal land. The three states believe the regulations exceed the BLM's statutory authority and contradict existing federal law and plan to seek an injunction or temporary restraining order to prevent the rules from going into effect until the case is settled.

North Dakota Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem said last week in a prepared statement, "I am pleased the

kota to participate as a party to uphold our state's strong and comprehensive fracking regulations...We will be there alongside Wyoming in protecting our own state's authority to regulate the industry."

Utah announces they'll be joining the lawsuit:


Since permission was granted to North Dakota and Colorado to join Wyoming in the lawsuit, Cody Stewart, Utah Governor Herbert's Policy Director and Energy Advisor states that Utah will be filing a protest to try to show in court that the BLM has stepped out of bounds beyond their authority.
