USDA Announces Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Sign-Up Period for 2011 Crop Losses

Farm Service Agency Administrator Juan Garcia announced today the signup period for the 2011 crop year Supplemental Revenue Payments Assistance (SURE) program will open Oct. 22, 2012. The SURE program is part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (Farm Bill). Under the 2008 Farm Bill, SURE authorizes assistance to farmers and ranchers who suffered crop losses caused by natural disasters occurring through Sept. 30, 2011.

"Any eligible producer who suffered losses during the 2011 crop year is encouraged to visit a local FSA office to learn more about the SURE program and how to apply," said Garcia.

As of Sept. 30, 2011, the Department's authority to operate the SURE program expired along with four other, important disaster assistance programs: the Live-

stock Indemnity Program (LIP); the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP); the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP); and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP). Production losses due to disasters occurring after Sept. 30, 2011, are not eligible for disaster program coverage.

To be eligible for SURE, a farm or ranch must have:

At least a 10-percent production loss on a crop of economic significance; A policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for all economically significant crops; Been physically located in a county that was declared a primary disaster county or contiguous county by the Secretary of Agriculture under a Secretarial Disaster Designation. Without a Secretarial Disaster Des-

ignation, individual producers may be eligible if the actual production on the farm is less than 50 percent of the normal production on the farm due to a natural disaster. A "farm" for SURE purposes means the entirety of all crop acreage in all counties that a producer planted or intended to be planted for harvest for normal commercial sale or on-farm livestock feeding, including native and improved grassland intended for haying.

Producers considered socially disadvantaged, a beginning farmer or rancher, or a limited resource farmer may be eligible for SURE without a policy or plan of insurance or NAP coverage.

Farmers and ranchers interested in signing up must contact their local FSA county office for an appointment and complete the 2011 SURE sign up process before the June 7, 2013 dead-line.

The MonDak Heritage Center is pleased to announce the opening of Edith Freeman's Montana Seasons. The late Edith Freeman was an artist, teacher and rancher. Her lush and serene woodblock prints capture central Montana in all its varied seasons, evoking memories and reminding us of our region's beauties.

Born in 1913 in Broadview, Montana, Freeman moved to Billings in 1919, where she attended Billings public schools and received her B.A. and M.S. from Eastern Montana College (now MSU-Billings). printmaker. Few artists have been as deeply attuned as Edith Freeman to the austere beauty of Eastern Montana. Among many honors, Edith Freeman was the recipient of the

Montana Governor's Award for the Arts.

Not A Record, But Very Close

Altogether, more than 250 area residents, businesses, schools and government agencies recycled just shy of 29 Tons (57,939 pounds) of e-waste at this year's "E-rase your E-waste" events, organizers reported last week. The amount collected was just under last year's record breaking total of 59,630 pounds, which brings the program's 8-year total to over 266,000 pounds or 133 Tons of e-waste that has been recycled in Richland County.

"We just missed setting another record," Jackie Couture, co-chair of the local "E-rase your E-waste" Committee, noted. "So we were very pleased with this year's participation."

In particular, the group's four, summer month, mini-collection events attracted a lot of participation again this year, Butch Renders, another e-waste committee member noted. Overall, Couture and Renders reported that a total of 255 individuals, businesses and organizations participated in the group's 2012 collection events, including the four mini-collections and the final weekend event held Sept. 7-8. They brought with them hundreds of electronic items, including 381 monitors, 387 CPUs, 218 printers, 11 large copiers and 204 television sets. "And a lot of those TVs were huge!" Renders added.

Luckily the group had lots of help from loyal volunteers who return year after year to help out, as well as good support from county agencies. "The Richland County Solid Waste Department lets us use their shop space for all our events," Renders noted. "And they also let us store the e-waste there until it can be picked up, which we very much appreciate."

Renders and Couture thanked all the volunteers who came out to unload, load, palletize and shrink wrap the items, and once again pointed to the Richland County RSVP program as a major supporter of the effort. "So many of our senior volunteers return every year and several times in a single year....Stan Lindblom, Deek and Betty Risinger, Bill Forrester, Regina Schwindt and morethey're there whenever we need them," Renders said. "Basically they're family

Other volunteers helping out this year included the Juvenile Probation Office and their charges, Couture said, adding, "They worked hard and we really appreciate it!"

A number of local businesses also regularly step up to provide pallets, cardboard, shrink wrap and promotional support to aid the effort, Couture noted, for which the E-rase your E-waste Committee is very appreciative. They include Sidney Health Center, Sidney Sugars, Richland Opportunities, Inc, and the Montana Department of Environmental

"Our thanks to them," Couture said, "And, of course, a big thank you to our e-cycler, UNICOR, which allows us to provide this service free of charge each year."



Montana Public Media Presents Debates, Launches Website

Montana's public broadcasting services, Montana Public Radio, Yellowstone Public Radio and MontanaPBS, have joined with The University of Montana School of Journalism to launch an election year website and collaborate on broadcast debates and election programming.

The website, http:// montanapublicmedia.org, will archive all the broadcast and online material produced by the partners. It also

will provide links to other Web

"The goal is to be a 'goto' site for citizens who want to learn more about the candidates and the races," said William Marcus, a general manager of MontanaPBS and MTPR.

The partners also plan an ambitious lineup of broadcast debates, candidate profiles and interviews, special documentaries and "Equal Time" and "Ad Watch" segments. The debates will be broadcast live on public radio and TV at 7 p.m. on the following dates:

Monday, Oct. 8: U.S. Senate race.

Wednesday, Oct. 10: Governor race.

MontanaPBS will broadcast fact-checking segments produced by the UM School of Journalism following each debate, and MTPR will provide analysis for radio listen-

MTPR's "Campaign and Jackie

Yamanaka's candidate interviews and call-in programs will be archived on http:// montanapublicmedia.org, as will the "Ad Watch" and "Equal Time" segments from MontanaPBS. "Equal Time" allow candidates Montana's four government administrative offices: secretary of state, state auditor, attorney general and superintendent of public instruction. It's an unedited opportunity to answer a set of pertinent questions. "Ad Watch" analyzes campaign advertising.

MontanaPBS will broadcast documentary profiles of the candidates for U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives and governor. Another MontanaPBS program, "Billing Montanans," will examine how two Montana families' tax dollars are apportioned to sectors of local and state government.

The news staffs at MTPR and YPR will produce interviews and call-in programs with candidates as part of their regular news programming.

The coverage will culminate with live election-night reporting, coordinated with PBS NewsHour and NPR coverage, to bring viewers and listeners results from statewide races.

Montana Public Media's website and special reporting is supported, in part, by a grant from the Greater Montana Foundation.









Curt Moen, Watford City Planner, spoke to Watford City chamber members last week about retail opportunities and other developments in the greater Watford City area. system fell 39 percent in the last four years while the bill for MDU customers dropped 45 percent.

The rate cases filed by the utilities seek to recover the cost of infrastructure that delivers natural gas to customers, however, and not fuel costs.

MDU is seeking to recover increased investments in facilities and associated depreciation, operation and maintenance costs and taxes linked to the new investments, according to the company's filing.

As proposed by MDU, a typical residential customer's bill would increase by \$3.37 per month as part of a \$3.5 million, or 6 percent, annual increase over current rates.

MDU, which serves about 79,000 natural gas customers, last filed a gas rate case in April 2004. In that case, the Commission granted a \$125,000 increase, or less than 1 percent.

The recent applications are available online under Dockets D2012.9.100 (MDU) D2012.9.94 (NorthWestern). The Commission has taken no action on either filing.

Interested parties will have an opportunity to formally intervene in both cases and provide testimony on the reasonableness of the requests. The Montana Consumer Counsel represents ratepayers in matters before the PSC.

The commission will likely issue final orders early next summer.

In general, since all humans require sleep on a daily basis, any driver can be affected by fatigue putting them and you at risk of a crash... Learn who is at risk, what factors increase the risk, the signs of fatigue and what can be done to reduce the risk.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration conservatively estimates that 100,000 police-reported crashes are the direct result of driver fatigue each year. This results in an estimated 1,550 deaths, 71,000 injuries, and \$12.5 billion in monetary losses. These figures may be the tip of the iceberg, since currently it is difficult to attribute crashes to

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration the following groups are at higher risks:

Young people, especially males under 29

Shift workers and people with long work hours, working the night shift. The National Sleep Foundation reports it "increases your risk by nearly 6 times".

People with undiagnosed or untreated sleep disorders. Other factors that could put you at risk:

Working more than 60 hours a week "increases your risk by 40%" reported by the National Sleep Foundation.

Working more than one job and your main job involves shift work

Drinking even small amounts of alcohol

Driving alone or on a long, rural, dark or boring road Sleep-deprived or fatigued, "6 hours of sleep or less" triples your risk" reported by the National Sleep Foundation.

Driving long distances without appropriate rest breaks Driving through the night, mid-afternoon (for older adults) or when you would normally be asleep



FWP Urges Hunters To Check Fire Status **Before Heading Afield**

With many Montana counties operating under emergency fire restrictions, hunters need to know that some private landowners and Block Management Area cooperators may be reluctant to offer hunting access until weather conditions improve.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks urges hunters to check in with the nearest regional FWP office before making final plans. Meanwhile, all hunters must be prepared to prevent

"Hunters have a responsibility to be fire conscious," said Ron Aasheim, FWP spokesman in Helena. "It is a matter of human safety and it's our civic duty to be ready to protect the public and private lands we all enjoy."

Be aware that conditions remain volatile in many areas. Hunters should:

- drive only on established roads.
- avoid roads with tall vegetation in the middle track.
- never park over dry grass or other vegetation.
- carry a fire extinguisher-or water-filled weed sprayer, shovel, axe and a cell phone for communications in addition to other outdoor safety gear.
- restrict camping activities to designated camping areas.
 - not build campfires.
 - smoke only inside buildings or vehicles.

Being able to respond is essential in the first few seconds of a fire start when it is small and easily extinguished.

Tip-Mont Works 24-7 **To Stop Poachers**

Montana's outdoor crime-stopper help line, TIP-MONT, has a new online option to report poachers and other hunting-season viola-

Now alert citizens can report poaching and violations of hunting regulations by going to the FWP website at fwp.mt.gov. Click "TIP-MONT" to use the online report form.

"TIP-MONT online is best used to report observations that might help solve a violation that has already occurred," said Brian Shinn, FWP's TIP-MONT coordinator. "The TIP-MONT toll-free number-1-800-TIP-MONT or 1-800-847-6668-is the best way to report crimes that are in progress, or where immediate assistance is needed."

Shinn said that while the online service isn't a realtime TIP-MONT connection, the reports are checked several times a week. Online TIP-

MONT reports remain confidential and are managed under the same guidelines that protect all crime-stopper callers.

TIP-MONT callers most often report violations of Montana's hunting rules and regulations. Other important calls pertain to vandalism at Montana state parks and on public lands.

Here are some of the most common hunting season violations reported:

" failure to obtain permission from landowners before hunting on private prop-

" wasting any part of a game animal suitable for food.

" failure to properly validate a license or tag, or securely fasten it visibly to a game. animal immediately after it is taken and before it is moved or transported from the kill site.

" taking game from the wrong hunting district.

using someone else's tag on a harvest game animal.

" failure to leave evidence of sex attached.

Callers to 1-800-TIP-MONT, and those who file reports online, may remain anonymous and may be eligible for a cash award of up to \$1,000 if the information leads to a conviction.

New Access Opportunities For Game Bird Hunters

This time of year, it's often hard to tell who's more "birdy"-hunters or their dogs. And now, with the advent of Open Fields for Game Bird Hunters opening gates for up to 17,000 acres of walk-in game bird hunting, it's clearly a tossup.

Open Fields for Game Bird Hunters is a pilot program that targets productive game bird habitats enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program for access and habitat protection. Landowners receive payment for allowing walk-in hunting for game birds during fall seasons on tracts of up to 160 acres of CRP and, in some cases, adjacent land. Tracts are signed, so hunters can simply park and walk in with no further permission required.

For 2012, 55 tracts are enrolled in north central, northeastern and eastern Montana. Contracts extend for a minimum of five years, with many tracts enrolled for up to 10 years. Funding for this 2012 program was included in the 2008 federal Farm Bill, delivered through Farm Service Agency to Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks via a federal grant award.

FWP officials say response from landowners has been excellent, with more applying to enroll than funding could accommodate. Initial reports from hunters are similarly enthusiastic, as hunters express apprecia-

tion for new access opportunities to hunt game birds in the fall.

2012 Upland Game Bird Season Update

Most of Montana's upland game bird hunting seasons are underway, but many experienced hunters-and their trusty retrievers and pointers- are hoping for good shooting and cooler days ahead.

In most areas of Montana, Montana wing-shooters should find the state rather accommodating with fair to good game bird populations and some pockets of very good hunting potential.

Montana's upland game bird hunting seasons generally run through Jan. 1, 2013. The exception is the sage grouse season, which closes Nov. 1.

Montana's pheasant season opens Oct. 6 and runs through New Year's Day. For more information on upland game bird hunting in Montana, visit FWP's website at fwp.mt.gov, click "Hunting" then click Hunting Guide.

Here's a look at what upland game bird hunters can expect this season

Region 7-Southeastern Montana

"Last winter was among the mildest on record, so overwinter survival of upland game birds was high. Sharp-tailed grouse production was good with excellent numbers throughout the region; sage grouse should be found in fair numbers; turkey populations are good but still below long-term averages. In general, upland game birds have begun to recover from declines due to several harsh winters. Dry conditions this summer probably enhanced brood survival since young chicks easily succumb to the elements in cold, wet weather. While drought conditions and emergency haying of CRP will take a toll on fall hunting, hunters can nonetheless expect to see more upland game birds this fall compared to the past few years.

"Pheasants look to be in good supply. Overall, spring nesting conditions were favorable, thanks to plentiful moisture in spring-summer 2011, which translated abundant residual cover for nesting birds this spring.

reluctant to make access commitments until weather conditions improve. FWP urges hunters to check in with the regional FWP office before making final plans and to be prepared to prevent wildfire statewide.
