Peace Officers Memorial Ceremony, Sidney, May 14

For the past 34 years, the Montana Association of Chiefs of Police has been hosting the Peace Officer Memorial Day. Every year officers from all across Montana and Canada come to the one in Montana to honor their fallen brothers and sisters.

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed into law a joint resolution of Congress making May 15 Peace Officer Memorial Day and May 15, Police Week nationwide. The Association of Chiefs of Police in Montana has


been holding the event since 1988. They choose a different city or town every year to host the event. Usually, the city is in western Montana but this year things are going to be a little different. This year the association requested that they could host the ceremony in Sidney. Police Chief Mark Kraft said, "When we were asked to host this event I thought it would not only be an honor to do so but it would give an opportunity to showcase Sidney to people who may have never been out here before." Since May 15 falls

on a Sunday, this year it was decided that the ceremony should be held on Saturday, May 14 so that more officers could attend. Also, this year, since the Sidney Police, County Sheriffs, and local Highway Patrol have such close working relationships with many North Dakota law enforcement agencies, the partner agencies in North Dakota will be invited to attend as well.

The event will begin at 10:30 a.m. in the old Pamida/Shopko parking lot. Officers will march on foot followed by a vehicle pro-

cession to the historic Richland County Courthouse. A memorial ceremony will be held on the lawn at 11 a.m., just after the parade, where Montana Lieutenant Governor Kirsten Juras will give the keynote address.

Sidney's Chief Kraft wanted to thank the Sidney Chamber of Commerce for helping with the logistics of the parade. He also wanted to thank the Richland County Sheriff and Sidney Police Departments for helping to organize the event.

MHSA Changes Enrollment Classifications, Making Fairview Switch To Class B

After almost 24 years of being Class C, Fairview is moving up to Class B.

During a Montana High School Association (MHSA) meeting in November 2021, MHSA changed enrollment classifications for Montana sports to the following measures: Class AA, 801-plus; Class A, 301 to 800; Class B, 101 to 300; Class C, 1-100.

According to the MHSA press release, eight schools are expected to move up a classification. Bigfork will change from Class B to Class A, and Fairview, Chinook, Lone Peak, Darby, Ennis, Park City and Superior will move from Class C to Class B, and Forsyth will drop down from Class B to Class C. For football, all of these schools will remain in the 8-Man ranks

Taking effect in the 2023-2024 school year, Fairview will play in District 2B for basketball, volleyball and track and field, Class B Division 1 for golf, and will remain in the Eastern division for 8-man football.

For Fairview, the change in classification means traveling longer distances for competitions.

"Ultimately the biggest difference will be who we play and there

will be significantly more traveling. We will travel as far as Malta for our conferences, whereas before our furthest trip was 80 miles, and now our furthest trip will be 220 miles," said Fairview Superintendent of Schools Luke Kloker.

Although there will be many more miles to cover, Fairview's sports program is looking forward to the new competition.

"We have had good relationships with all of the schools around us and will miss our competitors, but we are excited to work with other schools that we have not worked with before," explained Kloker.

Fairview school's enrollment has stayed around the 120 mark for several years, the school first switched to Class C in 1998.

"We were right on the verge of switching over to Class B for a while, so we knew it was definitely a possibility." Several of Fairview's Class C

competitors had a considerably smaller enrollment than them and now they will be competing against schools with much larger enrollment.

"We will be playing against bigger schools with bigger teams, which could mean more difficult competition."

The festival was started in 1990 as a way to attempt to bring some tourism to the area and, at the same time, give local artists a chance to sell their wares. It was originally held in Veteran's Memorial Park, near the middle school but was moved to downtown to allow storefront businesses a chance at the influx of people. Rosendale **Updates Sidney** Residents

U.S. Representative Matt Rosendale (MT), stopped in Sidney last Tuesday to update the public on his current agenda for his first full year in Congress.

"Right now serving in the minority puts us in a not real productive place in Congress so we have been pushing back against a lot of the overreach of the federal government but what I have been able to do during the first year in Congress is also introduced 21 bills."

Unfortunately, you don't hear a lot about that because serving in the minority they have no obligation to even bring my bills forward, so I've introduced bills to expand healthcare, some of things I did when I was insurance commissioner. I introduced bills to reduce the cost of prescription drugs."

The Corp of Engineers is in the process of doing test flows on the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers, which can jeopardize water rights for farmers.

Rosendale quotes, "I met with the Army Corp of Engineers last week in my office in Washington, DC and unfortunately the good news about the drought is that the levels are so low there will not be any test



They gave me a lot of information about what they are going to be basing those flow tests on and I have shared all of that with commissioner Duane Mitchell so he has all of that documentation. I made sure they understood in my office that the #1 priority that if there are going to be any kind of test flows out of Fort Peck lake that they let me know well in advance when its going to happen and at what rates it's gonna happen, so I can prepare all the users that are downstream


Rosendale is up for reelection this year. He will face Democratic challenger Penning Ronning or Skylar Williams in the Nov. 8 general election.



Guest Opinion: Defending Richland Co. In The State Capital

In this primary election season, critics say we need to stop local government representatives such as the mayor of Sidney and the county commissioners from "running to Helena." Would this serve the people or neglect our interests? Let's consider a handful of examples from the last few years.

In 2001, several revenues were diverted from local governments to the state. To make up for that, state budgeting has an item for a local government share. This compensation is threatened every session. In the 2019 Legislature, an illegal, secret meeting of a legislative committee was convened without notice by legislators from western Montana to rob millions from the local government share and give it to the State Office of Public Defender to shore up the state's bankrupt mismanagement of that program. The Montana Association of Counties caught wind of the secret meeting and fielded hundreds of local government representatives who packed the meeting room to protect the local government share. Neither our legislative Representative nor our Senator spoke or even attended. Commissioner Shane Gorder and others from Richland County spoke to defend Fairview, Savage, Lambert, Sidney, and Richland County. They were successful, only because

they were there. If we "put a stop to running to Helena," we will be defenseless against legislative robberies like that. Critics must face the fact that Helena is the state capital, and many things happen there that vitally affect us here. We cannot defend ourselves by just sitting on our rears in Sidney.

The same thing happens with the oil and gas severance tax. Every legislative session, someone in the west tries to rob us of our share.

In six years of rulemaking before the Department of Environmental Quality, there were efforts to make Richland County a dumping ground for North Dakota's worst radioactive waste. North Dakota allows disposal only up to 50 picocuries, but Montana was set to allow 200. That would have made us a magnet for the hottest loads. Commissioner Gorder testified before the

Department, and all three Commissioners including Mitchell and Young worked in the legislative Environmental Quality Council to equalize Montana's level with surrounding states to defend us from dumping of the worst radioactive waste that neighboring states won't accept.

The same dynamic affects many local interests touching everything from aviation funding for the Sidney-Richland Airport

Johnson Nominated For DSU's 2022 Outstanding





Missoula Nonprofits Turn To Surplus **Bakken Homes For Affordability Solution**

As Prices Skyrocket, Groups Bring Homes Left Over From Oil Boom To Ease Housing Costs

As home prices continue to climb to record highs in Missoula, community nonprofits are turning modular homes that were once intended for workers in the Bakken oil fields into permanently affordable housing for two lifelong area residents.

Homeword and Habitat for Humanity of Missoula are working together to help two East Missoulians attain homeownership using money from Missoula's new Affordable Housing Trust Fund and a long-term lease that ensures permanent affordability.

The modular homes will be available for two residents — a retired house painter and a working diesel mechanic — to purchase at a fifth of the cost of Missoula's median home price. said Heather Harp, Habitat for Humanity of Missoula executive director.

The project comes as home prices in Missoula continue to rise. The median home price in Missoula County has climbed to a new high of \$510,000, according to a report released recently by the Missoula Organization of Realtors.

"This is a beautiful partnership because you've got two nonprofits that are working on an innovative solution," said Andrea Davis, Homeword executive direc-

tor. "Is it only two homes? Yes, but every household that gets impacted is a win. And this is a model that can be used by other people and inspire other land sellers."

The homes will be placed on permanent foundations on land in East Missoula that a family sold at a discounted price to Habitat for Humanity. Homeword bought the modular homes from a surplus that was intended for workers in the once-booming Bakken oil fields of western North Dakota and northeastern Montana.

Habitat will use \$190,000 from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund that the Missoula City Council unanimously approved spending to purchase the structures from Homeword and pay for costs associated with moving and repairing the homes.

After placing the homes on foundations and making any necessary repairs, Habitat will sell the homes to the new owners and hand over land stewardship to Trust Montana, a statewide community trust working to increase affordable properties for Montanans. Homeword will also help prepare the prospective homeowners by providing them with financial education.

Harp said the homes will be available for purchase by the prospective homeown-

ers who make under 80% of the area median income. The area median income (AMI) is the midpoint of an area's income distribution, meaning half of the families in the area earn more than the median and half of the families earn less. Harp also said the mortgages for the homes will not exceed 30% of each household's income.

A Model For Success

The project is based on a model that has proven successful in the past. Several vears ago. Homeword purchased 10 modular homes that originally were meant for oil workers and placed six of those homes on permanent foundations in what was called the Montana Street Homes project.

The six homes were sold to households earning 80% or less of the area median income, which was about \$36,900 or less for one person or \$56,300 or less for a family of four in 2018, according to the American Community Survey. The 450-square-foot, one-bedroom home sold for \$98,000 and the 550-square-foot two-bedrooms sold for \$120,000. The land under the homes is permanently owned by Trust Montana, and the home buyers lease it via renewable and inheritable 75-year agreements, according to Homeword's website.

Homeword is no longer

affiliated with the project because the land was transferred to Trust Montana after Homeword developed the properties. But Davis said that, to her understanding, all of the original homeowners from 2018 have remained.

The model of homeownership using a community land trust ensures longterm affordability for current and future homeowners and helps them build equity, Davis said.

But Davis also noted that community land trusts are only one tool for helping create affordable housing for Missoulians and said that many other changes, such as more development and changes to zoning that allow for more town home development, are needed.

For their part, community land trusts are an effective way for Habitat for

Humanity and its affiliates across the country to house more families. Harp said. The nonprofit will be able to place both the homes on the same lot because Missoula County's zoning regulations allow developers to increase density for the purpose of permanent affordability.

The use of modular homes will allow Habitat for Humanity to house the two residents in East Missoula in a quarter of the construction time it typically takes the organization to complete a project.

"Habitat is trying to pivot so that we can increase our production above and beyond two homes per year," Harp said. "In order to do that, it requires us to be innovative so we're looking at our construction methods."

In addition to conventionally built homes, Harp said Habitat for Humanity plans to pursue more modular homes.

Apart from the quick construction timeline, the use of modular homes also helps address a lack of homes for people who live alone.


According to AARP, the percentage of nuclear family households, or households that consist of two parents and one or more children, has been on a steady decline over the past 50 years while the percentage of single-person households has been on the rise. But the housing market hasn't kept up with the shift.

"With this particular project, we got to do something we've never done before," Harp said. "We got to focus on the single people, and this is the first time in our history that we've been able to do that and it's in large part because these were already designed to be one bedrooms."

Davis said Homeword still has two modular homes that the organization is looking to place on land, and added that it would like to hear from anyone who might be interested in donating or selling land at a discount to nonprofits.

Harp also said Habitat for Humanity of Missoula will be holding a town hall meeting to educate the public about community land trusts on May 25.

"We need to inform and educate people about the work we do, and we also need to inspire people to be the change we need to see happen," Harp said. "Just like (those) who donated the lots to us a few years ago, we hope to inspire others to do the same."

43rd Annual Custer County ND Paddlefish Snagging Season **Closed To Additional Harvest**

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department announced May 9 that the state's 2022 paddlefish snagging season is closed to any additional harvest to provide long-term protection of the paddlefish population.

An additional seven-day snag-andrelease season will begin Monday, May 9 and run through Sunday, May 15. Paddlefish snaggers with an unused paddlefish tag can continue snagging during the additional snag-and-release season but must release all fish immediately. If a snagger has already used their tag on a harvested paddlefish, they are not allowed to participate in the additional snag-and-release period.

Snag-and-release will be open only in that area of the Missouri River starting on the north shore from the Confluence boat ramp then east (downstream) to the pipeline crossing (river mile 1577), and on the south shore from the Confluence with the Yellowstone River then east (downstream) to the pipeline crossing (River mile 1577).

Paddlefish snagging is allowed only from 7 a.m. - 9 p.m. CT during each day of the additional seven-day season. The use or possession of a gaff on snag-andrelease days is illegal.







Two Candidates Running For Richland County Attorney

In seven weeks Richland County voters will be able to vote for a new County Attorney. The term of the current County Attorney, Janet Christofferson, expires on Dec. 31 of this year. Two candidates are running for the position. Charity McLarty and Layne Johnson are both seeking their first term.

According to the Richland County website, www. richland.org, the County Attorney is to represent Richland County and the State of Montana in criminal, county's civil cases, and all the rest of the county's legal business but they do not just serve in the courtrooms. They also advise the Board of County Commissioners, other county offices, departments, and subdivisions. Because they represent the county they do not represent individuals. They can also represent the city of Sidney and the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services for child welfare cases.

While Charity McLarty is running for her first term she is no stranger to the courtroom. A graduate of the University of Arkansas-Little Rock William H. Bowen School of Law, McLarty has been practicing law in Glendive and Sidney for the past 11 years. She was a public defender in Glendive for 1 1/2 years, a defense attorney in Sidney, co-owned her own law office, and for the last four years has been Richland County Deputy County Attorney. She has worked with the victims of domestic violence, sex crimes, and many more atrocities. She said, "My experience as a civil attorney, a defense attorney, as well as a deputy county attorney, is vital to do this job well. While I recognize the expense to

Layne Johnson is running for his first term as County Attorney, as well. He earned his law degree at the University of Montana School of Law and started working as a Deputy County Attorney for Richland County. Johnson was born and raised in eastern Montana. He has spent his summers working on his family's farm and ranch and also worked for the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation while attending law school. While John-

son believes his experience handling different types of legal proceedings would be beneficial if he is elected, he said "My ability to work with the various involved parties is just as critical as my experience. Both candidates are running as Republicans. The winner of the primary will run unopposed in the Nov. 8 general election.
