

'E-rase your E-waste' Fall Collection is Sept 5-6

Over the past 10 years the "E-rase your E-waste" program has collected more than 164 TONS of outdated electronics for recycling, preserving space in the local landfill as well as protecting the environment and human health through the proper disposal of hazardous materials contained in those electronics. Organizers are hoping to push that total over 175 tons during their

Later that evening, the Fireman's Competition will have Alexander's Fire Department squaring off with firemen from Arnegard, ND in a series of challenges that are sure to be fun for the participants and onlookers alike. Live music provided by White Water Willie will be in front of the fire hall to close out the day.

Saturday will be a full day of activities and events starting with a parade at 11:00am. Everyone is invited to the Barbeque in the Park followed by an honorary program recognizing the local EMS and Fire Department.

The afternoon has something to offer all ages; Alexander teachers and students will be manning the kid's carnival which includes bounce houses and games and there will be bingo in the park with opportunity to simply visit with friends and neighbors.

This is the second year that vendors and crafters have been part of the festivities, incorporated to ensure that people were kept interested and involved throughout the day. A variety of clothing and artwork will be available as well as Clever Container, Mary Kay, Vemma all-natural energy drink, Hello Tutu, food vending and a booth providing school board information. There are no vendor fees and anyone interested in setting up can contact Brittni Virden at City Hall for more information, 701-828-3461. Set up will begin at 10:00am Saturday on the north side of the park and participants are invited to stay as long as they like.

The Lewis and Clark Trail Museum will be open to the public giving an insight to the lifestyle had by the first settlers in the area. The 1914 school house, which is now home to the museum, will be open from 9:00am-6:00pm Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Hiway Lounge Horseshoe Tournament will showcase the new horseshoe pits at the park with registration at 1:30pm and the celebration will wrap up with a street dance beginning at 9:00pm.

Buttons dedicated to this year's honorees are available prior to the festivities and throughout the three day event. They can be purchased at the Hiway Lounge or Alexander City Hall for \$2.00 each.

Old Settler's Day Celebration not only proves to be a lot of fun for local residents, but also draws many people who grew up in the area and have moved away, making it a great time reconnect and celebrate a time-honored tradition.

"We'd love to celebrate our 10th year by topping the 175-ton mark," E-rase your E-waste Committee Chair Jackie Couture said. "That's only another 11 tons which is definitely doable. We've had annual totals ranging from 20 tons to 27.5 tons of e-waste for five of the past six years."

This year's fall collection event will once again be held at the Richland County Shop at 2140 W. Holly in Sidney, next to the Fairgrounds. Signs will be posted. Now's the time to clear those closets as this is the final collection event for 2014, according to Couture. Times are 3-7 pm Friday, Sept. 5, and 9am-3 pm Saturday, Sept. 6. Please note, the county shop is available for drop offs during event times ONLY, when employees with Yellowstone E-waste Solutions of Billings, our e-cycler, and local volunteers will be available to help with loading and unloading.

Yellowstone E-waste Solutions is providing e-cycling services for FREE, with two small exceptions. Participants wanting their hard drives removed from their computers will need to pay a small fee of \$5 for removal. In addition, those needing documentation certifying that their hard drive has been destroyed will also be charged a \$5 fee.

Note, too, that anyone in the MonDak region, or even outside it, is welcome to bring their electronic items to the Sidney event during the scheduled hours. You do not need to be a Richland County resident to participate.

What Can I Bring?

For those new to the event, nearly all electronic devices are accepted, Couture said, including computers and their components (printers, scanners, keyboards, etc.), cell phones, cameras, TVs, VCRs, cable TV boxes, fax machines, copiers, stereos, game boys and even specialized electronic equipment used in businesses such as hospitals, law enforcement and manufacturing and even the oil fields.

However, NO consumer white goods, light bulbs, CFLs, mercury thermometers, alkaline batteries, or items containing refrigerants (including dehumidifiers), oils, or acids will be accepted. If you are unsure whether your item qualifies you can check out the handy "What to Bring ... " handout posted on the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab's e-waste website at www.ars.usda.gov/npa/nparl/ewaste or call Jackie Couture at 406-433-9422. In addition, a handy "Items List" recycling form is also available at the website to further speed processing time for participants bringing both large and small amounts.

Local businesses, agencies and organizations with large amounts to e-cycle are asked to make an appointment to drop

> off their items by calling Jackie Couture at 406-433-9422. Please leave a message.

> Where possible larger recyclers are also encouraged to palletize their own items, or send extra staff to help get it done. Details on acceptable items and how to palletize them can be found in the "What to Bring ... " handout posted to the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab's e-waste website noted above.

> The "E-rase your E-waste" effort in Sidney is coordinated by members of the Richland County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), Richland Opportunities Inc., and volunteers with other community organizations including the RSVP program. The Montana Department of Environmental Quality has also committed funds for advertising the 2014 event and the Richland County Public Works Department makes their facilities available for the collection event in Sidney.

Beginning September 2nd, the Richland County Family Resource Center will offer a 15-week session of the Nurturing Parenting Program. Classes are free and will be held from 5:30 to approximately 7:30 at the Sidney-Richland County Library. Parents are encouraged to bring their children, as a family-style dinner and childcare will be provided at each session. Classes will run every Tuesday until December 16th. The class is a great time for kids and families, and offers a night off from cooking and cleaning!

The goal of the Nurturing

Parenting program is to provide parents with additional tools and techniques that help provide a healthier home environment for the family. Every week each class begins with a family meal which is generously provided by a member or group in the community. Following dinner time parents and children participate in an interactive song and activity that helps transition the children to a separate classroom from their parents.

Examples of topics include: Family morals, values and rules, empathy, behavior encouragement, discipline, child development, parental expectations, empowering ourselves and our children,

derstanding feelings, nurturing parenting routines, problem-solving, and positive selftalk. Children learn the same topics as the adults, through playtime interaction and educational games. Lesson take approximately one hour, and at the end of each session the families are brought together for a family activity, such as games, crafts, or story time. All classes are taught by trained facilitators.



Deer Archery Season Opens Aug. 29

North Dakota's deer archery season opens Friday, Aug. 29 at noon, and bowhunters are reminded that deer bow licenses and accompanying tags are only available through electronic purchase

Bowhunters can buy a license online at the State Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov; by calling 800-406-6409; or at license vendors in counties that are linked to the Game and Fish Department's online licensing system. Hunters who purchase bow licenses online should allow for several days to receive their tag in the mail.

Bowhunters must follow all regulations of the managing agency when using tree stands on public hunting areas, including displaying the owner's name, address and telephone number on tree stands left unattended on Game and Fish wildlife management areas.

In addition, hunting big game over bait is prohibited on both public and private land in deer unit 3C west of the Missouri River, and all of units 3E1, 3E2, 3F1 and 3F2.

The archery season is open through Jan. 4, 2015. Hunters should refer to the 2014 deer hunting guide for season information and regulations.

In her kevnote presentation, Pierce takes a hilarious look at the Twister game of life. Audience members will


learn practical tools for untwisting themselves, gaining new perspective and finding greater peace.

Department of Revenue Creates Citizen Concern Form

In order to provide a process for citizens to register concerns within their communities, the Montana Department of Revenue has created a Citizen Concern Form. This form is used when a citizen has concerns over a potential liquor law violation related to over-service to an intoxicated person, sale to an underage person, disorderly licensed premises, sales/ service/consumption on a licensed premises between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., or any other worries.

On these forms, the person reporting will be required

address of the establishment, the city, and if possible, the name of the individual of concern, whether it be a bartender, server or seller, owner or bouncer.

When filling out the form, the concerned citizen will also be asked to give a detailed description of the violating events, including dates, times. names, activity of concern, frequency of offending events and any other relevant information. They will also be asked to fill in their name, email address, phone number, and mailing address. The option to report anonymously is available, but it can negatively impact the ability to effectively to fill in the name of the li- investigate and address your censed establishment, the concern and could result in no

action regarding your concern. Lastly, the reporting citizen will be asked if they are a customer of the licensed establishment, connected to the alcohol industry in any way, or are a concerned community member.

2014 North Dakota **Waterfowl Regulations Set**

North Dakota's 2014 waterfowl season has been set, with noteworthy changes including a daily bag of one canvasback during the season, and an additional two blue-winged teal during the first 16 days of the season.

Opening day for North Dakota residents is Sept. 27 for ducks, geese, coots and mergansers. Nonresidents may begin hunting waterfowl in North Dakota Oct. 4. The season for swans opens Oct. 4 for both residents and nonresidents.

Hunters may take six ducks per day with the following restrictions: five mallards of which two may be hens, three wood ducks, three scaup, two redheads, two pintails and one canvasback. An additional two blue-winged teal can be taken from Sept. 27 through Oct. 12. The daily limit of five mergansers may include no more than two hooded mergansers. For ducks and mergansers, the possession limit is three times the daily limit.

The hunting season for Canada geese in the Missouri River zone will close Jan. 2, 2015, while the remainder of the state will close Dec. 25. The season for whitefronts closes Dec. 7, while the season on light geese is open through Jan. 4, 2015. Shooting hours for all geese are one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m. each day through Nov. 1. Beginning Nov. 2, shooting hours are extended until 2 p.m. each day.

Extended shooting hours for all geese are permitted from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset on Saturdays and Wednesdays through Nov. 26, and on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays from Nov. 29 through the end of each season.

The bag limit for Canada geese during the regular season is eight daily and 24 in possession, except in the Missouri River zone where the limit is five daily and 15 in possession.

The daily limit on whitefronts is two with six in possession, and light goose is 50 daily, with no possession limit.

The special youth waterfowl hunting season is Sept. 20-21. Legally licensed residents and nonresidents 15 years of age or younger can hunt ducks, coots, mergansers and geese statewide. Youth hunters must have a general game and habitat license and a fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. A licensed adult of at least 18 years of age must accompany the youth hunter into the field.

Nonresidents have the option of buying either a statewide waterfowl license or one with zone restrictions. Nonresidents who designate zones 1 or 2 may hunt that zone for only one seven-day period during the season. Nonresident hunters who chose to hunt in zone 1 or 2 and wish to use the full 14 consecutive days allowed, must use the other seven days in zone 3. Hunters in zone 3 can bunt that zone the entire 14 days

Summer Safety on the Water

The single most important reminder the North Dakota Game and Fish Department will issue to recreationists this summer is to be alert and safe near water.

Boat and water safety coordinator Nancy Boldt said safety on the water begins with wearing a personal flotation device.

"Failure to wear a personal floatation device is the main reason people lose their lives in water recreation accidents," Boldt said.

North Dakota law requires all children ages 10 and younger to wear a personal flotation device while in boats of less than 27 feet in length. The law also requires all personal watercraft users to wear a life jacket, as well as anyone towed on skis, tubes, boards or other similar devices.

Water users should make sure to wear life jackets that are the appropriate size, and in good condition. It is also important that children wear a PFD while swimming.

Water skiers and tubers should wear a life jacket with four nylon straps rather than one with a zipper, because straps are stronger than zippers upon impact with water. Anglers or persons paddling a canoe should opt for a PFD that is comfortable enough to wear for an entire outing.

Water skiers and tubers are reminded it takes three to ski and tube. When a person is towed on water skis or a similar device, an observer other than the operator is required on the vessel.


"In addition, it is important for swimmers to know water depth, as serious injuries can occur from diving into water," Boldt said. "Large objects hidden below the water's surface can lead to significant injury."

North Dakota boaters also are reminded that marine VHF radios are an important part of boat safety that should not be improperly used by operators. These radios are intended for boat operators who are in distress and facing an emergency situation.

Regulations to help ensure safe boating this summer are found in the 2014-16 North Dakota Fishing Guide. A more comprehensive listing is available in the North Dakota Boat and Water Safety Guide or the Boat North Dakota education book. These guides are available online at the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, by email at ndgf@nd.gov, or at a local Game and Fish Department office.

In accordance with state law, nonresidents are not allowed to hunt on North Dakota Game and Fish Department wildlife management areas or conservation PLOTS (Private Land Open To Sportsmen) areas from Oct. 11-17.

All migratory bird hunters, including waterfowl, must register with the Harvest Information Program prior to hunting. Hunters purchasing a license from the Game and Fish Department can easily get a HIP number. Otherwise, hunters must call 888-634-4798, or log on to the Game and Fish website at gf.nd.gov, provide the registration information, and record the HIP number on their fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. Those who HIP registered to hunt this spring's light goose season or early fall Canada goose season do not have to register again, as it is required only once per year.

Hunters should refer to the 2014 North Dakota Waterfowl Hunting Guide for further details on the waterfowl season. Paper copies will be at license vendors in early September.

MSU Finishes Another Strong Year in Research

Montana State University closed out another strong year of research successes with significant work in energy, agriculture, health and biomedicine, and the environment leading the way.

The university's overall research enterprise did \$109.6 million in work for the fiscal year ending June 30. That includes \$90.5 million in competitively won federal funds, as well as \$1.6 million in gift

funds for research. It also includes \$15 million in state and \$2.6 million in federal funding both largely for agricultural research through the Montana Agricultural Experiment Station.

"MSU's research enterprise has great breadth, but also great depth, and that's illustrated by the many successes and advancements of our faculty in the last year," said Renee Reijo Pera, MSU's vice president for research and

economic development.

For students, MSU's research enterprise pumped \$9.2 million into teaching and research assistantships, scholarships, and other student support – making it one of the largest sources of student support on campus.

"MSU's research enterprise gives our students the opportunity to work side-byside with the faculty who are working on the cutting edge in their fields – it's research and teaching as one," Reijo Pera said. "This is vital preparation for our future engineers, scientists, teachers, scholars and entrepreneurs."

Those research opportunities translated into notable student successes in the past year: MSU undergraduates won three Goldwater Scholarships in 2014, the nation's premier scholarship for undergraduates studying math, science and engineering. MSU is among the top universities in the nation for total number of Goldwater winners. Six graduate students won prestigious National Science Foundation fellowships, which can award more than \$100,000.

In agricultural research, highlights included MSU's development of a new variety of wheat resistant to the orange wheat blossom midge, a destructive pest that can ruin up to 90 percent of a wheat harvest. Research has also continued research on the wheat stem sawfly, which can cause millions of dollars of losses to Montana wheat producers. MSU received a \$500,000 USDA grant to screen 4,000 to 5,000 varieties of wheat for sawfly-resistant traits, then identify the genes associated with those traits.

"Agriculture is our largest industry in Montana, and MSU is proud to provide research that is improving the bottom line for producers in many areas, from new crop varieties, to livestock forage, to pests, plant diseases, fertilization, and even threats to honeybees, which pollinate billions of dollars of crops across the nation," Reijo Pera said.

Internationally, MSU researcher David Sands received a \$100,000 Grand Challenges Exploration grant from the Gates Foundation – the first at MSU – for his promising work on fighting a parasitic weed called Striga that chokes out 30 to 80 percent of corn, millet and sorghum crops used for food in Africa. If successful, Sands' biological control method could greatly improve nutrition on the continent.

Just six months later, MSU learned Seth Walk and Blake Wiedenheft from the Department of Microbiology and Immunology also won a Grand Challenges Exploration grant for their work in the field of biomedicine. The pair are looking at disease-causing microbes in the human gut.

"These are extremely competitive and extremely prestigious grants," Reijo Pera

said. "To have two within such a short period of time speaks volumes about the quality of faculty we have at MSU."

In addition to Walk and Wiedenheft's work, MSU's work in biomedicine was also recognized when Josh Obar, also in Microbiology and Immunology, became one of only five scientists in the world to receive the Young Investigator Award from the American Society for Microbiology for his work on the secrets behind out-of-control immune systems, flu pandemics and other biomedical issues.

In energy, MSU became the lead on a new \$10 million, four-year project focused on innovative energy research. The Biological Electron Transfer and Catalysis Energy Frontiers Research Center (EFRC) involves seven institutions and will look at fundamental biology and chemistry that could improve biofuel production.

A major effort to study how to safely store carbon dioxide deep underground took a big step forward this spring when MSU researchers successfully drilled a pair of wells in northern Montana. The wells will offer a first test of the scientific principles behind the Kevin Dome Large Scale Carbon Storage Project, which is funded through an eight-year \$67 million award from the U.S. Department of Energy. The goal of the project is to demonstrate that CO2 can be stored safely and viably in regional geologic formations.

Also in energy, a fourstate team involving MSU received nearly \$10 million to investigate the challenges of turning beetle-killed trees into biofuel. Led by Colorado State University, the academic, industry and government consortium will study the major challenges that limit the use of beetle-killed trees in the Rockies as biofuel.

In the area of the environment, MSU and the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks are collaborating on a \$1.2 million, six-year project to enhance bighorn sheep conservation and management in Montana.

MSU faculty member Ben Poulter's paper in Nature on the role dry lands play in the global carbon cycle – a role larger than had been previously thought – received significant attention nationally and internationally.

MSU's Western Transportation Institute continued to be one of the world's leaders in road ecology, publishing findings on the value of wildlife crossing structures for maintaining the genetic diversity of black and grizzly bears.

"Our faculty published findings in many of the major journals such as the Journal of the American Chemical Society, the Journal of Applied Ecology, the American Journal of Public Health, and the Journal of Animal Science as well as in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, Cell, Nature, and Science," Reijo Pera said. "Our faculty were tremendous this past year in terms of the quality and quantity of their work, and the coming year looks even more exciting.'

Just Add Water:

Irrigation Powers a \$22 Million Economy on the Tongue River

What does irrigation do for Montana's agricultural economy? Take a trip down the Tongue River Valley, where you'll find about 25,000 irrigated acres along its 190-mile length.

With 130 frost-free days per year, high quality soils, and a climate that features hot days and warm nights, growing conditions are nearly identical to California's San Joaquin Valley. Apples, pears, melons, squash-just about any crop grown in the Golden State can be grown here. There's a vineyard in Miles City.

"We have an image problem," says John Hamilton, whose thriving new orchard includes 25 varieties of apples. "People think of eastern Montana as a wasteland. They don't realize what we have down here."

It all starts with the DNRC-owned Tongue River Reservoir, which stores 56,000 acre-feet of water. A major upgrade of the dam was completed in 1999. The work included adding four feet to the height of the structure, which added 20,000 acre-feet of water storage.

The Tongue River Water Users Association has a contract with DNRC for 40,000 acre-feet of stored water for irrigation. Art Haves Jr., President of the Water Users Association, savs reservoir operations are managed by a committee that includes himself, DNRC, a representative from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, a member of the Northern Cheyenne Indian tribe, and one at-large member.

Art's great-grandfather came to the Tongue River Valley in 1884, and two years later was among the first settlers to bring cattle into the region. He also made one of the earliest water right claims.

"He realized nobody was going to survive here without irrigation," says Art. "Our family has quite a few of the early water rights."

Today Hayes' Brown Cattle Company operates on 10,000 acres, 500 of which produce irrigated alfalfa hay. A portion of the crop feeds his cows and the remainder is sold. A typical dryland alfalfa yield is 1-2 tons per acre; irrigated, the yield rises to 7-10 tons.

In 2013, agriculture in the Tongue River Valley was analyzed by Montana State University's Agricultural Marketing Policy Center.

"Agriculture in the valley produces \$22 million in revenue each year," says Hayes, "and 40 percent of that production comes from irrigated land, even though it's one-sixth of the total acreage.

Alfalfa hay is the most prevalent crop, accounting for \$5.5 to 7 million of the valley's annual gross revenues. Les Hirsch takes this abundant local resource and turns it into a value-added product-feed pellets for livestock.

He got interested in making pelletized alfalfa 14 years ago. "I knew that if we could find a way to put it into pellets, we could add value and not be so dependent on the sale of a round bale."


Hirsch grows about 1,200-1,500 tons of alfalfa each year on 320 irrigated acres. He purchases additional alfalfa from local farms and ranches, along with dried shelled peas; the peas, rich in protein, are combined with alfalfa to make the pellets. Each year, he purchases about 50,000 bushels of peas within a 60mile radius of his farm. "It's great for the local economy," he says.

Tri State Alfalfa Cubes sells pelletized feed across northern Wyoming and the northern tier of Montana. "It's turned into a product that fits the marketplace," says Hirsch. "Our family business has grown into sales of 7,000 tons per year."



"My mother remembers before the dam came in, without any storage there were several years that producers ran out of irrigation water," he says. "Around here we'd probably get one cutting of alfalfa without irrigation. With it, we get three.

Hirsch's business has led to further economic development in the area.

"We buy 12 semi-loads of binder to make our pellets," he says. "We buy a lot of diesel fuel to run our production facility. In any given year we've got 425 semi loads of ingredients coming in or going out."

A local trucking business has sprung up. Hirsch also needed to purchase customized trailers and trucks, and there are 2 or 3 families in the area providing these services.

"A dollar turns over about seven times here," he says.

John Hamilton is a local innovator. "This area grows just about anything you can grow in California," he says. To prove it, Hamilton in 2007 designed an orchard with 105 fruit trees. He's growing plums, pears, apples, cherries, peaches.

"I'm growing about 25 different varieties of apples-early, mid and late season varieties," says Hamilton. "This year it was phenomenal. Some of the Honeycrisp apples weighed half a pound each. This was my first year of full production."

Hamilton is known in Miles City as The Watermelon Man. "A lot of people out here have never tasted vine-ripened fruit," he says. "There's no comparison to a watermelon you buy at the supermarket. Those are picked green and they ripen during transport. Mine are picked ripe and sold fresh off the truck."

He also raises squash, cantaloupe, and pumpkins. He's a fixture at the Miles City Farmer's Market.

All of Hamilton's crops are grown with irrigation water.

"You can get by without irrigation for one in twenty years," he says. "The other 19 years you'll get nothing. We can regulate the flow to where we get irrigation water all summer. It's a tremendous system we have."

On his Cedar Hills Ranch, Hamilton also raises cattle and grows spring wheat, barley and alfalfa.

"Wonderful soils, wonderful grass, wonderful water," Hamilton says. "We have some incredibly valuable natural resources in this vallev.

All three water users are determined to keep things that way. They say energy development in the Tongue River watershed impacts water quality and threatens the valley's vibrant economy. Water discharged from coalbed methane drilling contains elevated sodium levels. Hamilton says it doesn't take much to disrupt soil productivity.

"A lot of these crops are sensitive to salt. We've always had high quality water in the Tongue River until energy development. With naturally occurring salts in the ecosystem, you start adding a little more and you can tip the balance."

Hayes says the balance has already been tipped toward higher levels of salinity. "We're at the point now where we need a strong flushing flow each spring to mitigate it."

Each of DNRC's 21 water projects supports an agricultural economy. Irrigation water generates direct economic benefits by directly increasing the supply and / or value of some crops, and in the process generating jobs and income. And like the Tongue River Valley, most all irrigation-driven economies produce a ripple or multiplier effect, making the overall impact larger: farmers and ranchers spend a portion of their income on goods



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

North Dakota Swan Hunt Lottery Held, Licenses Remain

North Dakota's swan lottery has been held and more than 300 licenses remain. Only hunters who do not have a swan license for the 2014 season can apply, as regulations limit hunters to one license per year.

Beginning Sept. 3, all remaining licenses will be issued on a first-come, firstserved basis. Resident and nonresident hunters will be able to apply online, or print out an application to mail, at the State Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd. gov. Hunters may also request an application by calling the department's Bismarck office at 701- 328-6300. The license fee is \$10 for residents and \$30 for nonresidents. The statewide tundra swan hunting season is Oct. 4 - Jan, 4, 2015.

Dove Season Opens Sept. 1

North Dakota's dove season opens statewide Sept. 1, and hunters are reminded to register with the Harvest Information Program prior to hunting.

The daily limit is 15 and possession limit is 45. Shooting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. The season is open through Nov. 9.

All dove hunters must possess a fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate and a general game and habitat license, regardless of age. In addition, hunters ages 16 and older need a small game license. Hunters who purchase a hunting license through the State Game and Fish Department's electronic licensing system (gf.nd.gov) or instant licensing telephone number at 800-406-6409 can easily get HIP certified.

Otherwise, hunters can access the department's website, or call 888-634-4798 and record the HIP number on their fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate.

Those who registered to hunt the spring light goose season in North Dakota do not have to register with HIP again, as it is required only once per year. However, hunters must HIP register in each state for which they are licensed before hunting migratory game birds.

Labor Day Enforcement Crackdown Adds Patrols to Target DUIs

One of the deadliest crimes committed in Montana may also be the most preventable. In Big Sky Country, the number of fatal crashes involving impaired drivers using alcohol and/ or drugs continues to be nearly the highest in the nation. In an effort to eliminate this trend of high-risk behavior, law enforcement agencies across the state are participating in a national crackdown targeting DUI offenders.

The Montana Highway Patrol as well as city and county law enforcement agencies throughout the state are always on the lookout for drivers who show signs of impairment. During the weeks prior to Labor Day, August 13 through September 1, law enforcement officers statewide will intensify efforts to target drivers who appear to be impaired.

"Our experience tells us that we are very likely to see an increase in high-risk behavior from motorists during Labor Day weekend," said MHP District 1 Commander, Captain Jim Kitchin. "Instead of enjoying the last summer holiday before the weather changes, individuals who choose to drive while under the influence of drugs and alcohol may be spending their time elsewhere—in jail or the morgue."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), more than 10,000 people die annually from injuries received during impaired driving crashes—that's one every 51 minutes. Motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death for people under the age of 35 with a staggering economic impact of more than \$230 billion annually.

"If you plan on drinking during Labor Day weekend, be sure to designate a sober driver," said Kitchin. "With the additional officers out in force patrolling our roadways, chances are that if you choose to drink and drive, you will be caught and you will be prosecuted."

High-visibility enforcement is one of the overall strategies employed in Montana's Vision Zero, a multipronged initiative with the goal of eliminating deaths and injuries on Montana roads. Law enforcement patrols participating in extra patrols are funded by the Montana Department of Transportation. For more information, visit plan2live.mt.gov or #VisionZeroMT.

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

Information relative to the proposed addition to East Fairview Elementary School and to the issuance of school building bonds for Yellowstone School District No. 14 was heard and discussed during an August 15 informational meeting conducted at the East Fairview School.

Dale Danielson, chairman of the Board of Trustees for the school district, conducted the meeting which was attended by school trustees Dennis Erickson, Jim Ketterling, and Lyle Sponheim and district clerk Jeannette Cayko. Also attending were Principal Richard Nordberg, attorney H. F. "Sparky" Gierke III, and Don Jiran, architect for the proposed addition.

Jiran, who manages his own architectural firm in Bismarck, described the proposed addition as a 9773 square foot addition to the west wing of the existing building. The addition would house a 5808 square foot Junior High size gymnasium (to seat 150) with men and women's locker rooms and showers taking in an additional 1120 square feet. Space for a P.E. instructor, storage and toilet facilities are also included. In addition, two classrooms totaling 1612 square feet plus toilet facilities and a mechanical area totaling 1233 square feet are part of the proposed addition.

Jiran also outlined approximate costs for each section of the proposed addition. According to Gierke, the total project is estimated at \$485,120.



With hunting season right around the corner, it's time to dust off your shotguns and head out to the Sidney Trap Club. Open every Tuesday from 6:30PM to 8:30PM, there's no better way to practice for the upcoming pheasant and grouse this fall. The Trap Club is located just two miles north of Sidney on HWY 16 across from REA.

Jim and Leanne Pelvit, who volunteer their time at the Club, encourage anyone to come out and give it a try. "We are open from May through September, but often stay open well into October if the weather suits. Bring your family. It's five dollars for a round of 25, however, Pheasants Forever donate and pay for kids under the age of 16 to shoot. They have to be accompanied by a parent of course, but all you need to bring is your gun and your ammunition."

The usual play is standard trap which consists of five stations with each person shooting five rounds at that station and rotating to the next until you have completed your round of 25. There is a small bunker built into the ground which houses the automatic thrower. Once you yell "pull", Jim will push the button and a bright orange clay pigeon will fly out in a random direction. This is helpful since it is simulating live fowl and their flight patterns. While Jim is working the thrower Leanne and her eagle eyes keep track of all the hit and misses. "We also do elimination rounds and occasionally a grouse walk. It keeps things interesting and fun."

You do not need to be a member of the Sidney Trap Club and although they are only open on Tuesdays, they will open for private groups. Maybe there's a reunion happening, or an employer who wants to take the crew out for some fun, you can contact Leanne at 480-5594.

Conversely, Game and Fish may have added new tracts to the program after the guide went to press.

To minimize possible confusion, Game and Fish will update PLOTS map sheets weekly on its website.

The PLOTS Guide features maps highlighting these walk-in areas, identified in the field by inverted triangular yellow signs, as well as other public lands.

The guides are free, and will be available at county auditor offices and license vendors in the state; by walk-in at the Game and Fish Department's Bismarck office; and at district offices in Riverdale, Harvey (Lonetree), Williston, Dickinson, Jamestown and Devils Lake.

The guides are not available to mail, so hunters will have to pick one up at a local vendor, or print individual maps from the website.

The Private Land/Public Wildlife Council is seeking comment through Sept.12 on draft recommendations regarding access to public and private land and on improving relationships among those who enjoy, participate and make hunting possible in Montana.

Council members worked over the past eight months to develop draft recommendations to help achieve a number of goals, including: (1) maximizing access to public lands; (2) improving communications and relationships among outfitters, landowners, hunters, and Montana Fish, Wildlife, & Parks; (3) increasing public access to private property and outfitted lands; (4) improving hunter compliance with laws; and (5) recognizing good behavior.

Recommendations focus on developing better information about which public lands have legal public access; landowner elk-permit incentives to allow public elk hunting; revisions to a

Hunters' Most Common Hunting Violations

Every hunting season some individuals unwittingly or knowingly violate the state's game laws.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks officials urge hunters to review Montana's hunting rules and regulations to ensure they act within the law and that they recognize when others violate the hunting regulations and related laws.

Any violation afield can be reported to TIP-MONT at 1-800-TIP-MONT, that is 1-800-847-6668 or Report a Violation online on the Enforcement web page.

Here are some of the most common game violations:

- Failure to obtain permission from landowners before hunting on private property.

- Wasting part of a game animal suitable for food.

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Failure to properly validate a license/tag or to s ecurely fasten the tag in a visible manner to a game animal immediately after it is taken and before it is moved or transported from the kill site.

- Taking game from the wrong hunting district.

- Using someone else's tag on a game animal you killed, or tagging a game animal that someone else killed.

- Shooting game animals on or from any public highway or public right-of-way.

- Taking game without a license or the proper permit.
- Failure to validate a big game tag.

- Not leaving evidence of the sex or species of the game animal attached.

FWP encourages hunters to protect the future of their sport by hunting responsibly and reporting hunting violations to the toll-free 1-800-TIP-MONT (1-800-847-6668) number or report a violation online at fwp.mt.gov, then click "Enforcement".
