## 'E-rase your E-waste' Fall Collection is Sept 5-6

Submitted by Beth Redlin Over the past 10 years the " E -rase your E -waste"

program has collected more than 164 TONS of outdated electronics for recycling, preserving space in the loca andfill as well as protecting the environment and human health through the proper disposal of hazardous
materials contained in those electronics. Organizers are hoping to push that total over 175 tons during their upcoming fall weekend collection event set for Friday and Saturday Sept. 5-6, in Sidney.
"We'd love to celebrate our 10 th year by topping the 775 -ton mark," E-rase your E-waste Committee Chair Jackie Couture said. That's only another 11 tons which is definitely
six years."
This year's fall collection event will once again be held at the Richland County Shop at 2140 W. Holly in Sidney, next to the Fairgrounds. Signs will be posted. Now's the time to clear those closets as this is the final collection event for 2014, according to Couture. Times are $3-7 \mathrm{pm}$ Friday, Sept. 5 , and 9 am- 3 pm
Saturday, Sept. 6. Please note, the county shop is available for drop offs during event times ONLY when employees with Yellowstone E-waste Solutions of Billings, our e-cycler, and local volunteers will be available to help with loading and unloading. Yellowstone E-waste Solutions is providing e-cycling services for FREE, with two small exceptions. Participants wanting their hard drives removed from their computers will need to pay
a small fee of $\$ 5$ for removal. In addition, those needing doca small fee of $\$ 5$ for removal. In addition, those needing docwill also be charged a $\$ 5$ fee.
Note, too, that anyone in the MonDak region, or even outside it, is welcome to bring their electronic items to the Sidney event during the scheduled hours. You do not need to be a
Richland County resident to participate.


What Can I Bring? For those new to the event, nearly all electronic devices components (printers, scanners, keyboards, etc.). cell phones, cameras, TVs, VCRs, cable TV boxes, fax machines, copiers, stereos, game boys and even specialized electronic equipment used in businesses such as hospitals, law enforcement and manufacturing and even the oil fields. However, NO consumer white goods, light bulbs, CFLs, mercury thermometers, alkaline batteries, or items containing
refrigerants (including dehumidifiers), oils, or acids will be accepted. If you are unsure whether your item qualifies you can check out the handy "What to Bring..." handout posted on the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab's e-waste website at www.ars.usda.gov/npa/nparl/ewaste or call Jackie Couture at 406-433-942.  Revenue Creates Citizen Concern FormSubmitted by Nicole Hackley In order to provide a process for citizens to reg-
ister concerns within their communities, the Montana Department of Revenue has created a Citizen Concern Form. This form is used when a citizen has concerns over a potential liquor law violation related to over-service to an intoxicated person, sale to an licensed premises, sales/ service/consumption on a licensed premises between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., or any other worries.
On these forms, the person reporting will be required
to fill in the name of the li-
address of the establishment,
the city, and if possible, the name of the individual of concern, whether it be a bartender, server
bouncer

When filling out the form, the concerned citizen will also be asked to give a detailed description of the violating events, including dates, times names, activity of concern,
frequency of offending events frequency of offending events
and any other relevant information. They will also be asked to fill in their name, email address, phone number and mailing address. The option to report anonymously is
available, but it can negatively available, but it can negatively

## 2014 North

Dakota Waterfowl Regulations Sef

North Dakota's 2014 waterfowl season has been set, with noteworthy changes including a daily bag of one canvasback
during the season, and an additional two blue-winged teal during the first 16 days of the season.
Opening day for North Dakota residents is Sept. 27 for ducks, geese, coots and mergansers. Nonresidents may begin hunting waterfowl in North Dakota Oct. 4. The season for swans opens Oct. 4 for both residents and nonresidents.
Hunters may take six ducks per day with the following restrictions: five mallards of which two may be hens, three wood
ducks, three scaup, two redheads, two pintails and one canducks, three scaup, two redheads, two pintails and one can-
vasback. An additional two blue-winged teal can be taken from Sept. 27 through Oct. 12. The daily limit of five mergansers may include no more than two hooded mergansers. For ducks and mergansers, the possession limit is three times the daily limit. The hunting season for Canada geese in the Missouri River zone will close Jan. 2, 2015, while the remainder of the state
will close Dec. 25. The season for whitefronts closes Dec. 7 while the season on light geese is open through Jan. 4, 2015 Shooting hours for all geese are one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m. each day through Nov. 1. Beginning Nov. 2, shooting hours are extended until 2 p.m. each day.
Extended shooting hours for all geese are permitted from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset on Saturdays and
Wednesdays through Nov. 26 , and on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays through Nov. 26 , and on Saturdays, Sundays and
Wednesdays from Nov. 29 through the end of each season. Wednesdays from Nov. 29 through the end of each season.
The bag limit for Canada geese during the regular season is eight daily and 24 in possession, except in the Missouri Rive zone where the limit is five daily and 15 in possession.
The daily limit on whitefronts is two with six in possession and light goose is 50 daily, with no possession limit.
The special youth waterfowl hunting season is Sept. 20 age or younger can hunt ducks, coots, mergansers and geese statewide. Youth hunters must have a general game and habitat license and a fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. A licensed adult of at least 18 years of age must accompany the youth hunter into the field.
Nonresidents have the option of buying either a statewide waterfowl license or one with zone restrictions. Nonresidents
who designate zones 1 or 2 may hunt that zone for only one who designate zones 1 or 2 may hunt that zone for only one
seven-day period during the season. Nonresident hunters who chose to hunt in zone 1 or 2 and wish to use the full 14 consecutive days allowed, must use the other seven days in zone 3 . Hunters in zone 3 can hunt that zone the entire 14 days. In accordance with state law, nonresidents are not allowed to hunt on North Dakota Game and Fish Department wildilife
management areas or conservation PLOTS (Private Land Open management areas or conservation
All migratory bird hunters, including waterfowl, must register with the Harvest Information Program prior to hunting. Hunters purchasing a license from the Game and Fish Department can easily get a HIP number. Otherwise, hunters must call 888 634-4798, or log on to the Game and Fish website at gf.nd.gov, provide the registration information, and record the He number
on their fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate. Those who HIP registered to hunt this spring's light goose season or early fall Canada goose season do not have to register again, as it is equired only once per year.

Summer Safety on the Water
The single most important reminder the North Dakota Game and Fish Department will issue to recreationists this summer is o be alert and safe near water.
Boat and water safety coordinator Nancy Boldt said safety the water begins with wearing a personal flotation device.
"Failure to wear a personal floatation device is the main eason people lose their lives in water recreation accidents," Boldt said.
North Dakota law requires all children ages 10 and younger to wear a personal flotation device while in boats of less than 27 feet in length. The law also requires all personal watercraft sers to wear a life jacket, as well as anyone towed on skis, Water users should make sure to the appropriate size, and in good condition. It is also important that children wear a PFD while swimming.
Water skiers and tubers should wear a Water skiers and tubers should wear a life jacket with four nylon straps rather than one with a zipper, because straps are
stronger than zippers upon impact with water. Anglers or persons paddling a canoe should opt for a PFD that is comfortable enough to wear for an entire outing.
Water skiers and tubers are reminded it takes three to ski and tube. When a person is towed on water skis or a similar device, an observer other than the operator is required on the vessel.
"In addition, it is important for swimmers to know water depth, as serious injuries can occurf from diving into water," Boldt said. "Large objects hidden below the water's surface can lead to significant injury.
North Dakota boaters also are reminded that marine VHF radios are an important part of boat safety that should not be mproperly used by operators. These radios are intended for boat operators who are in distress and facing an emergency situation.

From MSU News Service Montana State University closed out another strong year significant work in energy, ag riculture, health and biomedicine, and the environment leading the way.

"MSU's research enterse has great breadth, but also great depth, and that's illustrated by the many successes and advancements o our faculty in the last year,"

For studerts, MSU's research enterprise pumped 9.2 million into teaching and research assistantships, cholarships, and other stu
dent support - making it one of the largest sources of student support on campus.
"MSU's research enterprise gives our students the opportunity to work side-by
side with the faculty who are side with the faculty who are working on the cutting edge in
their fields - it's research and teaching as one," Reijo Pera said. "This is vital preparatio for our future engineers, scientists, teachers,
entrepreneurs."
ntrepreneurs."
Those research opportunities translated into notable student successes in the past year: MSU undergraduates won three Goldwater Scho arships in 2014, the nation premier scholarship for undergraduates studying math,
science and engineering. MSU s among the top universities in the nation for total number of Goldwater winners. Six grad uate students won prestigious National Science Foundation more than $\$ 100,000$.
In agricultural research highlights included MSU's de velopment of a new variety of wheat resistant to the orang wheat blossom midge, a deto 90 percent of a wheat har
tinued research on the wheat stem sawily, which can cause millions of dollars of losses to Montana wheat producers. MSU received a \$500,000 USDA grant to screen 4,000 sawfly-resistant traits, then identify the genes associated with those traits.
"Agriculture is our largest is proud to provide research that is improving the bottom line for producers in many areas, from new crop varieties, to livestock forage, to pests,
plant diseases, fertilization, plant diseases, fertilization, and even threats to honey-

## Irrigation Powers a \$22 Million Economy on the Tongue River

Hunting Violations

Every hunting season some individuals unwittingly or knowingly violate the state's game laws. ingly violate the state's game laws.
Montana Fish, Wildlife \& Parks officials urge hunters to review Montana's hunting rules and regulations to ensure they act within the law and that they recognize when others violate the hunting regulations and related laws. Any violation afield can be reported to TIP-MONT at 1-800-TIP-MONT, that is 1-800-847-6668 or Report a Violation online on the Enforcement web page.
Here are some of the most common game violations: - Failure to obtain permission from landowners before hunting on private property.

- Wasting part of a game animal suitable for food. Failure to properly validate a license/tag or to securely fasten the tag in a visible manner to a game animal immediately after it is taken and before it is moved or transported from the kill site.

Taking game from the wrong hunting district.
Using someone else's tag on a game animal you killed, or tagging a game animal that someone else killed. - Shooting game animals on or from any public highway or public right-of-way.

Taking game without a license or the proper permit,
Failure to validate a big game tag.
Not leaving evidence of the sex or

- Not leaving evidence of the sex or species of the game animal attached.
