Richland County Transportation Needs Your Feedback

Richland County Transportation is asking county residents to help them determine the direction of their service by filling out a quick survey. The service is twelve years old and has grown and changed a lot. The question is whether the existing plan still works or whether there are additional services that residents would utilize. Results will be used to develop a five year plan with an extension to ten years. Richland County Transportation received a grant to pay for the survey so no county dollars are

Richland County Transportation is used by all ages for multiple uses, and is very inexpensive at only \$1 per stop if reserved the day before or \$5 per stop if called in the day of. The service is not income based and is available to anyone for any reason.

Hours are 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week for anyone within a five mile radius of Sidney. Buses run to Savage on Tuesdays, Lambert on Fridays and Fairview on Thursdays, with stops made along the way.

What other uses would the public like to see? How can we serve you better? Have you ever used the bus and how? If you haven't used it, what would your needs be? Would you utilize it to go to medical appointments in Williston, Glendive or Billings? Could it be used to bring in workers from other towns?

"The transportation system is important to have in our community," stated Jodi Berry, Commission on Aging. "It's very affordable and we have many people who are loyal and thankful. We just need your help to determine the direction the system needs to go to make our service even better."

Soil Health Workshop Coming To Sidney Jan.

A soil health workshop aimed at helping Montana producers learn new strategies and techniques for improving soil health on their land and their bottom line is coming to the MSU Extension Office Building in Sidney on January 18, 2019.

The workshop will feature well known soil health speakers Race King and Keith Berns.

Race King brings a wealth of expertise in ranching and herd management to his job as Ranch Manager at La Cense Montana. La Cense Montana specializes in raising and developing Angus and Angus-cross feeder cattle entirely on grass and forage. They are strong proponents of grazing management strategies that use high stocking densities for short durations. Race will be speaking about his experience with year-round grazing and improving hay systems that work for both the cattle and the operator.

Keith Berns brings the experience of 20 years of no-till farming, ten years of teaching about agriculture and computers, and years of experimentation with over 100 different cover crop types and hundreds of mixes planted into various situations to his presentations. Keith also developed the SmartMix Calculator, a widely used cover crop selection tool. Keith will talk about Carbonomics - his acclaimed approach to thinking about soil processes in terms of economy - and his experience and advice for using cover crops in Montana.



It's that time of year again when the winter doldrums strike. Those incredibly dark three weeks on either side of the winter solstice are enough to drive anyone mad. The three weeks in December prior to the solstice pass relatively smoothly with the preparations for the holidays occupying everyone's attention. The holiday season has ended, people have returned to the daily grind, and they face short days, dark nights, and often quite chilly temperatures. Life goes on even if it may be cold and miserable some days. I try to keep that in mind when sunless days and frigid temperatures bring on mental stress.

However, they provide hours of entertainment on cold dreary days. I compare varieties, trying to decide what might and might not work in my small part of the world. I take comfort in the thought that if seed companies figure they can send out catalogues when the thermometer reads minus 3 and the weatherman snickers when he tells me the wind chill factor is minus 40, they must have unswerving faith that spring will follow in the future, however distant and impossible that future might seem at this point.

So, I live through January as best I can. I catch up on my reading and I get latch hook projects completed. I am thrilled when I turn the first page of the new calendar to show that February has arrived, as I figure that with February's arrival, I can and will make it to spring. Those long blue afternoon shadows will surely begin to shorten up as the days grow longer.

As the first baby born at Sidney Health Center in 2019, Sawyer and his parents received a gift bag full of baby items valued at more than \$200 from the Sidney Health Center Caring Corner Gift Shop and Good Cents Store Volunteers.

Although Sawyer was the first baby born in 2019, 2018 was a busy year for the obstetric department. In the past year, 215 babies were delivered at Sidney Health Center, an increase of 34 deliveries compared to 181 babies delivered in 2017. One hundred four of the babies were girls while one hundred eleven were boys. Although the average number of babies born per month was 18, August and November were busy months with 23 births.

Sidney Health Center's female Obstetrician Gynecologists provide essential obstetrical services to women living in the Mon-Dak region including preconception counseling, genetic screening and diagnosis as well as management of both low and high risk pregnancies through delivery and follow-up care. Dr. Lisa Ross and Dr. Maula Tambi have been practicing in Sidney since summer 2016.

The Sidney Health Center obstetric and newborn units feature Labor, Delivery, Recovery, Postpartum (LDRP) rooms. These rooms are equipped with Jacuzzi tubs and Hill-Rom birthing beds. During labor, options for pain medication are offered. A trained and experienced OB and Nursery Staff is available 24 hours a day.

The obstetric department also offers a One-Day Childbirth Class four times per year with the first one in 2019 scheduled for February 23 in the hospital classroom from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Registered nurse instructors will review the following topics: relaxation, anatomy and physiology of childbirth, types of delivery, anesthesia, breast feeding and child care. The session is free of charge; however, donations up to \$25 are gladly accepted to cover expenses.

Another option for those parents who cannot attend conventional prenatal classes or would like home-based education, is the eLearning Childbirth Education Program. It may also be used as a "refresher" course or to reinforce what you learned in class. The interactive web-based program includes animated illustrations, videos and voice-overs and can be viewed on a PC, Mac or mobile device. More information about this web-based class is available through the Sidney Health Center OB Clinic.

Hess Corporation Announces Additional **Plans For Bakken**

Hess Corporation, the energy company headquartered in New York City with major investments in the Bakken oilfield, has announced additional plans for the region. The Fortune 500 Corporation, which was founded in 1920 and today is worth tens of billions of dollars, has announced a sale of its Bakken water services business. However, the purchase won't take the business far from home or away from Hess altogether.

Hess has entered a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Hess Infrastructure Partners (HIP), which lays out a tentative agreement to sell their Bakken water

investments for 225 million in cash. HIP is a midstream energy joint venture between Hess and Global Infrastructure Partners known as Hess Midstream, which operates primarily in the Bakken and Three Forks Shale plays in the Williston Basin. Hess Midstream, which will tentatively acquire Hess' water assets, is a company formed to provide services to its sponsor company, Hess Corporation, and other third-party customers.

The transaction is expected to be complete at some point during the first quarter of 2019, assuming regulatory approvals are granted by governing agencies.

Regarding the MOU purchase agreement, John Gatling, the chief operating officer of Hess Infrastructure Partners, said that there would be lots of room for growing investment in infrastructure for the Bakken in coming years.

Gatling said, "Hess has been actively building the water infrastructure necessary to meet its accelerated Bakken growth profile in tandem with HIP's oil and gas infrastructure build-out. The expected growth in produced water volumes over the next several years and underdeveloped basin infrastructure creates an attractive opportunity for continued investment to build

additional infrastructure for

Hess and third parties." Currently there are over 150 miles of Hess water gathering pipelines that capture about 24,000 barrels of water per day. Along with saltwater disposal, Hess water operations in the region are massive.

Jonathan Stein, the Chief Financial Officer for Hess Infrastructure Partners (HIP), says that the acquisition of Hess Corporation's water business in the Bakken will help the HIP portfolio.

Stein reported, "Consistent with our commitment to deliver stable cash flows, the water services business is

expected to be underpinned by a long-term contract."

He continued, "This contract structure is expected to be complementary with the current contract structure of our existing assets, making the water services business a strong addition to the HIP portfolio."

In the meantime, Hess Corporation's production in the Bakken shows signs of continued growth, despite its sale of the water business to its subsidiary, Hess Midstream. A December press release forecasted between 135,000 and 145,000 barrels of oil per day in 2019.

John Hess, the chief ex-

ecutive officer of Hess Corporation, said, "Our capital and exploratory expenditure program is designed to deliver strong returns, production growth and significant future free cash flow. As we focus spending on our high return investment opportunities, we will continue to reduce our unit costs to drive margin expansion and improve profitability."

Hess plans to operate a six-rig program in 2019 within the Bakken, which is up from an average of 4.8 rigs in 2018. They anticipate a 42 percent increase in production from 2018 for a total of 180 anticipated newly drilled wells over the course of the next year.
