metal files are just like gravel roads – rough."

She added that the crystal nail files make taking care of your nails low maintenance. "The nails grow out nicer, longer

and smoother."

The neck wraps and headache marks are filled with clean Montana wheat. She said they can be micro-waved or frozen

to provide relief.

Petersen explains she sells at events in Montana, North
Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming and Minnesota. Her favorite
show is the one at the Richland County Fair because of being

able to see so many friends and neighbors.

She enjoys when her young grandchildren can assist her at the shows. "They are coming to Arts in the Park too," Peterson smiled. "I'm teaching my grandkids to be polite to customers, to





Paddlefish Harvest On Yellowstone, Missouri **Stays Within Target**

The 2019 paddlefishing harvest season on the Yellowstone and Lower Missouri rivers wrapped up on June 1, condensing the harvest into a two-week window.

High catch rates on May 31 heading into Memorial Day weekend prompted FWP to give notice of the harvest season closure on June 1 at 9 p.m. This accommodated paddlefishing the entire Saturday of the holiday weekend, which proved to be a busy harvest day. Following the harvest season closure, anglers were allowed to catch and release paddlefish only at Intake Fishing Access Site for 10 consecutive days, which ended June 11.

The right combination of increasing river flows, increasing paddlefish concentrations and holiday angler traffic triggered the June 1 closure, which was enacted to ensure that overall harvest did not exceed the 1,000-fish target contained in the regulations.

Based on processing of paddlefish at Intake and reports from anglers elsewhere, FWP estimates harvest at just shy of 900 fish. Of that total, almost 45 percent were female.

Paddlefish movements and angler success are notoriously difficult to predict, and this season was no exception. Harvest on Saturday's final day started fast and furious and was expected to near or exceed the 1,000-fish harvest target by day's end. However, angler success and participation slowed the last half of the day, keeping the overall harvest within the desired range.

Fort Peck Reservoir Angler Creel Survey Underway Through September



Anglers on Fort Peck Reservoir this summer may be asked a few questions about their fishing experience when they come

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks is conducting an angling "creel" survey on the state's largest and most popular warm water fishery to monitor catch rates of popular game fish and determine level of satisfaction with the fishery.

The data-gathering surveys will be based at marinas and boat ramps around the reservoir. Creel clerks will ask several questions about the day's fishing and also provide information on aquatic invasive species (AIS).

"The interview is short and shouldn't take more than a couple minutes," said Fort Peck Reservoir fisheries biologist Heath Headley.

According to Headley, detailed information gathered from these surveys is important and helps FWP better manage the Fort Peck fisheries by providing information on fishing pressure, size of fish harvested and angler catch rates.

"We'd like to thank all anglers in advance for their time and cooperation during these surveys and wish everyone the best of luck fishing this summer," Headley said.

Local Conservation Districts' Efforts Support Agriculture And The Missouri River

Dick Iversen and Buzz Mattelin attended the Missouri River Recovery Implementation Committee (MRRIC) plenary session May 21 - 23 in Sioux Falls, SD serving as representatives of Richland and Roosevelt Conservation Districts. Dick and Buzz had both previously served as stakeholder representatives on the Committee but were attending this meeting to represent the interests of irrigators and agriculture producers in the area below Fort Peck dam to the Yellowstone River Confluence.

The Missouri River Recovery Implementation Committee (MRRIC) serves as a national forum where people with diverse interests in the Missouri River basin can collaborate on recommendations for implementing the Missouri River Recovery Program. The plan, which was given final approval in 2018, is meant to provide a pathway for the recovery of three endangered species, which includes two bird species and the pallid sturgeon.

Mr. Iversen and Mr. Mattelin were appointed to serve on the Committee's Human Consideration Work Group where they are deeply involved with the Army Corps proposal to implement test flows out of Fort Peck meant to increase recruitment of the endangered Pallid Sturgeon up the Missouri River to the Fort Peck dam. Their involvement with the work group and presentation to the full MRRIC group resulted in the Corps modifying their test flow proposal to best accommodate the interests of irrigators who use the more than 150 pump sites between the dam and Yellowstone River confluence.

Following Army Corps public outreach meetings at Fort Peck and Williston earlier this year, a concerted effort was made to involve local irrigators, Conservation Districts, landowners and Montana agency representatives from Montana FWP and DNRC, in the public comment process. As a result of those efforts and the involvement of Mr. Mattelin, Mr. Iversen and Taylor Twiest (all of whom serve on the MRRIC Human Considerations work group), the Corps increased their minimum low flow projections during those key irrigation months in July and August.

Conservation Districts and local irrigators will need to maintain their engagement during this process and work with their local Conservation Districts to ensure the viability of using water resources for farmland irrigation.





Cathryn is a professional fine artist living and working from Glasgow, Montana; originally from southern Saskatchewan, Canada. She has pursued art as a full time profession since 2016 and through this work attempts to articulate the culture and values of northeastern Montana.

She received her B.F.A. from UNLV in 2006, and her M.F.A. from UM in 2011. Cathryn has called Glasgow home for the past thirteen years and in this time has defined herself as a nationally exhibited artist. She feels very strongly about the pursuit of her calling, and about the region she depicts through her work. Her work is heavily influenced by the wildlife and ranching culture that are synonymous with northeastern Montana.

Cathryn feels that the isolated geographic location of her home is one of its most unique factors and appreciates the silence that is synonymous with living in

She finds that the lack of "noise" so often found in urban locations, but missing in a rural location, is a powerful advantage and one that she uses throughout her artistic practice. The lack of distrac-

tion (social, visual, and otherwise) gives her an opportunity to focus more intensely on her art. She appreciates that within this region she has more time to consider her own artistic motives and she can hear her own creative voice more clearly, without the influence of other artists. As a result her art comes from a place of deep authenticity and is undeniably unique.

Throughout her work Cathryn uses found objects, often of a historic nature. She feels that these historic objects contribute their own meaning to the artwork and that their presence within the work speaks to time and place.

She feels passionately about creating work that exists within contemporary art conversations but comes from a remote location. Book Boxes To Encourage Summer Reading

To encourage kids to read during the summer, Westside School librarian Jean Barnhart and 2nd grade teacher Karen Pollari teamed up to create a book box in front of the school where kids can take a book, read it, and return it for another.

Donations have been received from teachers, and kids so the box is well stocked with titles sure to please everyone.

A second box is just waiting for the final touches from Pollari and will be placed at the Boys & Girls Club. One more is in the works with its final destination unknown at this point.

The idea grew out of a meeting with Barnhart and a group of teachers who tackled the problem of how to keep kids reading throughout the summer since reading proficiency can decrease dramatically over the summer vacation. With the encouragement of former principal Loretta Thiel, the idea was hatched to have little libraries around town. The books are free to use, and no library card is required. Plus, they're always open.

The first book box was actually found in the courtyard having served some unknown purpose in the past. Barnhart cleaned and painted it and quickly put it to use. The group wanted the first one to be on the west side of town since there is one on the east side at Central Elementary. The boxes will be out all year long, always encouraging kids to read. Plans call for a bench or lawn chairs as well so that kids can grab a book and read it on the spot.

Westside is also conducting its Wednesday afternoon Rocket Reader program, led by Barnhart and Pollari. Kids can come from 1 to 5 p.m. each Wednesday to read books and magazines, listen to audio books, complete fun projects, play games, practice keyboarding skills, practice reading and math skills with Moby Max, and check out a book. If the child completes all the tasks on the card, they are sent home with a snack and a prize. "We offer a variety of things that are educational and fun and try to follow a theme each week," Barnhart said. They also sneak in some fine motor skill development activities which the kids think



are fun. "Everyone wants to complete the menu so they can get a snack and a prize.'

Barnhart said 18 or 19 kids, mainly kindergarten and 1st graders, have been attending each week. They would really like to encourage older kids to come as well, to have fun and brush up on their reading and math skills. The program continues July 10, 17 and 24. Parents are welcome to stay with their kids. "It's fun to watch them engage with their own child, or maybe another one, or sit back and encourage the kids as they complete the tasks," Barnhart said.

Some staff changes will be taking place at Westside with Barnhart moving into a 3rd grade teaching position that she is excited about, although she loves being librarian as well. She said she will be happy to support, help and guide whomever is chosen to fill her position. Also coming in is a new principle to

replace Thiel who retired this spring. Barnhart and her fellow teachers are excited about the

all-new reading curriculum coming this fall with new books in every class. School will be here before we know it. Help keep your kids reading all summer by taking advantage of the book boxes in Sidney.





Western North Dakota native Miles Bendixon will present his art at The Pioneer Museum of McKenzie County during Homefest 2019 on July 12-14. The Pioneer Museum and the Long X Art Foundation will host the event. On Friday, July 12th the exhibit will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with old-fashioned ice cream for a dime. Saturday, July 13th the exhibit will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with a public unveiling of newly commissioned art from 10 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. There will also be an open house with coffee, cookies and ice cream sundaes for a dime. Sunday, July 14th there will be an open house from

Artist Miles Bendixson is a native of North Dakota, born in Williston and grew up in Watford City. The experience of growing up in western North Dakota had a profound influence on him and his way of life. Hunting, fishing and snowmobiling in the outdoors is the way he spent most of his time growing up. It was unbeknown to him at that time, what a huge roll this would play in his development as a wildlife and western artist. To him the west has permeated his soul, gradually becoming a way of life; which has resulted in the subjects he paints today.

Miles started out his career as a freelance artist, after graduating with a degree in commercial art from Bismarck State College. He did many different kinds of graphic art, from brochure & logo design, to sign painting and illustration. Illustration became an area of focus for him, having completed many portraits and caricatures as a result of that. His break into fine art came at the height of his development as an illustrator while competing in the North Dakota Fur- Bearer Art Stamp contest. After the third time competing, fortune smiled on him and he won this coveted competition in 1986. His winning entry, Beaver Pond, a painting of a beaver at streamside became the hunting trapping stamp and limited edition print, for the State of North Dakota in the fall of 1987. Winning this competition gradually moved him away from commercial art into fine art, resulting in his first limited edition print Little Dreamer. Since the release of Little Dreamer in 1989, he has published and marketed several of his prints across the US and Canada.

A major change in Miles' career came about after attending the Pacific Rim Wildlife Art Workshops in Jackson Hole Wyoming in 1995,1997 and 1998. Each year had a different featured wildlife artist that hosted and taught a group of fledgling wildlife artists from across the world.

Carl Brenders from Belgium taught in 1995, Robert Bateman from Canada in 1997 and Greg Beecham from Wyoming in 1998. Being able to attend workshops taught by world-renowned wildlife artists as these had a profound influence on Miles and the way he approaches his art. He came away with the idea that art should be integrated into his everyday life and in doing so, great art can be achieved. A result of following these practices and disciplines, he believes he has been making better decisions, concerning a paintings design, attention to proportion and color choices. The workshops he attended cemented the idea that a bond should take place between the artist and the subject he paints and draws.

This has resulted in a spiritual connection to his paintings. The goal that he strives for is to strike an emotional chord within himself, as well as the audience he paints for. The Pacific Rim Wildlife Art Workshops enabled Miles to take a closer look at what makes great art that has truth, meaning, depth and purpose.
