MT Dept. of Revenue Reminds **Businesses** to Submit **Unclaimed Property Report**

The Montana Department of Revenue would like to remind businesses throughout the state that the deadline for submitting an annual unclaimed property report is November 1. Because November 1 is a Saturday, reports will still be accepted on November 3. Montana law requires businesses to submit the report if they are holding unclaimed property. The deadline applies to all businesses except life insurance companies, whose deadline is May 1.

Unclaimed property is any financial asset that is being held by a business for a person or entity that owns the asset but cannot be found. The asset can be an uncashed check, dormant savings or checking account, payroll check, credit balance, money order, customer deposit, travelers check, stock or bond certificate, insurance payment, certificate of deposit, safe deposit box contents, and other interests or benefits.

"The report is an essential tool we have to make sure businesses that are holding unclaimed property transfer the property to the state, so we can then get that property to its rightful owner," says Jim McKeon, Unclaimed Property Program Manager at the Department of Revenue.


The department encourages businesses to submit their unclaimed property report electronically through the free Montana ePass File Transfer Service. Businesses can do so by going online to revenue. mt.gov, clicking the Online Services button, and then on the Holder Unclaimed Property tab. Electronic filing is secure, accurate, and encrypted, which means that businesses do not need to encrypt the submission themselves or protect it with a password.

Businesses can also file using downloadable forms from the department website. The department is no longer able to accept unclaimed property reports on compact discs, diskettes, tapes, or USB devices.

Each year, millions of dollars go unclaimed. The department receives between \$7 and \$8 million worth of unclaimed property annually and gives back about \$4 million. It is currently holding about \$63 million that can be claimed indefinitely. The department's Click for Cash application makes it easy for people to go online to search for unclaimed cash, claim their money, track the status of their claim, and have the cash deposited directly into their bank account. Visit revenue.mt.gov to use Click for Cash. You can also email the department at UnclaimedProperty@mt.gov or call toll free 1-866-859-2254, in Helena, 444-6900, to have the department perform a search for you.

Registered users can also bid on other kinds of unclaimed property through the department's online auction. For more information, visit revenue.mt.gov and click Unclaimed Property.

Hunters Against Hunger Donate Big Game for Hungry Montanans

"A Montana law passed during the 2013 state session allows individuals to make a contribution that will help nonprofit groups process donated wild game for free distribution by Montana Food Bank Network to help feed people in need," said Ron Aasheim, spokesman for Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks in Helena. The law came into effect when Montana State Senator Kendall Van Dyk sponsored SB123, which passed to become 87-1-293 http:// leg.mt.gov/bills/mca/87/1/87-1-293.htm

Hunters who legally harvest big game during the hunting season can donate the meat to feed hungry Montanans. There will be no cost or processing fees for the donated meat! Only legally harvested or confiscated big game animals can be donated (deer, elk, antelope, moose and wild buffalo). No road kill can be donated. Simply deliver the big game to the nearest participating meat processor (listed below). The ground venison will then be distributed to Montanans in need through Montana Food Bank Network's partner agencies.

If a hunter desires to retain part of the meat, the meat processor will take a photocopy of the carcass tag to remain with the donated meat. The original license stays with the hunter's meat. The carcass tag or a copy of the carcass tag for each animal processed must be kept by the meat processor for inspection by Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks.

To help with processing charges, anyone purchasing a Montana hunting license has the opportunity to make an on-thespot donation to Hunters Against Hunger. A hunter who applies for or purchases a deer, antelope, elk, or wild buffalo license may donate \$1 or more in addition to the price of each license. These contributions will help pay for butchering and distribution of the processed game.

Participation by meat processors and hunters is the key to success to feed hungry Montanans. We also would like to give a special thanks to our local partner agencies for their participation.

Hunting from Duck Boats Requires Safety

Waterfowlers hunting from boats are encouraged to wear properly-fitted life jackets while on the water.

North Dakota Game and Fish Department boat and water safety coordinator Nancy Boldt said there are hunting jackets available with life jackets already built in.

"There are no excuses, they are light and comfortable to wear," Boldt said.

Eight people have drowned in state waters since 1998 while hunting from a boat, and none were wearing life jackets. Boldt wants to make sure a duck hunter doesn't become another statistic.

"Capsizing and falling overboard from small boats are the most common types of fatal boating accidents for hunters," Boldt added. "With all the gear in the boat, including dogs, it can quickly become unbalanced."

In addition, wearing a life jacket will not only keep the overboard hunter afloat, but also slow the loss of critical body heat caused by exposure to cold water.

Fall Turkey Licenses Remain in Unit 25

Fall turkey licenses remain in Unit 25 for hunters who do not have a license, or for those who want additional licenses. Hunters are allowed a maximum of 15 licenses for the fall season.

Unit 25 covers McHenry County and portions of Pierce and Resident and nonresident hunters can apply online or print out an application to mail, at the Game and Fish Department

website, gf.nd.gov. The fall turkey season is open through Jan. 4, 2015.





Sidney Health Center Upgrades Its MRI Testing Service

Sidney Health Center recently acquired a new magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) system from Toshiba America Medical Systems, Inc. The Vantage Atlas MRI system limits the use of contrast during certain exams, providing safer, more effective care.

Typically, MRI exams require an injection of contrast material that may cause side-effects; however, Sidney Health Center now has the ability to perform magnetic resonance angiography (MRA) without contrast when necessary. Using the Vantage Atlas MRI system, non-contrast MRA testing provides doctors with the high-quality images they need for diagnosis without an injection, making it more convenient, comfortable and safe for the patient.

Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) is a test that uses magnetic field and radio waves to create detailed pictures of organs and parts inside the body. In many cases, MRI is used to obtain further information from a previous X-ray, ultrasound

or CT scan. MRI sometimes detects a problem that does not show up with other imaging methods.

Medical providers use MRI testing for many reasons. MRI is particularly helpful for diagnosing problems with the eyes, ears, heart, and circulatory system, as well as problems in joints, cartilage, ligaments, and tendons. It is also helpful in identifying infections and inflammatory conditions or to rule out problems such as tumors. Most exams take 45-60 minutes each.

The MRI machine looks similar to a CT scanner; however, the tunnel is more enclosed. Patients must be able to lie still for the duration of the exam and tolerate close quarters.

The new MRI system is housed in a permanent building structure on the east side of the hospital, conveniently located behind the ER/Radiology Wing. A climate-free breezeway was also recently installed between the facility and the MRI building to avoid the outside elements and improve the patient experience when having a MRI test.

Secretary McCulloch Announces New Way for Montanans to Register to Vote, Online Pre-Registration Tool Will Increase Accuracy and Efficiency

Secretary of State and Chief Elections Officer Linda McCulloch announced on Tuesday a new way for citizens to register to vote for upcoming Montana elections including the November 4th General Election.

The Secretary of State's office is now offering an online pre-registration tool, which allows qualified citizens to enter and submit their registration information online via a computer, tablet or smartphone.

"The pre-registration tool was created to increase accuracy and efficiency of the voter registration process," Secretary McCulloch said. "It's important for people using this tool to remember that they still must go into the county election office (or designated loca-

tion for late registration) where their online submission will be processed just as a paper form is processed, and they will sign the registration form provided by the election administrator in order to receive their ballot."

Full online voter registration has not yet been implemented in Montana; anyone submitting their registration information using this online tool must still go into the county election office or designated late registration location and sign the registration form before they are legally registered

"It's often times hard for citizens to get into the county election office before 5 pm during the late registration period," Secretary McCulloch said. "This tool gives people the ability to pre-register at

their convenience from anywhere at any time, as long as they get to the election office to complete the registration process before the polls close on election day."

The online pre-registration tool can be found on the Secretary of State's website at registertovote.mt.gov/Applica-

tion/Welcome.aspx.

Montanans can check their voter registration status using the Secretary of State's online elections tool, "My Voter Page." Registered voters can also view a precinct-specific sample ballot for the November 4 General Election, find the location of their polling place, and track the status of their absentee ballot once one has been issued.

Wenko Named New Williston Economic Development Director

Williston's Economic Development (WED) Department is under new leadership. The City of Williston named 38-year-old Shawn Wenko as the department's executive director effective on Wednesday, October 1, 2014.

Wenko, a Williston native, returned to his hometown in 2008 to join WED. As deputy director he initially focused on the Williston City Commission's "Build Williston Initiative" which was designed to enhance the three pillars of community development: housing, workforce, and quality of life.

Going forward, Wenko will be in charge of arguably the most enviable ED job in

the country. Williston has been named the fastest growing micropolitan in the country for the past three years and the City has an unemployment rate of less than one percent.

"We are in a fortunate position, and it's important to capitalize and continue our investment in economic development," said Wenko. "Building industry diversification, staying competitive, and enhancing quality of life are all the things that will take us to the next level as a city."

Wenko said one of his initial efforts will be defining WED's role in the City's future.

"My first goal is to create a Program of Work for 2015 that will highlight several key strategies which our office can focus on. Two of our initial strategies involve partnering with the local Job Service office to create a workforce development plan and creating an annual manufacturing logistics conference to attract more manufacturers to meet the growing needs of the oil field," said Wenko. "We want the oil and gas industry to remain sustainable for generations to come."

Wenko said WED faces the same challenges as its associates who are challenged to find workable business plans.

"We are in a unique situation where traditional economic development practice doesn't necessarily apply to us. Promoting affordable housing development, infrastructure development and quality of life enhancements Brooklyn and London.

ment of focus for our office."

Wenko replaces longtime WED executive director Tom Rolfstad. Rolfstad spent about 25 years leading ED efforts in the Williston region.

"We feel Shawn Wenko is the person to lead the City's future economic development efforts," said City of Williston Mayor Howard Klug. "We expect the transition between Rolfstad and Wenko to be seamless.'

Wenko has played a key role in a number of major developments in Williston: he assisted in the initial design and implementation phases of the Western Star Career and Technical Center located on Williston State College Campus; he helped with the planning and development phase of the new Train ND Petroleum Training Center and he facilitated a partnership with Williston Job Service to host a bi-annual career fair which has become a model now practiced across North

New Alert System Notifies Montanans About Urban Pests, Insects, Weeds

Montanans can now sign up for "MSU Urban Alert," a new system to rapidly share information about plant disease, insect and weed issues in urban settings.

"Landscapers, gardeners, homeowners and managers of parks or nurseries might be among those interested in receiving the free emailed alerts," said Mary Burrows, plant pathologist with Montana State University Extension and director of the Schutter Diagnostic Laboratory at MSU.

"The MSU Urban Alert works the same as MSU AgAlerts, but the new system

gardens, parks or other outdoor urban settings instead of plant disease, insects and invasive plants impacting agricultural areas," Burrows said.

MSU Urban Alert might warn people to avoid mistaking the fruit of the poisonous vine white bryony with grapes, for example. It could provide

the latest information about emerald ash borers or remind people to water their trees in the fall.

ONEOK Partners Announces Plans To Invest In Natural Gas Processing Plants In ND And

ONEOK Partners announced their plan to invest approximately \$480 - \$680 million by the end of the third quarter 2016 to build two natural gas processing facilities – the Bear Creek plant and the Bronco plant – along with their related infrastruc-

The partnership plans to build the Bear Creek plant, an 80-million cubic feet per day (MMcf/d) natural gas processing facility and its related intrastructure in northwest Dunn County, ND. This plant will process natural gas which is produced in the Williston Basin from the Bakken Shale.

The Bronco plant will consist of a new 100-MMcf/d natural gas processing facility and its related infrastructure in southern Campbell County, WY. This plant will process natural gas

produced in the Powder River Basin from Frontier, Sussex, Turner and the Niobrara Shale forma-


ONEOK CEO Terry Spencer said "The Bear Creek plant will be built near existing ONE-OK Partners natural gas gathering, compression and residue takeaway infrastructure in Dunn County and will alleviate pipeline inefficiencies in an area challenged by geographical constraints and severe terrain.... The construction of this facility, along with previously announced capital-growth projects, shows our continued commitment to building critical natural gas infrastructure in North Dakota in an effort to meet the industry goal of reducing natural gas flaring to 5 to 10 percent of total production by the fourth quarter 2020."

Since 2010, ONE-OK Partners has built or is in the process of building, 11 new natural gas processing plants

and related infrastructure across its operating footprint - including eight in the Williston Basin. The partnership expects their

Williston Basin natural gas processing capacity to increase to nearly 1.2 billion cubic feet per day (Bcf/d) following the com-

pletion of the Bear Creek plant and the completion of their previously announced projects in the region.





Edam Discusses Changes as a Fourth Generation Wheat Farmer

Dale Edam, a fourth generation wheat farmer in the area, is still working the land that his father and grandfather worked before him. The original homestead of his great-grandfather is about a mile away from the current farm which is located west of Crane, MT.

In 1912 Edam's great-grandfather Bert Edam established a homestead and farmed 160 acres near Crane, MT as well as owning the first tractor and threshing machine in the area. Edam's grandfather, Wilbert Edam, and his brother George began farming at 14 and 16 years of age; Edam's father, Wilbert (Dale) Edam also began farming as a teen and following with tradition, Edam himself began farming as a teenager by raising a family garden as a 4-H project. Later he would purchase a small herd of cattle in FFA and lease crop land from the family farm. He notes that growing up on the farm instilled in him a good work ethic while giving him a place to work with animals and enjoy nature, a large garden, and riding motorcycles. Edam officially purchased the farm in 2000 where he and his wife LaDean raised their twin sons. Koby and Keevin.

The farm has approximately 2080 tillable acres and Edam notes that one of the biggest changes over the years has been the notill or minimum till method of

"Growing up, so much of my summer was spent tilling fallow ground," he says. "Forty to fifty percent of the land was not cropped and left idle to prepare the soil for crops the next year. Today we use rotation crops to break up the cycle of continuous cropping and we have a more diverse cropping system which includes spring wheat, peas, beans, millet, sunflowers, safflowers and alfalfa."

Raising livestock has also been an asset to the farm; three and a half sections of grass are designated for grazing allowing for alfalfa and hay crops to be incorporated. This system helps to break down disease and weed cycles. In addition, cattle are beneficial reducing labor and fuel costs by helping maintain land and provide organic matter where needed.

Weather has always been the biggest challenge when it comes to farming in Northeastern Montana. Severe climates and intense snow storms are just as much of a concern now as they were to previous generations. However, larger equipment is available today to move snow and livestock can be reached more quickly after a storm.

In addition, the oil-boom has brought changes to farming in the form of both opportunities and challenges.

"Finding experienced farm labor has been difficult with the draw of the oil field and high paying jobs. I have reduced my labor force, leased some land, but have also had some great opportunities to work in the oil field as well,"

Despite challenges both new and old, Edam notes that he has always enjoyed farming and ranching and continues on in the tradition of generations before him.

The original 1912 homestead which Edam's great-uncle **George Edam lived** in until the early 1970s without electricity or running water.



Richland County has "Interesting" Harvest in 2014

I guess the most appropriate word to use for the 2014 harvest in Richland County is interesting. Not necessarily bad, not necessarily good, just interesting.

When the barley harvest started in July, it looked like everything was going to be good and maybe even terrific. The winter wheat that actually made it through the winter was looking good and for the most part the barley could have been classified as phenomenal. I remember visiting fields to certify them for the noxious weed seed free forage program and walking through chest-high barley loaded with seeds. Those growers who were able to get their crops out early certainly reaped the benefits of doing so this year.

Then, the bottom dropped out. Mid to late August and into September brought rain. According to Tanja Fransen with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the National Weather Service, we set new records for the most rainfall in the month of August. There are 2 sites that Tanja reported on in Richland County. One was in Savage and one was in Sidney. At the Savage location, the average rainfall for August is 1.21 inches. This August we saw a 559% increase in rainfall as the Savage site received 6.26 inches. This new record of 6.26 inches also shattered the old record of 4.46 inches which was set in 1918.

At the Sidney site, the difference was not quite as dramatic but there was still more rainfall in August than we previously had ever experienced. The new record set this year was 5.11 inches. This beat the previous record of 4.53 inches set just last year and bested the average August rainfall total of 1.16 inches by 441%.

While we hate to curse moisture in this part of the country, it could not have come at a worse time. We were just getting into spring wheat harvest when the skies opened up and it sure did make a mess of things. The coffee shop/barber shop/elevator conversations were still centered around the idea of "what am I going to do with all of this grain". However, early in the harvest season it was because it looked like harvest was going to be plentiful. Late in the harvest season it turned to issues with diseases in grain and sprouted grain that wasn't worth much to the buyers and, as such, there were fears of being stuck with grain and nowhere to unload it.

After August and early September, things did calm down somewhat and the weather pattern changed which allowed for our producers to get that last bit of the wheat crop out of the field. It still is not in the best condition, but it is at least out of the field. Now beet harvest has begun and early reports indicate that those producers are going to be pleased with the results. The same can probably be said of the corn and soybean harvest.

It is interesting to me that, as I visit with people, I commonly hear them mention that in the going on 5 years that I have been here, I have yet to see a "normal" planting, growing, and harvest season. I think that in those 5 crop producing seasons I have seen everything at some point along the way. One year there was massive flooding along the Yellowstone and Missouri Rivers at planting season, one year there was a somewhat substantial drought in June and July, we have had more than adequate snow cover and no snow cover with sub-zero temperatures for weeks.

I guess what I'm trying to say is that I'm not sure what "normal" is anymore when it comes to weather and the growing season. What I do know, though, is that our agricultural producers should be given lots of thanks and praise for continuing to do what they do through it all. So thank you and keep up the good work.

After 34 years at Sidney Sugars, Randy Jones is working his last harvest. He will be retiring from his position as the Ag Finance Superintendent to enjoy his family, hobbies and volunteer work.

"I'm 67 years old and it's time to step aside and do some of the things I've missed out on like pheasant hunting which is always during harvest season. It's time to let younger people step in and take over," says Jones about his decision

The factory employs about 230 people during the harvest season, and Jones' final harvest is expected to be a record year. A potential twenty-nine tons of beets per acre could be harvested this fall.

Jones originally moved to Sidney from Northern Wyoming to work for Holly Sugar and over the years he has seen his fair share of changes. When Jones started the factory was owned by Holly Sugar; it was later acquired by Imperial Sugar and is currently Sidney Sugars which is owned

by American Crystal Sugar located in the Red River Valley in North Dakota.

Other than the changes in ownership, Jones notes that the biggest developments over the years have been in the growing process. It used to be that farmers seeded beets two inches apart and then handthinned them to six inches apart, which involved hiring additional people to work in the fields. Approximately 20 years ago, all of that changed; beets are now planted four and three-quarter inches to five inches apart which is a much better method as it eliminates the need for thinning and is more cost effective. Planting Roundup Ready Beets (beets that are genetically engineered to withstand the herbicide roundup) has also been a major improvement in the growing process. Beet fields no longer need to be sprayed numerous times with six or seven different types of herbicide.

In addition to his job, Jones has been a judge of the Make it With Sugar contest every year since it began. While he has always enjoyed sampling the tasty entries, he has really appreciated getting the recipes, too. After being a long-standing judge, Jones does admit that he's looking forward to entering in the contest next year.

His current job will be split into two positions. Cheryl Riedel will take over the administrative work such as grower payments and doing the purchasing for the Ag Department. Vanessa Pooch is an agriculturalist who will be overseeing the Tare Lab.

"It's been a great 34 years. I've worked with a lot of great people, both growers and employees," Jones says of his career at Sidney Sugars and he admits he will miss it. However he is looking forward to enjoying his pastimes.

His plans for retirement include hunting, fishing, woodworking, and gardening. Jones also plans on volunteering at the local food bank and spending lots of time with his family as his two daughters and six grandkids all live in the area.





A Little Bit Country **Who Would** Have Thought **Vomitoxin In Western ND**

Several years ago when scab first became a major problem in durum and spring wheat grown in eastern North Dakota, many of us thought it never would be a problem for us in western North Dakota and eastern Montana. How wrong we were. This year it has been a major problem for growers of the area.

Scab, technically referred to as Fusarium head blight (FHB), most notably causes shriveled kernels which can be easily separated. However. there can be a hidden problem not noticeable to the eye. This is known as deoxynivalenol (DON). It is also commonly referred to as vomitoxin.

The concentrations of vomitoxin in grain are expressed as parts per million (ppm). One ppm is equivalent to 1 pound in 1 million pounds. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have expressed vomitoxin advisory levels to provide safe food and feed. Unlike aflatoxins in corn, vomitoxin is not a known carcinogen. Furthermore, grain with vomitoxin would have to be ingested in very high amounts to pose a health risk to humans but it can affect flours in foods and processing performance.

Human food products are restricted to a 1 ppm level established by the FDA. This level is considered safe for human consumption. The food industry often sets standards that are more restrictive. In livestock feed, vomitoxin infected grain causes food refused and poor weight gain in some livestock.

The FDA advisory level for ruminating beef and feedlot cattle older than four months and for poultry is 10 ppm providing these ingredients don't exceed 50% of the diet. Research conducted in North Dakota and Minnesota has suggested growing and finishing cattle can tolerate higher levels (up to 18 ppm) based on research at the Carrington Research Extension Center.

Cleaning the wheat or durum with screening or aspiration often does not adequately remove the scabby grain infected with vomitoxin. Best results are obtained with a gravity table but the success is still variable.

Fusarium head blight is caused by a fungus so appropriate personal protective gear such as masks designed to keep out mold spores and grain dust are recommended. Generally, these masks are either N95 rated which typically have two stages or respirators with HEPA filters.

Vomitoxin usually does not increase when the grain is in storage. After the grain dries before a moisture level of about 22%, fungal growth and vomitoxin production stops.

High amounts of vomitoxin affected grain do exist in this area. Much of it is being heavily discounted bringing prices down to feed level. However, even as feed prices, it must compete with depressed corn prices which is the grain of choice for cattle feeders. So, it is going to be a challenge to market wheat high in vomitoxin.

Pine Needle Drop Every year there is concern about pine needles turning brown and dropping to the ground. These needles are located on the inner part of the branch. Such needle drop varies from year to year, thus causing a great deal of concern to the owner. When callers describe this situation, I quickly advise them not to worry because this is a natural

Though pines and most other conifers are called evergreens, their needles do not stay alive and green forever. Generally, new needles are produced every spring and summer and last for two to four or more years. So as the tree grows larger year-by-year, newer needles are always at branch ends and older needles are further back in the crown.

As needles age, they become less efficient at producing food for the tree. They also become more shaded by newer needles. For these reasons, old needles finally turn brown and drop off. This doesn't hurt the tree because several years' worth of newer needles are always there to replace the older ones. Ponderosa pine, which is the most popular kind in this area, usually holds its needles for three to five years.

Do be concerned, however, if your tree is losing needles at the branch tips. These needles are young and have not out-lived their usefulness. The culprit for tip needle browning is likely some type of insect or disease.

To help maintain the health of the tree and possibly retain needles for a longer period of time, I suggest a heavy watering before freeze-up.



NDSU Releases New Soybean Variety



ND1406HP is a conventional soybean released by the North Dakota Agricultural **Experiment Station.**

Characteristics of ND1406HP include 0.6 maturity, purple flower color, gray pubescence, yellow hila with dull seed coat luster and brown pod color.

Producers in the soybean specialty market may be interested in ND1406HP, a new variety developed by the North Dakota State University soybean breeding program. ND1406HP is a conventional (non-GMO) soybean that was released this year from the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station.

"ND1406HP is intended for the high-protein, tofu or soymilk specialty markets," says Ted Helms, NDSU soybean breeder. "I am excited about this release because ND1406HP has better vield and quality for these specialty uses than other NDSU varieties. However, it is important for some growers to note that it lacks a major gene for phytophthora root rot resistance."

ND1406HP has had consistently high protein content. It also is more resistant to lodging than Prosoy and is rated higher than Prosoy in overall tofu quality. Characteristics of ND1406HP include 0.6 maturity, purple flower color, gray pubescence, yellow hila with dull seed coat luster and brown pod color. ND1406HP is tolerant to metribuzin herbicide at the recommended rate of application.

Compared with the conventional NDSU soybean variety Sheyenne, ND1406HP has 3 percent higher protein content, matures three days earlier and yields 6 bushels per acre less. Earlier-maturing varieties can help reduce the risk of yield reduction in a cool year with an early fall freeze.

"ND1406HP will be attractive for people in the foodgrade soybean market because of its potential to be an earlier tofu soybean with high yield," says Tom Teigen, NDSU

Agronomy Seed Farm director. "It also has better quality and shorter maturity than Prosoy, the current industry standard specialty soybean."

Helms credits the North Dakota Soybean Council and North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station for their continued support of the NDSU soybean breeding program, especially in the development of ND1406HP.

The North Dakota Crop Improvement and Seed Association has a license agreement with the NDSU Research Foundation to produce and distribute ND1406HP seed through Dakota Select Seed. There is a one-time \$100 membership fee to join Dakota Select Seed. A variety access fee of \$100 per variety per year also is charged.

MSU Extension Offers Advice on Use of Sprouted Grains Feed for Livestock

Because of this summer's weather – Montana has been hot, cold, rainy and, in some parts, snowy – the grain harvest was delayed in many areas, and some barley and wheat have sprouted in the seed heads. These sprouted grains, although not suitable for traditional markets, can be used as a feedstuff for livestock.

Based on research, sprouted grains have similar feed value to non-sprouted grains. Daily gains and feed efficiency in the feedlot are similar between cattle consuming non-sprouted or sprouted grains. However, due to the high starch content of wheat and barley, feeding below 20 percent of the total ration on a dry matter basis is recommended to minimize incidences of acidosis. For the greatest benefit of feeding wheat and barley, either sprouted or not, the kernels should be rolled or cracked and should never be self-fed or used for creep feeding. Fine grinding of wheat and barley should be avoided.

Major areas of concern when feeding sprouted grains are proper storage and the potential development of mold and mycotoxins. Proper storage of the sprouted grains is crucial to maintaining quality and limiting mold growth.

If moisture levels are less than 13 percent, it can be stored as you would ordinarily store grain. When determining moisture levels of a field, make sure multiple samples are collected. Moisture content may vary across the field depending on topography and wind, which would cause uneven drying the sprouted grain.

If moisture levels are greater than 13 percent, ensiling may be a better option for storage. Sprouted grains can be ensiled in silos, bunkers, or storage bags. Whole grain does not pack well, so rolling or cracking of the grain should be done prior to ensiling. Sprouted grains, such as barley and wheat, can be layered with corn silage during silage packing to ensile the sprouted grain.

The combination of high moisture and cool weather

conditions means mold may develop in sprouted grains. If mold is seen on the sprouted grains, it is recommended to collect multiple samples from around the field. Proper drying of the sprouted grains is more likely to occur on the outer edges, while the center of a field will be more susceptible to mold and mycotoxin production due to higher moisture contect.

Mold and mycotoxin levels should be assessed prior to feeding or harvesting because they can be hazardous to both humans and livestock.

Barry Jacobsen, MSU Extension plant pathology specialist, suggests that when submitting samples to labs, mold species and genus should be identified if possible. If mycotoxins are present in the sprouted grains at moderate levels, the sprouted grains should be combined with clean, non-moldy feed to reduce mycotoxin levels.
