## Rob Quist Campaigns in Glendive May 18

#### By Joshua Smallwood

Democratic nominee for US House of Representatives Rob Quist gave a speech in Glendive at the Makoshika Park Visitors Center on Thursday, May 18th. The speech was a part of the Hands Off Our Health Care Tour, a Quist effort that on the same day went to the Wolf Point Community Center at and Loaded Toad Coffee in Glasgow.

While not limited to health care, as Quist took opportunities to reiterate his platform and address statements made by his opponent, Republican nominee Greg Gianforte, the state of health care in the nation was at the forefront. Quist however first began by telling an anecdotal story from his high school days in Glendive. "Glendive will always be one of my favorite cities," said Quist after telling the story. He then began to address some of the issues he has been facing down in the election. "People ask me, 'why in the world would you want to get into the down and dirty world of politics?' And I'm just finding out how down and dirty it is."

Quist then went on addressing some of his opponent's points. "Our public lands are really under threat. I feel this is a fight for the soul of Montana... when people like Gianforte see our public lands, they probably think, 'well, that would be good to own, and to fence in, and develop.' But real Montanans would say, 'This is our way of life." Quist maintained that the

issue of public lands was one with future consequences, "The transfer and eventual sale of our public lands is nothing more than theft against our children," said Quist.


Quist reached the main point of his speech when he addressed the Affordable Care Act (ACA). "There are definite problems with the ACA," said Quist, "but we can't just repeal it and have everybody not covered. I think one of the things we could do would be to lower the cost of pharmaceutical drugs."

The pharmaceutical industry was an important point in Quist's speech, and about his opponent Gianforte in relation to pharmaceutical companies, Quist said, "My opponent has two and a half million dollars of stock in these same companies that are gouging the people of America." Offering solutions to the problem of high-cost prescription drugs, Quist said, "Another way to lower the cost of prescription drugs is reimportation from Canada. If these drugs are good enough for the people of Canada, they are definitely good enough for the people of the United States."

Returning to his opponent, Quist said, "He's brought out Vice President Pence and Trump, Jr., so to me this just makes me realize how worried they are because we have momentum on our side. We started twenty points down and we closed at the single digits here about two and a half weeks ago." Referencing Gianforte's failed bid for governor in 2016, Quist said, "He failed in the last governor's election and now he wants this one - the U.S. House of Congress will not be his consolation prize."

Taking questions from the crowd, he answered one question about his views on gun rights. "Being raised in a ranching and farming community, gun safety is something that you grow up with. Quite frankly, I've got a number of guns that are older than the amount of years Mr. Gianforte has been in Montana. He talks about how I want a national gun registry - that's patently false."

Closing his speech, he gave one last admonition to his supporters. "I just want to encourage you to talk to your friends and neighbors and really make them understand how important this election is. This is a fight for the soul of Montana. I know if we stand together we cannot be denied."

## Maah Daah Hey Trail Offers Mud Run June 10th

The Bull Moose Mudder will be held on Saturday, June 10th, beginning at the Medora Family Fun Center at the entrance to the Medora Campground.

The Mudder's organizers, the Save the Maah Daah Hey Trail non-profit in conjunction with the Teddy Roosevelt Medora Foundation, have taken advantage of the natural challenge of the North Dakota Badlands to set up a 3-mile loop course inspired by Theodore Roosevelt's daily trek.

Roosevelt called his treks "point-to-points", jaunts he had to complete each day to finish his chores. This included crossing the Little Missouri River thirteen times a day, carrying and dragging heavy objects, and climbing up and over hills. As in Roosevelt's daily routine, the Bull Moose Mudder includes multiple creek and river crossings with water up to waist deep, and natural obstacles like fallen logs and tall grass. Akin to carrying game animals Roosevelt hunted for food, participants will lift and carry sand bags across an open meadow. The mudder takes participants up a natural butte, down the other side, and through a tunnel to complete the race with a man-made obstacle course. Teddy Roosevelt himself will be completing the race as well.

The mudder will begin at 1pm Mountain time with a shotgun start by Mrs. Medora on horseback, at the Medora Family Fun Center at the entrance to the Medora Campground. Racers may opt to compete in teams or alone and may choose between one fun lap, a competitive lap, or as many competitive laps as possible in three hours.

Following the award ceremony, a Kid's Fun Run will kick off, where kids of all ages with their parents can get muddy and complete events at the Family Fun Center.

## **Alexander Public School Receives OneOK** Grant





## Early-Season Fungicide Application For Wheat

A common agronomic practice that will be considered in the upcoming weeks is tank mixing a fungicide with a herbicide. Here are a couple reminders when making the decision on an early season (tillering) fungicide in wheat.

#### **Diseases Being Targeted**

An early-season fungicide is geared at managing residue-borne diseases. The pathogens responsible for these diseases are able to overwinter on host residue and can start an epidemic under conducive environmental conditions in the spring. The most common residue-borne diseases for wheat include tan spot, Septoria, and Stagonospora. Often times, more than one disease can be found on a leaf and is referred to as a leaf disease complex. For more information on fungal leaf spot diseases of wheat please reference Extension Publication PP1249.

#### The Decision to Spray

When scouting tillering wheat fields, an early season fungicide is likely recommended if fungal leaf spots are already found on the oldest leaf tissue. Another way to assess the value of an early-season fungicide application is to assess disease risk. The greatest amount of disease risk occurs when a susceptible variety is grown in a wheat on wheat production system, with minimal tillage and favorable conditions for disease development. Favorable conditions for fungal leaf spots are cool temperatures and prolonged periods of leaf wetness including rain and dew. NDSU routinely conducts fungicide-timing studies for management of fungal leaf spots in wheat. As a quick

summary of 59 replicated fungicide trials from 2008-2015, trials were categorized into the three disease risks (low, moderate and high) based on environmental conditions and production practices. Based on this data set, when compared to a non-treated control, the mean positive yield response for an early-season fungicide was 0.1%, 3% and 4% for low, moderate and high disease environments, respectively. Although a robust statistical analysis has not been conducted on this data set, the general rule of thumb is that the likelihood of a positive yield response from an early-season fungicide will increase as disease risk

#### **Fungicide Efficacy and Expectations**

There are several fungicides labeled that have efficacy on all three residue-borne leaf spot diseases. For more information, please consult the 2017 Fungicide Guide or use the NCERA-184 fungicide efficacy table. Fungicides are best used in a preventative manner and will only protect available leaf tissue at time of application. Also, it is important to remember the movement of a systemic fungicide should not be compared to the movement of a systemic herbicide. Most systemic fungicides are locally systemic (moves short distance from droplet), translaminar (moves from top side of leaf to the underside), or moves upward with xylem to a leaf tip. Therefore, as the wheat crop progresses and new leaves emerge, continue to scout fields to track disease development and progression.



## **Healthy Is** Hard To

When it comes to selecting the foods we eat, nothing seems more confusing than choosing "healthy" options. We are constantly bombarded with information about food products, nutrition and ingredient information on the news, social media and Pinterest. If you find yourself confused by "healthy" options, you aren't

Over twenty years ago, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) narrowed down a definition of "healthy" that was allowable to use on food packaging to mean foods low in fat, cholesterol and sodium and contain at least 10% of certain nutrients. But that was in 1993, and food and nutrition science has come a long way since then.

The 1993 definition of "healthy" focused mostly on total fat content, which is an important part of nutrition, but nutrition science has shown that the type of fats contained in a food product tells more about its "healthiness". For example, according to the 1993

FDA definition, foods that we now accept as healthy, such as nuts, whole grains, and salmon, would not meet the criteria of healthy foods as accepted n 1993. We now know that these foods contain the "good fats" called unsaturated fats, that nutrition science shows may reduce your risk of heart disease. In contrast, the "bad fats", the saturated fats, can build up in your body and cause weight gain, high cholesterol and increase your risk of heart disease. In short, it is clear that not all fats are created equal, and the 1993 definition of "healthy" isn't particularly consistent with current

dietary recommendations. So what should you be eating? Nutrition science suggests that one size does not fit all, especially when it comes to diet. Specific recommendations for nutrition will come from your health care provider and will be based on your specific health conditions. For example, providers may

recommend a diet low in fat and sodium for those at risk of heart disease, or a diet high in folic acid, found in beans and dark green vegetables, for pregnant women.

The United States Department of Agriculture recommends having a balanced diet consisting of foods from all of the five food groups. This mean choosing whole grains, vitamin-rich fruits and vegetables, lean proteins, lowfat dairy, and unsaturated fats. Nutritionists currently recommend managing portion size as a means to promote health, and eating fresh, unprocessed foods when available. Fresh foods are more likely to be rich in fiber and other nutrients as well as lower in fats and sugars than processed foods.

## **History Alive! Programs Planned At Chateau De Mores State Historic Site**

The French aristocrat and cattle baron the Marquis de Mores will appear at the Chateau de Mores State Historic Site the weekend of June 3-4 in the first History Alive program for the summer. Portrayed by Lance Rustand, the Marquis will share his dreams of a beef empire in the frontier Medora of the 1880s.

A 98-year-old veteran of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) portrayed by Ed Sahlstrom will appear on June 10-11. Sahlstrom will relate experiences of the CCC as it restored the Marquis de Mores's Chateau from 1939 to 1941.

A.T. Packard, the editor of the Bad Lands Cow Boy, will appear the weekend of June 17-18. Portrayed by Donald Ehli, Packard will discuss his life as the editor of the newspaper from 1884-86.

The Marquise de Mores (Medora) will appear at the Chateau June 24-25. Portraved by Karen Nelson, this program will center on Madame de Mores's return to Medora in 1903. Visitors meet Madame in a brief retrospective on her time in western Dakota as well as her life following her return to France,

catching a glimpse of the romance of meeting the Marquis, her passion for hunting, and the tragic death of her beloved

All performances will be on the veranda of the Chateau at 10:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m., and 3:30 p.m. (MT). The free History Alive programs explore the lives and times of decades gone by, combining theater arts with history. The 20-minute monologues are based on original letters, diaries and other documents, many from the archives of the State Historical Society of North Dakota.
