### Senior Seth Ullman Will Perform at Carnegie Hall in Feb. 2017

There are a lot of upcoming opportunities for high school senior Seth Ullman, who has been playing trombone for the last seven years. He found out just a few weeks ago that he was selected as a finalist for the New York Honors Performance Series Symphonic Orchestra. The approximately 200 finalists that were selected will venture to New York City, NY Feb. 2nd - 6th to perform at Carnegie Hall. All finalists are designated to one of four groups: Choir, Band, Symphonic Orchestra, or String Orchestra.

After several months of practicing his solo piece, Ullman attended Eastern A District Music Festival before going onto State Music Festival where he received a 1. the highest rating that can be given. All soloists who went to State Music Festival in the spring of 2016 were invited by the Honors Performance Series to send in an audio recording including one piece of requested music, as well as the piece of music they performed at state.

"Miss Sundt was pretty excited and posted it on the band's Facebook page," Ullman said of his band director. "It got around 100 likes; that's the most Facebook-famous I've ever been."

The cost of the trip is \$2,000 which includes hotel, museum tours, and a Broadway Show in addition to rehearsals. He has a GoFundMe Account under Seth Ullman Plays Carnegie Hall, and he's also gotten congratulation cards and letters from community members with enclosed donations sent to him at 524 3rd St SE, Sidney, MT, 59270.

"My brother told me that Pink Floyd, Led Zeppelin, and the Beatles all performed at Carnegie Hall, and that's pretty cool. It definitely gives me something to think about while I'm on stage," Ullman commented. "I don't think I'll be nervous, but I will be excited. I've never played in such a big room in front of

Another adventure he will be having this year is a tour of Europe with a band composed of director-nominated juniors and seniors from Montana and North Dakota. He may even be going to Washington DC on a band class trip over the Fourth of July, and they are working hard to raise money for that trip.

"I'm going to be all over the place this year," he said.

When asked about his plans beyond traveling, Ullman said he wants to go to college at MSU Bozeman and get his degree in music education.

"I want to be a band teacher because music has played an important role in my life," Ullman concluded.





I've decided that Christmas truly belongs to youngsters. Christmases became bright again, as my sister and I developed our own traditions and ways to celebrate the holidays. I finally realized there was no way on earth I could ever recapture the Christmases of my childhood, but I certainly could create new traditions and fresh memories and enjoy the season as an adult.

I looked forward to the holidays again, delighted in planning Christmas Eve food, and appreciated the immense pleasure I felt when I found those special gifts for my sister and her husband that I knew would please them. I even did a bit of Christmas baking, including making my favorite fudge.

Christmas spirit, anticipation, and enthusiasm disintegrated once more, and for the past two years since our move to Virginia City I developed apathy for the season and an attitude that many older people unfortunately seem to develop: Christmas is just another day.

However, I don't want my Christmases to be just another day. I want them to hold promise, joy, and appreciation for life and the world around me. I want to feel peace, contentment, and a little bit of magic, so to that end, I continued to decorate the house to a certain extent, I set the star my father made that I have covered with solar lights out on the front porch, and I continued to purchase gifts I thought my husband might like. I filled a stocking for him for the last two years that contained small items so he had surprises to look forward to on Christmas morning.

Making new traditions and starting over yet again takes time. My efforts the past two years have worked to an extent but this year I have high hopes for Christmas. In August we bought a 5 acre lot on the side of a mountain that overlooks Virginia City. Both my husband and I love the place; it offers peace and quiet, a great view, and the chance to move out of Virginia City proper and into our own small cabin.

The property has a wealth of spruce and juniper trees of various sizes and shapes, and I intend to purchase solar powered outdoor Christmas lights and decorate one or two of those trees for Christmas. The thought makes me smile, and every time I look at those trees with the thought of choosing one or two of them for my outdoor Christmas trees, I feel some stirrings of

anticipation about the upcoming Christmas season, a feeling I have not had for the past three years.

We also have a small 12x20 foot building on the mountain property that will eventually become my office once we get our cabin on location. 
I have expectations we will spend Christmas Eve at the new



# 10 Tasty Turkey Tidbits

Feasting on Thanksgiving dinner with turkey and all the trimmings is something many of us eagerly anticipate. Deep conversation over dinner about the details of one's personal life or the election results...not so much. If you think you might find yourself in search of non-controversial conversation starters while enjoying your holiday meal, consider the tasty turkey tidbits below.

- 1. The American Farm Bureau Federation's annual survey on the average cost of a classic Thanksgiving dinner with turkey and all the trimmings for 10 is much anticipated. This year's tally is something to be thankful for, coming in at \$49.87 down 24 cents (less than 1 percent) compared to 2015.
- 2. President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday in 1863, supposedly as a response to a campaign organized by magazine editor Sara Joseph Hale. In 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving Day forward one week to the fourth Thursday of November, as it is presently celebrated. Plymouth Plantation recounts the history of the first Thanksgiving, as Gov. William Bradford's description of the Pilgrims' first autumn in Plymouth makes clear, "There was great store of wild turkeys, of which they took many, besides venison, etc."
- 3. In 2015, more than 233 million turkeys were raised, with about 212 million consumed in the U.S. Thanksgiving is the biggest day for turkey consumption (46 million), followed by Christmas (22 million) and Easter (19 million).
- 4. Nearly 88 percent of Americans surveyed eat turkey at Thanksgiving. The average weight of turkeys purchased for Thanksgiving is 16 pounds. In 2015, per capita turkey consumption was 16 pounds, compared to 8.3 pounds in 1975.

- 5. Benjamin Franklin, who proposed the turkey as the official United States' bird, was dismayed when the bald eagle was chosen instead. Franklin wrote to his daughter, referring to the eagle's "bad moral character," saying, "I wish the bald eagle had not been chosen as the representative of our country! The turkey is a much more respectable bird, and withal a true original native of America."
- 6. The naturally mild taste of turkey, a nutrient-rich protein, combines readily with different seasonings, making it an ideal choice in spicy ethnic dishes, as a substitute for higher-fat meats in favorite recipes and as a complement to other foods on the plate.
- 7. Many people report drowsiness after eating Thanksgiving dinner. While turkey often receives the blame, recent studies suggest that carbohydrate-rich meals may cause sleepiness by increasing the number of tryptophans in the brain. So, the unusually large, multi-course, carbohydrate-rich meal most people eat on Thanksgiving is more likely the reason a late afternoon nap seems like such a good idea.
- 8. White meat turkey is generally preferred in the U.S. A turkey typically has about 70 percent white meat and 30 percent dark meat. White meat has fewer calories and less fat than dark meat. The rich flavor of dark meat is especially valued in soup and stew recipes. It also holds up well in rich marinades and is a perfect choice for grilling and barbecuing.
- 9. Turkey is listed among the top 10 foods for your eyes because it's rich in zinc (plus the B-vitamin niacin protects against cataracts).

Are you or someone you know worried about how you're going to pay those home energy bills this winter? Energy Share of Montana is accepting applications for emergency heating assistance at Action for Eastern Montana in Glendive, 406-

Energy Share is a private nonprofit organization that helps Montanans who are facing financial difficulties, which may result in loss of heat or lights in their home due to circumstances beyond their control. Energy Share helps people no matter what their heat source, but the assistance is usually only once every ten years or so because the organization is truly a source of emergency funds, intended to complement government assistance programs but not replace them.

Energy Share helps an average of about 2,500 families per year (over 6,000 individuals) statewide. The organizational struc-

ture is unique because the applications are reviewed individually, allowing applicants to explain the difficult circumstances they are facing. The only way Energy Share can provide the individual attention it does to each application is through a cooperative effort. ### **County Agent Update**

**Grain Drying** and Storage Tips With harvest over for most, now comes the time to haul and sell your grain. Many

operations have to have grain bins and a handling system as heading straight to the elevator isn't an option, for many reasons. With the cooler temperatures among us, and precipitation soon to be coming in the form of snow below are some tips from North Dakota State University Extension Service Engineer, Dr. Kenneth Hellevang. Natural Air Drying; In-bin air-drying becomes inefficient as outdoor air temperature decreases. Turn the drying fans off when outside temperatures average below about 40 degrees. Transition to cooling the grain for winter storage. Do not operate the fans when it is raining, snowing, or foggy. Cooling Stored Grain; The grain should be cooled whenever the average outdoor temperature is 10 to 15 degrees cooler than the

grain. It should be cooled to

near or below 30 degrees for

winter storage in the northern states. Cool grain with aeration to reduce the insect infestation potential. Insect reproduction is reduced at temperatures below about 60 F. insects are dormant below about 50 F, and insects can be killed by extended exposure to temperatures below about 30 F. In addition, grain moisture content and temperature affect the rate of mold growth and grain deterioration, with the allowable storage time approximately doubling with each 10-degree reduction in grain temperature.

Storing grain in poly bags is a good option, but it does not prevent insect infestations or mold growth in damp grain. Grain placed in bags should be dry and cool. Recommendations include: Placing grain in bags at recommended stor age moisture contents based on grain and outdoor temperatures. Heating and grain deterioration will occur if the grain exceeds a safe storage moisture content, and grain in a bag cannot be cooled with aeration. The average temperature of dry grain will follow the average outdoor temperature. Selecting an elevated, well-drained site for

the storage bags. Preparing the ground surface so the bag is not punctured during placement. Grain frequently is stored short term in outdoor piles. However, precipitation is a severe problem in uncovered grain. Just a 1-inch rain will increase the moisture content of a 1-foot layer of corn by 9 percentage points. This typically leads to the loss of at least 2 feet of grain on the pile surface. Snow on the pile may melt and wet the grain, or it is mixed with the grain during unloading. If creating outdoor piles: Use a cover to prevent water infiltration. A combination of restraining straps and suction from the aeration system holds grain covers in place. Aeration and wind blowing on the pile will not dry wet grain adequately to prevent spoilage. Place the pile so the storage floor is higher than the surrounding ground to minimize moisture transfer from the soil into the grain and assure that there is good drainage around the pile.
