ANOVA Family Health Center Offers Rapid COVID-19 Drive-Thru Testing

The ANOVA Family Health Center, 301 12th St SE, Watford City, ND, has been offering COVID-19 drive-thru testing since March, but more recently,

they have been providing rapid COVID-19 testing. The clinic performs up to 60 tests Monday-Thursday and up to 30 on Fridays.

If someone suspects they have COVID-19, they

Richland Co. COVID-19 Update: 9 Active Cases, 1 Death, 36 Recovered, 46 Total

The Richland County Health Department is announcing additional active cases of COVID-19 in Richland County residents. This brings the total case count to 46. At this time, 36 of the total cases are recovered, 9 are active, with one death. Active case updates are as follows:

Case 46: A female in her 20s who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual was named as a contact to a positive case and was symptomatic.

Case 45: A female in her 50s who is not hospitalized and is isolating at home. The investigation is ongoing and contact tracing has begun. The individual was named as a contact to a positive case and was symptomatic.

The Health Department continues to monitor more than 30 close contacts daily. The Health Department's investigations show that residents could be doing more to follow COVID-19 preventative recommendations, particularly in regard to not going out when sick, staying home after being tested, and avoiding large gatherings.

It is imperative that Richland County residents follow instructions from the Health Department and healthcare providers. The following are important reminders:

 If you are not feeling well, particularly including symptoms of a dry cough, fever, shortness of breath, headache, and other cold-like symptoms, stay home until you feel better. This means that you do not go to work, do not attend regular activities, and cancel or postpone appointments.

 If you have been tested for COVID-19 for any reason, including preoperative testing, you must stay home until test results are received. This means that you do not go to work, do not attend regular activities, and cancel or postpone appointments.

 All residents should be practicing social distancing, including limiting the number of close contacts. This means avoiding large gatherings where social distancing is difficult. Wear a mask as required and when social distancing

Together we can slow the spread of COVID-19 in our community. Please do your part so Richland County can recover socially and economically from this pandemic.

can schedule a time to be tested by giving the clinic a call. "When they call the clinic, we do a North Dakota Department of Health intake on them. Once that is complete, we input the information into our computer system and schedule a time to come through our drive-thru testing facility," explained Dori Sparby, ANOVA Family Health Center Clinic Manager.

When patients arrive, Dr. Anita Pedersen DNP, FNP-BC, comes out in full PPE, goes over paperwork with the patient, and then swabs the inside of the patient's nostrils. "The sample is then processed with our machine: this process takes around 15 minutes. Once we have the results, the patient is called and informed of their results, and then we send the results to the North Dakota Department of Health," added Sparby.

ANOVA staff members are dedicated to serving not only the Watford City community but the Northwestern region of North Dakota. Sparby said, "Prior to ANO-VA performing drive-thru testing, Dr. Anita Pedersen had been doing research and had our clinic and staff preparing for it by obtaining PPE and cleaning supplies. Once we began testing, Pedersen lived in the clinic for almost six weeks to make sure that she did not take anything home to her family members as some have un-

derlying health conditions."

Sparby explained that the goal of testing is to try and limit the spread of COVID-19. She said, "We recommend that everyone, even if they have a negative test but are sick, that they stay home for at least 48 hours or until they are symptom-free. We continue to recommend social distancing, wearing masks in social settings, and washing your hands.



Animatronic Pets Are Coming To RMC

Picture this. A dementia resident in her late 70s wakes in the middle of the night confused. She begins to frantically search in a panic for a loved one. In this situation, it can be difficult to put her mind at ease because she is in the late stages of dementia. The nurse redirects her by placing a 'cat' in her arms and she immediately begins to pet it. Otis looks like a cat. His

orange, tabby fur feels soft. He purrs, licks his paws and even rolls over for a good belly scratch. But Otis isn't a cat. He's a robot designed to interact with and bring joy to patients who suffer from varying stages of Alzheimer's, dementia and other cognitive decline.

Roosevelt Medical Center recently received a grant from the Roosevelt County Community Foundation to purchase animatronic cats and a dog to enable RMC to begin developing a pet therapy pro-

Roosevelt Medical Center has

long considered turning to robotic therapy pets to soothe the agitation, depression, anxiety, and isolation that often accompany dementia and Alzheimer's. With the recent grant funding RMC received, plans are now underway to kick off the program with a goal of providing "pets" to the residents that will be available to them 24/7.

"With the visitation restrictions we currently have to enforce as part of our safety measures to keep the residents and patients in our facility safe, these "pets" couldn't have arrived at a better time," said Amy Petersen, RMC social services director. They are helping to provide comfort,

companionship and joy," Petersen added.

So far, a total of three cats have been purchased. The dog they want to order will not be available for a few months.

Pets will be included in weekly reminiscing activities and available to all patients who desire to have a pet with them throughout the day or night.

Whether the "pet" is alive or animatronic makes

no difference. Both have been shown to be beneficial with improving mood, providing calming effects, decreasing agitation, improving nutrition, increasing social interaction, and physical activity. They can also create a sense of purpose and motivation.

"For the residents, a pet provides new opportunities to communicate, connect, give and receive affection and be a caregiver themselves, an active and empowering role often lost with these disorders," said Vickie Grimsrud, RMC activity director. "Being around an animal has a soothing effect. Animals are the perfect companion for the individual with disorders that prevent them from identifying or communicating with people," Grimsrud added.

Animatronic pets can greatly reduce a patient's risk for falls too. They pro-

vide a reason to remain sitting and help keep the patient's mind and motor-skills busy and focused on the feel of the animal as well as the comfort it brings.

"Implementing pet therapy at RMC will enhance the quality of life for the patients who cannot care for a live animal but who would greatly benefit from the socialization and love they provide," Grimsrud commented.


The \$1,000 grant will

Reynolds Market A Unique **Work Environment**

Reynolds Market is one of the most popular stops in Sidney, and store officials believe part of the reason is because of the high quality of their employees.

Reynolds offers a good

variety of positions including cashiers, stockers, deli employees, bakery staff and meat cutters.

"When I interview people, I like to make it unique," Loren Kutzler, Reynolds Market store manager, said. "I like to visit and see where they might fit

A personality trait that is required at Reynolds is for employees to be outgoing.

"The one thing you need to be is friendly," Kutzler said. He noted about 3,000 people come to the store each day so it would be difficult to be bashful.

Guest Opinion: Would We **Defend Our Courthouse From Riots And Firebombing?**

We should tolerate firebombing federal courthouses in Portland no more than we would tolerate firebombing the law and justice center in Sidney. Both house our courtrooms. We bring our

cases to both places. Remember the irrigation case? It would have abolished irrigation here. We were heard before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in one of the federal courthouses in Portland. We won a reversal in that building that saved our way of life.

That is not an isolated case. I took an appeal for Richland County to defend our county revenues against oil companies and railroads. We were heard before the Ninth Circuit in a federal courthouse in Portland. We won a reversal in that building which saved resources for the betterment of our community.

Those are our cases in our courthouses.

What happens when riots attack the courthouse for more than two months? The courts cannot do their business. The business is our business. It is our cases, our irrigation, our county revenues. The riots are against us.

Suppose all the things that are happening at the Mark O. Hatfield federal courthouse in Portland were happening at our law and justice center that houses our district court, youth court, justice court, and small claims court? Our state court cases go there. Our federal court appeals go to Portland and San Francisco.

Would we defend our law and justice center against pipe bombs, improvised explosive devices, Molotov cocktails, commercial mortar fireworks, flares, and other incendiaries? We would stop rioters from trapping people inside the building and trying to set it on fire? Would we accept outside law enforcement help if our local law enforcement was outnumbered and facing projectiles of concrete, brick, metal, glass, wood, rocks, and frozen water bottles? Would we accept police tactical responses to attacks with bleach, hockey sticks, golf clubs, power tools, sledge hammers, metal spikes, and lasers. In Portland alone, three officers have been blinded permanently by rioters using

lasers. The explosion of one device that struck the front door of the Hatfield courthouse was both heard and felt over a block away. Suppose you heard that and felt it in Sidney. What would you think is the right response?

What is all this rioting adding up to? A local television station's website in the Twin Cities catalogued the destroyed buildings in just those two cities documenting names and addresses. So far it is over 1500. Businesses have been ruined permanently. Jobs have been lost permanently. Neighborhoods have become uninsurable and unpoliceable. In Seattle's CHAZ/CHOP rebellion, innocent bystanders have been shot. Some have been killed. Emergency medical responders were prevented from serving. Citizens had to improvise transport to a hospital.

It is time for us to stop looking at this as somebody else's problem in a faraway place. This is our problem, our business, and our responsibility. It is our courthouse where we conduct our business and where our judiciary maintains our free republic. Burn down the courts and you won't have a country.







Never Leave A Child Alone In A Car..."Not Even For A Minute"!

The Montana Children's Trust Fund's (MT CTF) "Not Even for a Minute" Campaign encourages parents and caregivers to never leave children unattended in or around vehicles. Leaving a child alone in a vehicle for even a short amount of time can lead to heatstroke. dehydration, overheating, hyperthermia, injury, abduction and even death.

"This is an issue that needs the close attention of all parents and caregivers to prevent these tragedies from occurring," said "Not Even for a Minute" Campaign organizer Melissa Lavinder, MT CTF.

Since 1998, a total

of 863 U.S. children have died of heatstroke in hot cars - 14 this year to date. On average, one child dies from heatstroke in a vehicle nearly every 10 days in the United States. A total of 52 children died from heat-

stroke in 2019. "Temperatures in cars skyrocket quickly, and if left in a hot vehicle, a young child's body temperature may increase three to five times as quickly as an adult's, 80% of the increase occurring in the first 10 minutes," Lavinder said.

Lavinder said cracking windows, even to eight inches, has minimal effect on the temperature inside a car and the vehicle can reach very dangerous temperatures within just a few

minutes. On a 73° day, the internal vehicle temperature can reach 90°F within 10 minutes and nearly 100°F within 20 minutes

In these extreme conditions, children can die or suffer a permanent injury. In fact, children have died from heatstroke in cars at temperatures as low as 60°, 88% of children who have died from vehicular heatstroke are age three or younger.

"Believe it or not, routines and distractions have caused people to mistakenly leave children in cars," Lavinder said.

Some of the trends for vehicular heatstroke deaths

· About 46% of the time when a child was forgotten, the caregiver meant to drop the child off at a daycare or preschool.

· Thursdays and Fridays - the end of the workweek - have had the highest deaths.

· Nearly 75% of children who are forgotten and die are under 2 years old. In order to prevent

these car accidents, follow these safety tips.

· Make your child as visible as possible.

· Place your purse, briefcase, or whatever is to be carried from the car in the back seat with your child.

 Set a reminder on your cell phone or computer to be sure you dropped your child off at day care.

· Ask your childcare provider to call you if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.

Use drive-through

convenience provided by banks, restaurants, and other businesses.

 Pay at the gas pump. Prevent trunk entrapment and other accidents.

 Teach your children the dangers of a car and let them know that it is not a toy or playground.

· Always lock your car, even at home, and remind your friends and neighbors to do the same.

· Put your keys in a safe and secure place out of children's reach.

· Check vehicles and

car trunks immediately when a child is missing.

If you see an unattended child in a car, dial 911 immediately and follow the instructions that emergency personnel provide. EMS professionals are trained to determine if a child is in trouble.



Turn Your Backyard Into A Safe Space For Healthy Play

(BPT) - As Americans across the country retreat to their homes to help slow the spread of COVID-19, many are rediscovering the value of their yards as places to take in fresh air, engage their children in outdoor games and enjoy physical activity in a safe environment.

Three tips for safe, healthy outdoor fun for the family:

Unplugging and stepping outside can be good for the whole family's physical and mental health. Consider these three tips as you explore ways to take advantage of the green space around your home.

Now is a great time for some DIY spring maintenance to get your lawn ready for summer and the likely heavier-than-usual use it will see as you spend more time at home. To create a lush, healthy, low-maintenance lawn that is summer-ready, follow these spring lawn care tips from the experts at Grass Seed USA, a coalition of American grass seed

farmers and turf specialists.

Interseed for a thicker lawn. Lawns that are sparse or have worn patches coming out of winter can be interseeded when the soil warms up in the spring. In addition to enhancing the overall appearance of the lawn, interseeding will help keep turf dense, which is a natural defense to keeping pesky weeds out.

Simply rake away lawn debris or accumulated thatch, broadcast seed widely or target bare spots on your lawn and irrigate regularly until the seed germinates. Be sure to use a high-quality seed that is a good match for your geographic region and your lawn's soil type, sun exposure and irrigation patterns. Seed can be ordered online and shipped directly to your home from most home improvement retailers.

Water deeply and infrequently. Rather than irrigating lightly every day, begin to water more deeply, only once or twice a week, which will encourage strong root growth and make for a hardier lawn in the summer. Most turf grasses will stay vigorous if they receive about 1 inch of water per week, including rainfall (and drought-tolerant species such as tall fescue do well on even less).

Mow early and leave the grass taller. Start mowing your lawn before it gets too tall. Scalping an overgrown lawn will stress the plants and potentially cause problems all season long, so make sure you never cut off more than one-third of the grass blade height at a time. A good rule of thumb for most species is to mow when the grass reaches a height of about 3 inches. That means you can cut it to 2 inches - or you can even leave it a little taller to protect the growing point at the base of the blade and improve your lawns wear tolerance.

Feed your lawn. Grasscycling - leaving the clippings on the lawn after you mow and allowing them to decompose - can save you time and provide up to 25% of your lawn's fertilizer needs. To meet the rest of your turf's nutrient requirements, you'll likely need to fertilize in the spring and fall. The spring application should be relatively light and should feature slow-release nitrogen fertilizer to avoid causing rapid but weak growth, which can make the lawn less durable.

If you're among the many Americans seeking activities for energetic kids, suddenly finding time for long-delayed home improvement projects, or just needing a breath of fresh air, step out the backdoor and take advantage of your home's lawn. By engaging in a few DIY spring lawn projects now, your lawn will be ready no matter what summer brings!



On Motorcycles"

In order to reduce motorcycle crashes and save more lives, Richland County Injury Prevention/ DUI Task Force and Richland County Health Department is teaming up with the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to launch a new "Get Up to Speed on Motorcycles" safety campaign to help save lives on our roadways.

According to NHTSA, motorcyclists accounted for 13.6% of all traffic fatalities in 2018, while motorcycles make up just 3% of all registered vehicles in the United States. In 2018, 4,985 motorcyclists were killed in motor vehicle crashes, a 4.7% decrease from 2017 when 5,229 motorcyclists were killed and more than 89,000 injured in motor vehicle crashes. To give you a more local view, in Montana 22 motorcyclists were killed in 2019. As of the writing of this report, July 28-2020, 18 motorcyclists have lost their lives this year alone in motor vehicle crashes. Folks, if we keep this trend up we are in danger of breaking the 10-year high death toll for motorcyclist of 34 in 2013. As a state, our average for the last 10 years is 23 deaths, with the lowest being 17 in 2016.

Anyone who rides a motorcycle will tell you how vehicle drivers can unintentionally become huge dangers to their safety. By gaining a basic understanding of motorcyclists' riding behavior, motorists can drive more safely when motorcyclists are on the road with them.

With thousands of deaths each year, motorcyclists are overrepresented in crashes and fatalities. Per vehicle mile traveled, motorcyclists are 27 times more likely than passenger vehicle occupants to die in a motor vehicle crash. and 5 times more likely to be injured.

Even the smallest momentary lapse in awareness by a motorist can result in the death of an unseen motorcyclist. Misunderstanding, misjudging or overlooking a motorcycle can cost someone his or her life. We hope this new "Get Up to Speed on Motorcycles" safety campaign will help both motorists and motorcyclists begin to understand the driving behaviors that can help keep all of us safe.

Data shows the most harmful event for motorcycles involved in fatal crashes were collisions with motor vehicles in transport. Because they are small and have greater maneuverability than cars and trucks, motorcycles can be difficult to see or spot on the roadway, and motorists have difficulty judging their distance and speed. Motorists making left turns at intersections are one of the most common causes of motorcycle crashes, due to motorists' difficulty judging the distance and speed of motorcycles.

A motorcyclist's slowing/braking is not always obvious to motorists. Motorcycles decelerate faster than vehicles, so motorcyclists will often downshift instead of applying the brake, especially when driving around a curve. This means the brake lights will not be engaged to signal motorists of deceleration or an upcoming stop. You can tune in to the Health Department's Face Book page over the next couple weeks for eight short clips about the "Get Up to Speed on Motorcycles" safety campaign.

"Get Up To Speed Cool Off This Summer Exploring North Dakota's Refreshing Waters

The perfect complement to a sunny, hot summer day is by getting out on the cool waters of North Dakota's lakes and rivers. Water lovers have their choices: Escape the crowd in one of Lake Sakakawea's many bays; take a thrilling kayak ride down the Missouri River from Garrison Dam to Bismarck; slowly canoe the Little Muddy Canoe Trail east of Williston; traverse the Red River separating North Dakota from Minnesota; or boat around Devils Lake or Lake Metigoshe with the wind blowing through your hair.

Once you leave any of the boat launches on 180-milelong Lake Sakakawea, you might not see another soul all day, if that's how you want it. Pull into a bay to swim. tan, fish, ski, picnic and watch an occasional sailboat drift by. Or if you're so inclined, open the throttle for a run up or down the lake to enjoy lunch at a state park

Devils Lake is known as a fishing destination, but it's much more than that. The largest natural lake in North Dakota is brimming with resorts that offer boat rentals for a day of fishing or just plain old boating. Channel your inner explorer and kayak the steady current of the Missouri River, just like Lewis and Clark. Put in below Garrison Dam and follow the current to Fort Mandan at Washburn – reconstructed home of the

Corps of Discovery - and on to Cross Ranch State Park. Come ashore for a night under the stars in a yurt, cabin or tent. Then it's on to Bismarck-Mandan. Don't have a canoe or transportation? Don't worry; Cross Ranch can set you up with both.

Other options: Paddle the gently flowing Sheyenne River within forested Fort Ransom State Park. Rentals and shuttles are available and lodging includes full-service yurts.

Explore the twisting Red River at Fargo and see how many species of birds flitter through or nest in the trees along the banks.

Jamestown Reservoir has seven boat launches, from which to launch in. Paddle out to the Island by Lakeside Marina for 24 holes of disc golf.



When Is The Best Time To Plant?

One of the most common questions we receive at the nursery is, "When is the best time to plant?" As I write this, the month of July is drawing to a close and we'll soon be into August. It's surprising just how fast this summer has gone! The month of August usually has us starting to think about school and a return to our "indoor" environments. We are also approaching THE best time to plant ANYTHING that is a "perennial" planting.

For those of you who've forgotten what a "perennial" is, I'll give you just a brief reminder. A "perennial" plant is known to last for an extended period of time. Examples of such items would be; trees, shrubs, certain lawn grasses, and other non-woody plants. You might also think about the gardening term

"annual". Remember that and then rest. the annual only exists for ONE season. They flower to produce their seeds, so the seeds can sprout next year and the next generation can

The best time to plant ANYTHING that is a "year after year" or "perennial" plant, is actually the fall. Up here in Northeast Montana and Northwest North Dakota, we are accustomed to a "grain-growing" mentality. Most of those crops we grow are annuals. These crops only live for a season. They are planted in the spring and harvested in the fall. While not ALL agricultural crops are this way, many that we think of, are.

Since this is what we are accustomed to we have to train our minds to the concept of "perennials". Like annuals, perennial plants do not grow "all the time" either. They grow for a season

Spring: In the spring these plants burst forth with all kinds of new growth, putting forth leaves in all kinds of ways, eager to feed and strengthen themselves for another season. Providing ample and consistent water in the spring of the year will mean more and more vibrant new growth for these plants. The spring season is also a time for fertilizing these plants. A consistent dose of fertilizer or nutrients will mean good strong and healthy leaves. These leaves will then become the home of the plant's "production" and source of food. The roots carry the water up to the leaves where the leaves take in the sun and use the light and water to produce food. That food is then sent down the plants' stems and back to the roots. These plants will continue to produce new growth until mid-summer.

Summer: At or around the 4th of July most of these plants stop producing new leaves and instead begin to focus their energy back into the roots for winter storage. At this time, certain fertilizer blends can be "unhelpful" in our northern climate as they can focus the plant BACK into the production of leaves when they really should be starting to prepare for winter.

Fall: Why then is the fall the best time to plant? Well, one primary reason is that these perennial plants suffer less stress during this time of year. Anytime you plant something in a new space you disturb the roots by moving it. This means some minor "transplant shock" for the plant. Transplant shock is a fancy term for minor damage that occurs to roots. When the roots are disturbed it can make it difficult for these plants to feed their leaves and thus difficult for

the leaves to produce the food that the plants need.

Spring plantings often mean transplant shock during a time when the plant will have to endure the most stress, the hot part of the summer. Droopy or wilted leaves can often evidence this. During hot summer months make sure your plants do not have a lack of moisture available to them.

Planting in the fall moves the transplant shock to a time period that is generally much cooler. Temperatures in mid-August to early September are often much milder than they are in July.

In addition to temps being cooler, it is also a time when the soil is starting to cool off as well. Warm temperatures in summer can warm up the soil to temperatures above 60° making root development challenging as many of the organisms in the soil that help plants

do not perform favorably to temperatures that are well above 60°F.

The Short Answer: So as some of you might be thinking, "get to the point". I will! The best way to determine when to plant in a climate is to look at your "First Average Frost Date". You then want to walk that date backward by 6-8 weeks. This puts those of us in North Dakota and Montana at the dates of Aug. 15 to around Sept. 15. Planting at this time of year allows for plenty of good root development before winter and you also keep transplant shock to a minimum during the hot
