Sidney Native Begins Coyote Wrestling Season with High Expectations

1994 Eagles graduate, Chuck Rossol, begins his first season as head coach for the Williston Coyote wrestling team with high expectations of bringing home hardware. Rossol wrestled for Eagles coach, Guy Melby, until he graduated in 1994 and then wrestled as a walk on for South Dakota State University.

He admits he's been put in charge of a dedicated and very talented group of young men that are "Poised to make a pretty good run at the State Finals," which are scheduled to take place in Fargo, February 14th – February 16th.

Williston has approximately 35 young men wrestling varsity & junior varsity this year, with the majority of them being seniors and freshman. Rossol is anticipating many of the seniors to "Have the year of their lives on the mat, including a strong possibility for several champions." Rossol proudly comments, "They've been working hard all summer and every one of them is very eager to hit the mats."

The juniors and sophomores are the two smallest groups, but there is a lot of toughness in the two and a few of these wrestlers have some quality varsity experience. Rossol expects a couple of these hard workers to earn their way near the top of the stand this year.

The freshmen make up the second largest group. They're tough, hungry and putting in as much time on the mats and in the weight room as their dedicated predecessors.

With several teams out there having the same goals in mind as Rossol's Coyotes, he remains optimistic and has great expectations for his team. "These young men have worked very hard to be where they are and to achieve their

goals. I think they will continue to work and continue to improve, and will win some very big matches this year. I look forward to helping them realize their goals."



Symposium for Montana/ Wyoming Barley and Sugarbeet Growers Set for Jan. 9 & 10

The 2013 Montana/ Wyoming Sugar Beet Symposium will be held in Billings at the Big Horn Resort on Wednesday and Thursday, January 9-10, 2013.

The symposium will feature top experts from Montana State University, University of Wyoming, North Dakota State University and Kansas State University, the federal Agricultural Research Service (from Sidney and Kimberly, Idaho stations), as well as from private industry. There will also be a trade show with exhibits by many agricultural input sup-

Wednesday's program will focus on malt barley production, irrigation, grain storage, and corn genetics for dry-land and irrigated growers, pulse crops and crop protection (including managing weed, disease and insect pests of corn, dry beans, and wheat grown in rotation with sugarbeets and barley).

There will be presentations by faculty from Montana State University, University of Wyoming, Pioneer Hi-Bred, North Dakota State University and Kansas State University. Meteorologist John Pulaski will present a 2013 weather outlook.

On Wednesday there will be a sponsored soup and sandwich lunch at noon.

On Thursday, following a 6:30 a.m. breakfast sponsored by the Billings Chamber of Commerce, presentations will focus on sugarbeet production, including fertility, irrigation, new genetics, new equipment, plus insect, weed and disease management.

Ruthann Geib, vice president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association will present a Washington update, as well as updates on the use of Roundup-ready sugarbeets and other issues affecting the future of the sugarbeet

There will be a forum on control of rhizoctonia crown and root rot and a presentation by Carl Strausbaugh on effects of virus diseases on sugarbeet storage.





Donated steers will be used to raise funds for establishing and maintaining an Ag Ambassador program to help recruit and maintain enrollment for the WSC agriculture program and advocate for agriculture.

By donating a steer at weaning time and you'll be providing educational opportunities for students which include:

- * Brand release process
- * Processing change of ownership

ND Unfilled Doe Licenses No Longer Valid

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department reminds deer hunters who did not fill an antlerless lottery license during the deer gun season, that these licenses are not valid during the upcoming muzzleloader season, or the remainder of the archery season.

For several years prior to 2012, hunters with unfilled concurrent season antlerless licenses could continue hunting during the muzzleloader season, using a muzzleloader. Similarly, hunters could also use a bow during the remainder of the archery season to fill these licenses.

All hunters were limited to one deer gun license this year. Since there are no concurrent season licenses, there is no provision to use an unfilled license to continue hunting during the muzzleloader or archery season. Only hunters with muzzleloader, archery or unfilled gratis licenses can participate in those respective seasons.





Be Cautious of Early Ice

Winter anglers are encouraged to consider early ice conditions before traveling onto and across North Dakota lakes.

Keep in mind:

Snow insulates ice, hampering solid ice formation, and makes it difficult to check thickness. Snow also hides the blemishes, such as cracked, weak and open water areas.

Avoid cracks, pressure ridges, slushy or darker areas that signal thinner ice.

The same goes for ice that forms around partially submerged trees, brush, embankments or other structures.

Ice thickness is not consistent and can vary significantly even in a small area. Ice shouldn't be judged by appearance alone. Anglers should drill test holes as they make their way out on the lake, and an ice chisel should be used to check ice thickness while moving around.

temperature changes cause ice to expand and contract, affecting its strength.

The following minimums are recommended for travel on clear-blue lake ice formed under ideal conditions. However, early in the winter it's a good idea to double these figures to be safe: 4 inches for a group walking single file; 6 inches for a snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle; 8-12 inches for an automobile: and 12-15 inches for a pickup/truck.

These tips could help

Wear a personal flotation device and carry a cell phone.

Carry ice picks or a set of screwdrivers to pull yourself back on the ice if you fall through.

If someone breaks through the ice, call 911 immediately. Rescue attempts should employ a long pole, board, rope, blanket or snowmobile suit. If that's not possible, throw the victim a life jacket, empty water jug or other buoyant object. Go to the victim as a last resort, but do this by forming a human chain where rescuers lie on the ice with each person holding the feet of the person in front.

To treat hypothermia, replace wet clothing with dry clothing and immediately transport victim to a hospital.

North Dakota Winter Fishing Regulations

North Dakota anglers are encouraged to refer to the 2012-14 North Dakota Fishing Guide or the State Game and Fish Department's website for winter fishing regulations.

In addition, anglers can access the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov, for an extensive list of fishing questions and answers, and a

winter fishing preview from which no more than two North Dakota Outdoors magazine.

Some winter fishing regulations include:

A maximum of four poles is legal for ice fishing. However, when fishing a water body where both open water and ice occur at the same time, an angler is allowed a maximum of four poles, of poles can be used in open water.

Tip-ups are legal, and each tip-up is considered a single pole.

There is no restriction on the size of the hole in the ice while fishing. When a hole larger than 10 inches in diameter is left in the ice, the area in the immediate vicinity must be marked with a natural object. See regulations for more information..

It is only legal to release fish back into the water immediately after they are caught. Once a fish is held in a bucket or on a stringer, they can no longer be legally released in any water.

It is illegal to catch fish and transport them in water.

It is illegal to leave fish, including bait, behind on the

Depositing or leaving any litter or other waste material on the ice or shore is illegal.

Any dressed fish to be transported, if frozen, must be packaged individually. Anglers are not allowed to freeze fillets together in one large block. Two fillets count as one fish.

The daily limit is a limit of fish taken from midnight to midnight, and no person may possess more than one day's limit of fish while actively engaged in fishing. The possession limit is the maximum number of fish that an angler may have in his or her possession during a fishing trip of more than one day.



DPHHS Diabetes Project Promotes Healthy Lifestyle Changes To Prevent Type 2 Diabetes

Diabetes affects nearly 26 million Americans and an estimated 79 million adults are at risk for developing the disease. In Montana, diabetes affects more than 62,000 adults. It is estimated that 270,000 adult Montanans have pre-diabetes, which is a risk factor for type 2 diabetes. Type 2 diabetes can be prevented or onset delayed by lifestyle changes.

The Montana Diabetes Project and National Diabetes Education Program (NDEP) are Changing the Way Diabetes is Treated by working together to help people better understand how to make the necessary changes in their day-to-day life in order to prevent type 2 diabetes or manage their diabetes to prevent complications, and live healthier lives.

"Even if you know what to do to improve your health,

figuring out how to do it and fitting it into your daily routine can be a big challenge," said Anna Whiting Sorrell, Director of the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services. "That's why it's important to set goals and make a plan to prevent type 2 diabetes or manage diabetes to prevent complications."

The Montana Diabetes Project is working with diabetes educators and the NDEP to help people make a change to live well by bringing behavior change tools to the community to help people better understand how to make healthy changes in their day-to-day life.

So how do Montanans get started making these healthy changes? According to Sarah Brokaw of the Montana Diabetes Project, it's about choosing a goal and working toward it. The NDEP's "Make a Plan" is a great tool that can help and is available at www.diabetes.mt.gov

"Once a plan is in place, the NDEP provides a number of tools to help people reach their goals," Brokaw said. "Whether it's to eat healthier, be more active, lose weight, or cope better with stress and emotions, the NDEP offers tools and resources to help."

For more personalized assistance, Brokaw states Montana diabetes educators can also help tailor specific plans. Local diabetes educators can be reached by contacting local hospitals or

online at www.diabetes.mt.gov.

For those at risk for type 2 diabetes, the Montana Cardiovascular Disease and Diabetes Prevention Program is a 10-month program available at 15 sites across Montana and at several telehealth sites in southeast Montana. This evidence-based program has been shown to reduce the risk of diabetes by 58 percent and improve lives through simple lifestyle changes.

But I digress. My primary point in sharing the actions of that student group is not to point out that Christians and the things we hold dear are considered fair game in today's public square. My point is to remind you that there is no Christian man or woman that can escape others' ability to doubt or to denounce them.

Because of that, this is the challenge I would lay in front of you today. Forget the Christians you have known. Some of those Christians (like a Mother Teresa) you may hold in very high regard. If that is the case, I am grateful. There may be others who claim to be Christian whom you hold in utter disdain, as idiots, scoundrels, or hypocrites. If that is the case, let me offer my regrets. (There are many, I can tell you, who believe those words describe me.)

But forget the Christians you've known. Forget the laity, forget the pastors who have served you poorly or who have served you well. Forget me. Instead, consider Jesus. Don't consider Him on the basis of those who confess Him, even if they are like Mother Teresa. Like her, they can be doubted or dismissed. Consider Jesus on

the basis of His own claims about Himself.

Consider Jesus on the basis of His promises. Regarding His exclusive nature to be the access to heaven, consider Jesus' claim, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; No one comes to the Father, but by me." Consider Jesus' claim to be and to do what no man can possibly be or do: "I am the Good Shepherd. I lay down my life for the sheep. I give eternal life to them, and they shall never perish. And no one shall

snatch them out of my hand." Consider Jesus on the basis of His promise to you: "Lo, I am with you always." Consider Jesus on the basis of what He said on the cross about the guilt that separates you from God: "Father, forgive them," and "It is finished."

Take your eyes off the Christians you know. Even if you respect them, others will find reasons to denounce them. If there are Christians whom you don't respect, who have turned you away from the Christian faith, don't let

their error or weakness keep you from getting in the ring and wrestling with the One who claimed to fulfill all of God's promises for you,

But be warned. When you take your eyes off of Christians and place them on Jesus, when you wrestle with the claims and promises that Jesus makes, those claims and promises may just break you. If they do, as was the case for Mother Teresa, nothing will ever again be the same.



ANS Prevention in Winter

North Dakota ice anglers are reminded that regulations designed to reduce the spread of aquatic nuisance species also apply in winter.

It's important to reiterate that only legal live bait can be transported in water in a container up to five gallons. Both game and nongame species cannot be transported in water, although a daily catch can be packed in snow.

Other simple methods to prevent winter ANS introductions are:

Do not use illegally imported baits.

Do not empty a bait bucket into any water body.

Do not drop plant fragments into the water.

Dispose any unused bait into the trash.
