Dollar Deli Opens At Cartwright Water Depot

Time is money but food is a necessity. For people on the move along North Dakota Highway 200, a delicious, quick meal is now available at the Dollar Deli located at the Cartwright Water Depot. Owner Matthew Bondie, his sons, Nathan and Nicholas, and cousin, Dave Pollack, recently arrived from northern Michigan to "feed some hungry truckers".

Matthew has always been involved with food, from being a cook in the Marine Corps, to training as a sous chef in France and Italy, to being a chef in Detroit. "Once it's in your blood, it's hard to get out," he said. His concession trailer was custom built, designed to provide food primarily at charity events in Michigan. The entire family has been in the military, so many of the events were associated with the armed forces. Being familiar with brutal winters, Matthew also added a dining car where customers can stay warm while they wait for their order. The facility is licensed and inspected.

Everything at the Dollar Deli is prepared fresh, using the

pork and tender ribs. "All our sandwiches are ½ lb. sandwiches," Matthew explained. Add a side of fries, or a steaming hot bowl of chili or chicken noodle soup. For a different taste treat, try their chili spaghetti.

The Dollar Deli also offers a daily special which could be anything from tacos, to BBQ to a turkey dinner.

The men expressed their deep gratitude to Will Berry who owns the property they are set up on. "Drivers getting water at the Cartwright Water Depot can get fed better than at any other depot," Matthew said. They also appreciate John Hutter and his family for being so accommodating.

"We feel like Lewis and Clark," Matthew laughed. "We're on an adventure, it's a family deal, we're feeding truckers. It's all coming together nicely."

Russian Olive Removal Study Focus Of ARS BrownBagger

Russian olive, a popular shelterbelt tree in this region due to its hardiness, also has a darker side. At the USDA-ARS Fort Keogh Livestock and Range Research Laboratory near Miles City, Russian olive has escaped the confines of the shelterbelt and has now invaded thousands of acres of rangeland and riverbank, crowding out native plants and limiting river access with its painful barbs. As a result, its removal has become the focus of a new multi-agency study looking at not only what methods are most effective in getting rid of the tree where it's not wanted, but also at long-term restoration possibilities for impacted areas.

Collaborating in that effort is Sidney ARS Plant Ecologist Erin Espeland who will discuss the new study and its latest findings this coming Friday, March 2, as part of the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Research Laboratory's 2012 BrownBagger series.

Dr. Espeland's presentation begins at noon and is entitled "Getting information from weed eradication: a case study of Russian olive removal at Ft. Keogh". The one-hour session is open to the public.

In describing the study, Espeland says, "It was designed to identify the best Russian olive removal strategy and to determine whether revegetation was necessary and if so, what revegetation practices would work best." According to Espeland, researchers began by distributing a questionnaire to people already battling Russian olive asking what they used and what worked best. The group identified about two dozen different practices from the responses, which they used to develop their own "best practices" strategy, Espeland said. The new strategy was then employed at the Fort Keogh site with impressive results.

"We were very successful in removing Russian olive with our approach," she noted. "We had very, very low resprout rates." According to Espeland, of the thousands of trees removed so far under the study, less than three dozen resprouts have been recorded.

Espeland will share the project's successful removal strategy at Friday's session, as well as discussing other elements of the long-term study, which includes tracking the recovery of rangeland ecosystems where Russian olive was removed as compared to those where no removal was done. Researchers will be observing any changes in the soil, as well as insect, plant and bird life impacts over the 15-year life of the project.

Other collaborators in the study include Sidney ARS Entomologist Kevin Delaney, Miles City ARS Research Leader Dr. Mark Peterson, Miles City NRCS Rangeland Specialist Robert Kilian and representatives of the NRCS Bridger Plant Material Center.

By Jodi McPherson It's nothing new to those living in the Bakken to pay higher gas prices than the rest of Montana and North Dakota. Go east or west and the price of gas is normally on average up to \$.10 lower than the boom towns of eastern Montana and western North Dakota due to the increased demand of the oil industry services.

The crude oil price rose in recent weeks because of increased tensions and fears of an Iranian supply cut. Gas prices have been rising because of the soaring oil prices. Surprisingly, oil prices fell below \$109 a barrel for crude on Monday but the price we pay at the pump increased as much as \$.11 in some areas.

Automotive group AAA

says Montana gas prices are up \$.12 and North Dakota prices are up \$.06 from last week. Prices at the pump are as low as \$2.99 for regular unleaded in Billings and \$2.89 in Wyoming. Go east to Minot, prices are \$3.49 for regular unleaded.

While still lower than the national average, gas prices in eastern Montana rose \$.10 from last week to \$3.59 for

regular unleaded. Williston gas prices are at \$3.49 for regular unleaded. Although fuel supplies remain plentiful in most of the country, gas prices have been rising daily for the 20th day in a row.

AAA says Montana's prices are about \$.45 lower than the national average. AAA North Dakota says gas prices in the state are now \$.23 higher than they were a month ago and \$.18 higher than a year ago.

If you want to save some money at the pumps, AAA said the best way to avoid higher gas prices is to fill up early in the week. An increased demand through the week and fuel delivery schedules make fuel prices higher later in the week.

The usage and pricing of gasoline results from factors such as crude oil prices, processing and distribution costs, local demand, the strength of local economies and the availability of local sources of gasoline suppliers.

Taking all that into account, gasoline prices really aren't high right now. In fact, they are actually unusually low but because of this year's election coming up politicians would like us to believe they are high. Gasoline prices would have to rise by another \$.65-.75 per gallon from where they are now just to be "normal".



Each year in the United States, over 156,000 playground injuries occur resulting in 15 fatalities. Making sure North Dakota's playgrounds are safe for our children is the responsibility of owners, operators, designers, manufacturers and all other caretakers. To help schools, daycares, parks and recreation agencies, and others ensure their playground hazards are minimized, the North Dakota Recreation & Park Association (NDRPA) is offering its 10th annual Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI) course April 10-12 in Bismarck.

This two-day course provides participants the opportunity to learn about the latest developments in playground safety through classroom instruction and hands-on site investigation, as well as the chance to become a certified playground safety inspector by successfully completing an exam on the third day. 

Girl Scout Organization Celebrates 100 Years

By Lois Kerr This year the Girl Scouts celebrate 100 years of an organization that builds leadership skills and fosters independent, self-reliant women. The organization dedicates itself to the promise to help people at all times, and to build character, confidence and courage in its membership.

It all started because one self-possessed capable woman who refused to crawl away when times got tough fell in love with the wrong man. Juliette Gordon, a Savannah, GA, debutante, fell madly in love with and married a wealthy British rake, William Mackay Low. Low not only had a lot of money, but unfortunately he also philandered and thought nothing of having extramarital affairs and of flaunting his mistresses in front of Juliette. Eventually abandoned by Low in early 1900, Juliette refused to roll over and play dead. When Low died and left his fortune to his mistress, Juliette fought for and won her share of the estate.

Juliette returned to the U.S. and in time she met Robert Baden-Powell, the man who founded the Boy Scout movement. Intrigued with the scouting movement and with the thought that girls could learn self-sufficiency, good citizenship and become competent people in their own right, in 1910 Juliette founded the Girl Guides organization. The movement, which quickly became hugely popular, encouraged girls to explore their full potential and move beyond the restrictions of the times. Girl Guides promoted the idea that girls could have careers in whatever field they chose, including non-traditional professions such as medicine, architecture and aviation.

In March of 1912, Juliette held a girl guides convention in Savannah and at the convention the organization officially changed its name to Girl Scouts. The rest is history.

Dr. Dirt Special **Remember The Alamo**

I recently visited the great state of Texas. The plan was to take the Amtrak to St. Paul, and then for my brother (Roger) and I to drive down to the San Antonio area. We hoped to see a few new places, play a few rounds of golf, and join up with Father Ned Shinnick, who spends each February in the Canyon Lake area.

The Amtrak provided transportation for the first leg of my journey. I made the 7 pm to 7 am ride from Williston to St. Paul without incident. The "clickety clack" of the rails lulled me into a good night's sleep. My brother's trusty Buick carried us the remainder of the way. The 2000 mile trek took me 3 days. The objective of my travels was to enjoy the journey - and not just the destination.

We met up with Fr. Ned at his motel in the Canyon Lake area. Although the weather in Texas was mostly rainy, we were able to enjoy one day of golfing. My game was extremely rusty. Ned and Roger enjoyed a healthy competition. They did duff a few shots, however, and some of their responses were less than priestly.

We used the rainy days to visit the local tourist attractions. Our trip to the Alamo museum, for example, was very interesting. Although the exact numbers are debated, it has been reported that in 1836 some 189 Texas loyalists held off 1800 Mexican soldiers for 13 days. All of the soldiers (even those who surrendered) died at the hands of Santa Anna's forces. Casualties included Sam Bowie and Davy Crockett. This slaughter generated the slogan "Remember the Alamo". Memory of this defeat rallied the American forces to not only recapture the Alamo, but also to go on winning a series of battles that eventually led to our control of Texas and the entire southwestern portion of our country.

The three of us (Fr. Ned, Roger, and I) also travelled to the town of Fredericksburg. That is where the Admiral Nimitz and George H.W. Bush museums are located. These museums provide very interesting relics and information on the Pacific aspects of World War 2. We learned, for example, that Japanese people strongly believed that "dying for the Emperor" was the most honorable way for a soldier to die. Surrender was regarded as pathetic and dishonorable. That is why historians believe that the war with Japan could have lingered on for years. Thousands more American lives, and millions more Japanese lives, could have been lost - had not President Truman decided to use the atomic bomb to bring the Japanese conflict to an end.

Human beings love to debate these issues. In a similar way, the three of us also debated the rules and fine art of playing pinochle. Fr. Ned has played this card game for many years, and is a veritable expert in this area. He soundly defeated "the Kessler boys" in this competition. Our debate of political issues was a bit more balanced, however, and I believe that Dr. Dirt's opinions prevailed in this arena.

Confirmed Cases Of "Whooping Cough" (Pertussis) In Dawson Co.

The Richland County Health Department would like to inform and provide some prevention information to readers regarding the seven cases of pertussis which have been identified in Dawson County as of Feb. 22.

Pertussis or Whooping cough is a contagious disease caused by a type of bacteria called Bordetella pertussis. These bacteria attach to the cilia (tiny, hair-like extensions) that line part of the upper respiratory system. The bacteria release toxins, which damage the cilia and cause inflammation (swelling)

The disease usually starts with cold-like symptoms and maybe a mild cough or fever. After 1-2 weeks, severe coughing can begin. Unlike the common cold, pertussis can become a series of coughing fits that continues for weeks. Whooping cough can cause severe coughing with a "whooping" sound or severe coughing that

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may lead to difficulty breathing, vomiting and disturbed sleep. The disease can be life threatening for infants and can cause moderate to severe illness in adults. Infants and the elderly may need hospitalization and/or supportive care if the disease is bad enough.

Symptoms

Pertussis (whooping cough) can cause violent and rapid coughing, over and over, until the air is gone from the lungs and you are forced to inhale with a loud "whooping" sound. This extreme coughing can cause vou to throw up and be very tired. The "whoop" is often not there and the infection is generally milder (less severe) in teens and adults, especially those who have been vaccinated.

Early symptoms can last for 1-2 weeks and usually include: runny nose, low-grade fever (generally minimal throughout the course of the disease), mild, occasional cough, apneaa pause in breathing (in infants).

After two weeks, Whooping cough is characterized by one or more of the following symptoms which may last 6-10 weeks: prolonged cough (lasting for a week or more); long spells of coughing with spasms; Coughing with a whooping sound; Coughing that leads to gagging or vomiting.

Symptoms of pertussis usually develop within 7-10 days after being exposed, but sometimes not for as long as 6 weeks. Transmission

Pertussis is a very contagious disease only found in humans and is spread from person to person. It is spread by coughing or sneezing while in close contact with others, who then breathe in the pertussis bacteria. Sick persons are most infectious early in the illness, but ability to pass on the disease may persist for three weeks after

onset of cough. Many infants who get per-

tussis are infected by older siblings, parents or caregivers who might not even know they have the disease.

Pertussis vaccines are very effective in protecting you from disease but no vaccine is 100% effective. When pertussis is circulating in the community. there is a chance that a fully vaccinated person, of any age, can catch this very contagious disease. If you have been vaccinated, the infection is usually less severe. If you or your child develops a cold that includes a severe cough or a cough that lasts for a long time, it may be pertussis. The best way to know is to contact your doctor.

People who have any of the above symptoms should call their health-care provider to be evaluated, tested or treated for whooping cough. People who may have been exposed to a person that was confirmed as having pertussis should call their health care provider for recommendations. People who do not have any symptoms or were not exposed to the infected person do not need to be tested or treated.

Diagnosis

Pertussis can be diagnosed by taking into consideration if you have been exposed to pertussis and by doing a: history of typical signs and symptoms; physical examination; labo-

ing a sample of secretions (with a swab or syringe filled with saline) from the back of the throat through the nose.

Treatment

Pertussis is generally treated with antibiotics and early treatment is very important. Treatment may make your infection less severe if it is started early, before coughing fits begin. Treatment can also help prevent spreading the disease to close contacts (people who have spent a lot of time around the infected person) and is necessary for stopping the spread of pertussis. Treatment after three weeks of illness is unlikely to help because the bacteria are gone from your body, even though you usually will still have symptoms. This is because the bacteria have already done damage to your body.

What can you do?

Remind everyone about the following precautions that are important in decreasing the spread of many illnesses including pertussis (whooping cough): Make sure your immuniza-

tions are up-date. There are two types of whooping cough vaccines - DTaP for infants and children and Tdap for adolescents and adults.

Frequent hand washing with soap and water. Hand washing is one of the best preventive measures, not only for whooping cough, but for all diseases. Using good respiratory

nose with a tissue when sneezing or coughing and throw away the tissue after use. Cough into your sleeve.

Staying home from work or other recreational activities when you're ill. This will help prevent the spread of illness to your friends, co-workers and family.

Because pertussis outbreaks can spread rapidly, health agencies work quickly to investigate each pertussis case. Persons who have close contact with a pertussis case may be treated with antibiotics to prevent illness. Fully vaccinated children and adults are less likely to become ill. If illness occurs in those that are fully vaccinated, the illness is generally milder.

Parents may contact their health-care provider or their local health department if they have questions about themselves or their child's vaccination status.

There are no positive cases in Richland County at this time. As of Feb. 23, the State of Montana has currently 35 confirmed cases. Number of cases for Montana in the past years: 134 cases (unofficial count) for 2011; 122 cases in 2010; 62 cases in 2009; 84 cases in 2008; and 44 cases in 2007.

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

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


