Larson's Impressive Carnival Horse Menagerie

Some people collect coke bottles. Some collect dolls. Some collect tractors or even matchbooks but not Chuck Larson. Chuck collects horses and not just any horses, he collects carnival horses. All around his house stand metal horses of various sizes from 2 to 10 inches. "They call them carnival horses because you used to be able to win them in carnival games," Chuck told me. "You could win a little one, then play some more and trade it in for a larger one." He said it is possible that some of the horses in his collection came from other sources. He has a few he is sure came off ashtrays or clocks and one of William F. Cody and his horse that he was told were sold in his wild west shows.

For Chuck, it all started in 1942. His mother, who was away and taking classes to be a military nurse during WWII, bought a metal cowboy for Chuck's grandfather and sent it to him. When Chuck saw it he figured it needed a metal horse so he bought one for \$5. Little did Chuck know that his collection had begun. The war was over before Chuck's mother could complete her classes and she returned home. Things returned to normal and the years passed. When Chuck's mother passed away in 2004, he inherited the cowboy and horse. He was not sure how to feel. His mother had inherited them when her father died and now they were Chuck's. Then, he began to find some metal horses at yard sales and flea markets, a few at auction, and sometimes people just gave them to him. His sister is always looking for them to help add to his collection. Now, Chuck has about 52 bronze, silver, and gold colored metal horse figurines.

"I call them my little ponies," Chuck said laughingly. They are just a hobby for him, something to hunt for. However, he feels that very first horse is his favorite.

Flu Shot Important for High Risk Groups

Though everyone is at some risk of contracting the flu, there are some people who are at a higher risk of both contracting the flu, and getting serious, flu-related complications.

People who are at high risk of contracting influenza include children younger than 5 years old, and especially those who are younger than 2. Every year, thousands of children are hospitalized due to the flu, and some children die from the flu. Children are more likely to experience serious, often life-threatening influenza complications, including pneumonia and inflammation affecting several different organs. The flu vaccine is available for children 6 months and older.

Adults aged 65 and older, and especially those who reside in nursing homes or another long-term care facility, are also at greater risk of serious flu-related complications. The population 65 years and older typically bear the greatest burden of severe flu illness, accounting for about 75% of flu-related deaths and up to 70% of flu-related hospitalizations. The body’s immune system tends to naturally decline over time, making those aged 65 and older more susceptible to the flu, and less likely to be able to fight it off than younger adults. A high-dose version of the flu shot is available for folks over 65, which is associated with a stronger immune response to fend off the flu and better flu outcomes than with the standard vaccine.

Any person who lives with certain medical conditions, including asthma, neurological conditions, heart disease, lung disease, blood, organ or metabolic disorders, and those with a weakened immune system are also are high risk of flu-related complications. This also includes pregnant women. In these cases, the body’s immune system isn’t as readily available to fight the flu because the body is focused on the medical condition or growing a healthy baby. The flu vaccine is recommended for all pregnant women. Check with your doctor for vaccine recommendations for your specific medical condition.

Likewise, if you are living with or the caretaker for someone who is in any of these categories, protecting yourself from the flu is especially important. The flu virus can be spread when a sick person sneezes, coughs or talks, or spread by surfaces shared by both sick and healthy people, like doorknobs and bathroom faucet handles.

The single most effective way to protect yourself from the flu and flu-related complications is to receive the flu vaccine.

The Richland County Health Department offers the standard flu vaccine for those aged 6 months and older, as well as high-dose vaccine for those aged 65 and older. The Mass Flu Shot Clinic will be held on Thursday, October 4th, from 10AM to 6PM. Private insurance, Medicare and Medicaid will be billed for those who bring their insurance cards. No appointment is needed for the Mass Flu Shot Clinic on October 4th. Clinic paperwork is available on the day of the clinic, or can be downloaded at www.richland.org or on Facebook at www.facebook.com/RichlandCountyHealthDepartment.

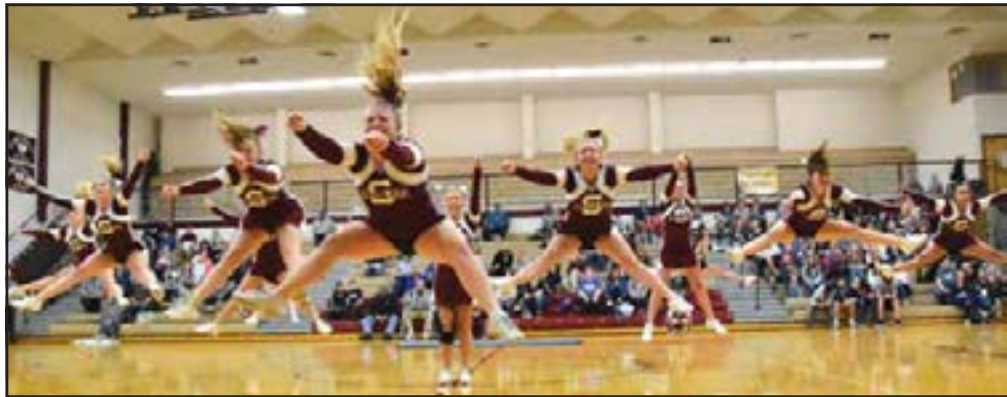

Are You Due for a Mammogram?

Approximately 38% of women in Montana will be diagnosed with cancer, with breast cancer being the most common cancer among women.

Every woman is at risk for breast cancer even if she has no family history or other risk factors for the disease. Breast cancer typically produces no symptoms when the tumor is small and most easily treated, which is why screening is important for early detection. Receiving routine mammograms are the best way to detect breast cancer early, when treatment is more effective.

Women who are 50-74 years old are at the highest risk for breast cancer and should get a mammogram every two years. Women who are 40-49 years old should talk to with a health care provider about when to start and how often to get a mammogram.

Flu Myths...Busted!

There are so many myths about the flu and the flu shot all over the internet, so in preparation for the Mass Flu Shot Clinic at the Richland County Health Department on October 4th, we’ve busted a few myths wide open.

During the 2017-2018 influenza season, Richland County saw 198 confirmed cases of influenza, with infection ranging from age 4 months to 95 years old. Of those, only 34% had received a flu shot.

Many people claim they avoid the flu shot because it makes them sick. However, flu shot vaccine does not contain any live virus, so it actually can’t make you sick with the flu. The vaccine contains inactivated virus, which means that once it’s in your body, your immune system can learn to respond to components of the virus, so that if you do come across the real flu virus, your body will be prepared. Because vaccines are designed to evoke an immune response, it is common to have injection site soreness or a slight fever, but these symptoms shouldn’t last long. The Vaccine Information Sheet, offered either at the beginning or the end of your vaccination clinic visit, explains potential risks and reactions.

Some others say they don’t bother with the flu shot because it’s not effective.

Though the vaccine isn’t 100% effective in avoiding the flu, it will help to avoid hospitalization should you contract influenza. OF the 198 cases of the flu last season in Richland County, 15 people were hospitalized and 3 died from influenza. Getting the annual flu shot can help you minimize the risk of hospitalization and death.

If you’re considering skipping the flu shot this year because you exercise and eat healthy, reconsider your decision. The flu virus doesn’t discriminate, and even healthy people can become infected. The flu virus can be spread when a sick person sneezes, coughs or talks, or spread by surfaces shared by both sick and health people, like doorknobs in public, bathroom faucet handles, and shopping carts. You may lose income due to days off from work, or may face more serious consequences of the flu, such as

hospitalization and death.

There are many reasons to get your flu shot this flu season. If you have questions or need help with the decision to get you and your family vaccinated again the flu, contact the Health Department at 406-433-2207.

Flu shots are available for those 6 months and older at the Richland County Health Department during normal clinic hours, and at the Mass Flu Shot Clinic on Thursday, October 4th, from 10AM to 6PM. Private insurance, Medicare and Medicaid will be billed for those who bring their insurance cards. No appointment is needed for the Mass Flu Shot Clinic on October 4th. Clinic paperwork is available on the day of the clinic, or can be downloaded at www.richland.org/rchd or on Facebook at www.facebook.com/RichlandCountyHealthDepartment.

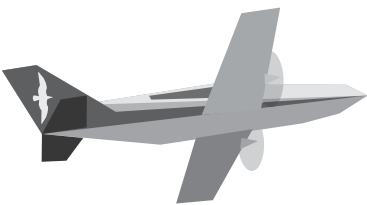

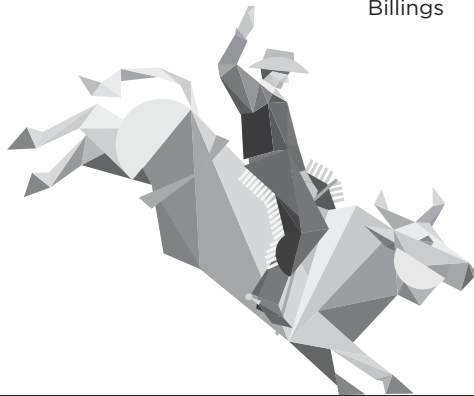
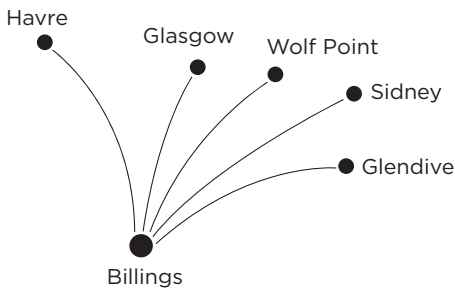

Colon Cancer Screening Kits Available at Flu Clinic

Free at-home colon cancer screening test kits will be available for those who are eligible at the Mass Flu Shot Clinic on October 4th, from 10AM to 6PM at the Richland County Health Department.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in Montana and the United States, and like the flu, colorectal cancer is preventable. Colorectal cancers are those that start in either the colon or the rectum, and may be detected early through regular screening.

The free screening kit offered on October 4th is called a FIT test, or a fecal immune chemical test. This is a non-invasive, at-home screening kit that tests for hidden blood in

the stool, which can be an early sign of cancer. FIT does not require any diet restrictions or preparation and can be completed in the comfort of your home.

Clinic participants will be screened for eligibility for the test kit. Participants who are between ages 50 and 74, have not had a colonoscopy within the past 10 years, have not had a flexible sigmoidoscopy within the last 5 years, and have not had a FIT test within the last year will be offered the test kit. The test can be completed at home and submitted to the lab at Sidney Health Center to be tested for free. Test results may be shared with your healthcare provider.

The free, at-home col-

orectal screening FIT kits will be available for eligible participants at the Mass Flu Shot Clinic at the Richland County Health Department in the Community Services Building on Thursday, October 4th, from 10AM to 6PM. For questions regarding flu shots or the free FIT colorectal screening test kits, call the Health Department at 406-433-2207.

Savage brothers Chase and Tanner Hagler closed out their hunting season by landing a large buck each within the first four days of hunting season.

The brothers began hunting at only age 15, when family friend Jim Miller convinced them to complete the hunter's safety course required by law to apply for a tag. Chase and Tanner started their hunting careers rifle hunting with their father and grandfather on the family's land outside Savage. Later, the two began bow hunting as well.

"I'm definitely a bigger fan of bow hunting, for sure. There's a lot more that goes into it- scouting deer all spring, hanging stands. There's a lot of time and effort that goes into bow hunting," Chase said. One major difference between bow and rifle hunting is the distance from the animal for a successful shot. "A good archer can shoot 80 yards, maybe, where a rifle hunter can get a kill at 600 yards. It's a lot bigger of an adrenaline rush, being that close. It's cool being that close to that animal and

them not knowing you're there," he explained.

Bow hunting provides an extra, early opportunity to take a deer, as bow hunting season opens September 1st, and general rifle season opens mid-October. The general tag, Chase explained, is good for either season, so an unsuccessful bow season doesn't mean the hunter goes home empty handed.

This year, however, neither Chase nor his twin brother Tanner would need the extra season to fill their tag. On just the second day of archery season, Chase took down a 4x4 buck, in full velvet. Tanner followed two days later with a 5x5 buck.

Chase actually missed the first shot he took at his 4x4, from about 43 yards away. "It was about 6 or 7 o'clock, and I saw this line of deer coming in. The last one in the line was the one I killed. I missed him the first shot. He turned around and jumped behind a Russian olive tree. He jumped a fence and walked the fence line, and I actually got him closer than he was before," Chase said. Both Chase and Tanner took their kill from a tree stand.

Chase harvested both the meat and the head from the buck. "I had the full head mounted. It was in full velvet, it might not have been the biggest deer, but it's pretty hard to kill a deer

in the early season. Not many people get to kill a deer in full velvet. It's really cool," he said.

Processing the meat from their kill is a family event for the Haglers. "We make our own deer sausage. It's a pretty big time for our family. We all get together and spend the day making deer sausage. It's something we look forward to every year," he said.

Both Chase and Tanner give partial credit for their 2018 kills to Pure Whitetail, a company that provides certified deer urine to hunters to attract a buck. Both Chase and Tanner are field staff members for the company. "It sure changed the game of bow hunting for me. Deer can flip a switch in a real quick hurry. They do not like each other in rut," he explained. The urine is sprayed around the area where the hunter wants to draw the deer, and the bucks come looking to fight one another over the territory.

Though Chase and Tanner have filled their deer tag for the year, they aren't quite done with the 2018 hunting season. "This year I drew my antelope tag. I've been really trying hard to chase one with my bow but they are a lot quicker so I haven't had that opportunity yet," Chase said.

Reminder in the Field this Hunting Season: Be a Good Steward of the Land

Although most hunters respect the land, property, and wildlife they are hunting, many others do not. Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks would like to remind hunters and all outdoor enthusiasts to be good stewards of the land, and respect both private and public property. The FWP Region 6 Citizens Advisory Committee, recognizing that this is an ongoing issue, raised the need for more public outreach.

Every hunting season, there are reports of vandalizing of Block Management Area (BMA) boxes, hunters driving off road, illegal trespassing, hunters being shot over, littering, and livestock being shot. With upland bird, dove, and archery seasons beginning over the Labor Day weekend, we encourage everyone to be good stewards of the land. Below are just a few of the things that hunters and all outdoor enthusiasts should be aware of when enjoying our resources:

Littering- not only is littering careless and unsightly, it is against the law. This includes toilet paper, and the proper management of human waste.

Leave gates as you find them- If a gate is closed, close it behind you. If it is obviously open (pulled all the way back to the fence), leave it open. If you are unsure, contact the landowner or public land agency.

Know your target and beyond- Hunters must be sure of what they are shooting at (species, sex, etc.), and know what lies beyond their target (houses, outbuildings, livestock, vehicles, other hunters).

Be aware of fire danger at all times and use precautions. Be weed free- Check clothes, dogs, ATV's, and vehicles for weeds and weed seeds to help prevent the spread to other private and public lands.

Avoid driving on muddy roads- Unless it is a well-graveled road, walk.

Avoid ridge driving and driving to overlooks- Not only is this a poor strategy while hunting, it is considered as driving off road if it is not already an established trail.

Ask for permission to hunt- Montana law requires permission for all hunting on private land. Even if the land is not posted, hunters must have permission from the landowner, lessee, or their agent before hunting on private property.

Completely fill out BMA slips- If a hunter doesn't correctly fill out a block management slip, they are hunting without per-

mission.

Know where you are located- Whether you are hunting public land, private land, or land enrolled in an access program such as block management, it is every hunter's responsibility to know where they are to avoid trespassing. Maps are always available, as are GPS chips and cell phone apps to aid in orientation.

Driving off road- While hunting on private property, a person may not drive off established roads or trails without landowner permission. Off-road travel on public land, including game retrieval, is prohibited unless designated as open. Consult appropriate land agency or land maps for specifics.

Accessing public lands- Access to public lands (on a private road) through private land requires permission of the private landowner, lessee, or their agent.

Camping- camping is allowed on most public lands (see agency regulations), but permission is needed to camp on private property and BMAs.

Know the rules- Consult BMA maps for specific rules on block management property, including: driving on roads, parking areas, no shooting zones, walk-in only areas, camping, number of hunters allowed, game retrieval, etc. Rules for most land agencies can be found on maps and/or on brochures. Go to the appropriate agency website or local office for information.

Report violations- report any hunting and fishing, trespassing, vandalism, or other criminal activity you see to 1-800-TIP-MONT (1-800-847-6668).

The 1-800-TIP-MONT program is a toll-free number where one can report violations of fish, wildlife or park regulations.



Educator Workshop in Miles City to Explore “Prairie Ecosystems”

Callers can remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward up to \$1,000 for providing information that leads to a conviction.

Also remember that the fall is a very busy time for landowners. Cattle and other livestock are being moved from their summer and/or fall pastures and are often brought near the home site for winter feeding and care. Please use common sense and respect when around these activities.

FWP also offers a free online program called The Montana Hunter-Landowner Stewardship Project. This project is an information program for anyone interested in promoting responsible hunter behavior and good hunter-landowner relations in Montana. The program is delivered through an interactive website utilizing questions, videos, and feedback as well as opportunities for you to test your knowledge on a variety of practical topics related to hunter-landowner relations and responsible hunter behavior.

2018 Montana Pheasant Hunting Outlook

Montana is experiencing a large decline in conservation reserve program acreage along the northern tier of the state, which may have an impact on hunting experiences in Regions 4 and 6. CRP is a program that pays landowners to remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production and plant species which improve environmental health and quality of bird habitat.

In Region 5, pheasant crow counts this spring in the Clarks Fork valley indicated that over-winter survival was not too good. Pheasant harvest will likely be somewhat lower this fall than in past years.

Along the Yellowstone and Musselshell valleys, spring pheasant counts were similar to last year and hunting harvest will be decided by how well young-of-the-year survived spring storms.

In Region 6, pheasant adult numbers, according to spring crowing counts, show quite a bit of variability across the region. The west end of the region, including Hill, Blaine and a portion of Chouteau counties, indicate numbers at 40 to 50 percent below long-term average (LTA) in those areas. Phillips county is above LTA, while Valley and McCone counties are 10 to 24 percent below. The northeast corner, including Daniels, Sheridan, Roosevelt and portions of Richland and Dawson counties, indicate numbers at average to 10 percent below average. Pheasant distribution will vary across portions of each county, and most birds will be found in optimal habitat including river-bottoms, riparian areas and other moist areas that produce adequate cover.

Harsh winter conditions resulted in low overwinter survival. However, peak hatch for pheasants occurs around mid-June, which corresponded with regular, favorable moisture events in Southeast Montana. Overall, pheasant hunting in Region 7 should be fair to poor this fall depending on local conditions. The moisture levels this year have provided birds with vast areas of cover and have also made agricultural lands productive, which will aid birds throughout their lifecycle.

Trapping Advisory Committee to Meet Oct. 6-7

The Montana Trapping Advisory Committee will hold its third meeting Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 6 and 7 in Miles City at the Sleep Inn & Suites, 1006 S. Haynes Ave. Saturday’s meeting will start at 9 a.m., and Sunday’s meeting will start at 8 a.m.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks assembled this citizens’ committee to provide recommendations that ensure population viability of trapped species, the humane treatment of animals and the minimization of social conflict. The committee represents the spectrum of opinions on trapping.

During the meeting, members will affirm the committee’s charter, continue learning about trapping in Montana, finalize “guiding principles,” move closer to agreement on tentative answers to the individual “Important Questions,” and confirm a date and location for a fourth meeting and assign homework.

The committee’s charge is to present recommendations to FWP by March 30. FWP staff are not members of the committee but will provide information and technical assistance.

The meeting is open to the public. The committee will hear public comment at noon on both days.
