#### **Hinds Pleads Not Guilty**

Sasha Marie Hinds appeared before Judge Katherine M. Bidegaray in the 7th Judicial District Court in Sidney on April 15. Hinds entered a plea of not guilty to the charges of Deliberate Homicide and Aggravated Assault in connection with the death of her 2-month old daughter, Kylie Ann Hinds, and the stabbing of Brendan James Sheehan.

Hinds' counsel Cynthia Thornton and Michael Haase stated they would not be prepared for a May 20 omnibus hearing. They requested additional time for discovery and a pending evaluation from Montana State Hospital.

At press time orders from Judge Bidegaray regarding scheduling were pending.




# MonDak Illustrator to Participate in Art & Wine Walk

MonDak area illustrator Jeanne Bowman will be showcasing her work at Books on Broadway at the Williston Downtowners Association's Art & Wine Walk.

Bowman is a 2010 graduate of Rocky Mountain College, and worked at the Yellowstone Art Museum for two years before embarking on illustrating independently. Bowman participated in the Albuquerque regional branch of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators, a non-profit group dedicated to supporting the creation and availability of quality children's books. It was there she began to take an interest in children's books. "We're a group of writers and illustrators who have monthly meetups to talk shop and encourage each other on projects," Bowman explained. "I knew I wanted to do art, but I didn't know what specific industry I wanted to engage in. The SCBWI



meetings helped me find a focus for my portfolio." she said.

Bowman reached out to a number of publishing companies to land her first project. "Part of being an illustrator is that you constantly have to promote yourself. One way is making promo cards with your information and illustrations, and sending to a list of publishers," she said. Bowman landed her latest job with her first postcard. "It's all a timing thing," she explained. "Publishers are picking up projects at certain times, and there's more illustrators than publishers."

Bowman's project was a remake of Oscar Wilde's 1888 classic The Selfish Giant, published by Familius, a global trade publishing company that publishes books and other content to help families be happy. The story is about a giant who is a bit selfish, putting up a wall around his garden to keep children out. It was always winter in the garden, until one special child changed the giant's heart, and spring returned. Colorfully illustrated, the new edition is described as a "richly sentimental 19th century tale in a 21st century setting," by the Kirkus Reviews.

Though the new book is available on Amazon and Barnes and Noble, Bowman set out to bring The Selfish Giant to local audiences. It was the owner of Books on Broadway that opened the invitation to Bowman to participate in the Art & Wine Walk this year. "I was talking to Chuck, the owner, in person, and he invited me to be involved," she said. Bowman will join Sidney artist Trish Stevenson in displaying several pieces in the bookstore during the event.

Currently, Bowman lives in Sidney and will be bringing the book to the Sidney-Richland County Library as well.

As for future plans, Bowman said, "Right now I'm working on a picture book that I'm both writing and illustrating. I want to make all kinds of books-picture books, books for middle schoolers, art books. I want to be known as a person who makes beautiful books."

# **Richland Federal Credit Union Holds Their 79th Annual Meeting**

#### **RFCU Volunteer Apprenticeship Program Sneak Preview Event April 17**

Richland Federal Credit Union (RFCU) held its 79th annual business meeting Tuesday April 9 at the Saint Matthews Center in Sidney with one hundred members present to hear reports from the board of directors and management. Chair Beth Redlin reported on the credit union's new RFCU Volunteer Apprenticeship Program, a 2-year volunteer leadership development program to educate interested members about the credit union movement and provide training to enable them to hit the ground running when taking on future leadership roles with the Credit Union's Board of Directors and Supervisory Committee.

In her remarks, Redlin also discussed the \$250,000 bonus dividend that was given to RFCU members at the end of 2018. "It's our way of saying thank you for keeping your money with the credit union during the past few (at times tumultuous) years,"

In his report, Manager Kevin Mayer pointed to the strong financial health of the credit union and noted the goals completed during 2018. Mayer also discussed the bonus dividend distributed to members this past year and how it differentiates the credit union from banks. Mayer also commented on the continued threat of fraud that exists within our community pointing to current scams circulating in the area including the "grandparent, romance, and IRS scams" in addition to ongoing email "phishing" efforts to gain personal information. He assured the members that the staff of the credit union is there to help members identify and avoid potential scams. He also urged members to not be embarrassed if they do become a victim of a scam and to come forward and discuss it with the credit union.

In other business at the meeting, Chair Beth Redlin and Secretary Albert McGahan were re-elected to new three-year terms on the board of directors. Other current board members are Vice-Chair Toby Panasuk, and board members Daryl Norgaard and Amanda Seigfreid.

The church started with a humble beginning in a small building that still stands on the 100 block of East Holly and is owned by Gurney Electric. Over the period of the next twenty-four years, the congregation continued to grow to the point where they needed a new building. It was at this time that the church made it's home in the current location on 3rd Ave SE in Sidney. Forty years later, in 1963, classrooms were added to the current building. Fifty-five years later, in 2018, change was once again happening to the congregation of the Lonsdale United Methodist Church.

The change began as a conversation in 2017 between members of the church and Elaine Stedman and the board of the Boys & Girls Clubs of the MonDak - Richland Unit. The Club was going to lose its current location due to growth within the school system and the church was looking to make some changes as well. The church is located directly across the street from Central School, which makes the building easily accessible for the children. After sev-

it was decided that the church would donate the building to the Club and the Club would buy the parsonage to convert into office space until they could move into their permanent home.

tion began to transform all of the rooms within the church building, except the Sanctuary and the Heritage room, into a modernized, usable facility for the Boys and Girls Club. In July of 2018, the Club moved into the parsonage as its temporary office and in August of 2018, Pastor Sione Fungalei began his journey as the new leader for the Lonsdale United Methodist Church.

Pastor Sione Fungalei grew up in Tonga, a country in the Polynesian Islands. There, he grew up in a Christian household. As he grew up, Sione decided that he wanted to follow in his grandfather's footsteps. In 1993 he became a United Methodist preacher. He came to the United States and lived and ministered in Utah for several years. He said, "While there, I told God, 'Here I am" Then, the United Methodist Conference, a cooperative organization of Methodist churches that provides a means for consultation and cooperation on an international level, contacted him. They informed him that the District of Sidney was looking for a pastor and offered him the job. August 1. Sione

The offices, hallways, bathrooms, storage rooms and classrooms have all been remodeled. The Club and the church have some shared space so that both can take advantage of certain areas within the building, for example, the kitchen, the fellowship hall/dining room, and a board room. Rhonda Folstad stated that the members of the church have made some minor facelift changes to the sanctuary itself by painting, cleaning and reorganizing.





# Staying

Activity of any sort has always been a large part of my life. As a child, I had the nickname Worry Wart or Nervous Nellie as I could not seem to sit still for any length of time. When sitting, one or the other leg constantly jiggled up and down, my feet tapped the floor, and movement seemed an integral part of my being. I drove classmates who had the misfortune to sit directly in front of me totally berserk, as my feet always seemed to find the back rung of their chairs and those feet beat a constant tattoo on that rung. I tried hard to sit still, but it seldom worked well.

This activity continued as an adult. When I worked at outside jobs, I got along well. When I had the misfortune of working inside at a desk, I needed to get up and move to stay sane. I walked during every break, and my lunch hours I spent walking as well. When I lived in near proximity to a job, I would walk to and from work every day, regardless of the weather.

Now that I am semi-retired, I still remain far more active than most people I know. So imagine my annoyance and disgruntlement when I broke my ankle in January and spent the next six weeks with no weight bearing allowed on that leg. Oh, I found ways to move with the help of a pink scooter, which allowed me to lead a semi-normal active lifestyle but this didn't compensate for the loss of my normal hiking and other activities and the freedom to move at will.

While under orders not to put weight on the broken ankle, I did some research on exercises, what I could do in spite of a broken ankle to remain in somewhat decent physical shape, and what physical activities would help me remain sane in a most unhappy situation. I looked at statistics in general on exercise and physical fitness. I was horrified to discover what a nation of overeaters America has become. First of all, obesity has soared out of control. 68% of Americans are overweight or obese. That is more than half of us. By 2020, experts figure that

three out of four Americans will be overweight or obese. The CDC recommends an hour and fifteen minutes of vigorous activity daily for those between 18-64, but

most adults only do 17 minutes of fitness activities per day. Only 30% of those of us between 65-74 years of age

are physically active, and of those 75 years and older, only 40% remain physically active. 80% of adults do not meet the guidelines for both aerobic and muscle strengthening activities. Especially disturbing to me is that older adults are more physically active than youngsters, who spend far too much time in front of a screen of some sort.

I find this information appalling and really sad. I looked around, and noticed that often the heaviest people park by a store entrance, while thinner people are willing to walk a little distance to reach that entrance. Stout people seldom return shopping carts to the collection site, but drive away leaving their carts abandoned in the parking lot. Many of us seem willing to drive three blocks to the post office rather than taking a nice stroll to retrieve their mail. Research does show that people feel better about themselves when they include some physical activity in their daily routine, even if that means a short walk to the post office, or a jaunt down the lane and back.

While I nursed the broken ankle, I did push my scooter up and down Lois Lane, down Cornucopia, and into Virginia City and home again. I shoveled show, swept walks, and completed housework. It wasn't the same as having two sturdy legs underneath me, but it kept me mobile, moving, and far less grumpy and discouraged than I would have been had I confined myself to the house. I did foot exercises, I moved my foot up and down, tapped my toes, raised my heel, and did leg raises to keep the leg muscles somewhat in shape, and ready for action when I got the all-clear to start walking. Was this easy? Not always, nor was I always in the frame of mind to work on physical activity of any sort. It took a good talking to myself on many occasions to get up out of the chair and start to move.

It took seemingly forever, but the time did arrive when I was allowed to start walking with a boot and crutches on

that bad ankle once again. I think the effort I expended while remaining non-weight bearing paid off. I need to wear a boot on the affected ankle until the end of April, but the boot doesn't hamper me much. I also needed crutches the first few weeks of weight bearing, and they DID slow me down somewhat. The exercises the physical therapist gave me were not that difficult to do, and my stiff ankle has responded well

to motion. It feels good to move, it makes my heart sing to have the ability to lead an almost normal life again, and I appreciate a body that works reasonably well and gets me where I want to go.

Physical activity really does improve my mental outlook as well as my physical health. It takes just a little thought and some desire to add additional physical movement to a day to improve one's physical fitness. There are days when I really do not feel like expending a whole of energy, but I do it anyway and once I get started, I want to continue. Activity really does fix foul moods and correct feelings of boredom or dissatisfaction.






The McKenzie County Sheriff's Office utilizes the latest in technology to investigate, deter, and apprehend criminals adequately. They work with other city, state, and federal agencies that operate in the confines of the county to ensure the safety and security of McKenzie county citizens. They provide law enforcement and public safety services to 2,800 square miles including the cities of Alexander, Arnegard, Cartwright, Fairview,

Grassy Butte, Keene, Watford City, and a portion of the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation and the north unit of the Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

Currently, four different departments serve the McKenzie County area: Patrol, Dispatch, Administrative, and Investigations

The Patrol Division is the largest division in the Sheriff's Office and provides many services. This Division takes pride in the day-to-day activities it performs, ensuring that McKenzie County citizens are afforded the "protection and service" they deserve. The Division Commander is Lieutenant Max Matthews-Kasner. When Lieutenant Max Matthews-Kasner was asked what he likes about his job, he responded, "The positive feedback we get gives us a sense of purpose and the amount of positive community interaction and perception of law enforcement is something that we really appreciate in the area."

The Dispatch Division contains emergency communications, professionals who are called upon to ensure the successful transmission of information from callers in distress to responding police personnel. Their work includes providing accurate and timely information to police officers and dispatching the appropriate personnel to emergencies through a communications system within a city or municipal police department.

The Administration Division ensures the normal operations of this division are being conducted efficiently and effectively. The division is also tasked with maintaining personnel equipment and records, specialized equipment, grants, civil processes and budgeting, and maintaining the property and evidence room. The Administration division commander is Lieutenant Newman.

The Investigations Division investigates criminal activity

that occurs and has an effect on McKenzie County. Several cases that are investigated are those that are reported to the agency through the patrol division and referred to investigators for further follow-up.

Because of all the hard work law enforcement performs, McKenzie County citizens are provided with a safe environment to live, work, and play.



#### Prairie Dog Law Set To Bolster Bakken Infrastructure velopment Director, Vawnita

A new law has passed the North Dakota legislature that is designed to fund infrastructure projects throughout the state and maintain current funding guidelines that assist the needs in McKenzie County.

North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum, signed the legislation that will help oil-producing regions in the state, from whence comes a great deal of state revenue. House Bill 1066 was called, "Operation Prairie Dog," and intends to use revenue from oil and gas production to give more than \$250 million to various products statewide.

The Prairie Dog Law is presumed to be a great help for McKenzie and Williams Counties in particular, because it will maintain their Gross Production Tax and keeps 30 percent of oil and gas revenue in Bakken counties coming back to the area to help maintain infrastructure.

Projects designated by the new funding bill include city, county, and township improvements, along with airport infrastructure. Most of this money will not be available until 2021 however.

The split of revenue mandated by the bill includes up to \$250 million total, which is dependent upon oil tax revenue, with \$115 million designated to North Dakota cities, \$115 million designated to counties and townships, and \$20 million designated to airport infrastructure.

The Roundup spoke to Watford City Community DeBest, who was enthusiastic about the legislation, in spite of projects not being earmarked in the region.

Best said, "None of that money will go to McKenzie County. That will go to non-oil producing counties. The oil producing counties and their cities and the hub cities of Minot, Dickinson, and Williston are in a different part of that formula. But McKenzie County will continue to receive their 30 percent, which is what they receive now.'

Best asserted that even though McKenzie County won't benefit directly from the infrastructure money, the law was still a major win for the area. When asked why local residents should be excited in spite of not having infrastructure projects earmarked in the bill, she explained that it provides a few other benefits the region needed.

Best explained, "This is good bill because maintaining the current percentage is a win. There are individuals in the legislative body who think the percentage should be reduced. So between the last session and now, the West Dakota Energy Association commissioned an interim legislative study to evaluate the needs of impacted communities and so that study showed there were still expensive infrastructure needs in the studies. Prairie Dog continued that 30% redistribution to continue to help with those infrastructure needs."

She continued, "It's not

too terribly long ago that counties were receiving only ten percent, like back in the early 2000s.'

Best was very optimistic regarding the law and said there wasn't much negative to complain about. Furthermore, the greatest advantage of the law was abrogation of a sunset clause on the revenue formulation that would allow McKenzie County to be more stable in their long-term planning.

Best said, "There aren't really downsides. Another part of 'Prairie Dog' for oil and gas impact communities is the removal of the sunset clause. Historically, whatever bill the gross distribution tax was in had a sunset clause. Every biennium it might change and there was no predictability in what it would be going forward.

To clarify, Best explained that the 30 percent designation of revenue return isn't precisely accurate, as the state takes a portion off the top for their own budget.

Best added, "Last year in 2018, McKenzie County received 78 million in gross production tax return, but it produces 40 percent of the oil revenue. Twenty percent is taken off the top for state budget needs, and that 78 million represents then thirty percent of eighty percent of McKenzie County oil revenue."

When asked if removing the sunset clause on that formula would better allow the county to plan for the future with certainty, Best responded, "Yes, absolutely."

One of the bills we passed out of Judiciary Committee and the Senate was HB 567, the "School Marshall" bill by Representative Derek Skees (R) Kalispell. This bill will allow an employee of the school to be armed. The training for the Marshalls would be conducted by the Montana Law Enforcement Academy. This would be a voluntary program for the schools.

Another bill we passed out of Judiciary Committee was HB 500, the "Montana Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act", by Representative Lola Sheldon-Galloway (R) Great Falls. HB 500 would outlaw abortion after 20 weeks, except in certain situations.

In Health and Human Services Committee, we passed HB 753 by Representative Dennis Lenz, (R) Billings. This bill attempts to reign in Child Protective Services from what seems like unlimited power. We heard a lot of testimony from people who had children removed from their homes for no apparent reason.

In Fish and Game Committee we had a hearing on the Governor's nominees for the Fish and Game Commission. In testimony there was some concerns about some of the nominees. We will have to do executive action on them this week

This is the time in the session where government really tries to grow. I vowed to vote for less Government and less taxes and that is what I intend to do.




