

#### **Sidney Wins Eagle Tournament**



# Who Is Santa Claus?


I recently learned that my son (Ian) made a Facebook posting saying that my wife and I should never have pretended that there was a Santa Claus. His Facebook note tells the world that we "completely abused my trust in them," and we now "feel bad" that we ever did that. "I'm not," Ian says, "going to do the same thing to my kids whether they believe me or not."

lan goes on to say: "I believed in [Santa Claus] until 5th grade. My friends told me that Santa wasn't real, but I didn't listen to them because my parents told me otherwise, and I completely trusted my parents because my parents had never lied to

me. When they told me that Santa wasn't real, I went upstairs and stayed in my room for the majority of Christmas Eve night, and I completely lost trust in my parents. To this day, I still . . . give them crap about it"

My son's attitude toward Santa Claus is both right and wrong. It is certainly true that too much emphasis is placed on the commercial aspects of Christmas. Kids are obsessed with receiving gifts from Santa Claus instead of celebrating Christmas as the birth of our Lord. Everything about Christmas is distorted in order to make a buck. And historians note that our modern day image of Santa Claus as a jolly fat guy with a beard and red suit was actually invented by Coco-cola in the 1960s.

Does "the Santa Claus myth" serve any useful noncommercial purpose? It is worth recalling that our present day notion of Santa Claus is based on the life of a real person, St. Nicholas of Myra. He was a  $4^{\text{th}}$  century Greek Bishop of Myra, which is part of the present day country of Turkey. Nicholas was a very devout Christian. And he secretly gave gifts to people in need, such as putting coins in the shoes of those who left them out for him. He also arranged for wheat to be delivered to starving people in Greece, and it is said that the wheat was "multiplied" by virtue of the fact that the amount given



far exceeded what it was expected to be.

The legend of Saint Nicholas is acknowledged by Catholic and Orthodox Christians. He is also honored by various Anglican and Lutheran churches. Saint Nicholas Day is celebrated on Dec. 6th, and it is a day to remember who Nicholas was, especially his reputation for being a charitable giver of gifts. The American Santa Claus is derived from these legends. "Santa Claus" is itself derived from the Dutch word "Sinterklaas".

Many of you may not be convinced that "the legend of Santa Claus" is a good thing. Exchanging gifts on Christmas is not a bad thing, however; and letting children be children is also okay. It is only when the notion is carried too far that it is harmful. As far as my son is concerned, he is free to skip the Santa Claus story with his kids if he so desires, but I hope he does not forget to celebrate the magic of the Christmas season. I hope he not only honors Christmas as the feast of Jesus Christ's birth, but also remembers to share holiday good will with his family and friends.

Ray A. Zimdars, 76, passed away on Tuesday, Nov. 29, 2011 with his family by his side at the Glendive Medical Center, Glendive. Visitation was held from 11 a.m.-5 p.m. and from 6-8 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 5, 2011 at the Chapel of the Silvernale-Silha Funeral Home, Glendive. A life tribute service was held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 6, 2011 at Zion Lutheran Church in Glendive with Celebrant Sandy Silha officiating. Interment with military honors was held in Dawson County Cemetery in Glendive. Silvernale-Silha Funeral Home, Glendive, has been entrusted with the arrangements.

Ray was born on Aug. 29, 1935 in Glendive, a son of Henry and Mary (Bush) Zimdars. He was raised and educated on the family farm west of Bloomfield.

# **2011 Growing Season Weather Summary**

According to Adnan Akyuz and Barbara Mullins, both of the NDSU Department of Soil Science, the 2011 growing season (the period from April-September) for North Dakota can simply be characterized as "wetter" than normal compared to the 30-year average from 1981-2010. No one will argue that statement, even those retired farm producers who have lived a lifetime in this area. I have yet to come upon a farmer who remembers so many prevent-plant acres as we had this year.

Here are some of the numbers which support Akyuz and Mullins. The state average precipitation during the 2011 growing season was 16.94 inches which was the 12th wettest growing season among the past 117 years since 1895. Historical records indicate that the state average precipitation values range between the lowest value of 5.62 inches and the highest value of 20.33 inches occurred in 1936 and 1941 respectively. Data collected at the Williston Research Center show the 2011 growing season to be the 11th wettest over the 117 years. However, the amount of precipitation was quite varied in Divide, Williams and McKenzie counties. Parts of Divide County received a high of 170% of normal rainfall while the Williston area had a low of 125% of normal.

Likewise, the state average temperature during the 2011 growing season was 58.3° F, which was the coldest growing season among the past 117 years. Even though the state average growing season temperature appears to be cooler than normal, it can be characterized by a much cooler spring followed by a warmer summer and much warmer fall compared to the normal values. Historical state average growing season temperature values in North Dakota range between 62.5 and 52.7 in 1988 and 1907 respectively.

In 2011, the Williston Research Center reported 130 consecutive days between the last and first day of frost. This was the 48th longest period since 1894. The

period was from May 10-Sept. 18. Sites at Bismarck, Fargo and Cavalier reported the longest (145) continuous frost free days.

The first killing frost occurred on Sept. 18 in most of the northwestern parts of the state. This basically ended development for crops planted the end of June. The next hard freeze occurred one month later thus making the fall season very pleasant for everyone.

The Climate Prediction Center (CPC) has predicted a cooler than normal winter and spring. If the forecast comes true, late planting during the start of the coming growing season should be considered. The CPC gives equal chance of having a wetter or dryer than normal winter and spring seasons. However, it acknowledges that we are still under the influence of La Niña episode. There is a 69% probability that LA Niña will persist into winter and 51% chance that it will persist into April. There is only a 5% chance for development of El Niño conditions by April.

By February we will have a more accurate weather outlook for the 2012 planting and growing seasons. During the Wheat Show Tanja Fransen, National Weather Service (Glasgow office), has consented to give us a current

### **Hunters Reminded Wasting** Wild Game Meat Is Illegal

Many hunters are looking back on what was a successful big game hunting season. These same hunters are also responsible for seeing that the wild game they harvested is properly cared for and processed.

The waste of edible game meat is illegal. Under Montana law, it is illegal to waste any part of a game animal that is defined as "suitable for food". For big game animals, all four quarters above the hock, including loin and backstrap, fall into that category.

Hunters who can't use the wild game meat could donate it to a neighbor or friend who would appreciate it, or to a local food bank. There are many food distribution programs in Montana eager to accept big game meat.

Anyone with information about the wanton waste of wild game should call FWP's toll-free TIP-MONT hotline, 1-800-

TIP-MONT. Callers who report violations of wildlife, fish or park regulations can remain anonymous and may be eligible for cash rewards.

# **Craig & Cel Iversen Named 2011 Cooperators of the Year**

The Richland County Conservation District has named Craig and Cel Iversen as this year's Cooperators of the Year. For the past 15 years, the Iversens have worked diligently with the NRCS and the Richland County Conservation District to improve their land for cattle and for wildlife. They have accomplished this by drilling wells, laying pipeline, installing stock tanks, cross fencing, reseeding old cropland to grass and planting shelterbelts.

"When we picked up this place 15 years ago, there were only a few grain bins and one building here," says Craig Iversen. "There were no wells, no pipelines, and nothing for cattle to utilize. Cattle had to drink out of stock ponds which often became stagnant and unusable."

Using available NRCS programs, the Iversens began the process of improving the land by drilling two 400-foot deep wells that provided excellent drinking water. Once they had the wells in place, they began installing pipelines and fencing. "We put in eight miles of pipeline that served all the pastures." Iversen remarks. "We then put in water tanks and did some cross fencing. This allowed cattle access to good drinking water and to better

utilize the available grazing land."

The Iversens eventually built a home on the property and turned their attention to planting shelterbelts. They used a variety of shrubs, deciduous trees, and conifers to encourage the growth of a variety of trees and to attract wildlife as well. "The trees that were here were dying, so we planted shelterbelts," Iversen comments. "We bought our trees from the Richland County Conservation District, and we've planted trees every year. The deer are hard on trees, and the porcupines are hard on them, but we keep replanting. The Conservation District helped us plant them, they came back and laid the mesh, and then we utilized the pipeline as we put in a drip system to water the newly planted trees."

The Iversens also seeded 200 acres of land back to grass, which has helped better serve the cattle and also has enhanced wildlife. "The NRCS came up with a good variety of grass that gives us an excellent hay crop," Iversen notes. "We always leave a few strips of the grass for wildlife use."

The Iversens are pleased with the outcome of their efforts and commitment. and they praise both the NRCS and the Richland **County Conservation District** for assisting with this long term project. They used fed-

eral conservation programs available to landowners and received nothing but valuable help and advice from the local NRCS. "We are happy with the results," Iversen says. "It took a long time, but eventually everything came together. The main thing was obtaining the water, and everything else followed from that."

He concludes, "This was a big project, and it took a lot of time, effort and money. Without the NRCS programs and the Richland County Conservation District, we couldn't have afforded to do this. We applied for the programs every year, and didn't always get them, but when we did, the help was invaluable. The NRCS planned it all. Dave Haverkamp is a great guy to work with, and we got a lot done."

In response to a recent environmental assessment, Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks will recommend that 68 disease-free bison be relocated to two northern Montana Indian reservations.

The tribal lands were evaluated in an EA that considered moving about 150 disease-free bison that currently are held in a quarantine facility and on a ranch in southwestern Montana. The tribal lands recommended include the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation near Malta and the Fort Peck Indian Reservation near Wolf Point.

Two wildlife management areas were also considered in the EA—the 7,800acre Marias River WMA near Shelby and the 28,000-acre Spotted Dog WMA near Avon-but neither will be recommended as bison relocation sites.

An official "Record of Decision" was signed by FWP Director Joe Maurier. If FWP Commission approves the recommendation at its meeting in Helena on Dec. 9 the bison could be moved this winter.

FWP held three public meetings in October-attended by about 400 people—to discuss the relocation proposals. The agency also received more than 3,370 written comments, plus a petition signed by 600 people who opposed the relocation of bison to Spotted Dog WMA. The two WMA proposals were opposed by many neighboring landowners, livestock producers, local governments, and hunt-

While there was opposition to the tribal sites by neighboring landowners along Montana's Hi-Line, the tribal locations were supported by the local tribes and bison advocates.

The bison to be relocated are part of a study that began in 2004 aimed at determining if bison could be kept free of the bacteria that causes brucellosis, a disease that results in miscarriages in some pregnant animals, including domestic cattle, and bison and elk. The bison, which were repeatedly tested for the disease, are now considered brucellosisfree but to complete the feasibility study additional follow-up testing will continue.

Accordingly, management-plan agreements for each tribal site must include commitments to: (1) continue disease testing for five years, (2) properly contain bison, (3) immediately respond to any escapes of bison, and (4) provide Montana with disease-free bison for future conservation efforts. There are no infrastructure costs for FWP to pay associated with


the recommended tribal lands.

FWP Wildlife Bureau Chief Ken McDonald said FWP's initial goal was to relocate up to 150 of the disease-free bison from a quarantine facility near Gardiner and from a temporary site at the Green Ranch near Bozeman. A "no action" alternative would have had the bison remain at those locations.

If the recommendation is approved, and when management agreements are in place, all 68 bison now held at the quarantine facility will be relocated to the tribal sites and the quarantine facility will end its operations. The 143 bison now on the Green Ranch will remain there at least through 2015, and the anticipated completion of a comprehensive bison management strategy. The strategy will seek to indentify suitable habitats for wild bison in Montana.

Wild bison exist in Alaska, Arizona, Utah, Canada and other places. Today in Montana wild bison that migrate north from Yellowstone National Park are found in winter near West Yellowstone and Gardiner. In years past, Yellowstone animals were used to help restore elk, antelope and other wildlife herds in Montana and



# **Collared Wolf Killed** Near Hammond, MT

On Nov. 27, a collared black male wolf was shot on private ground under the defense of property law near Hammond, MT. Montana laws and administrative rules allow for a person to kill a wolf in the act of attacking, killing or threatening to kill livestock, a provision in place to opportunistically minimize wolf-livestock conflicts when they occur. USDA Wildlife Service's investigated and confirmed that this wolf had attacked and killed one ewe lamb and fatally injured another that had to be put down. This is the only wolf that was believed to be involved in the attack, and no further management action is authorized this FWP received sporadic reports and photographs of a black collared wolf starting in May 2011. FWP personnel closely monitored reports, searched missing collared wolf frequencies from the ground and air, but did not

locate any wolves through these means throughout the summer and fall. Based on physical characteristics and proximity to the reports, it is likely that the collared black

wolf observed around the

Broadus area is the same

individual involved in this in-

cident. The wolf was originally collared near Jackson, WY in 2010, this 2.5 year old wolf died about 300 miles straight-line distance from where it was collared. On average in the northern Rockies, wolves disperse about 60 miles, but dispersal distances of over 500 miles have been recorded.

Receiving reports from the public assists FWP in

monitoring the wolf population for purposes of including new wolves in population estimates and harvest quotas. Please contact MT. ### **RTC Offers Scholarship Programs**

Reservation Telephone Cooperative (RTC), Parshall. ND, provides two college scholarship programs.

In 2012, RTC will award nine college scholarships, each in the amount of \$1,000. There will be one scholarship awarded in each of RTC's eight director districts and one scholarship at large. Scholarships will be awarded based on a random drawing between applicants who meet the established criteria. RTC applications must be postmarked to RTC by April 6, 2012.

RTC also participates in the Foundation for Rural Service (FRS) college scholarship program.
