

Ribbon Cutting Held At Intake Dam

The US Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation celebrated the completion of Phase I of the Yellowstone Lower Headworks Project by hosting a ribbon cutting ceremony at Intake Dam on Monday April 30. The \$17.8 million Phase I project saw the completion of a single diversion headworks structure that includes twelve double fish screens, sluice gates, and a new canal. The project allows irrigators within the Lower Yellowstone Irrigation Project (LYIP) to continue to receive irrigation waters and at the same time the newly installed screens prevent the entry of fish into the LYIP main canal

Phase II will include the building of a fish passage structure. The Corps designed the entire project to protect the endangered pallid sturgeon.

"Phase I will exclude fish from the LYIP main canal," says Jerry Nypen, former LYIP manager who witnessed the lengthy process required to bring this Phase I portion of the project to fruition. "The pallid sturgeon was declared endangered in 1990, public meetings were held in 2008, and the design work on the project started that same year. The Corps also began

The Corps made numerous changes to the design before finally reaching consensus with the Bureau and LYIP as to what design would work best.

Ames Construction of Aurora, Colorado won the contract bid to build the Intake Diversion Fish Protection Project. The headworks project has reinforced concrete pile walls and a bridge deck placed on 247 drilled reinforced concrete caissons 36 inches in diameter and 35 feet deep. The structure contains twelve separate fish screens, each with a sluice gate, hydraulic power unit, and controls.

"This was a big job to screen fish out of that amount

of water," Nypen notes. "It was a big challenge, a massive undertaking, and it could be complicated to keep it running properly. The gates are fully automated and the technology will have to be kept up to date."

Nypen expresses appreciation to the Corps and to the Bureau of Reclamation, as the project required a lot of cooperation and communication among various

interested entities for its successful completion. "Both the Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation worked fully with LYIP," Nypen remarks. "LYIP participated in the design and construction, and we were very grateful for the good cooperation we received. I want to acknowledge this cooperation; we reached good rapport and an understanding of the needs of all of us, and we all worked

together to achieve those needs.'

The completed Phase I structure has fish

He concludes, "The Army Corps of Engineers doesn't normally build irrigation works, but they undertook this large irrigation feature. They listened to LYIP and incorporated the needs of our water users into their design plans. This was a good project and it took good cooperation among all of us to achieve this result.'



The Sidney Area Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture sponsored a candidates' forum on Thursday evening, April 26.

I attended the candidates' forum on Thursday evening, April 26. I fully expected to come away knowing which person for Montana's legislature I intended to endorse and who I intended to vote for. I planned to choose the candidate with the strongest passion for agriculture; the candidate who laid out his or her action plan for agriculture complete with details as to how he or she intended to implement the plan and what top agricultural priorities he or she intended to tackle first.

Imagine my stunned disbelief when NONE of the candidates even mentioned agriculture in their initial statements. Sure, they all want to keep oil and gas money here at home; of course we all want that. Sure, they had ideas as to what they planned to tackle, and certainly they understand the impact oil has had and continues to have on eastern Montana, but the word 'agriculture' never even got lip service.

It took Don Steinbeisser, a member of the audience, to stand up after all candidates had finished speaking and gently chide the entire group of them for failing to mention Montana's number one industry: agriculture. Steinbeisser kindly pointed out the fact that none of the candidates mentioned agriculture or talked about any action plans to work for agricultural interests.

Of course, once Steinbeisser had pointed out the obvious, candidates fell all over themselves assuring the crowd that most definitely they had agriculture as their number one priority, of course they wanted to help agriculture and of course they felt passionate about agriculture and would do all they could to aid agriculture if elected.

So, if they all feel so strongly about agriculture, how come they never bothered to mention it without being asked?

I still have no idea who I will vote for or who I can endorse as a candidate. I would very much like all these passionate advocates for agriculture to lay out a priorities list for agriculture along with an action plan as to how they intend to implement their ideas.

I also need to know which candidate, if any, will come down on the side of agriculture should there be a conflict of some nature between oil interests and agricultural interests.

Sign Your Children Up For Jr. Master Gardener Program

NDSU Extension Agent, McKenzie/Dunn Counties If you would like your children who are ages 8-12 years old to learn more about gardening, the Junior Master Gardener Program (JMG) is for them! This free course will be held in Watford City starting May 10 after school to 5 p.m. and continuing weekly (Thursdays) through the month of June. This program is modeled after the highly successful Master Gardener Program and offers horticultural and environmental science education, and leadership and life skills development through fun and creative activities. The program is committed to helping young people become good gardeners and good citizens so that they can make a positive contribution to their community, school and family.

Participants will meet at the 4-H building on the McKenzie County Fairgrounds and work in their raised garden beds just north of the building. They will be planting their own vegetable and flower gardens.

Topics of learning will include plant growth and development, soils and water, seed germination and more.

Youth gardeners can explore their world through meaningful horticultural and environmental science activities that encourage leadership development, personal pride, responsibility, and community involvement. The program incorporates service learning and volunteerism, which enables youth to make a positive contribution to their community.

Peer and cross generation mentoring occurs when JMG groups interact with community volunteers and leaders. GMG Kids can be mentors to younger youth, by teaching them about horticulture.

JMG provides an opportunity for youth to interact and bond with nature. As they go through the JMG program, they can learn how to conserve our natural resources and make knowledgeable decisions about the environment.

Volunteer instructors are needed to teach lessons in the program and to help supervise the children.







USDA Warns Of Fraudulent Letters, Calls

Officials with the U. S. Department of Agriculture have been notified that fraudulent letters and at least one fraudulent phone call have been received by individuals in a number of states.

The phone call was received by an individual in Indiana, and letters are being sent by FAX to individuals and businesses in a growing number of states. The letters and call purportedly come from a USDA procurement officer and seek personal information. These letters are false and in no case should a recipient respond with personal and financial information.

The fraudulent letters bear USDA's logo and seal and are signed by an individual identified as "Frank Rutenberg" using a title of "Senior Procurement Officer". Recipients should not respond and should not supply the requested information. USDA is investigating this matter through the Office of the Inspector General. USDA first learned that the letters were being circulated on March 16.

Pertussis In Richland County

Richland County has its first confirmed pertussis case (whooping cough). The Richland County Public Health Department is working with local schools, health care providers, and other partners to identify close contacts and ensure that they are evaluated and treated as needed.

Pertussis is a contagious respiratory disease that in almost all cases can be effectively treated by a health care professional if identified early. Pertussis is spread through the air by coughing, and transmission is dependent on the closeness and length of contact. The disease is most serious in very young infants - especially those under the age of six months. Infants should be kept away from anyone diagnosed with pertussis or identified as a close contact of someone who has been diagnosed. Infants with any coughing illness should be promptly evaluated by their health care provider.

The Richland County Public Health Department's number one priority is to contain the spread of the disease. Health Department staff will identify close contacts of those who have been diagnosed with pertussis in order to lessen further spread of this disease. Mass treatment is not recommended or indicated at this time.

Pertussis begins with cold symptoms (runny nose, sneezing) and a cough, which becomes much worse over one to two weeks and can last up to 6 weeks or more. Symptoms usually include a long series of coughs (coughing fits) followed by a whooping noise. However, older children, adults and very young infants may not develop the whoop. Coughing fits may also be followed by vomiting or turning blue. There is generally no fever.

The cough is often worse at night and cough medicines usually do not help alleviate the cough. Anyone experiencing these symptoms should contact their health care provider.

The most effective way to prevent pertussis is through vaccination. Pertussis vaccine is available for persons over the age of six weeks. It is included in the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's recommended routine childhood immunizations schedule. It is also very important for adults to receive the vaccination as well. No vaccine is 100 percent effective and no community is 100 percent vaccinated. However, we do know that vaccines are the most effective tool we have to reduce transmission of pertussis and that even immunized children who get sick tend to have less severe symptoms than children who are not immunized.

Commission members have been sorting through the remaining contents of the office and plan to hold a moving sale of office machines, furniture and historic memorabilia that are not essential to the mission of the preservation office on Saturday, May 5, from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. at the office.

Montana Cowboy Hall Of Fame & Western Heritage Center An**nounces Winning Building Site**

Sixty-plus years after State Senator Leo Cremer, Sweet Grass County, proposed the need for Montana to build a cowboy hall of fame; this vision took major steps towards becoming reality as the Montana Cowboy Hall of Fame & Western Heritage Center (MCHF & WHC) announces that it has completed its ten-month long building site selection process. Big Timber has been selected as the new home and building site of the MCHF & WHC.

Through a request for proposals process, an evaluation committee, made up of MCHF &WHC board members, selected finalist communities based on the infrastructure and capacity to sustainably operate a visitor attraction. In the final phase of the process, the committee evaluated the specific building site proposals offered by Big Sky, Big Timber, Livingston and Madison County.

"As we concluded our process, the important factors of sustainability, working with Montana's tourism infrastructure, and the overall cost for development of the project played an important role in Big Timber's selection," said DuWayne Wilson, MCHF & WHC president. "The Stetson building is highly visible and centrally located on I-90. All of the necessary infrastructure is fully developed at the site, while the building itself is simply an open shell that we can incorporate our exhibition plan into. In all, this unique package has been offered at an extraordinary cost savings over what it would otherwise cost to implement at any other site. Additionally, the contract terms gave us greater flexibility than some of the other property offers.'

"We had a tough decision with fantastic proposals from Big Sky, Livingston and Madison County," Wilson said, "Every finalist had some quality that ranked higher than their peers. In the end, it was our responsibility to make the best business decision we could and we could only choose one. We want to express our deep appreciation to the community leaders who put forward an exceptional effort and demonstrated themselves as true ambassadors for their communities. It made our decision that much harder."

With the site selection process completed, the focus of the MCHF & WHC will be implementing a capital fundraising campaign to move forward with developing the campus in Big Timber.

"We have a clear line of sight for success," said Mike Gurnett, MCHF & WHC board member. "This is truly a project whose time has come. With this great central I-90 location, I can envision the parking lot filled with school buses from across the state as students explore Montana's Western Heritage. The timing could not be better for people to step forward with financial support and artifact donations to keep us moving forward to achieving our goals to celebrate what makes Montana so great."

Background information:

Under a 2003 Montana legislative effort, Wolf Point was identified to be the future building site for the MCHF & WHC. With the mission of "honoring our cowboy way of life, American Indian cultures, and collective Montana Western heritage," the organization has been greeted with a great deal of enthusiasm from all corners of the state. After successfully organizing a statewide network of Trustees and implementing the annual Hall of Fame inductions, the organization set its sights on the development of its future museum and visitor center attraction. As interested donors watched other statewide museums and non-profits struggle under the crippling economic downturn, donor concerns quickly rose regarding the feasibility and sustainability of such a facility, given the planned location's distance from major tourism and interstate corridors. To address these concerns, the membership, Board of Trustee's and Board of Directors unanimously voted to pursue a legislative revision which would allow them to study the feasibility of any building location throughout the state and to invite all interested communities to express their interest. House Bill 528 was signed into law in April 2011 and efforts began to organize a request for proposal process that would objectively evaluate offered building sites.

The request for proposals was developed under the advisement of special taskforce of top industry experts from across the state and the nation. The resulting request for proposals was implemented in three phases. Phase one consisted of an open invitation to all Montana communities to express their interest in being considered. In phase two, all interested communities were asked to complete a comprehensive questionnaire to study, in detail, issues such as community infrastructure and those factors essential to operating the visitor destination attraction business. These submissions were evaluated under a standardized scoring system that resulted in a field of finalists to participate in the third and final phase. Finalists worked in the third phase to identify specific building sites within their community and to bring forward community resources.

HANDLING BEEF WITH CONFIDENCE

Start by familiarizing yourself with food safety tips. Wash your hands before and after handling raw meat, thaw in the refrigerator, keep raw meat separate from other ingredients and perishable items. Try these tips to make your meal tastier:

•Seasoning: Burgers, meatloaf, meatballs and other ground beef recipes will be more tender if you handle the meat as little as possible as you add seasonings and other ingredients. If you over mix it, you'll end up with a firm, compact texture after cooking.

Browning: Dry beef by patting with paper towel before cooking. Liquid sizzles in the pan creating steam that can prevent browning.

•Uniformity: To evenly cook kabobs, cut into equal-sized cubes

(but don't worry if they're not perfectly square) and leave a little space between each piece.

•Stir-frying: Put beef in the freezer for about 30 minutes, or until just firm, to make the meat firm and easier to cut into strips.

•Salting: Add salt after cooking. Salting before cooking can draw the moisture and juices out of the meat.

•Turn Meat with Tongs: If you use a fork, it will pierce the beef and release flavorful juices. When flipping burgers, you can also use a spatula, but don't use it to press down on the beef, or you'll lose the juices that make your burger moist.

•Monitor the Heat: If the heat is too high you might overcook your beef on the outside while the inside is still undercooked. For tender beef, cooked to the desired doneness. Use medium heat with most dry-heat cooking methods, such as grilling and sautéing, and medium-high heat for stir-frying. Low heat is ideal for moist-heat cooking methods, like braising.

•Marinades and Rubs: Marinades and rubs not only add excitement and flavor to many cuts of beef, but with the right ingredients, marinades can also be used to make some cuts more tender.

Summer Hours To Begin At Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center Near Williston May 16

Beginning Wednesday, May 16, visitor hours will change at the Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center near Williston. From May 16 to September 15, summer hours of 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., Central Time, seven days a week, will be in effect. The museum will follow winter schedule hours, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Central Time, Wednesday through Saturday and 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday, September 16 through May 15.

Located 22 miles southwest of Williston, the Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center is considered part of the Fort Buford State Historic Site, also managed by the state's history agency, the State Historical Society of North Dakota. The center is open year-round, except for New Year's Day, Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Admission is \$5/ adult, \$2.50/child, ages 6-15, and children 5 and under are admitted free. Admission is half-price from September 16 through May 15. The fee also covers admission to the Fort Buford State Historic Site, located mile west of the Confluence Center. Visitors to the Confluence Center will see the exhibit, The Art of Einar Olstad. Inspired by the people, scenery, and ranch life of the Dakota Badlands, rancher and artist Einar Olstad (1878-1955) captured the essence of the American West in his whimsical and often humorous portrayals of the Dakota cowboy. In addition to a wide selection of his evocative paintings, objects relating to ranching life in the 1930s are on display.

A permanent exhibit in the Field Officer's Quarters at the Fort Buford site explores the life of a frontier military officer at Fort Buford and also examines the role of women at an army post. Life by the Bugle features several objects original to Fort Buford's days as a military post from 1866 to 1895. The Field Officer's Quarters will open for the visiting season Tuesday, May 15.

The Confluence Center also includes a meeting room, rotunda and an open plaza facing the Confluence. The meeting room is available for use during and after operating hours. Equipment is available for no charge, including a slide projector, overhead, screen, easel with white board, public address system, and a coffee percolator. The rotunda and open plaza are available to groups after operating hours only. A \$25 security fee is charged for after hours use, with a minimum use requirement of two hours.

Free admission to all sites administered by the State Historical Society of North Dakota (SHSND), www.history.nd.gov is one of the many benefits for members of the SHSND Foundation. Others include a 15 percent discount on museum store purchases, and the quarterly publications, North Dakota History and Plains Talk. 




