#### Red Cross: Donors Of All Blood Types, Races **And Ethnicities Needed**

The American Red Cross urges people of all races and ethnicities to give blood or platelets to help increase the diversity of the blood supply.

The vast majority of blood types fall into one of the major blood groups. However, for patients with rare blood types or those who receive regular blood transfusions, blood must be matched closely - beyond the primary A, B, O and AB blood types - to reduce the risk of developing complications from transfusion therapy. The best match may be someone of the same racial or ethnic group.

Eight-year-old AJ Torres requires blood transfusions to treat complications from sickle cell disease, the most common genetic disease in the U.S. The disease is most common among people of African descent or Latino descent, like AJ, and can sometimes cause small blood vessels to become blocked. Diverse donors are important to ensuring AJ has the blood products he needs to regain his health.

"Within minutes of receiving a blood transfusion, I watch his strength be restored, pain vanish and energy return. Soon he transforms back to himself - a rambunctious little boy," said his mom, Caira Torres. "If an 8-year-old can withstand a needle, so can you."

Donors of all blood types, as well as all races and ethnicities, are needed to meet the needs of an increasingly diverse patient population. As a thank-you, those who come to give blood or platelets during the month of October will automatically be entered for a chance to win one of five \$500 gift cards redeemable at hundreds of merchants, courtesy of Tango Card. #### Me & Mrachek One More Time

Russ and I met in the fall of 1963, Russ had recently moved from Minnesota to Dickinson with his parents and family.

Russ's dad, Joe, and his older brother, John, were drawn to Dickinson with a company that built electrical transmission lines.

Russ and I met in the Journalism Department at Dickinson State University. We hit it off right away and became best friends. Besides everyday journalism classes the department put out a newspaper called the Western Concept. Russ and I wrote a column about things happening on campus called Me & Mrachek. Russ named the column.

Little did we suspect that the column would become so popular that everyone from the nerds, the athletes, the regular kids to even the faculty waited for the paper to come out to read our column.

I had a girlfriend, Donna, who is now my wife. We both were from Alexander and so we made lots of trips home on weekends. Russ decided to come with us and on one of those trips, when we were driving around town, we stopped to talk to some friends. It was then that Russ met Linda and they were a couple from then on.

Russ and I were involved in a lot of adventures over the years. I lived with Joe and Marilyn, Jerry, Helen and "Gush" for a time while I was going to college. It was a great time, one I'll never forget.

I went into the Navy, encouraged by my local draft board. It was the Vietnam era but I was lucky and spent my entire tour of duty in Japan working between the public affairs office, heading up the base news magazine and at the military newspaper Stars and Stripes. When I got out of the Navy, Russ got me my first

job in the civilian newspaper business. He hired me as editor of Sidney Herald.

We spent the next few years working together and apart. While he was in Arizona, where Wick Communications was headquartered, I would attend conferences there and Russ and Linda always made sure Donna and I were taken care of when we stayed a few extra days.

Russ and I were in northern Ontario, Canada on a fishing adventure with his family in 1980, when Mt. St. Helens blew its top. With no outside news or communication it was an eerie feeling when the sun didn't come through for four days because of the volcanic ash. We finally got a three-day old newspaper from a lodge 30 miles across the lake and found out what had happened.

I could go on and on about the things we did together like tipping over my uncle's tractor while packing silage in a pit on his farm; Russ setting the record at Dickinson State College for the most consecutive sit ups at one time; organizing a "Little Kids Christmas Tree Fund" in college so we could replenish our beverage supply; baking buttercup squash on the riverbank

by Williston; and trips to Russ and Linda's winter cabin at Gardner, Montana.

Russ and I lived, hunted, fished, camped, chased girls, got sick and got well together. We partied, healed up from partying and worked together for years. He was a good friend and I'll miss him.



A 3D mammogram consists of multiple breast images taken in just seconds to produce a 3D image. Our radiologists, Dr. Jennifer Adams and Dr. Leszek Jaszczak look through the tissue one millimeter at a time seeing detail inside the breast in a way never before possible.

We recommend yearly mammograms starting at age 40 and continuing for as long as a woman is in good health. Even though mammograms are the best method we have for early detection, not all cancers are found with mammograms. SIDNEY, MT - What's scarier than all the ghosts and goblins roaming the countryside on Halloween? Palmer Amaranth lurking in your fields!

Palmer Amaranth, a pigweed relative, is one of the most serious weeds facing American agriculture today and it's coming this way! After traveling across the southern U.S. and moving northward through the Midwestern states into North Dakota, it now sits on our doorstep ready to pounce.

Be prepared. Join us for a free half-day workshop, "Palmer Amaranth: It's Coming! What You Need to Know" on Tuesday, November 5, at the Richland County Extension Office conference room in Sidney, MT. The event runs from 8:30 a.m. to noon MT and is being sponsored by the Montana Wheat and Barely Committee.

Palmer Amaranth is one of the most adaptable and dangerously resistant weeds in the country. It can grow 2 to 3 inches a day (to a height of 6 or more feet), produce up to a half million seeds per plant and has demonstrated resistance to nearly all herbicides commonly available to producers for weed management. It competes aggressively in crops, emerging throughout the growing season, and its small seeds can be easily transported in equipment or through grain, seed or feed contamination.



Farmers and ranchers across Montana need to take immediate action to identify and prevent establishment here, weed scientists working with this pernicious pest warn. This workshop is designed to provide participants the necessary tools to do that.

The featured speaker is Dr. Jason Bond, the weed control in agronomics crop specialist from Mississippi State University Extension and a 20-year veteran in battling Palmer Amaranth. He describes his talk as "what mistakes we made when Palmer Amaranth showed up and how to avoid doing the same." Dr. Bond works out of the Delta Research and Extension Center and will discuss the problems that Mississippi producers have faced in trying to prevent and control Palmer Amaranth and what they've learned in the process.

Dr. Bond will be joined by other weed experts including Dr. Brian Jenks, weed scientist at the North Central Research Extension Center in Minot, North Dakota. Dr. Jenks will discuss North Dakota's efforts to prevent the spread of Palmer Amaranth since it was first identified there two years ago. Also on tap is Dr. Tim Seipel, Montana State University Extension Cropland Specialist, who will discuss steps Montana producers can take to avoid infestations and more specifically what they can do to combat herbicide resistance. Dr. John Gaskin, Molecular Botanist with the USDA-ARS Northern Plains Agricultural Re-



search Laboratory will discuss identification tips and possible biocontrols, while Plant Ecologist Dr. Natalie West, also with the Sidney ARS lab, will discuss the potential for drones in scouting for the weed.

In addition to their various presentations, the program's weed experts will also participate in a panel question and answer session with attendees.

And finally, Richland County Extension Agent Tim Fine will join Dr. Gaskin to discuss other emerging crop and rangeland weeds MonDak producers need to be on the lookout for.

Pesticide points are pending for this workshop. The workshop will also be broadcast as live webinar at County Extension Offices across the state, where participants will also be eligible for pesticide points.

nutrients.

Fiber-which can be found

sweet potatoes, pumpkins, apples, brussels sprouts, and more. Fiber can help lower cholesterol and even slow our bodies' absorption of sugar from the foods we eat.

Minerals-can be found in broccoli, beets, cabbage, and more. Vitamins and minerals can help our bodies grow, stay healthy, and are important in helping us build healthy bones.

Calcium-can be found in dried figs, dates, broccoli and more. Calcium is an essential mineral for our bodies, it can help keep our teeth and bones healthy, and getting the proper levels over a person's lifetime can help prevent osteoporosis.

Now that we know some of the amazing benefits of our fall fruits and vegetables, you might be wondering about ways to prepare them? In the Montanan State University, Buy Eat Live (2018), Nutritional Fact Sheet on Fall Harvest Vegetables, it mentions roasting beets, carrots, turnips, sweet potatoes, parsnips as a fantastic way to cook these vegetables. Wondering what to do with kale? Try a kale chip recipe that provides a

nice crunch to these vegetables. Try making a fall harvest soup and cook some of your favorite winter squash into a hearty soup. You could even try using spaghetti squash instead of making pasta with vour favorite sauce recipe. The possibilities are endless with fall harvest fruits and vegetables.



#### Richland County Crimestoppers Wanted Person Of The Week

On May 7, 2019 a Bench Warrant was issued out of Montana Seventh Judicial District Court, in Richland County for the arrest of Joseph Dayton Cook for Failure to Appear for Adjudicatory Hearing set for May 6, 2019. Crimestoppers would like to remind everyone that it is a crime to knowingly harbor a person that is wanted by a law enforcement agency.

In March of 2019 Joseph Dayton Cook had been arrested in Williams County, North Dakota on a warrant of Montana Seventh Judicial District Court for Violating Conditions of his sentence. He had originally been charged with felony drug possession and intent to distribute. After being extradited to Montana, he was transported to the Richland County Jail on March 20, 2019 and on March 22, 2019, was released on a \$10,000 bond by a bonding company. On May 6, 2019 he failed to appear in Montana Seventh District Court for an Adjudicatory Hearing that had been scheduled. On May 7, 2019 a Bench Warrant was issued for his arrest, with no bond listed by the Judge. Joseph Dayton Cook, who is 29 years of age, White Male, 5' 7" 200 lbs. with blue eyes and dark blonde hair. He has been known to live in the Sidney and Williston, ND area. Records show that he has lived in Montana, North Dakota, Idaho and Washington at different times. He was born in the state of Idaho. It is felt that Joseph has left the Richland County area and may have returned North Dakota or Idaho. If you know this person or where he is living contact Crimestoppers or your local law enforcement agency. This warrant can be served in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming and Minnesota.

## **Watford City Plans To Have New** Elementary School Ready By Fall Of 2020

The oil and gas industry continues to attract more and more new families to Watford City, and with that, the population of students continues to increase. The McKenzie County school district's growing enrollment rate has so far required the expansion of the existing elementary school in 2012 and the construction of a 53 million dollar high school in 2016 and now requires an additional elementary school.

"Our current Kindergarten through 5th-grade student population is approximately 1,035 students - which clearly shows a need for two elementary buildings as we transition to a more defined K-5 (2), 6-8, and 9-12 student building configuration," explained Dr. Steven Holen, Superintendent of Schools for McKenzie County District No. 1.

In order to accommodate Watford City's growing student population, a new elementary school is being built in the Fox Hills development and close to the new Watford City High School.

The building is expected to be ready for students and teachers by the start of the 2020 - 2021 school year. The current budget is \$35 million as per the bond referendum. It will be two stories high and approximately 90,000 square feet. It is expected to have a student capacity of 600 students, which will

require many teachers. "We will be splitting our current grade levels with the new facility, and we expect 35 to 40 teachers and typical support positions to operate the new school. Not all positions will be new as teachers will transition to the new facility from current facilities - new positions will be based on student growth and section needs for the 2020 - 2021 school year," stated Holen.

When Holen was asked what would be the biggest challenge for the project, he explained that timing will be a big challenge. "As we account for weather conditions in completing the project on time. We are confident in our current timeline and hoping for a mild winter to assist with the current timeline and in getting the building enclosed before major winter conditions. However, we are expecting a slightly later start to the school year than in previous years," said Holen.

Holen expects to see the student population to grow increasingly over the next years. According to the McKenzie County School District No. 1 Enrollment Projections, the district enrollment will increase from the current student population of 1,958 to 3,798 students by the beginning of the 2028-2029 school year.

Although the student population is expected to increase, the new elementary school will suit the needs of the growing student population as of now. Holen explained, "The new elementary school will help meet the growing enrollment and educational needs of our community with features such as collaborative learning spaces, up to date special education, building security, and bus/parent drop off." The Mckenzie County School District No. 1 will have two K-5 elementary schools, one 6-8 middle school, and one 9-12 high school to start off the 2020-2021 school year at Watford City.



It's that time of the year again and hunters couldn't be happier. In a lot of cases, hunting is something they have done their whole lives. Hunter George Stuckers Jr. has been at it since he was a kid.

"I was given my first Red Ryder BB gun when I was five years old. I couldn't even cock it myself, I had to have my dad do it for me," Stuckers said.

Stuckers hunts everything from water fowl, upland game, big game and even does carp shooting. He said his favorite to hunt are elk. Stuckers said that he's only gotten one elk while bow hunting.

He started bow hunting back in 2011 when he moved to Sidney. When asked what his best hunting experience was, Stuckers said it was hard to pull one out of the bunch.

"Each trip is unique in its own way. It differs from each hunt," Stuckers said. "Any hunting experience is pleasurable with family and friends." Stuckers said for the last ten years, he and three of his

friends take a hunting trip to the breaks for one week each While they put in a lot of work scoping out the hunting

ground, getting rifles and bows sighted, it's all worth it for the Stuckers said they use Google Earth to help them scout an

area before they trek out to it. "You can check out the vegetation and the coverage, find

out who owns it and the animals it holds," Stuckers said. "It's really cool."

He typically hunts around Sidney but has hunted from the east to west end of the state on different occasions.

Stuckers's most memorable hunting trip was one where he ended up getting food poisoning and ending up really sick. That was the year he shot his trophy elk. It was so snowy, he and his hunting partners had to stop

and put chains on their tires to finish the drive. After getting out to go hunting, he was so sick he had to go back to the hotel. "Sunday morning it was snowing like crazy. I drove back up

there Sunday night. I got to the top of the mountain and there was three to four feet of snow. I saw two bull elk and I went for the bigger of the two. I shot twice. I was 75 yards away from the road," Stuckers said.

It took six of them to haul his trophy elk to the truck to get it loaded up.



## Free Hunter Workshop In Glasgow

Learn about CWD, how to extract lymph nodes, and how to quarter a big game animal using the "gutless" method



With the detection of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in the state of Montana in 2017, the way hunters approach the hunting and processing of the big game animals of the deer family is changing; especially with hunting and processing an animal in a CWD management zone. At this free workshop, hunters will learn all about hunting in a CWD management zone, including information on CWD, how to extract lymph nodes for testing, and how to quarter a big game animal using the "gutless" method. FWP plans to use recently harvested deer for this demonstration.

The workshop will be held in Glasgow at the FWP Region 6 Headquarters on Sat., Oct. 19, starting at 12:30 p.m. The workshop will be held regardless of weather (there will be an indoor option), and all ages are welcome. The Hi-Line Sportsmen conservation group in Glasgow is sponsoring door prizes, and beverages and light snacks will be available.

CWD Management Zones are areas where CWD is known to exist. In Region 6, the Northern CWD Management Zone includes all districts north of Highway 2. To prevent the spread of CWD from infected areas of Montana to other parts of the state, the whole carcass, whole head, brain, or spinal column from any deer, elk, or moose harvested within a CWD Management Zone may not be removed from that Management Zone unless the animal has tested negative for CWD.

One way to effectively remove the harvested animal from a CWD Management Zone is by quartering it and removing all required consumable parts, which leaves the rest of the carcass in the field. Not only is this an effective method to limit possible transmission of CWD, it is a very efficient way to carry an animal out of the back country. Any big game hunter can benefit by learning how to quarter an animal.

About CWD

CWD is a progressive, always-fatal disease affecting the nervous system of mule deer, white-tailed deer, elk and moose. It is spread primarily through animal-to-animal contact or animal contact with infected materials and tissue. Infected tissue can also be spread by humans, often by dumping animal remains outside of approved landfills.

There is no known transmission of CWD to humans or other animals, including pets or livestock. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that hunters harvesting a deer, elk, or moose from an area where CWD is known to be present have their animal tested for CWD prior to consuming the meat, and to not consume the meat if the animal tests positive.

Hunters who want to have samples tested from outside FWP established survey areas can have them tested and FWP will cover the costs. Prior to the general season, hunters can collect samples themselves and mail them to the FWP Lab in Bozeman — instructions and a video are available on the FWP website. Starting with the general season, hunters can still submit samples themselves or take the samples or a deer/elk/moose head to CWD sampling station or regional offices for assistance.






