On Dec. 9 Lower Yellowstone Lodge #90 hosted the annual "Gifts from the Heart" program in Sidney.

Local residents came to the Lodge and were given bags of food and were able to select toys and Christmas gifts for their children from the collections provided by local charities. Tables were set up for boys and girls and by ages. Five or six families were allowed to enter at a time and were accompanied by a "Santa Shopper" to help them find appropriate gifts.

There were 135 bags of food including canned goods and a \$15 gift card to help purchase a turkey or a ham from the local grocery stores. Toys were collected for over a month at four Edward Jones locations, financial institutions collected hats and mittens, 60 crochet hats were donated, and the ABATE motorcycle club provided money to buy bikes.

Over 200 volunteers from youth groups and church groups helped set up the event in just three days.

In 2022, there were 152 families, including 453 children, that were given gifts and food. This year there were 158 families and 452 children.

Empowering Success: "Gifts From The Heart" Sidney Health Center's **Nurse Residency Program In Action**

Sidney, MT (Dec. 8) - In the dynamic realm of nursing, the journey from graduation to professional practice can be both exhilarating and daunting. Newly licensed registered nurses, Halley Henry, Malisa Reed, and Ande Turner, recently completed Phase One of the Nurse Residency Program at Sidney Health Center.

The initial nine-week portion of the program's onboarding process provided a solid foundation, a diverse range of experiences, and a nurturing environment aimed at fostering their growth as competent healthcare professionals.

Upon completing the introduction week, these nurses delved into intensive two-week rotations across key departments including Med/Surg, CCU/ER, Surgery, and OB. Paired with trained mentors in each department, Halley, Malisa, and Ande embarked on a journey of hands-on learning, gaining insights into specialized areas of nursing.

The program's gradual release design is proving to be instrumental in building their confidence and skills. It offers a panoramic view of the healthcare facility, cultivating a cohesive working environment while allowing these nurses to navigate and understand the intricacies of

each nursing domain. "Exploring different departments has strengthened our nursing skills by giving us insight into their procedures and needs. Understanding the processes from Surgery to Med/Surg or pre-surgery preparations equips us to better inform patients," exclaimed Malissa. "This program broadens our nursing skills and provides a supportive community for new

nurses like myself." Guiding this transformative experience is Danielle Seitz, who is a Registered Nurse and the program's facilitator. Through the threephase onboarding process, Danielle serves as a liaison for these individuals. Her ongoing check-ins and unwavering support throughout the program's duration ensure that nurses feel empowered to identify their unique niches within the organization.

"When approached to lead this project, I was a little overwhelmed by its scale, but the alarming statistics drove my determination to make this rural healthcare program a success," stated Danielle as statistics indicate that between 17-30% of firstyear nurses leave their jobs. "Working closely with newly licensed nurses has been a mutual learning experience. Our platform enables open discussions about both successes and challenges, allowing immediate guidance and reinforcing skills to handle future situations gracefully."

"Like Malisa mentioned, collaborating with various departments broadens our perspective," Halley agreed. "However, having Danielle as our dedicated contact through this program offers us a reliable support system. Whether we encounter challenges, need advice, or seek a sounding board for ideas, knowing we have her support is invaluable."

The stories of Halley, Malisa, and Ande reflect the program's transformative impact, not just in honing technical skills but also in fostering a sense of belonging and purpose within the healthcare community. Their journey underscores the importance of tailored support and comprehensive training in empowering nurses to thrive in the multifaceted landscape of healthcare.

"I am so excited to offer this program to new nurses, who are anxious to put their

skills to work. With so many service lines to choose from. it is often an eye-opening experience," explained Pam McGlothlin, Nursing Services Senior Executive. "Through this onboarding process, they get a sense of what area they want to dedicate their time and talents to and we are open to training them in specialty areas like surgery, labor and delivery,

ICU or cancer care." McGlothlin also points out, "The advantage of working at a critical access hospital, like Sidney Health Center, is that nurses can grow in their profession at an accelerated rate. Moreover, they often become a jack of all trades and a valued member of the team. The nurse residency program really jumpstarts their nursing career in a safe learning environment."



2023 Election **Precinct** Redistricting

New precinct boundaries have been established for Richland County after the adoption of the 2023 Legislative Districting Plan. Section 13-3-102 (1), MCA, requires that precinct boundaries conform to legislative boundaries following the adoption of a districting and apportionment plan under Article V, Section 14 of the Montana Constitution.

The Legislative redistricting plan was determined by the Montana Districting and Apportionment Commission. The new plan divided Richland into two House and two Senate Districts. The division mainly follows along Highway 200 and the Yellowstone River, with some variations closer to the Sidney area. The redistricting split Precinct 7 (Lambert area) into Precinct 7A & Precinct 7B.

House District 30 and Senate District 15 is mostly north of Highway 200 & Highway 23, this includes Precincts 1, 2, 3, 4, 8, 12, 17, 19, 22, 23, and Precinct 7A.

House District 33 and Senate District 17 is mostly south of Highway 200 and Highway 23 and east of the Yellowstone

River, this includes Precincts 5, 9, and Precinct 7B. The new precinct map is available on the Richland County website, Richland.org/elections.

Winter Watering Evergreens

The area has been experiencing dry winter weather

without much snow cover, and moderate daily temperatures, making it beneficial to continue watering your evergreen trees and shrubs.

Evergreens lose moisture all winter long and watering them can reduce the chance of winter injury and desiccation. Water the trees mid-day to ensure the water will soak into the ground and when daytime temperatures are about 40°F. Younger and newly planted trees experience more water-stress compared to established trees, making it even more important to water them during these dry periods. When watering, make sure to water trees around the drip line and shrubs at the base.

Making sure trees are not water-stressed during these warmer periods can make the difference between having a healthy or unhealthy tree next spring.





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

Daniela was a dear lady. Although she didn't have biological children, she considered herself mama of many. She was well known for her strong Romanian accent and her homemade salsa and her tomatoes at the farmer's market.

She worked at Sidney Sugars for 28 years in many different areas. She finished her career in the lab as an assistant chemist. She was part of the A-team as the girls called it. Everyone knew stuff was not good when they heard her on the radio calling the warehouse more than once.

She had a big heart and was always saying a prayer for those who needed it and even for those who didn't know they needed it. She had a strong belief in her faith and loved to share the word with everyone that would take even a moment to listen and if they didn't, she would still pray for them. She was a hard worker and expected you to try your best, and she felt that she could be a teacher of many things from gardening, crocheting, canning, sewing, and the Bible.

She was very vocal and when she was quiet you knew you might be in trouble or she wasn't happy with your language that you had used or you did something that was against the grain of life.

Daniela was always making stocking caps and stockings and would gift them to people for the holidays. In the late summer she tried to always have something for the Farmer's Market-selling peppers, cucumbers, salsa, and her famous tomatoes (she loved being known as the Tomato Lady).










Construction In Sidney To Continue Into 2024, Throughout The Summer

At the end of 2023, the construction that was scheduled in Sidney to go from April through the end of July 2023 is still not done. According to Jeffrey Hintz, public works director, City of Sidney, the water mains are done but there is street work yet to be completed and more projects still needing to be done.


Lincoln Avenue will need to be overlaid from 4th St. S. to Central Avenue as well as 6th St. SW from Lincoln Avenue to Central Avenue. Work on the water tower has already started with a geotechnical investigation to make sure the soil in the park can support a newer, heavier water tower

and will continue through mid-January 2024. In late October, the remodeling of city hall began and is expected to continue until sometime in April. Phase 4 of the wastewater treatment facility will need to start and there are a few streets separate from the Lincoln Avenue project that have been recently overlaid and need to be chip-sealed.

The old wastewater treatment facility lagoon pond had to be chemically treated to help reduce the amount of sludge on the floor of the pond. This treatment took approximately two vears to complete. During the summer of 2023, the city crews drained the pond into the new treatment facility cell

and allowed the pond floor area to dry. The remaining sludge is scheduled to be removed from the old pond in mid-summer of 2024 and applied to area farm fields nearby.

With winter and subzero temperatures just around the corner, most of the work will have to wait for spring or summer. Hopefully, the old lagoon pond will be dried enough by July to allow heavy equipment to enter the pond floor to clean up and properly dispose of the leftover sludge. Overlaying and chip sealing will require the high temperatures of summer to set properly so these projects will not even start again until after school






There are not any sales in the rest of May except the in-store specials, but there will be a regular sale flyer in the papers starting in June. They plan on having a grand opening in August.

2023 Sidney Health Center Year In Review

Sidney, MT - 2023 proved to be a year of remarkable accomplishments and strides at Sidney Health Center. Throughout the year, dedicated efforts remained centered on enhancing patient and resident care. Overall, the organization successfully completed a couple major construction projects, unveiled new service lines, and proudly accepted accolades in recognition of its commitment to excellence.

ER Renovation:

In 2022, Sidney Health Center embarked on an ambitious journey to overhaul its Emergency Department that was originally built in 1983. In 2023, this vision became a reality as the renovation was revealed with a ribbon cutting and open house in October. The \$4.8 million transformation involved not just a facelift but a complete reimagination of how emergency care should be delivered. The result is a cutting-edge facility that aligns with modern emergency medicine practices, prioritizing patient comfort, safety, and efficient care delivery.

One of the most striking features of the renovated **Emergency Department is** the redesigned patient flow. The layout was methodically planned to ensure efficient movement of patients in and out of the ER, minimizing wait times and optimizing the delivery of medical care. Larger patient rooms offer comprehensive monitoring and treatment, regardless of the presenting condition, while soundproofing and privacy measures have been integrated to create a peaceful and confidential atmosphere for patients and their families.

In fiscal year 2023, the ER treated over 6,000 patients, the Richland County Ambulance Service did 538 runs throughout the county, and the Care Flight service provided 386 flights from Sidney Health Center and surrounding facilities.

Cancer Care Expan-

In August 2022, Sidney Health Center began expanding the Cancer Care Center with a second vault. This addition was crucial

diation therapy services. Without it, removal of the original TomoTherapy machine could have disrupted services for three months.

The new radiation vault was completed in fall 2023, with the new unit installed and in operation. This expansion also includes space for a hyperbaric chamber.

Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy (HBOT) is a non-invasive treatment that involves breathing pure oxygen in a pressurized chamber. This therapy has shown remarkable benefits in various medical conditions, including wound healing, decompression sickness, carbon monoxide poisoning, and more.

Sidney Health Center treats people with different types of cancers from several counties in eastern Montana and western North Dakota. The most common types of cancer include breast, prostate, lung, colon, head and neck, and esophageal cancer diagnoses.

facility had 3,444 medical oncology visits and 1,807 radiation therapy visits.

The expansion of the cancer care services to include radiation therapy in 2011 has proved to be a vital and necessary service, serving more than 600 area cancer patients in the first 10 years of operation. 

Sidney McDonald's Fully Reopens After 6 Month Closure For Remodeling

McDonald's fans in Sidney got a scare in 2022. The longstanding business closed its doors for renovations and when the projected reopening date came around the restaurant remained closed. They did reopen and held an open house to celebrate on March 1, 2023.

On Aug. 22, 2022, Emmanuel Leon closed his Sidney McDonald's location for much-needed renovations. He has been the franchise owner of five McDonald's locations including Sidney's since 2021, but the Sidney location was the only one that needed to be modernized. His Sidney staff were

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offered positions at his other locations until renovations could be completed. With help from Corporate Mc-Donald's Leon attempted to use local businesses and contractors to complete the renovations but many were not able to do the work in the time frame he needed it done. He ended up going

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through Ziva Contractors, a company out of Washington state, for general construction. Frontier Heating and Cooling, Sidney were hired to construct the new walkin cooler for the location. Agri Industries, located just across Central Ave from the restaurant did the plumbing.

The projected completion date was originally in October but the store was not ready. Construction was finally complete enough to open the drive-thru on Dec. 12 but the lobby was still being worked on. Besides the new walk-in cooler, Sid-

ney McDonalds now had a new McCafé production line, a state-of-the-art kitchen, new machines, plus a new condensed and optimized production line but the lobby was getting a 4 wall, floor-to-ceiling rebuild. It was going to take longer. Finally, on Feb. 17, renovations were completed and Sidney McDonald's was fully open. The lobby got a new decor package sporting an "Experience of the Future" theme. Besides a new paint job, flooring, furniture, and arraignment of stations; the restaurant now has online

order kiosks, two tabletop game stations, and a counter station just for mobile orders and pay for curbside. Leon said, "I'd like to thank the members of the community that were able to help us out with a special thanks to Frontier Heating and Cooling and Agri Industries." He also wanted to thank his team and local fans

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








