





## Livestock Producers Urged to Document Losses

Livestock producers that suffered losses due to natural disaster are urged to keep thorough records of all losses, including livestock death losses, as well as expenses for such things as feed purchases and extraordinary costs because of lost supplies or increased transportation costs.

USDA Farm Service Agency State Executive Director Aaron Krauter said that both versions of the pending Farm Bills contain a reauthorization of the lapsed disaster programs such as the Livestock Indemnity Program that are retroactive for losses occurring from October 2011. "We're optimistic that a Farm Bill will be passed and we'll be able to provide that strong safety net for producers," Krauter said. "While we can't

accept documentation in FSA offices until the programs are reauthorized, it's extremely important that farmers and ranchers affected by adverse weather events keep thorough records of their losses."

Owners and producers should record all pertinent information of natural disaster consequences, including:

Documentation of the number and kind of livestock that have died, supplemented if possible by photographs or video records of ownership and losses:

Dates of death supported by birth recordings or purchase receipts;

Costs of transporting livestock to safer grounds or to move animals to new pastures:

Feed purchases if supplies or grazing pastures are destroyed; Crop records, including seed and fertilizer purchases, planting and production records;

Pictures of on-farm storage facilities that were destroyed by an adverse weather event; and

Evidence of damaged farm land

Producers with damaged farmland should contact their local FSA office regarding the Emergency Conservation Program, and producers with private forest land should contact FSA regarding the Emergency Forest Reserve Program.

FSA's authority to operate the five disaster assistance programs authorized by the 2008 Farm Bill, including SURE, LIP, ELAP, LFP and TAP expired on September 30, 2011.





## North Dakota Sportsmen Against Hunger Accepting Deer, Light Goose Meat

North Dakota's Sportsmen Against Hunger Program is again accepting donations of deer at select processors across the state. In addition, the program is also able to accept light goose breast meat (snow, blue and Ross's geese) for the first time this fall.

Canada goose meat, while accepted during the early goose season, is not eligible for donation during the regular waterfowl season.

Sportsmen Against Hunger is a program administered by the North Dakota Community Action Partnership, a nonprofit agency that serves low-income families across the state. SAH raises funds to pay for processing of donated deer and geese, and coordinates distribution of ground venison and goose meat to food pantries around the state.

The State Game and Fish Department strongly supports the SAH program and encourages hunters to consider donating deer, according to agency Director Terry Steinwand. The program can accept whole deer only, which must be processed at a participating licensed meat processor.

According to NDCAP Executive Director Andrea Olson, the SAH program has sufficient funding available to process deer and geese this fall. "The meat that is generated is so appreciated by the families who receive it," Olson said. "They are all so grateful for access to a nutritious source of protein; something that is often expensive and otherwise difficult for them to obtain."

A list of participating processors and more information is available on the Community Action website at capnd.org.

Participating processors will not accept deer shot in the hind quarters, and donated deer will be processed individually or only with other donated deer.

Hunters can clean their light geese at home prior to delivery to a processor, but breast meat brought from home without a wing or head attached to the meat must be accompanied by written information that includes the hunter's name, address, signature, hunting license number, date taken and species and number taken.

Hunters may also deliver light geese directly from the field to a processor, but identification must remain attached to the bird until in possession of the processor.

Hunters interested in donating light geese are encouraged to call processors to have a clear understanding of how goose breasts will be accepted.



## **Storytelling** in the Oil Patch

Writing Workshops Nov. 7 & 21

An organization in North Dakota believes it's just as important to harvest the stories coming out of western North Dakota as it is to capture the natural resources there. To achieve their goal, the North Dakota Humanities Council (NDHC) will send two professional writers with North Dakota roots to communities directly affected by the recent oil boom to host writing workshops exploring the ways oil is transforming the landscape and culture.

Everyone is invited to stop by over their lunch break and tour the rehab gym. The staff will be serving root beer floats and be available to visit about the services provided within the rehab department. Information will be available on the proper ergonomic computer setup to help prevent neck pain and other potential consequences related to a poor desk setup. Other information will include ways to help reduce knee pain with activity.

In addition, attendees will have an opportunity to register for a chance to win great gifts including an iPod Nano and free physical therapy consultations.

Physical therapists are healthcare professionals who evaluate and treat individuals of all ages and health conditions that limit their ability to move and perform functional activities of daily living. Physical therapists examine the individuals and develop a plan to provide treatment techniques to promote movement, reduce pain, restore function and prevent disability, as well as develop fitness and wellness programs for a more healthy and active lifestyle.

Sidney Health Center's rehabilitation team has five physical therapists on staff including Kirby Halvorson, who is also the department manager, Viola Anderson, Jace Everett, Nicole Keysor and Amanda Piatte. Other staff members include Vince McGlothlin, occupational therapist, Chris Mullin, rehab aid and Juanita Johnson, front desk. The rehabilitation staff at Sidney Health Center work together to help individuals in the hospital, extended care, and outpatient rehab area.





## Giving Credit Where Credit Is Due - Fracking Pioneer George Mitchell

**Submitted by Tie Shank** George Mitchell Galveston, Texas passed away July 26, 2013. Mitchell earned a degree from Texas A&M University in petroleum engineering and then not only started an independent oil and gas company, Mitchell

Energy & Development

Corp, but he built it into

a Fortune 500 Company.

Mitchell had passion for technology. When so many large oil and gas companies were interested in shale gas but could not get the gas to flow, or make the breakthrough in fracking, Mitchell spent ten years and \$6 million to make that breakthrough.

In the 1980s and 1990s, Mitchell pioneered the technique fracturing and horizontal drilling in the Barnett Shale of Texas. He is also credited for pioneering the lower Bakken shale. This technique spread like wildfire and spawned a gas boom across North America.

As companies

Mitchell's adopted Techniques to oil fields, crude production has more than quadrupled in the Bakken formation in North Dakota and Montana in the past three years and U.S. gas production rose 25 percent in the past decade, pushing prices to a 10-year low in April

Α biography the website of the Cynthia and George Mitchell Foundation "Against the states, sentiments prevailing both within and outside the company, George persisted through 17 years of failures and incremental successes."

The biography goes on to say, "Finally, as he approached his 80th birthday, gas from these experimental wells began to flow in hugely profitable volumes."

During his career, he participated in drilling approximately 8,000 wells, including more than 1,000 wildcats. In his later years, Mitchell became an advocate for tighter regulation and safer practices around hydraulic fracturing.

Mitchells Energy & Development Corp. was acquired by Devon Energy in 2002.

Due to Mitchell's consistent, extraordinary vision and determination, fracturing has since driven a boom in oil and gas production credited with substantially improving U.S. energy security.

Mr. Mitchell will forever be remembered as "the Father of Shale."







## **MT Red Cross Wants You to** Stay Safe While Cooking, **Prevent Kitchen Fires**

The American Red Cross responds to thousands of fires in peoples' homes every year and most of those fires occur while someone is cooking. The focus of this year's fire prevention campaign is "Prevent Kitchen Fires" and the Red Cross is offering tips for staying safe in the kitchen.

"Montana Red Cross responded to 82 home fires around the state last year. We see firsthand the destruction a cooking fire can cause," said Rod Kopp, CEO of Montana Red Cross. "Yet most of these fires can be prevented. We urge everyone to follow our safety tips when they are preparing meals at home."

## **KEEP AN EYE ON WHAT YOU FRY**

The cook should not wear loose clothing or dangling sleeves while cooking. They should also stay in the kitchen and never leave cooking food unattended. If they must leave the kitchen. for even a short period of time, they should turn off the stove

Other ways to avoid cooking fires include:

Fires can start when the heat is too high. When frying food, if the cook sees smoke or the grease starts to boil, turn the burner off.

Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.

Clean and clear the area around the stove before turning on the heat.

back of the stove so no one bumps them or pulls them over.

Move things that can burn away from the stove - items such as dishtowels, bags, boxes, paper and curtains

Keep a pan lid or a cookie sheet nearby. Use it to cover the pan if it catches on fire. This will put out the fire.

The Pan Is On Fire

If the pan catches fire, don't move it. Slide a pan lid or cookie sheet on top of the pan to take the air away and put the fire out. Turn off the heat. Keep the lid on the pan until it cools. Never try to stop a grease or oil fire with water – it will only make the fire bigger.

### **OVEN, MICROWAVE FIRES**

If something catches fire in the oven, keep the door closed. Call 9-1-1 so firefighters can make sure the fire didn't spread to the walls. If a fire occurs in the microwave, keep the door closed and unplug the microwave if you can. Don't use it until a repairman checks it.

### STOP, DROP AND ROLL

If a fire occurs and someone's clothes are on fire, they should stop where they are immediately, drop to the floor, cover their face with their hands and roll over and over to suffocate the flames. Keep doing it until the fire is out.

## JUST GET OUT

Leave the home and Turn pot handles to the call the fire department from outside. Make sure everyone in the home gets out - fast. Once outside, stay out. Never go back inside a burning building.







## **Hunters** Report Few Sightings of **Dead Deer**

Even with thousands of hunters in the field during the opening week of the pheasant season, the State Game and Fish Department received only a few reports from hunters who found dead deer in southwestern North Dakota.

Game and Fish personnel have been monitoring the deer population in the southwest since late August, when the first reports of dead deer, attributed to epizootic hemorrhagic disease, came in from Bowman, Grant and Burleigh counties.

Isolated deer deaths continued into mid-September. prompting the department to suspend the sale of slightly more than 1,000 antlerless deer licenses that were still available in units 3F1, 3F2 and 4F in the southwestern part of the state.

Dr. Dan Grove, Game and Fish wildlife veterinarian, said information received from pheasant hunters is helpful in evaluating the magnitude of an EHD situation.

"The area of the state where EHD traditionally occurs is covered with hunters," Grove said. "With only a minimal number of dead deer sightings, combined with recent overnight low temperatures below freezing, it appears the worst of the EHD outbreak may be behind us."

EHD is a naturally occurring virus that is spread by a biting midge. It is almost always fatal to infected white-tailed deer, and is most noticeable in western North Dakota when high whitetail populations combine with a hot and humid late summer and early fall. Most deer that die from this are infected before the first hard frost, which kills the biting midges that spread the disease. Mule deer do not usually die from the

EHD causes dehydration and a high body temperature, causing deer to seek water prior to death. Other clinical and behavior symptoms may include respiratory distress; swelling of head, neck, and tongue; lesions on tongue and roof of mouth; indifference to humans; and in later stages, hemorrhaging from body orifices.

The transmission cycle of the viruses involved in EHD is complex and involves both domestic and wild animal reservoirs. Although it is rare for cattle to develop the clinical disease from the viruses that kill deer, during a wide scale outbreak such as in 2011, or a localized outbreak like this fall, it is not uncommon for cattle in affected areas to develop clinical disease. Grove said North Dakota is not alone this year, as EHD has been detected in wildlife in Wyoming, Montana, South Dakota and Michigan, and in both domestic and wild ruminants in Wisconsin and Iowa.

EHD is not a danger to humans. Hunters do not have to worry about handling or consuming meat from infected deer. However, hunters should not shoot or consume a deer if it
