Public Hearing Scheduled in Watford City For Proposed Crude Oil Pipeline

BISMARCK, ND - The North Dakota Public Service Commission (PSC) will hold a public hearing in Watford City on Thursday, Feb. 11, regarding a proposal for a crude oil pipeline in McKenzie County.

Tesoro High Plains Pipeline Company, LLC, has submitted an application for a permit for the Targa Antelope Lateral Pipeline Project. The new 1.4-mile long, 12-inch diameter crude oil pipeline would be built in McKenzie County. The project would enable Tesoro to more fully utilize its existing pipeline system, increase the storage and transportation capabilities of the system, and provide increased flexibility in transporting Bakken production the Tesoro's Mandan Refinery and other customer outlets. The maximum capacity of the pipeline would be 75,000 barrels per day, with a normal throughput of approximately 30,000 barrels per day. Estimated cost of the project is \$8.9 million.

The pipeline would connect the Targa Resources surface site and associated facilities with Tesoro's existing main trunk line approximately one mile south of Tesoro's Charlson Station. The public hearing will be on Thurs., Feb. 11, 2016 starting at 11:30 p.m. at Teddy's Residential Suites, 113 9thth Ave. SE Watford City, ND.

A substantive Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) will conduct this hearing. The ALJ will conduct the hearing and related proceedings and issue recommended findings of fact and conclusions of law and a recommended order. The PSC Commissioners will review all the information in the record and make the final decision on the case at a later date.


The hearing provides an opportunity for members of the public to contribute to the PSC's official record. Any comments from members of the public must be received at the hearing to be part of the record. People with concerns, questions or support/opposition for the project are encouraged to attend the hearing and present the information. Information received after the hearing will not be part of the official record and cannot be used as a basis for the Commission's decision unless certain additional procedures are followed. The North Dakota Public Service Commission is a constitutionally created state agency with authority to permit, site and regulate certain business activities in the state including electric and gas utilities, telecommunications companies, power plants, electric transmission lines, pipelines, railroads, grain elevators, auctioneers, commercial weighing devices, pipeline safety and coal mine reclamation. Public Hearing On Navratil **Channel Migration Easement**

On Wed., January 27th, at 7 p.m., Mike Backes with Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) and Tom Hinz with Montana Aquatic Resources Services Inc. (MARS), invited the public to comment on a proposal to fund the purchase of a perpetual channel migration easement (CME) on 89.5 acres in Richland County along the Yellowstone River near Sidney, MT. The CME is a conservation easement that includes land bordering a stream or river where the Landowner (The Navratil Family) agrees not to riprap or otherwise stabilize the riverbank, allowing the river's natural erosive processes to continue. The easements include important habitats provided for fish and wildlife species, in part by prohibiting rip rapping and dumping along the riverbank within the easement area. Montana Land Reliance (MLR), the state's largest land and trust, will hold in the easement in perpetuity.

Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), a member of the Upper Basin Pallid Sturgeon Governing Board, provided seed money to FWP in 2008 to do one or more sloughing easements. FWP later selected MARS to help develop the pilot sloughing, or CME, easement with the Navratils. WAPA also helps with other Pallid Sturgeon recovery projects, including research and management of the fish.

If the expenditure of FWP fund for the CME is approved, there would be 11 practices that would be prohibited throughout the easement. Some of these practices include bank stabilization, dumping, mineral extraction, placement of subdivisions, and camper and trailers, construction, roads, etc. The CME will have no negative effect on wildlife, land resources, water resources, and more. The purpose is to basically allow the river to migrate naturally by purchasing the right of the landowner to stabilize the river bank.

Public comments included complaints such as "It's a waste of money," and "If I can't dump on my land, I won't be able to irrigate my crops." Several citizens at the hearing were neighbors of the Navratil family, and did not like the idea of spending money on something that would happen naturally and not being able to prevent the loss of their own land.

Mike Backes, who has been involved with the project since 2008, will be paying close attention to the public comments. "We were hoping to make the decision to make the purchase on January 29th after all comments have been received, but after tonight I see we will have to revise the CME to better suit the public's needs."

Public Hearings Scheduled In Watford City For Two Separate Proposed Pipelines

BISMARCK, ND - The North Dakota Public Service Commission (PSC) will hold two public hearings in Watford City on Tuesday, Feb. 9, 2016, regarding two separate pipeline proposals in McKenzie County.

ONEOK Bakken Pipeline hearing for the Garden Creek Loop NGL Pipeline Project will be Tues., Fe. 29 at 9 a.m. CST at Teddy's Residential Suites, 113 9th Ave. SE, Watford City, ND, 58854.

ONEOK Bakken Pipeline, LLC, has submitted an application for a permit for the Garden Creek natural gas liquids (NGL) Pipeline Loop Project. The new 14.4-mile long, 16-inch diameter steel loop pipeline and associated facilities would be built in McKenzie County. Looping a pipeline involves operating a shorter segment of pipeline in parallel with the existing pipeline. The loop is connected to the main pipeline to help reduce pressure drop and increase capacity of the system. The pipeline will parallel and interconnect with the existing ONEOK Garden Creek NGL Pipeline to expand its capacity from 74,000 barrels per day to 93,000 barrels per day. The pipeline would transport Y-grade NGLs, which is a mixture of ethane, propane, butanes, iso-butane mix, pentanes, and natural gasoline. Estimated cost of the project is \$19.5 million.

The existing Garden Creek pipeline starts at the ONEOK Rockies Midstream Garden Creek

Gas Plants near Watford City and proceeds generally west and south through McKenzie County. Approximately 12.8 miles of the proposed loop will be co-located with the existing pipeline right-of-way. Oasis Midstream Services, LLC, has submitted an application for a permit for the Wild Basin to Johnsons Corner Crude Oil Pipeline in McKenzie County. The pipeline would be a new 10.75 inch diameter crude oil mainline with one lateral pipeline totaling approximately 19 miles in length (the mainline is approximately 18.3 miles and the lateral is approximately 0.9 miles in length). The pipeline would have a maximum capacity of 75.000 barrels per day. Oasis also plans to build three above ground storage tanks at the Wild Basin Gas Processing and Crude Handling Facility with a storage capacity of 200,000 barrels. Estimated cost of the project is \$13 million.

The mainline will originate at the Wild Basin Gas Processing Facility and extend southeast to terminate at the Tesoro Johnsons Corner Station, which is approximately 2.8 miles east of Johnsons Corner. The lateral would transport crude from the mainline to the proposed Dakota Access Pipeline. The hearings provide an opportunity for members of the public to contribute to the PSC's official record. Any comments from members of the public must be received at the hearings to be part of the record. People with concerns, questions or support/opposition for the project are encouraged to attend the hearings and present their information. Information received after the hearings will not be part of the official record and cannot be used as a basis for the Commission's decision unless certain additional procedures are followed.

The North Dakota Public Service Commission is a constitutionally created state agency with authority to permit, site and regulate certain business activities in the state including electric and gas utilities, telecommunications companies, power plants, electric transmission lines, pipelines, railroads, grain elevators, auctioneers, commercial weighing devices, pipeline safety and coal mine reclamation. 

Richland Community Complex Moves Forward Based On Survey Results

The phase 1 analysis and survey results show a positive community interest for a recreation & event center in Eastern Montana. The results are a great step forward in making a recreation facility that will help to address the current needs in our community. The potential building analysis will be scaled back to the current needs, with the ability to grow in the future in stages. This stage 2 analysis will give us a better idea of what we can support here in our area. The survey showed a positive community interest for a indoor pool with the capabilities for water physical therapy, swimming lessons, and a family environment for recreation. Other positives were the need for more gym space for athletes and the ability to host events for our area which will help to bring an economic stability to our businesses. An indoor track and workout facility with more capabilities, meeting spaces, and outdoor spaces with soccer fields, along with drop-in daycare and space for fine

arts/musical performances were also identified.

We are hoping to find a way to enhance what we currently have by putting the most important needs first and have a plan for the future. The 2nd phase of this analysis will give us a road map to move forward.

Conventions, Sports & Leisure International (CSL) has completed a Phase I draft analysis that comprehensively evaluates the market demand for the potential development of a new multipurpose, recreation and event center in eastern Montana. The research involved in this Phase included a detailed analysis of: existing market conditions; industry trends and characteristics; and, competitive and comparable facilities.

Additionally, we conducted an extensive survey process to measure demand for recreation and event space in eastern Montana that included: conversations with local area leaders and stakeholders; state and regional organizers of rotating meetings

and events; concert and other touring show promoters; organizers and representatives of amateur sports tournaments; meets and other competitions; and, outreach to the eastern Montana community residents, which resulted in nearly 400 completed on-line surveys. The results of these efforts were then synthesized and translated into a market supportable facility program for the potential development of a recreation and event center in eastern Montana.

The Richland Community Complex Board of Directors subsequently has requested that CSL continue with a Phase II evaluation of various key quantitative cost and benefit aspects, including financial operating, economic impacts and potential funding opportunities for a potential new recreation and event center. At the conclusion of this analysis, we will develop findings and recommendations as to how the community could best proceed in order to protect its priorities and to best integrate efficiencies that may be available through various partnership opportunities.



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


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The Public is Encouraged to Comment on the Intake Diversion Dam Fish Passage Project on or Before Feb. 17

On Thursday, January 21st, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation held a public scoping meeting at the Dawson County High School in Glendive, MT to gather public opinion and answer questions about the alternatives being studied as part of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Intake Diversion Dam fish passage project.

The EIS is being developed to better determine how fish passage, especially that of the endangered pallid sturgeon, can be improved with continued viable operation of the Lower Yellowstone Irrigation Project (LYIP). The LYIP provides water to over 50,000 acres of land from Intake into western North Dakota and is vital to agriculture in the area, with annual gross crop values currently between \$25 million and \$30 million.

However, the pallid sturgeon, native to the Yellowstone River, struggle to swim in the turbulent waters created by the dam, causing them to spawn below Intake. Newly hatched pallid sturgeon can't swim for the first 13- 15 days of life and drift downstream; it is believed that they then drift into Lake Sakakawea and die in the lake environment.

Over thirty individuals with the USACE, Department of Omaha, the BOR, and Tetra Tech, a company that has been

contracted to develop alternatives and write the EIS, are working on the project. Alternatives include No Action which would mean the continued operation and maintenance of the existing project, permit for rocking, and Endangered Species Act Section 7 consultation; the Rock Ramp Alternative which would replace the existing weir with a concrete weir and a shallow-sloped, un-grouted rock ramp. The Bypass Channel Alternative which would construct a bypass channel around the existing weir and divert about 15% of total river flow. The High Flow Channel Alternative which would modify an existing side channel around the current weir to divert river flow. The Pumping Alternative that would include either pumping stations (surface water) or Ranney wells (infiltration galleries) to divert water into the existing irrigation canal and the Non-Weir Alternative which could include pumping, alternative energy sources and conservation. Finally, there will be consideration of other recommended alternatives identified during scoping.

mil. Comments must be postmarked or received via email by February 17, 2016. A draft of the EIS will be complete in May 2016 at which time the BOR will hold another public scoping meeting with another 45-day comment period. The final EIS will be complete in November of 2016.

MFU Says Montana Farmers at Disadvantage When It Comes to Exporting Wheat to Canada

Great Falls- Montana Farmers Union Board Secretary-Treasurer Erik Somerfeld visited with staff from all three of Montana's delegates in Washington D.C. this week regarding Canada's current wheat grading system. This comes on the heels of a letter Senator Tester sent to U.S. Trade Representative Michael Froman requesting the ambassador address the issue with the Canadian government.

Under the current system, when Montana wheat crosses the border it is automatically downgraded to feed, the lowest quality designation. However, the United States has made it a priority to fairly examine wheat imported from Canada. Somerfeld spoke on behalf of Montana producers during his visit with the senator. "This discrepancy leads to an unfair disadvantage for Montana farmers who work tirelessly to provide high-quality wheat. MFU is in favor of standards that don't unfairly discount Montana grain," said Somerfeld.

Paul Kanning, MFU Board Member and farmer in Flaxville, grows spring wheat. Currently he sells his wheat in state, but

would consider doing business with Canada if it made financial sense to do so. "If the rules were more balanced, it would open up the options for us and put us on a level playing field," said Kanning.

Montana farmers export more wheat to Canada than any other nation, and contribute billions each year to the national economy. MFU President Alan Merrill: "Montana farmers depend on equitable grain pricing to put food on the table for people all over the world. We applaud Senator Tester's commitment to Montana agriculture."

Somerfeld was in D.C. to represent Montana on the National Farmers Union Policy Committee. With input from delegates and membership the committee will then submit

the committee will then submit a final copy of the policy at the national convention in March in Minneapolis.

Holzman said public health enhances quality of life in Montana by helping to build healthy communities. From ensuring tobacco free public spaces to helping healthcare improve patient


care, it touches everyone in Montana - from birth to death. Traditionally, public health

Affordable Housing **Development Assistance Available To Rural Communities**

BISMARCK, ND - North Dakota Housing Finance Agency is currently accepting applications for development assistance in rural communities through the state's Housing Incentive Fund. "Development in rural communities poses some unique challenges," said Jolene Kline, NDHFA executive director. "Having an adequate supply of affordable housing strengthens a community and by limiting a funding round to our state's smaller communities, we are ensuring that rural communities have access to this very valuable state resource."

During the 2015 Legislative Session, NDHFA was given the authority to issue \$30 million in state tax credits to capitalize the program and was provided with \$5 million from profits earned by Bank of North Dakota. An additional \$5 million was provided when 2015 bank profits reached \$130 million. The new money is set aside for communities with populations less than 12,500.

HIF program information is available online at www. ndhousingincentivefund.org. To be considered for funding, applications for assistance must be submitted by 5 p.m. (CST) on March 31. For more information, contact NDHFA at (800) 292-8621 or hfainfo@nd.gov.

Community populations will be determined using 2010 U.S. Census data. The program's other allocation criteria will be unchanged.

Since HIF's inception, NDHFA has allocated more than \$84 million to projects, leveraging more than \$424.5 million in construction financing to support the development of 2,500 new units statewide.



Bozeman, Mont., Jan. 29, 2016-The USDA Natural Reirces Conservation Service in Montana has extended the funding application deadline for the Wetland Reserve Easement component of the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) from Jan. 15, 2016, to March 11, 2016. Landowners interested in conservation easements to address natural resource concerns can submit applications at any time. Though signup is continuous, funding selections are made at specific times during the fiscal year. To be considered for funding in Fiscal Year 2016, applications for Wetland Reserve Easements need to be submitted by March 11, 2016. NRCS provides technical and financial assistance directly to private landowners and Indian tribes to restore, protect, and enhance wetlands through the purchase of a wetland reserve easement. For acreage owned by an Indian tribe, there is an additional enrollment option of a 30-year contract. MT Department Of Revenue Mails Thousands Of Livestock Reporting Forms For March 1 Reporting Deadline

Helena – The Montana Department of Revenue is mailing livestock reporting forms this week to Montanans who own livestock and need to meet upcoming reporting and payment deadlines.

About 21,000 Montanans who reported last year will receive reporting forms. To make reporting easier, the department prepopulated the forms with statewide livestock information that is organized by county.

All livestock owners need to report by March 1, 2016, any livestock they own as of February 1. You can submit the hard-copy form you receive or file online at ReportYourLivestock. mt.gov.


Livestock owners who have not reported in the past need to report online or fill out a reporting form available at revenue. mt.gov or pick up a form at their local Department of Revenue office.

Starting this year, a new law changes the payment schedule. Livestock per capita fees are due May 31 instead of November 30 to decrease the time between reporting and payment. Livestock owners are now able to report and pay online at the same time and track their reporting history. "The department wants to make it more convenient for livestock owners to report their livestock and pay their fees," said Director Mike Kadas, Montana Department of Revenue. "The online system is efficient and secure, which makes it easier for livestock owners to do business in Montana."
