Forage Analysis Workshop Kicks Off ARS 2017 BrownBagger **Series**

The USDA-Agricultural Research Service facility in Sidney is pleased to partner with the Richland County Extension Office to host an interactive forage analysis workshop to open the lab's 15th annual winter BrownBagger series on Friday, Jan. 20th.

This special kickoff presentation features Montana State University Extension Beef Specialist Rachel Endecott and will be held from noon to 1 pm in the Tech Transfer Room at the Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab (NPARL) in Sidney, MT. The lab is located at 1500 N. Central Avenue.

Dr. Endecott will discuss how to properly interpret a forage analysis so that producers know what nutrients are being supplied in their cows' diets through their forages, according to Richland County Agent Tim Fine. "The workshop is intended to be interactive," he said. "Participants are encouraged to bring a forage analysis with them to be used for a one-on-one analysis with Dr. Endecott." Fine had announced last week that producers should include requests for ADF (acid detergent fiber) and NDF (neutral detergent fiber) figures when requesting forage reports for this event.

Having a handle on forage nutrition content could go far in saving producers time and money, Fine said, particularly in this low price market. Dr. Endecott's presentation will provide tips on how to do just that, he said, noting that cattle producers will still find the talk very informative regardless of whether they are able to bring their own forage analyses to the event.

The Extension Office and Sidney ARS invite all interested persons to join us for this very enlightening kick-off presentation at noon on Friday, Jan. 20, at NPARL. Bring your lunch. We'll provide the dessert!

If you are like me, when the term livestock producers in Richland County is mentioned, your thoughts almost immediately turn to our ranchers who are working with cattle every day. And while our cattle ranchers certainly make up a large portion of the livestock inventory in our county, we still have a fair amount of sheep producers who often times get little or no attention or thought. In February, Richland County will be hosting the Eastern Montana Sheep symposium to hopefully bring some much needed educational programming and shed some light on our other livestock producers in the county.

The plans are still in the works and logistics are being ironed out, but for the most part the schedule is confirmed. The Eastern Montana Sheep Symposium will be held Monday, February 13 here at the meeting room at the Richland County Extension Office. This program will begin at 10:00 AM and end around 3:00 PM with a lunch provided. The exact schedule is still being hammered out, but the topics will include; Ewe Body Condition Scoring and Late Gestation Nutrition, Alternative Feed Stuffs, An Update from the Montana Wool Growers Association (MWGA), Results from a Trace Mineral Study, Integrated Pest Management, and Marketing.

Speakers for this event include Dr. Whit Stewart who is our MSU Extension sheep specialist; Colleen Buck, the Agriculture/4-H Extension Agent in Sheridan County, Chad Page, a masters in science degree student at MSU working on trace mineral supplementation in growing ram lambs; Sam Ortmann a district director with MWGA; and Larry Prager with Center of the Nation Wool in Belle Fourche.

Consider this your "save the date" announcement with more details and a complete schedule to come. There will be a charge at the door as lunch will be provided but all of those details are still being hammered out.

It is my hope that we will be able to fill the meeting room for this event which, to my knowledge, has not been held in Richland County previously. If you are a sheep producer, are looking at getting into the business, are looking at diversifying your operation, or are just generally curious about what it takes to raise some sheep, you are encouraged to attend. 



Montana Department of Transportation **Proposes Resurfacing Project for Montana Secondary Highway 254**

The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) would like to notify the public and seek comments on a proposal to resurface about 11.8 miles of Secondary Highway 254 between Bloomfield and Richey in Dawson County. The project begins approximately 8 miles north of Bloomfield at the intersection with county roads 416 and 516 at reference post 31.5 and extends northwest for approximately 11.8 miles, ending at the intersection with Montana Highway 200 at reference post 43.3.

Proposed work includes milling the existing surface, applying a new overlay, and finishing with a seal and cover (chip seal), and also includes upgraded pavement marking, signage and centerline rumble strips. The purpose of the project is to extend the life and service of the existing pavement.

The project is tentatively scheduled for construction in January 2019, but may be let earlier, depending on completion of all project development activities and availability of funding. No new right-of-way or utility relocations will be needed.



I wonder where the term 'golden years' came from to describe those of us who not only have gold in our teeth and silver in our hair, but also some lead in our derrieres. From what I see to date, no gold of any sort accompanies those aches and pains and other little mishaps we oldsters seem to face more and more frequently.

Case in point: about a month ago I slipped on a patch of ice in my back yard and fell splat on my back. It has taken those four plus weeks since my crash for the muscles, ligaments, and ribs on my right side to heal enough so that I feel I have nearly returned to pre-accident form. I certainly received no gold of any sort as a result of this unfortunate incident.

However, the fall also made me pause for thought.

These golden years have a lot of pitfalls. What if I had broken a hip, or a leg, or my back, and become incapacitated? How would I cope? My golden years haven't provided me with a plethora of spare cash, so how would I live if something devastating happened to me? The future holds two very real potential pitfalls, the state of my finances as well as the state of my

All of us face advancing age with different viewpoints and different wants and needs. My parents moved to a senior living facility that provided total care. Most residents started out living independently in the village (which my siblings and I dubbed Geezerville). As situ-

> ations changed for individual residents, they could move to an apartment that provided some assisted living, then if and when the time came, they moved to a hospital bed. This set-up ideally suited my mother who enjoyed having company and neighbors close by, appreciated the opportunity to enjoy a cottage living situation without the maintenance or

but at the same time, knew that immediate help was a

simple phone call away. This setup provided her with security and safety. Geezerville suited my mother perfectly.

A senior living center like that might appeal to my older sister as well, but it would not work for me, my brother, or my younger sister. Besides, I know very well I could not afford those living conditions. My golden years have not manifested enough gold for that scenario.

Besides, I want to age at home, live in my own house for as long as I can. However, that means I need to plan, to think ahead, and to try to anticipate how my needs might change with advancing age.

With very little gold to back us up, my husband and I have already put plans in place for our future. We have our current home on the market, and when it sells, we plan to move a small cabin to a five acre lot we purchased just outside of Virginia City. We expect this move will lower our taxes, slash heating costs in half, demand less money for maintenance and repairs, and get us in the financial mindset required for living on a reduced income. I still hope to retire from working full time before I reach the age of 90 and have begun to drool.

Striking a reasonable balance between what I want now and what I might want or need in the future can sometimes prove a tad difficult. My brother-in-law, after hearing our plans and seeing the layout of the cabin we plan to purchase, inquired if we really wanted a loft at our age. I thought about that question for a nanosecond and replied that yes I do. At this point in my life a loft presents no obstacle for me and it is a feature I always wanted in a cabin. Negotiating a loft may become dicey in ten years, but I want to enjoy it while I can. If a loft becomes out of the question down the road, then I just won't utilize that space. I can live the life I want all on the ground floor of our little home. I figure that yes I need to plan for older age and the pitfalls it will present, but I also want to live and enjoy what I have now. If a loft tickles my fancy and I can still easily handle the steps, then why not?

There is only so much we can do to plan ahead. Financially, we can save every possible penny, we can and will downsize, cut out unnecessary expenditures, and take delight in what we have and in the small pleasures that come our way.


Health-wise, we can only do our best to maintain our vigor. We eat properly, exercise well, and follow basic safety and common sense activities. I have always been healthy and plan to remain that way, but we don't usually have much say about what might befall us physically.

I have no idea how to plan for the eventuality of poor health, other than keep paying health premiums. I can only plan so far financially as well. After all, I no longer have thirty working years ahead of me. I have what I have at this point, and I can only cut back, make do, get my cabin outfitted for the future, and live within my means.

I want to live fully and well, I want to continue to enjoy life, but I also want to afford to eat when I reach 90, if I should live that long. Nearly 12 Million People with Medicare Have Saved Over \$26 Billion on Prescription **Drugs Since 2010**

Over 40 million Medicare beneficiaries utilized free preventive services in 2016

The Department of Health and Human Services released today new information that shows that millions of seniors and people with disabilities with Medicare continue to save on prescription drugs and see improved benefits in 2016 as a result of the Affordable Care Act.

More than 11.8 million Medicare beneficiaries have received discounts over \$26.8 billion on prescription drugs - an average of \$2,272 per beneficiary - since the enactment of the Affordable Care Act. In 2016 alone, over 4.9 million seniors and people with disabilities received discounts of over \$5.6 billion, for an average of \$1,149 per beneficiary. This is an increase in savings compared to the 2015 information released this time last year, when 5.2 million Medicare beneficiaries received discounts of \$5.4 billion, for an average of \$1,054 per beneficiary.

Medicare beneficiaries also continue to take advantage of certain recommended preventive services with no coinsurance:

An estimated 40.1 million people with Medicare (including those enrolled in Medicare Advantage) took advantage of at least one preventive service with no copays or deductibles in 2016, slightly more than in 2015.

More than 10.3 million Medicare beneficiaries (including those enrolled in Medicare Advantage) took advantage of an Annual Wellness Visit in 2016. Looking just at original Medicare, nearly one million more people utilized an Annual Wellness Visit in 2016 than 2015 (more than 6.6 million compared to nearly 5.8 million).

"While the Affordable Care Act has expanded coverage to 20 million Americans, the law is also a game changer for millions of older Americans," said Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Acting Administrator Andy Slavitt. "These benefits are providing seniors and people with disabilities with Medicare coverage increased financial security and the guarantee that they can get an important preventive screening without cost to them."

Today's announcement is part of the Administration's broader strategy to improve the health care system by paying providers for what works, unlocking health care data, and finding new ways to coordinate and integrate care to improve quality. The Affordable Care Act provides tools - such as providing certain recommended preventive services at no cost sharing and closing the Medicare Part D "donut hole" - to make our health care system more affordable for patients and move it toward one that

rewards doctors based on the quality, not the quantity of care they give patients. In addition, Medicare exceeded earlier than predicted - the Administration's goal to tie more than 30 percent of fee-for-service payments by the end of 2016 through alternative payment models to quality and cost metrics. Medicare is on pace to reach 50 percent by the end of 2018.

Closing the prescription drug "donut hole"

The Affordable Care Act makes Medicare prescription drug coverage more affordable by gradually closing the gap in coverage during which beneficiaries had to pay the full cost of their prescriptions out of pocket, after hitting their initial coverage limit, and before catastrophic coverage for prescriptions took effect. The gap is known as the donut hole. Because of the Affordable Care Act, the donut hole has been narrowing each year, and will be closed by 2020.

Because of the health care law in 2010, anyone with a Medicare prescription drug plan who reached the prescription drug donut hole received a \$250 rebate. In 2011, beneficiaries in the donut hole began receiving discounts and savings on covered brand-name and generic drugs. People with Medicare Part D who are in the donut hole in 2017 will receive discounts and savings of 60 percent on the cost of brand name drugs and 49 percent on the cost of generic drugs.









