Fairview Wins State Football Championship Game

It was a great community celebration. Fairview's residents and alumni gathered in a huge fashion at the Class C state football championship game held at Rocky Mountain College in Billings. The Warriors didn't disappoint. They needed only 12 seconds to take the lead and went on to crush Alberton-Superior, 70-6, on Saturday afternoon.

Fairview's football standouts understand how much the school's first state football title means to the team, school and entire town.

"It's everything," senior Jesse Selting, who scored three touchdowns, said. "We've been working so long for this."

The seniors noted that the Warriors dropping two state title games this decade, including one to Alberton- Superior, provided a little bit of extra motivation.

"It was heart-breaking.
Our community has a lot of pride especially for its sports teams," Cody Asbeck said.
"This means except thing."

"This means everything."
Selting added, "We finally got some revenge. It's amazing."

How much the title means could easily be seen in quarterback/defensive back Alex Schriver's face as he tried to hold back tears of joy prior to accepting the state trophy. "As you can see, everybody is here," he said of the fan support. "The whole town has come down for this."

Schriver delivered perhaps the best game of his career. The senior intercepted three passes and was involved in eight touchdowns. He ran for 123 yards and passed for 281 yard

"The offensive line has been so good this year," Schriver said as he shared the credit. "They made holes bigger than I can say."

He entered the game with five interceptions for the season. "We came in knowing they will pass a little bit," Schriver said. "Our defensive line was amazing for putting on pressure."

Fairview didn't just finish the season undefeated but every game was won by a large margin.

"Our defense has been playing so well," Asbeck said. "We played our best game of the season."

The contest started off with a bang for the Warriors. Most teams don't kick the ball to Asbeck, but apparently Alberton-Superior didn't receive that memo. The result was a 72-yard kickoff return by Asbeck for a touchdown.

"I was thinking they were probably going to do an onsides kick or a squib kick," Asbeck said of the Mountain Cats' decision. "Hey, it worked out. We've had some success on special teams lately."

On their first offensive possession, the Warriors put together a 68-yard scoring drive that was capped by a 37-yard touchdown pass from Schriver to Selting with eight minutes left in the first quarter.

"I saw the coverage. I got the feeling that Alex was going to get me the ball, and he did," Selting said.

After an interception by Schriver, Fairview reached the end zone when Schriver made several great moves on a 38-yard quarterback keeper run. Schriver passed to Braiden Taylor for a two-point conversion and 20-0 advantage with 4:54 left in the

quarter.

Fairview's defense, led by Josh Herron, Ethan Neu, Tom Neu and B. Taylor, then stopped the Mountain Cats on a fourth-down run attempt. The Warriors went on to score when Asbeck made an amazing "You got


leaping catch for a 29-yard touchdown play with 3:18 left in the period.

The Warriors' final touchdown of the first quarter came on a 67-yard shovel pass play from Schriver to Selting with 1:46 remaining. Schriver passed to Brady Buxbaum for a 34-0 advantage.

The Mountain Cats got on the scoreboard when Trey Green ran in from seven yards out with 11 minutes remaining in the half.

Fairview responded with a 46-yard scoring drive. A 28-yard pass from Schriver to Herron was good for a first down at the six. Three plays later, Asbeck scored on a two-yard run. Schriver ran in the conversion for a 42-6 lead.

After another interception by Schriver, the senior quarterback broke loose for a 31-yard touchdown dash. A conversion



pass from Schriver to Asbeck put the margin at 50-6.

The Warriors ended the half with a 21-yard touchdown throw from Schriver to Selting for a 56-6 half-time lead.

Alberton-Superior put together a scoring threat to open the third quarter, but the possession ended on strong defensive plays by Easton Hopes and Selting. The Warriors then scored when Asbeck took a screen pass 64 yards for a touchdown.

Late in the third quarter, Schriver intercepted a screen pass and raced 34 yards for a touchdown. Asbeck got in for the two-point conversion for a 70-6 advantage.

That was the end of the game's scoring as a very loud and proud fan base prepared to celebrate as a community for a record-breaking football season.

Three Deer Harvested In Region 7 Suspect For CWD

Samples from three deer harvested in southeast Montana have tested positive for Chronic Wasting Disease. These are the first positive results in the southeastern corner of the state. A second test will be conducted to confirm the initial positive results.

The positive animals include a mule deer buck shot 60 miles north of Miles City in Hunting District 701 in Prairie County, a white-tailed buck harvested two miles north of Hysham in HD 701, and a white-tailed doe taken near Decker in HD 704. The Decker deer was harvested within the Southern/Yellowstone CWD Management Zone, which includes transport restrictions. The sample was collected at the Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks office in Billings, which is within the management zone. All of the hunters were notified by FWP and were advised of their options to obtain another license, if desired.

"We have a management plan to guide local efforts," said Emily Almberg, disease ecologist with FWP's wildlife division. "We're not trying to eliminate deer, we're trying to manage the disease long term for healthy herds."

If left unmanaged, CWD could lead to population decline in infected herds, as it has in other states. Sampling is part of FWP's efforts to determine the presence and distribution of the disease.

FSA Encourages Farmers And **Ranchers To Vote** In County **Committee Elections**

The 2019 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections began on November 4, when ballots were mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices, or to be postmarked,

is December 2, 2019. County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, may also be eligible

Eligible voters in local administrative area #3 (the eastern third of McKenzie County), who do not receive a ballot, can obtain one from their local USDA Service Center.

Newly elected committee members will take office January 1, 2020.

vous system of deer, elk and moose. Transmission can most commonly occur through direct contact between animals, including urine, feces, saliva, blood and antler velvet. Carcasses of infected animals may serve as a source of environmental contamination as well and can infect other animals that come into contact with that carcass. The disease was first discovered in the wild in Montana south of Billings in 2017.

There is no known transmission of CWD to humans; however, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that hunters harvesting an animal in an area where CWD is known to be present have their animal tested. The animal's head and throat area are required for testing purposes. If the animal tests positive, CDC advises against eating the meat.

The general hunting season ends on Sunday, Dec. 1. Hunters wanting to have their animals tested for CWD have several options in Region 7. Samples will be collected at:

-The Miles City regional FWP office Monday-Friday during business hours through Tuesday, December 3.

-Hysham, Ashland and Ekalaka check stations, which operate Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to sunset and Mondays from 8 a.m. to

-Broadus FWP office on Tuesdays from 10 a.m. to

-Sidney at the volunteer fire department on Sundays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

-Glendive at Hollecker Lake on December 1 from 10 a.m. to sunset.

-Hunters also may collect the samples themselves and mail them using instructions posted at fwp.mt.gov/cwd.

To prevent the spread of CWD, hunters are encouraged to take the meat and leave the remaining parts at the kill site if possible, or to dispose of the animal in a Class II landfill. In Region 7, landfills are located in Miles City, Broadus, Baker, Forsyth, Glendive and Sidney. FWP strongly discourages dumping of carcasses or parts near roadways and areas outside of the kill site. It is unsightly and illegal, and if the animal has CWD, the carcass can transmit the disease for at least two years.

FWP's Efforts To Track Disease In Southeast Mon-

Southeast Montana is a high-priority area for CWD sampling this year. The Priority Sampling Area covers the southern portion of Hunting Districts 702, 704 and 705 (basically south of Highway 212). The area was chosen because of proximity to known

positives in other states. In this area, FWP is actively looking to sample hunter-harvested deer, elk and moose.

"Hunters in general have been very supportive of our efforts, which we appreciate," said FWP Regional Supervisor Brad Schmitz.

A Southern/Yellowstone CWD Management Zone also prevents the transport of carcasses, heads, brains and spinal columns of animals from that zone. The zone includes HD 704 south of Hwy 212, HDs 502 and 510, that portion of HD 520 east of Hwy 212, that portion of HD 575 north and east of Hwy 78, that portion of HD 590 south of Interstate 90, plus the communities of Billings, Broadus, and others on the defined boundaries.

The following carcass parts CAN be removed from a CWD Management Zone:

- · Meat that is cut and wrapped or meat that is boned
- · Quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached
- · Hides with no heads attached
- · Skull plates or antlers with no meat or tissue attached

· Skulls that have been boiled and cleaned to remove flesh and tissue

- Upper canine teeth · Head, partial body or
- whole-body mounts prepared by a taxidermist

Evidence of the animal's sex does not have to be attached to any part of the carcass but cannot be destroyed and should accompany the animal from field to point of processing.

What Can Hunters Do? Since it takes about three weeks after testing to obtain results, hunters may opt to store the meat until they know if it is negative for CWD.

FWP recommends taking simple precautions when field dressing deer, particularly in CWD Management Zones:

- Wear rubber gloves and eye protection when field
- dressing your deer. · Minimize the handling of
- brain and spinal tissues. · Wash hands and instruments thoroughly after field

dressing is completed.

 Avoid processing consuming brain, spinal cord, eyes, spleen, tonsils and lymph nodes of harvested animals. (Normal field dressing coupled with boning out a carcass will essentially remove these parts.)

· Leave the carcass at the kill site or dispose of it properly in a Class II landfill.



2019 Ag Research Summit Includes New Date, Irrigated, Horticulture Sessions


As 2019 nears a close, farmers and ranchers have a lot of questions: What's the deal with this weather? What do we need to brace for next? What can be done with all that damaged grain? What about disease....white mold? Fusarium? And what about new crop options to help battle low prices...Kernza, Hemp? Can these crops be adapted here? How do we manage them, and what about markets?

These and many other questions will be addressed during the 3rd Annual MonDak Ag Research Summit to be held Thursday, December 12 at the Richland County Event Center in Sidney, MT.

The summit runs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and is organized by the MonDak area's three ag research facilities - North Dakota State University's Williston Research and Extension Center, Montana State University's Eastern Ag Research Center in Sidney, and the USDA Agricultural Research Service's Northern Plains Ag Research Lab, also in Sidney. The collaborative program focuses on "ready to use" research findings by the more than 20 scientists employed at the three facilities who have expertise in irrigated and dryland agronomy, plant pathology, soil science, plant and insect ecology, molecular biology, weed

This year's Summit includes a new program structure with concurrent sessions targeting irrigated and dryland research in the morning and a new horticulture session and general ag talks in the afternoon. The latter will include a presentation on local hemp research and one by representatives of American Harvest, Inc., the new CBD oil plant being developed in Sidney.

Also featured are several guest presentations, beginning with one on current climate trends and influences, and what to expect next spring by Dr. Kevin Hyde of the Montana Climate Office at the University of Montana. Dr. Hyde will also do a lunchtime presentation on measuring and interpreting soil moisture data. He will be followed after lunch by NDSU Livestock Extension Specialist Dr. Jenna Block who will be discussing potential utilization of weather damaged grain for livestock. And, Dr. Tom Scherer, NDSU Associate Professor and Extension Engineer, will open the new Irrigation Session with a discussion of proper irrigation scheduling and machine maintenance. The afternoon concludes with a special presentation by American Harvest, Inc. CEO John Piracha. American Harvest is a hemp processing company that recently opened a plant in Sidney.

Altogether, 24 different research presentations are planned throughout the day, along with two poster sessions featuring another two dozen ongoing research projects at the three host facilities. The researchers on those projects will be on hand to answer questions regarding their work.



Beet Harvest Wraps Up, Processing A Challenge

"The growers did a good job of getting the beets out of the ground," stated Sidney Sugars general manager David Garland last Friday. Beet harvest for area growers officially ended on November 5 with an average of 31.89 tons per acre and 17.02 sugar. The numbers were down a bit from the average but tonnage was up a bit from what was expected.

97% of the beets were harvested, leaving 1200 acres in the ground, 900 of which growers were going through their insurance and 288 acres which would directly affect growers.

"It was an unusual year from the start," Garland commented. The wet spring and flooding which affected all areas but primarily Sugar Valley meant that 400 acres were abandoned. A cooler, summer followed and then, in September, record rainfall hit, causing saturated fields and pile grounds.

A target date of September 24 came and went with harvest finally beginning at all stations on October 7. The factory began slicing on October 12, two weeks later than planned. More rain, snow, and light frost continued to cause delays. Severe frost the week of October 21, and a forecast of continued cold, which would provide no opportunity for the beets to heal, changed the dynamics for the remainder of harvest.

Sidney Sugars and the Montana Dakota Beets Growers board signed a Frozen Beet Addendum on October 26 to allow the resumption of harvest. Harvest continued from October 31 through November 5. A total of 186,739 tons of frozen beets were harvested. Under that agreement, Sidney Sugars processed the first 108,000 tons. The growers would retain the balance of 78,400 tons and face consequences associated with not being able to process.

Never a fan of warm weather at this time of the year because of beet storage, Garland said the higher temperatures

last week caused juicing to

begin from the remaining fro-

zen beets, making processing

difficult. The Grower Board

and Sidney Sugars agreed to

mix good beets with frozen to allow processing to continue.

As of November 25, there are

approximately 40,000 tons

of the frozen beets left of the

grower 78,400 tons. "It's our

goal to do the best for the

grower and the company,"

Garland emphasized.



Krautter, has returned from three days in Billings with the REAL Montana (Resource Education and Agriculture Leadership) program. For Krautter and other members of REAL Montana Class IV, this was the second seminar in their two-year educational journey.























