Event to Discuss Good Government in North Dakota to be held in Watford City Free and Open to the Public, Refreshments Provided

NDSU's Northern Plains Ethics Institute and ThinkND are set to host a conversation about "What is Good Government in North Dakota?" on Wednesday, March 7th, from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m. at the Rough Rider Center in Watford City. The Bush Foundation and the North Dakota Humanities Council have awarded ThinkND grants for this project. The discussion will feature moderators Dana Whippo, Assistant Professor in Political Science and Economics at Dickenson State University, and Cecile Wehrman, President of Journal Publishing, which prints The Journal of Crosby and the Tioga Tribune.

The moderators will give opening remarks and then engage in audience conversations about: What makes good government? What makes a good elected official? What makes a

According to institute director Dennis Cooley, North Dakotans have reported that trust in government has eroded. "They feel that rapid changes in everyday life and government at every level have left many disconnected, if not reeling," Cooley said. "Facts seem often to contradict one another. Legislators are not as accessible as they used to be. Concerned citizens attending government hearings often feel dismissed, as if decisions have already been made. There are concerns about out-of-state money influencing government decisions. This comes at a time when trust is needed to pursue success for each citizen and the state."

The discussion is part of a multi-faceted initiative to engage North Dakota citizens and academic experts in a discussion

Scholars will address such topics as the role of ethical behavior in the history of North Dakota government, how ethical government affects a state's economy, the cost of mistrust and other matters related the requirements of good government.

The gatherings will focus on local thought leaders; teachers; students; people involved with township, city and county government: rural residents and the Native community.

"By providing an opportunity to engage in conversations with each other and experts from the academic community, a grass works-based framework for possibly rethinking government can be sketched out," Cooley said.

Ag Days will kick off at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, March 1 when the doors open for the trade show. After listening to suggestions from our ranching community, it was decided to push back the start of the educational sessions, so the first session will begin at 10:00 when Bridger Feuz gives his cattle market outlook. That will be followed at 10:45 when Hudson Hill leads a discussion on tools for monitoring and managing nutrition in the beef cow herd. After a break, Bridger Feuz will be on again to discuss economic ranch tools and risk management and that will be followed by Barton Stram's talk on what tools are available to build a range management plan. All of these previously listed talks are part of a complete program offered by the University of Wyoming Extension professionals and they are coming to Sidney because of a grant they received from the USDA Risk

Management Association. At 2:30 that afternoon Jim Beck, who used to work for the Montana DNRC, will talk about the form every landowner got from the DNRC in regards to water rights. If you got one of these letters but are not sure whether or not you need to do anything, you should come and find out. Thursday's educational portion will end at 3:45 with an update on crop insurance from Gary Hellig who is the Vice President and Northwest Division Manager for Rain and Hail. After last year's drought and lack of crop production, insurance really saved some people and may

be something to look into for 2018. Thursday evening's events will begin with a social sponsored by Prewitt and Company, the Sidney Livestock Market Center, and Yellowstone Bank. These businesses ensure that, when you purchase a ticket to the banquet, you will get a ticket for a free drink at the social. Speaking of the banquet, it will begin at 6:00 and will feature a steak dinner, awards from the Richland Conservation District and entertainment from Jerry Carroll. If you're not sure who Jerry Carroll is, you will want to visit his website which is http://www.thejerrycarroll.com. Be prepared to laugh. Tickets to the banquet are \$40 and can be purchased at the Richland County Extension Office, the Sidney Chamber of Commerce, Stockman Bank in Sidney, or Tri-County Implement in Sidney.

Friday's events will start with the annual Sidney Chamber Breakfast starting at 7:00 a.m. The trade show will once again open at 8:00 and then the educational portion will begin at 9:00. The first talk on Friday will be Richland County's own Chet Hill discussing Narrowleaf Hawksbeard and Marestail. If you are not familiar with these weeds, you will want to be as they are increasingly becoming problematic in Northeastern Montana. Chet's talk has been awarded 1 point for commercial and private pesticide applicators.

Following Chet's talk, Ed Usset will be at the event to give his popular presentation on 5 common mistakes in grain marketing. It is truly an honor to have Ed coming to Sidney as he is very well-respected in the marketing community and actually will be coming to Sidney directly from the Commodity Classic which is an event that brings farmers from all over the U.S. and Canada to Los Angeles for a large trade show and educational programs. Ed's program is sure to be thought provoking and worthwhile.

The event will wrap up with the final educational program starting at 1:15 when Patrick Gilchrist from the National Weather Service office in Glasgow will give as much of a weather prediction for 2018 as he can.

LYIP Hearing Set for March 5

Monday, March 5th has been set by the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals to hear oral arguments on the appeal by federal agencies and the Lower Yellowstone Irrigation Project against the injunction on the fish bypass and concrete weir imposed by Judge Brian Morris last summer. The court has up to six weeks to rule on the appeal.

The 40 minute hearing will be held at the historic Pioneer Square Courthouse in Portland, OR at 9 a.m. The appellants include LYIP, the US Army Corps of Engineers, US Bureau of Reclamation and US Fish & Wildlife.

Behavioral Health Workshop Set for March 29

School counselors, law enforcement, clergy, public health professionals, teachers and others who work with people will have an opportunity to learn about mental and behavioral health during a workshop the North Dakota State University Extension Service is hosting March 29.

The three-hour Behavioral Health for Your Family and Community workshop will be offered through the Interactive Video Network on the NDSU campus in Fargo and at several sites across the state, including McKenzie County. The local site will be the Commission Room in the McKenzie County Courthouse. The event starts at 9 a.m. Central time and is free of charge.

"We want people to be more confident in their ability to spot problems and get individuals the help they need to feel whole and healthy," says Kim Bushaw, Extension family science specialist.

Behavioral health specialists from Prairie St. John's in Fargo will present the program. The speakers and their topics are:

Jeana Scheffler, an adult inpatient therapist - geriatric mental health. Participants will learn typical behavioral health warning signs, barriers to care, risk factors, resources and care strategies for the geriatric population and will gain clearer understanding of mental health concerns facing the rapidly growing older adult population.

Monica McConkey, director of business development emotional stress on the farm. Participants will learn to identify stressors related to the farm crisis, become aware of specific warning signs related to a behavioral health crisis, and learn important skills to communicate support and access help for individuals of concern.

* Beth Brantner, a licensed clinical and addiction counselor substance use issues and concerns, including current substance use trends in North Dakota, signs and symptoms of substance use, prevention efforts and how to address substance use in your community

"Mental/behavioral health is an important topic, especially with difficulties in farming and ranching, the uneven nature of the oil industry and the state's budget cuts," McConkey says. "Many families are anxious about what will happen next to their farms, ag-related jobs, income, savings and futures.'

The Richland County Conservation District has presented the Cooperator of the year award for several years. Each year the winner has shown they care about conservation, it may be implementing conservation practices that improve water quantity and quality, enhancing soil health or recovering the rangeland. We have presented the award to individuals who work with the district to promote conservation. Irrigation districts and their members who upgraded their system to become more efficient in water delivery. Entities who promote and implement conservation and work with the Conservation District to accomplish these goals are recognized for their efforts.

Rost to Run for Legislative Office

Tanya Rost, a long-time resident of Richland County, is running for legislative office in House District 35. She is married to Shawn Rost, and they have four children together, own an oil field business and have investments in local agriculture. The Roundup spoke with Rost and asked her questions regarding her candidacy and plans for legislation if she were to win the seat.

When asked why she was running for the House District seat, Rost responded, "I want to make sure that there is a conservative candidate representing Richland County. It's one thing to call yourself a Republican, but it's another to be a conservative. I believe that I'm both, and want to see policies that will best benefit Richland County and align with our values." Rost went on to explain

what some of those policies should be, saying, "I want to see lowered property tax. Right now, the vast majority of property-owning Richland County residents are suffering from property taxes. We have seen them increase dramatically, even though their real property value has not risen accordingly. Other than protecting essential liberties, lowering property taxes will be a top priority." "Concerning the protection of liberties," Rost continued, "I want to see Constitutional

Carry pass the Montana legislature. This means I want the only concealed carry permit required in the State of Montana to be that which was given in the Second Amendment of the Constitution. We can already carry outside of municipal areas without a permit in Montana, and we need to join the rest of the conservative states in the Union that are allowing carry without a special permit, so long as the person is legally able to purchase a firearm."

Rost also spoke of the importance of the sanctity of life, saying, "I want to see a personhood law passed as well. The Montana Constitution already says that all persons are given the right to pursue life, and all we want is for law to recognize all human beings as persons, whether inside or outside the womb." Rost continued on the

subject, "Right now, the ACLU is suing the State of Montana, saying that because the state is so rural, we need to allow midwives to practice abortion. Montana is the most liberal state on abortion in the Rocky Mountain region, and giving midwives permission to perform complicated surgery away from medical centers won't help anyone, mother or child."

When asked to explain her potential strengths in the legislative office, Rost said, "First, I've been here a very long time and I know the area

very well. My job is to represent the district, and I'm from here. That's a big advantage right off the bat. Likewise, I feel that I share distinctly Eastern Montana values. There's a big difference between Western Montana and Eastern Montana, and I am here to represent our values, in particular."

When asked if she had any conflicts of interest or weaknesses that might prevent her from serving to the best of her ability, Rost responded, "I've lived a very simple, quiet life. I'm ready to serve my community, and voters can be confident that I'm the same neighbor they've known all these years, my views haven't changed, and neither have my convictions."





Standing Up For Community Health

By U.S. Senator Jon Tester

Community health centers, including Sidney Health Center here in Sidney, provide access to quality care to one in 10 Montanans. Community health centers are vital across rural America. That's why, after Congress let them sit in limbo for more than 130 days, I rattled some cages back in Washington to finally secure much-needed funding and certainty for them.

Last year, I held a series of listening sessions across our state. I heard time and again how much folks rely on these clinics, and appreciate the quality care they provide.

Congress' four-month failure to pass a long-term budget, forced Montana's 40 community health facilities to consider scaling back services or closing altogether.

After many rounds of negotiations, I pushed the Senate to reach a bipartisan agreement to increase funding for Montana's community health centers for the next two years.

This bipartisan agreement will keep health care accessible for 100,000 Montanans and will ensure that folks in Richland County don't have to travel hundreds of miles to take their kids to a checkup or get patched up after an injury.

That's why I fought to get this fixed. I stood with Montana's health leaders on the Capitol steps, demanded action on the

Senate floor, and even voted against short-term government funding budgets until folks would listen.

I told Washington to stop playing politics with your health care. I was the only member of Montana's congressional delegation to support the renewal and increase to community health

I am incredibly pleased that we prevented these clinics from closing. But we have more work to do, because Montana's communities deserve more than two years of certainty.

I've lived my whole life on the land my grandparents homesteaded in Big Sandy. I've worked that farm every planting season like my parents did and their parents before them.

Every farmer knows that accidents happen. Between losing my three fingers in a meat grinder to various bumps, cuts and bruises. I know how important rural health facilities are to our rural and frontier communities.

I will do everything I can in Congress to ensure you and your family never have to question whether Sidney Health Center will be there when you need it.


