## Watford City Voters Approve Funding For New School

#### By Jordan Hall

Watford City voters have overwhelmingly approved two ballot initiatives set to fund the construction of an elementary school and provide potential funding for another.

Two questions were asked of voters. The first was whether or not residents should approve a general obligation bond up to 35 million dollars for the purpose of building a new elementary school, which would raise millage an additional 13 mills, equal to \$13 dollars on each thousand dollars taxable valuation for the first taxable year. The second question posed was whether residents should approve an increase of its school Building Fund Levy from 10 mills to 20 in order to facilitate additional anticipated building needs.

Voters approved the measures on January 8, with more than 80% of voters voting 'yes' on the first question and more than 71% voting 'yes' on the second question. Sixty percent of voters needed to approve the measures for them to move forward, which was handily achieved. A similar bonding issue was narrowly rejected in the Williston School District the same day.

The Roundup spoke with Shilo Chavez, who organized

initiatives. Chavez told the Roundup that she was excited about the two questions being answered by voters in the affirmative. Although there were not as high a percentage of affirming votes as the last similar school-funding measure, there was enough to get it done.

the 'Vote Yes Committee,' which promoted the passage of both

Chavez said, "The last vote was closer to 90 percent in favor, so we did come down from that, but we still see that a large part of the community supported it. We knew there were people who weren't excited about the building structure of the high school and so may not be for the new elementary school, but we still had a lot of support from people in the community."

Chavez also commented on the narrow defeat in Williston. "I'm heartbroken for Williston," Chavez continued, "and I hope they have the ballots come in from absentees that they need. I believe their need is actually worse than our own here in Watford City. From my understanding, they're already using quite a few portables and just lack the necessary space."

According to Chavez, the results won't be official until all absentee ballots are counted, but it likely won't make a difference in the election's outcome.

Chavez reported, "The ballots that came in prior to the vote have been counted and had to be postmarked by the 7th. They'll do a final tally on the 14th and will have the School Board approve the votes then. There are about twenty ballots that still haven't been returned yet. Ultimately, we're not expecting it to change anything.'

Chavez expressed thanks to the community, saying, "We want to say thank you to everybody who supported us and supported our future and supported our kids. Thanks to everybody who helped sponsor the 'Vote Yes Committee' and helped to get the word out.

## **Fellowship Food Pantry** Helping Those In Need

gation of Fellowship Baptist Church in Sidney, Montana has been helping those in need of food through the Fellowship Food Pantry. Now, the people and businesses of Sidney and the surrounding area are helping them.

Last December Town Pump Charitable Foundation, Town Pump Corporate Fund, and the Bridger Lounge Corporation, through Town Pump's match donation program, donated \$3,300 to Fellowship Food Pantry for purchasing subsidized food products from the Montana Food Bank. The money went for helping those in need of food but in an indirect way assisted the church as well. Fellowship Food Pantry is usually staffed, paid for and supplied by the congregation of Fellowship Baptist Church. Fellowship Food Pantry is partnered with Montana Food Bank. Montana Food Bank is a non-profit organization out of Missoula that partners with neighborhood food banks, community pantries, social organizations, homeless shelters, schools, and hundreds of other organizations that are all working together to end hunger in Montana according to their website, https://mfbn.org. Through the partnership, the Food Pantry receives bulk do-

nations of free dry goods, fresh produce, and frozen meats, and has the opportunity to purchase very low-cost food products. Every six weeks they have to purchase food products that were needed but not donated from the Montana Food Bank. The food pantry receives financial support from what the congregation gives in tithes and offerings that is budgeted for the purchases.

Also in December, the students and Staff of Lambert School donated 500 lbs of food to Fellowship Food Pantry. It was part of their Do - Good December Drive from December 17 through the 21. Principal Kara Hansen Triplett told me that students and staff were encouraged to bring in food, new socks, or pairs of shoes. They got to make an ornament to hang on the school's caring tree outside the Main Office, and then took the ornament home before Christmas break. The Student Council gave away a soda or water to those who contributed. According to their Facebook page, the drive was done to invite their students and staff to consider ways to spread holiday cheer.

Several other businesses and organizations have assisted and donated to Fellowship Food Pantry over the last year. Wood Group, previously Mitchell's Oil Field Service, al-



As for the 'Vote Yes Committee,' Chavez says their work is done.

"For the most part," Chavez said, "we'll just dissolve. Most people from the committee are already involved in other areas as parent volunteers. We don't have any next project."

lows the Montana Food Bank to make Fellowship Food Pantry's drop on their property and loads the pallets to be taken to the church. The Pantry has received additional support from the Friends of Reynolds program at Reynold's Market, the Foundation for Community Care for outreach work, and the Lower Yellowstone REC's Operation Roundup program to purchase a new freezer; and has received donations of food from the Brorson Farmhands 4H group, Richland County Health Department staff, and many, many others.

Fellowship Food Pantry gives thousands of pounds of foods each year to families unexpectedly in need, or experiencing chronic food insecurity. Just from July to November in 2018 they helped 306 individual families with 6,607 lbs

of food. They will take food donations from individuals outside the church but do not solicit for them. Pastor Jordan Hall told me, "We understand there is another food bank in town that needs donations " He also told me that they have a Friends of Reynolds account and if individuals wish to donate they can simply give the cashier the number 2015 at checkout when shopping at Sidney's Reynolds Market and a percentage of the purchase will be donated to the food pantry.



## Week 1 Report from the Legislature

The first week of the legislative session in Helena got underway this past week. I was excited to be sworn-in, along with 30 other freshman House members and with family and friends present.

While the session officially began on Monday, the unofficial start for me was the day before, as a bipartisan group of a dozen legislators and I gathered at the home of Chief Deputy Attorney General Jon Bennion to make sausage and visit.

Senators Daines and Tester, along with Attorney General Fox each highlighted parallels between making sausage and making laws. The takeaway for me was how one can start with very different ingredients or in lawmaking, different ideas, that taken in combination, can still result in a good final product.

The biggest issue addressed in our first week was a discussion on the rules that will govern the session in the House of Representatives.

Concerns for why rules needed to be reformed were that current operating rules gave the Speaker of the House the opportunity to send bills he may not like to a committee of legislators he has discretion to appoint, where the bills can be killed and only resurrected to debate on the floor through the supermajority blast vote of 60 representatives.

Concerns on the other side were that by reducing the supermajority to a simple majority, it would undermine the work of committees who hear testimony and also undermine the power of the majority party.

My priority was to support

rules that encouraged more fairness and transparency and discouraged the type of dysfunction we see coming out of Washington, D.C. I also pushed for a compromise that would bring lawmakers together to begin the session.

I am pleased to report a resolution was reached on the rules reform that passed the House on a bipartisan 88-12 vote, and earned the support of all Republicans.

The new House rules will now more closely mirror the rules that have been in place in the Senate for more than 100 years.

The composition of committees will no longer be at the sole discretion of the Speaker, individual members will have more influence on which committee a bill is assigned to, and numerous other safeguards have been instituted to ensure more fairness and transparency.

The blast motion has been revised to match the number of legislators in the majority caucus. This means the number of votes necessary to successfully remove a bill from committee will be 58 for this session, down from 60.

This session I will be serving on the Business and Labor,

to the entry deadline. The MT TeenVax Challenge is a multi-year campaign to provide education, resources, and information about Tdap, meningococcal, HPV, and influenza vaccines for providers, parents, and teens. These vaccines are routinely administered at age 11-12 years with catch up for

those 13 and older. The MT TeenVax Challenge is in partnership with the Montana DPHHS Immunization Program, the Montana Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Montana Academy of Family Physicians and the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Montana Care

Van program. Are you up to the challenge with your immunization status?

Tdap vaccine protects against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough).

Meningococcal conjugate (MCV4) vaccine protects against meningococcal disease. Meningococcal disease is often severe and include infections of the lining of the brain and spinal cord (meningitis) and bloodstream infections (bacteremia or septicemia)

Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine protects against HPV infection and cancers caused by HPV. HPV infection can cause cervical, vaginal, and vulvar cancer in girls and penile cancer in boys. HPV can also cause anal cancer, throat cancer and genital warts in both boys and girls.

Influenza "flu" vaccine protects against seasonal influenza.

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



## **Conservation Cost Share Applications Accepted Until** February 28, 2019

The Richland County Conservation District is accepting applications for the 2019 Conservation Cost Share Program. Applications can be picked up at the Conservation District Office 2745 West Holly ST, Sidney, MT 59270 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Currently the Conservation District office is open as well as the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS).

Landowners in Richland County seeking to implement conservation practices on their property may be eligible for 50 percent cost share on the practices. Examples of eligible practices include, irrigation projects, stock wells, pipelines, grass seeding, fencing or any project that enhances or protects the natural resource. The conservation district's share for 2019 is limited to \$4,050 per applicant. Practices must benefit the natural resources in Richland County, design standards and specifications need to follow NRCS specifications where applicable. Proposed practices must be completed within one year of approval and payment will be made upon completion and inspection of the project. Projects that have been implemented prior to contract agreements are not eligible for cost share. The Richland County Board of Supervisors will make all decisions on prioritizing and acceptation of applications.

If you have a smaller conservation practice that would enhance the natural resources in Richland County, stop by the conservation district office at 2745 W Holly ST to pick up an application or call 433-2103 x3 to have an application sent to you. Applications are due back to the conservation district by February 28 and applicants will be notified by March 31, 2019 if they will be funded.

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
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




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## **Healthworks Offers Equipment Improvements**

Healthworks, a popular gym facility in Sidney, has recently added a new line of cutting-edge workout equipment.

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The Roundup spoke with Scott Doty, who has served as director of Healthworks gym for the last 12 years. Healthworks is a separate non-profit from the Sidney Health Center, but rents space from the facility and is managed by hospital staff. Doty explained the new equipment and how it was acquired.

Doty said, "The newest equipment we have in is the

Keiser Strength Line. The nice thing about it is that it operates off of air resistance. There's an air compressor in a separate room so what's nice is it offers resistance at one pound at a time. There's no weight stacks. It's used a lot in sport performance. A lot of professional sports teams use it because you can do full-speed strength training with it."

Using what they call Keis-

er Pneumatic Technology, the company claims the equipment allows muscles to remain active and engaged throughout the entire range of motion and velocities, with reduced shock loading to muscles and ioints, allowing for workout regimens that can improve performance not possible with other strength-training methods.

The Keiser Strength Line, a total of 11 machines in all, was funded by a gift from the Good Cents Store.

Doty had some advice for those wanting to stay in shape even in a cold MonDak winter.

Doty suggested, "The biggest things are going to be balance between exercise and nutrition. If you're going for any type of weight loss or increased energy throughout the day, nutrition is the huge key. In terms of exercise, the biggest key is to find something you enjoy. Find something that fits for you. If you don't enjoy it or can't follow through with it, you're not going to be successful with it."


Healthworks, according to Doty, can help health-conscious people stay motivated and be successful.

"Most of our classes include yoga and some strength-training classes," Doty explained. "We have a separate cycling studio as well. We have big screens on the wall, where you're riding your bike and it shows up on the screen."

If someone needs a little help with their exercise routine, Healthworks also offers personal trainers to help facilitate the process of getting into better shape.

"We have one personal trainer on staff and then a number of independent trainers that work within the facility as well. We have three or four of those," Doty offered.

Doty gave the hours of operation, "We open at 5 a.m. on weekday mornings and Monday through Thursday we close at 9:30 p.m. On Fridays we close a little bit earlier at 7:30 p.m., on Saturdays is 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sundays our operating hours are 12 to 4 p.m."





Sam Perry, the Clinic Administrator of McKenzie County Aesthetics Clinic in Watford City, believes aesthetics is the potential beauty of something. I asked Lynn Welker, Director of Public Relations and Fundraising for McKenzie County Healthcare Systems, how important attention to one's personal aesthetics can be and she said, "Because of various types of environmental exposure and skin damage that can be caused by the sun and a drier climate, aesthetics can be helpful in reducing the appearance of fine lines and wrinkles. Wearing sunscreen year-round is equally important. When you feel confident about how you look and feel there are many psychological benefits." Perry said, "We offer a service that can improve a person's selfworth and image. It may sound like a small service but it can go as far as decreasing depression, increasing energy and saving long-term grooming costs for the patient." According to them, the most prominent aesthetic concerns in the MonDak area would be signs of aging such as sun spots and wrinkles which can be corrected by providers at the McKenzie County Aesthetics Clinic.

They have a Cynosure machine that is used to treat rosacea, acne, unwanted facial and body hair, scars, stretch marks, fine lines, and wrinkles. Currently, McKenzie County Aesthetics Clinic doesn't carry skin care regimen lines but is looking to add these.

Lisa has advanced training specific to the Cynosure machine as well. According to Lynn Welker, "During a patient's appointment with Lisa, she will be able to make unique recommendations for the patient based on their skin type in order to enhance both the skin tone and texture."

In Montana, according to Dr. Shari Twigg, M.D. at Advanced Aesthetics in Fairview, aesthetics is a way to enhance a person's beauty. Aesthetic medicine is a branch of the medical community used to improve a patient's appearance. She told me, "Everyone's wanting to look a little better, feel a little better.'

Advanced Aesthetics is a part of Sidney Health Center that started up in December 2016. Dr. Twigg is originally from Pennsylvania. According to her bio on Sidney Health Center's website, she worked in a world-renowned spa and made a name for herself as an award-winning makeup artist. She went to medical school at West Virginia University and did her residency in Akron, Ohio. She originally worked in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Sidney Health Center when she and her husband, Eric, came to Sidney. She continued on there for 5 years before deciding she wanted something different. She still wanted to practice medicine but treat her patients differently. A little over two years ago Shari got Board Certification in Aesthetic Medicine and began practicing in Fairview.

Advanced Aesthetics offers several treatments to help augment the appearances of men, women and kids from childhood through their golden years. 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
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
