

Cookbook **Preserves** Memories

Losing a child might be one of the most difficult situations families face. The loss of a child of any age can devastate families and it may take years for the healing process to complete. A group of three ladies, all of whom have lost a child, decided that a good way to remember their children who have passed and at the same time preserve precious memories for family and friends, lies in the development of a special cookbook. Jacquie Pourroy, Vicki Waddington and Becky Kallevig have teamed up to produce Angel Food, a community cookbook project that will contain favorite recipes of beloved children who have passed on. The ladies invite anyone who has lost a child of any age to participate in this project by contributing a recipe or recipes to the cookbook, along with a brief memory of that child or the story behind the favorite recipe.

"We want this book full of love," says Pourroy. "Sharing meals, cooking together and finding favorite recipes say 'family'. After parents lose a child, they may find it difficult to face the food memories at first, but this can become a way of celebrating memories. Traditions develop around food. Kids help to cook in the kitchen when they are small, and after they grow up and move away, they still call home to find out how to make something."

She continues, "We want to put together a cookbook containing the favorite recipes of these children who are no longer with us. This is a way of healing and a way of preserving precious moments. Just talking about food brings back memories."

Another member of the team, Vicki Waddington, points out that those who have lost children are a community of silent sufferers. Angel Food will give them a voice. "We often aren't given permission by society to talk about our children who have passed," she remarks. "This cookbook offers a way to counteract that. We have to be able to say our children's names and we have to be able to tell stories. This cookbook is a fun way to do this and it will have personal meaning to every parent who contributes a recipe or recipes.

The ladies ask anyone who has lost a child of any age to participate in this project. The ladies will accept all recipes, from appetizers to desserts. Along with each recipe, parents can write a brief memory that will appear with the recipe. "This theme of favorite recipes with memories surrounding that recipe and that child keeps the focus on the child and



Girard Homemakers will be serving homemade pie and coffee to attendees. Anyone interested in this important rural water project is encouraged to attend.





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

Food safety, a larger issue than most people are aware of, costs the nation an estimated \$35 billion each year. Problems can occur at any point in the food chain from the farm to the kitchen to how the food is served.

Employees from Betania, Cattle-Ac, DCC Rental Bed and Breakfast, Double Barrel, Hotel Albert, South 40 and Winners Pub attended a two-hour food safety workshop taught by Judy Johnson, MSU Richland County Extension Agent. For some attendees it was a refresher course while it was new to others.

Schools Invited To Take Part In Recycling **Challenge**

The Montana Department of Environmental Quality is encouraging schools from all across the state to sign up for this year's Great American Can Round Up School Recycling Challenge sponsored by the Can Manufacturers Institute.

What can aluminum recycling do for your school? The kids in Cascade, MT, will tell you it can mean extra money for school activities. Recently, they were recognized for collecting the most aluminum cans per capita among Montana schools in the first annual School Recycling Challenge. The school placed 3rd nationally by collecting 13.06 lbs. of cans and won \$1,000 to help fund school activities.

"This event is open to all K-12 public and private schools and schools can earn money and prizes for participating", said Sandra Boggs, DEQ recycling specialist. As an added incentive she said that Pacific Recycling is paying \$.05 more per pound to schools recycling at one of their facilities.

The School Recycling Challenge runs between America Recycles Day (Nov. 15) and Earth Day (April 22). The national champion school wins \$5,000 and the state champion school will win \$1,000. In addition, there will be monthly drawings for \$50 pizza gift cards.

The convention will offer opportunities for attendees to learn tips to improve their ranch or business, find out about new products available for their animal health and ranch supply needs at the trade show, and for members to weigh in on policy discussions. MCHF & WHC One Step Closer To Decision On Future Building Site


The Montana Cowboy Hall of Fame & Western Heritage Center (MCHF & WHC) Board of Directors is pleased to announce the list of respondents that have submitted proposals to "Phase Two" of a three phase Request For Proposals selection process that will decide the organization's future building site.

Proposals have been submitted from: Eastern Plains Economic Development Corporation, Terry; Madison County Economic Development Corporation, Madison County; Miles City Chamber of Commerce, Miles City; Missouri Valley Development Corporation, Wolf Point; Montana Event Center, Huntley; Musselshell County Commissioners, Roundup; Park County Extension Service, Livingston; PhillCo Economic Growth Council, Malta; Ryan Hamilton on behalf of the Community of Big Sky; and Sweet Grass County Commissioners, Big Timber.

The Request for Proposals Evaluation Committee will now take up the task of evaluating each proposal response against a standard set of criteria. From this evaluation the

MCHF & WHC Board will announce a field of finalists to be considered in the third and final phase of the selection process. Each proposal will also be evaluated by an independent evaluator with expertise in non-profit administration and museum operations. The third phase will include interviews and comprehensive negotiations with each of the finalist candidates. The board of directors currently plans to announce the awarding of the future building site by the end of November.

Directed by the organization's vision to develop a facility that will serve as a "premier destination attraction that honors and celebrates Montana's unique western culture and heritage," the MCHF & WHC has taken on the ambitious effort to move forward with development of the facility despite the economic downturn that has slowed or stopped many other major development projects. Christy Stensland, MCHF & WHC executive director, stated, "The support and sense of urgency that many feel about the need to capture our heritage before it is lost and to pass it forward to future

With the passage of H.B 528 in April, the board of directors moved to open the opportunity of being considered as the future building site of the MCHF & WHC to all Montana communities. Aaron Lyles, MCHF & WHC director of finance, stated, "The decision of issuing the request for proposals and allowing any interested community the opportunity to be considered was the best approach and most objective way to select our future building site. The selection process requires the highest standards of transparency to meet the expectations of the public trust we operate under." The board of directors chose a traditional Request For Proposals process to administer the site selection. Therefore, the organization could not comment at this time on any one community's prospects or standing in the evaluation process. The organization will announce the finalist candidates upon the completion of the Phase Two evaluation. Lyles continued, "Since no community can claim exclusive rights to our collective Montana Western heritage, this selection process had to be focused on an objective alignment of the resources necessary for accomplishing our vision and mission to those communities that have expressed a desire to be considered. Though each community is anxiously waiting the final decision, it is clear after seeing the hundreds of letters of support that have poured into our office that no matter the final location our Montana community is behind the project."

This series of four classes. held on Tuesday afternoons - Nov. 8, 15, 22 and 29 - at the McKenzie County Courthouse meeting room, Watford City, will help you promote self-management of diabetes through healthy food choices and meal planning. Classes will start at 1 p.m. CT and conclude by 4 p.m. CT. They will be delivered through an interactive video network and will also include food demonstrations, hands-on food preparation, and tasting healthy foods. Participants will learn how to plan and prepare balanced and flavorful meals. Discussions and time to answer questions and network with each other will be included. Offered in 30 states, this tested program follows established clinical practice guidelines that reduce the risk of diabetes and complications. Remaining FCFS Deer Licenses Suspended, Hunters May Seek Refunds

Based on continuing reports of white-tailed deer mortality in western North Dakota caused by epizootic hemorrhagic disease, the state Game and Fish Department is suspended the sale of remaining first-come, first-served deer licenses in units 3F1, 3F2 and 4F, effective Oct. 21.



In addition, hunters with white-tailed deer licenses in units 3B1, 3D1, 3E1, 3F1, 3F2, 4A, 4B, 4C, 4D, 4E and 4F have the option of turning in those licenses for refunds.

Randy Kreil, department chief of wildlife, said the decision is based on evidence of moderate to significant white-tailed deer losses in some areas that might affect hunting success in those locations.

"While we first received reports of isolated deer deaths in August, loss of deer to this disease appears to have extended through September and into October, and covers a large area of western North Dakota," Kreil said.

More than 13,000 white-tailed deer license holders are eligible for license refunds. Individuals who return their license will have their preference points restored.


EHD, a naturally occurring virus that is spread by a biting midge, is almost always fatal to infected white-tailed deer, while mule deer do not usually die from the disease. Hunters do not have to worry about handling or consuming meat from infected deer because the virus that causes EHD is not known to cause disease in humans. In addition, the first hard freeze typically kills the midge that carries and transfers the EHD virus which will slow or halt the spread of the disease.

Before deciding to turn in a license, Kreil urges whitetail

The last time Game and Fish made license refunds an option for hunters because of an EHD outbreak was in 2000.

White-tailed deer license holders who want a refund must return their license, along with a note requesting a refund due to EHD, to the Game and Fish Department's Bismarck office no later than Nov. 3. Envelopes postmarked Nov. 3 will be accepted.





license holders to make local contacts to find out the extent of mortality in their hunting area. Large portions of affected units had no reports of whitetail deaths. "The whitetail population has not been decimated and in many areas a good harvest is still needed," he added.

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

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




"Flag Football"

The name Rance Haralson is synonymous with Sidney Flag Football. And it should be. Rance and his wife, Colleen, have run Sidney's Flag Football Program for the last 16 years. Wayne Swigart is the one who started the Sidney program, back in 1990, and he ran the program for the first 5 years of its existence. This program has been highly successful. Many kids and parents have enjoyed their "flag football days," and appreciate the work that these community benefactors have done.

Ninety-two kids signed up for flag football this year. Kids from Sidney, Fairview and Savage participate. There are five teams in the 3rd and 4th grade division this year, and two teams in the 5th and 6th grade division. In past years the program has had up to 148 participants and 10 teams. The numbers are down a bit this year because 50 some kids now participate in the recently started 5th and 6th grade tackle football program.

Rance and Colleen are in charge of disseminating information about flag football; signing up elementary school kids to participate in the program; organizing the teams and coaches into reasonably equitable units; ordering uniforms, trophies, and other supplies; lining up referees for the games; making the regular season and playoff schedules; mowing and lining the fields; and transforming an activity that attracts approximately 100 kids (and their respective families and friends) into something that is constructive and entertaining.

I have enjoyed helping Rance Haralson ref some games this fall. Working with Rance and the other referees (Bill Brenner, Duane Smith, Gordy Torgerson, Jerry Hughes, Cory Wheeler and Jeff Hintz) has been a good experience. Refereeing is harder than most people realize, though, and anyone interested in volunteering is welcome to do so.

It has been interesting to hear the refs talk about some of the funny things that have happened over the years: remember, they said, the time when a player had his breakaway pants pulled off, but his flags were left intact, as he ran (in his skivvies) to score a touchdown; the time the refs discovered that flags were being trimmed and greased - so that they would be more difficult to grab; and remember all those cute things that kids have said, e.g., "my hands feel like ice cubes" and "when is the game over, ref? I've got homework to do." But there have also been instances when players, coaches, and fans have forgotten that flag football is only a game. Referees try to enforce the rules – to the best of their abilities – and also try to remind everyone that flag football is a "just for fun" activity.

Rance tells me that this may be his last year running the Sidney Flag Football Program. I hope not. He does. after all, have other things to do with his life. He is co-manager and X-ray technologist par excellence at Sidney Health Center's Radiology Department. He is married and has two adult children. He and his wife (Colleen) enjoy many community and church activities. Rance also plays and officiates volleyball.

While Rance has enjoyed his volunteer flag football activities over the years, he sometimes says "the hassle" of running the program is starting to get to him. He hates, for example, when people say that he is "biased" in his officiating. And I relate to that sentiment. I also relate



to a parent's concern that "his kid" should be given a fair shake in life.

I remember (from the 1990s) when my own kids were in the flag football program. I have to admit that I did occasionally criticize the referees. Now that "the shoe is on the other foot," I realize that the only thing these referees want is for the games to be played in a fair and safe manner. They want it to be a good experience. Some of these kids may never play organized sports again. And some of them will go on to compete in a variety of sports activities.

If you run into Rance or Colleen Haralson, you should tell them "thank you" for their many years of service to the Sidney Flag Football Program. It hasn't always been easy. Their work has taught thousands of young people a little bit about sports. It has also given these kids a chance to do something that is just plain fun.





Training For Foot & Mouth Disease Response Set For Nov. 9

The Montana Agro-Emergency Preparedness Committee will present the tabletop scenario and exercise "Locally Responding to Foot and Mouth Disease" from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 9, at Montana State University, Bozeman. The event will take place at the Procrastinator Theatre in the Strand Union Building.


Livestock producers, advisers, county Extension agents and veterinarians represent the front line for foreign animal disease detection in animal production systems. The early identification and reporting of potential foreign animal diseases to state animal health authorities provides one of the best opportunities for early disease detection and is critical to limiting the scope of an outbreak. Increasing foreign animal disease awareness and preparedness has been an industry priority and has resulted in the development and delivery of this tabletop exercise training tool for livestock producers, veterinarians, emergency response professionals, law enforcement and stakeholders at the state and local level. This literal tabletop exercise is an interactive training tool that uses a scale model of a rural American community including farms, ranches, livestock facilities and a small town to help participants visualize what would occur locally during an animal disease disaster. The exercise walks the audience through a foot and mouth disease outbreak focusing on the effects at the local level and the operations that must occur to contain, manage and eradicate the disease. Participants rapidly become a part of the response effort from diagnosing the first case, mobilizing the local response, controlling and eradicating the disease, and getting back to business as usual. The roles of state and federal agencies are also explained and integrated into the exercise. This interactive training has been well received by producers, veterinarians and state and local first responders. This training event is distributed through the Montana Agro-Emergency Preparedness Committee and MSU Extension. It is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and Montana Disaster and Emergency Services. Through grant funding and agency cooperation, the program is provided at no cost to participants. Continuing Education credits have been requested for veterinarians, veterinary technicians and professional animal scientists. USDA To Make Payments To ND Farmers/Ranchers

North Dakota State Executive Director Aaron Krauter announced recently that approximately \$263.5 million in payments, including \$95.5 million in Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) rental payments and \$168 million in final direct payments, will be made to North Dakota agricultural producers this month.

North Dakota producers have more than 40,500 CRP contracts that cover over 2.4 million acres of land enrolled history and established in CRP. The voluntary program helps farmers and ranchers safeguard environmentally sensitive land and provides habitat for game and non-game species.

Final direct payments are made through the Direct and Counter-cyclical (DCP) and Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Programs, which provide payments to producers of certain commodities based on planting

A Little Bit Country **Water Quality Tests Available**

Although I have not been overwhelmed with callers asking for information about water quality tests, there is a growing trend of requests regarding testing services and interpretation of test results. I suspect much of this is being driven by the desire to document the quality and safety of ground water sources.

When someone inquires about testing water I usually ask if an analysis is desired for bacterial or mineral content. The reason for this question is because a bacterial analysis requires a sterile container. These are usually available from the laboratory which will also provide some sampling and timing instructions.

For a mineral or chemical analysis, most laboratories suggest using a clean plastic or glass container commonly available at home. One quart containers previ-



ously used for bleach, soap or other substances will contaminate the water sample. It is advised to rinse the container three times with the water to be tested.

For a bacterial test the laboratory commonly will report the analysis as either positive or negative (absent), indicating the presence or absence of coliform bacteria. A satisfactory (negative) rating would mean the water is safe for human consumption from a bacteriological standpoint.

Coliform bacteria are present in the intestinal tract of warm-blooded animals, including humans. While not a cause of disease by itself, its presence indicates probable contamination of the water supply and possible presence of disease organisms. This can lead to more serious problems for people with weakened immune systems such as the very young, elderly or immune-compromised individuals.

A positive bacterial test (greater than 1 per 100 milliliters of water) suggests further testing is necessary to include fecal coliform or E. coli bacteria testing. If such bacteria are present, the test

confirms sewage or animal waste is contaminating the water and shock chlorination should be performed.

A mineral analysis is likely to include tests for total dissolved solids (TDS), pH, hardness, nitrates, iron and manganese, calcium and magnesium, chloride, sodium and sulfates.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established a safe water guideline which is used by public water systems in North Dakota. Although the EPA cannot force private well owners to comply with the guidelines they can serve as a reference in determining the consumptive safety of ground water.




