Governor Signs Legislation To Return More Oil And Gas Tax Revenue To Eastern Montana Communities

Helena, Mont. – Governor Steve Bullock has signed House Bill 656, a bill sponsored by House District 35 Representative Joel Krautter (R-Sidney), to return more oil and gas tax revenue to eastern Montana cities and towns. Sidney Mayor Rick Norby was on hand for the bill signing and said, “This has been one of my proudest moments as Mayor and I am so thankful for the work of Representative Krautter.” In signing the bill Governor Bullock stated that, “When eastern Montana does well, all of Montana does well.”

The legislation restores a funding structure that distributes money from the Board of Oil and Gas’ oil and gas natural resource account to cities and towns in counties with oil and gas production, without raising current production tax levels. This funding structure for cities and towns was in place prior to the 2017 legislature, at which time distributions to cities and towns was eliminated due to legislative changes diverting money for other state programs. HB 656 restores this funding structure to cities and towns, with a 50 percent distribution increase for cities and towns from pre-2017 levels. The bill’s fiscal note estimates the legislation will eventually restore the total annual distribution of \$1-5 million to cities and towns in counties with oil and gas production.

Senator Tom Richmond (R-Billings) carried the legislation in the Senate and stated the bill, “serves a very good purpose, it does provide some direct funding for impact areas that would not otherwise go there.”

Fairview Mayor Brian Bieber, while unable to attend the bill signing was thankful to hear about the passage of HB 656 stating, “Thank you to everyone involved in this process. Funding such as this is crucial to the survival of Fairview and other small oil impacted towns and cities.”

Representative Krautter credits the successful legislative effort to a united approach at the legislature. “We started having phone conferences and meetings with eastern Montana mayors and interested stakeholders before the session began, to find common ground, identify our strategy to get this passed and address any concerns early. I especially want to thank Tim Burton and Kelly Lynch with the Montana League of Cities and Towns for their assistance and hard work on this bill. Bringing more oil and gas money back to eastern Montana communities, where the wealth is produced and impacts are felt on public safety and infrastructure was a priority of mine, so I’m very happy to see this victory for the people of my district and eastern Montana,” Krautter said.

Proponents of the bill included Richland County, with Commissioners Shane Gorder and Loren Young traveling to Helena to testify in support of the bill, Roundup Mayor Sandra Jones, Sidney Mayor Rick Norby, Fairview Mayor Brian Bieber, Wolf Point Mayor Chris Dschaak, Fallon County Commissioner Roy Rost, the Montana Association of Oil, Gas and Coal Counties, the Montana League of Cities and Towns, the Montana Association of Counties, the Montana Infrastructure Coalition, and the Montana Petroleum Association.

Krautter’s bill had bipartisan support from the very beginning, being co-sponsored by Senators Tom Richmond (R-Billings), Steve Hinebauch (R-Wibaux), Duane Ankney (R-Colstrip), Kenneth Bogner (R-Miles City), and Representatives Alan Doane (R-Bloomfield), Rhonda Knudsen (R-Culbertson), Joshua Kassmier (R-Fort Benton), Daniel Zolnikov (R-Billings) and Democrats Bridget Smith (D-Wolf Point) and Mary Ann Dunwell (D-Helena).

MDT to Resume Work Between Sidney To Fairview Next Week

Crews will soon be putting the finishing touches on the new stretch of highway between Sidney and Fairview. Border States Paving was scheduled to begin chip sealing operations on MT-200 north of Sidney on Monday and, depending on weather, the contractor anticipates completing work the same week.

Chip sealing is the final phase in a project started last year to improve safety and add capacity to the MT-200 roadway between Sidney and Fairview.

Previous work focused on road widening to accommodate the installation of center-left turn lanes and passing lanes along MT-200, as well as surface improvements throughout the corridor.

Chip sealing provides a moisture barrier for the underlying pavement extending the life of the roadway and lowering long-term costs.

Drivers should expect reduced speeds of 35 mph in work zones with flaggers and pilot cars to direct traffic. Travelers are encouraged to allow additional travel time to accommodate delays of up to 15 minutes and are reminded to watch for work crews and equipment. Chip sealing is scheduled to begin the week of May 13, and, weather permitting, will be completed within the week.

The convention will start at 8 a.m. on Thursday, May 30 and conclude on Saturday, June 1. Attendees will consist of North Dakota Firefighters Association members which comprises primarily of all the fire departments in the state of North Dakota, approximately 300 firefighters including spouses are expected to attend. The convention will begin with a golf scramble at the Fox Hills Golf Course on Thursday, May 30. There will be registration followed by a Fire Chief’s meeting and a social and barbecue. On Friday, May 31, the convention reconvenes with a Memorial Service honoring members of the North Dakota Fire Department that have passed away since the last convention. On Saturday, June 1, an election of officer positions as well as final reports will conclude the convention. “The purpose of the convention is to conduct the business meeting of the North Dakota Firefighters Association and provide an opportunity to socialize with other firefighters from across the State,” said Chairmen of the Convention Committee, Jeff Gronos. The North Dakota Firefighters Association has had an annual convention each year that rotates between host cities throughout the state of North Dakota. “In 2016, the Watford City Fire Department attended the North Dakota Firefighters Annual Convention in Bottineau, ND and submitted their nomination and was unanimously elected to host the 135th Annual Fire Convention in 2019,” explained Gronos. The Watford City Fire Department is looking forward to hosting its first ever North Dakota Firefighters Annual Convention and is excited to showcase all that the Watford City area has to offer.

"Right now I am concentrating on learning the job. It's a platform to build on what's there, which is already really good. I want to build on that, and keep it current," he said. The site supervisor is a different position than a traditional museum one, and as Garcia engages with the community and determines what needs are, the possibilities are endless for increased programming and engagement with visitors, schools and the area. "Most of my jobs have been in public service and have involved outdoor activities, and I will remain in that vein," he commented.

Garcia holds bachelors degrees in fine arts and geology as well as a masters degree in paleontology all from the University of Montana in Missoula. Those degrees have served him well as his first job was with the Paleontology Exploration Project, funded by the Fort Peck Paleontology Science Foundation grants, which taught teachers how to teach their students. Out in the badlands, Garcia and his crew would find a specimen, dig it half way up and then let the teachers and kids do the rest, including taking it to the lab.

While with the Fish & Wildlife Service, Garcia developed mobile kits that could be loaded into the back of a pickup and taken to students in the huge area he served. "It wasn't like here, where the kids come to you," he said. "I had to go to the kids there." The mobile kits are one of his ideas for the Confluence center, where families can pick up a kit consisting of a map, binoculars, topography plates showing rock formations, or rivers, or other landscape features, and other tools to help them understand what they are seeing. Bird watching kits with a spotting scope, written materials, and model birds are also on his list. "Families can do a self-guided tour and know what to look for with the backpack kit," Garcia explained.

A small teepee kit is also on Garcia's wish list. It would be

small enough, and tough enough, for kids to put together and then furnish the inside properly with everything needed to survive the harsh landscape of the MonDak. "Everything in a teepee had its proper space to ensure survival, and the kids would learn how and why," he said.

Garcia is married to Allana and has a 17 year old son David and 14 year old daughter Becky. The family will move to the Confluence area once school is out in Glasgow.

The Missouri Yellowstone Confluence Center is located at the junction of the two mighty rivers. It is just 22 miles southwest of Williston and is open year round.

Confluence of Creativity Coming to the MDHC

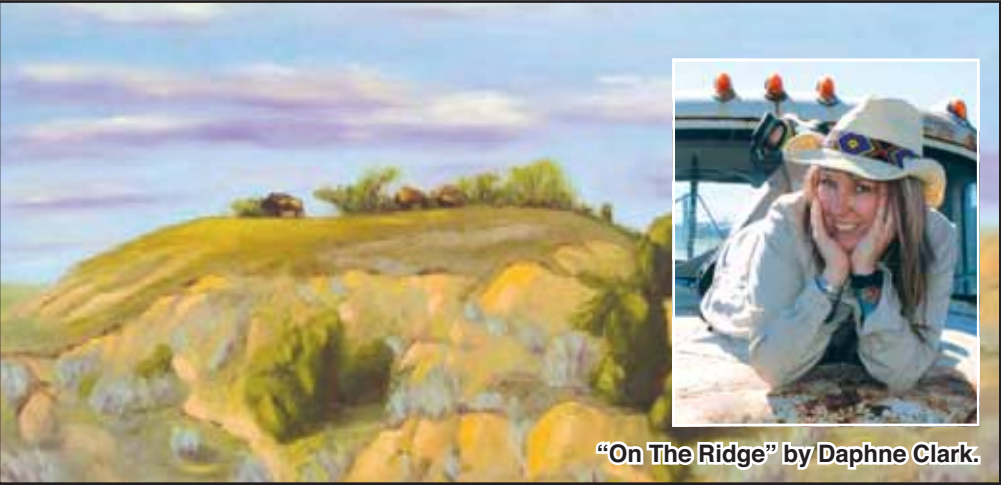
Invitational Art Exhibition, June 4 - July 27

In 2010, Daphne was drawn to start painting when a friend introduced her to oil paint as a medium. It was then she discovered she could easily spend hours mixing colors and manipulating paint on the canvas with different brushes, strokes and the pallet knife. The fluidity and versatility of this new medium had Daphne hooked, yet she craved feedback to further

her skill set. In 2012, Daphne enrolled at the Academy of Art University to pursue a Master's in Fine Art. She selected AAU because of their philosophy anyone can create art if they are willing to put in the work. Vaccines Protect You, Your Family, And Your Community

Pockets of our country are experiencing a significant uptick in the number of measles cases.

Measles is not a harmless childhood illness. It is actually a highly contagious, dangerous disease that can even be deadly. But measles is also easily preventable with a vaccine.

There's a lot of misinformation swirling around, so let me provide the facts: vaccines

save lives. Vaccines protect our children from debilitating and deadly disease, and they promote the overall health of our communities. Vaccines are safe and highly effective. Large studies undertaken over the years have confirmed their safety again and again.

Vaccines do not cause autism and do not contain toxic chemicals. Any serious side effects from vaccines are exceedingly rare, and the protection from disease that vaccines provide far outweighs any potential risks.

If you're a parent, talk to your child's doctor to make

sure your child is up to date on all of his or her scheduled vaccinations. This is especially important if you have an infant, because vaccinating your baby on the recommended immunization schedule provides protection against 14 serious childhood illnesses.

For measles, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that children get two doses of the MMR vaccine, starting with the first dose at 12 to 15 months of age, and the second dose at 4 through 6 years of age.

If you're an adult, check with your doctor about wheth-

er you're up to date on your vaccines, too.

We all want our children to grow up in a world that is free from preventable diseases. The single most important thing each of us can do to achieve that goal is to get fully vaccinated—for ourselves, our families, and our communities.

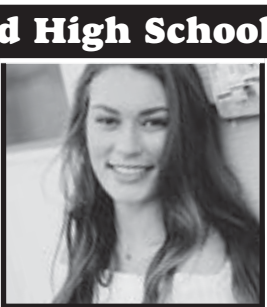

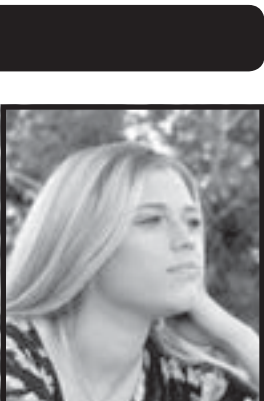

Fishing Regulations Scoping Survey Available Online

Sidney Track And Field At The Jockstop Invitational

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks invites anglers and other interested parties to participate in a survey regarding changes to the 2020 fishing regulations. The survey is available at <http://fwp.mt.gov/fish/publicComments/regsScoping.html>.

The survey is part of a public scoping process to review fishing regulations and identify potential issues with fisheries. This review happens every four years.

Public input is vital to crafting fishing regulations, said Eric Roberts, FWP fisheries management bureau chief. We evaluate how a regulation may impact a fishery biologically, angling opportunities for the public and the regulations social acceptability.

This initial scoping process runs through June 21, 2019. FWP staff will then formulate tentative proposals to present to the Montana Fish & Wildlife Commission in August. Additional public comment on tentative proposals will be collected this fall and the final regulations will be considered at the October commission meeting.

Some of the ideas now being considered by FWP include:

- Changing the largemouth and smallmouth bass limits on some waterbodies in the Western Fishing District;
- Allowing single-point lures only on the Middle, North and South Forks of the Flathead River;
- Implementing a hoot owl restriction on the Ennis Dam to Mouth stretch of the Madison River that would prohibit fishing between 2 p.m. and midnight from July 1 through Aug. 31;
- Establishing no limit or mandatory harvest of northern pike and standardizing the daily walleye limit on the Missouri River from Holter Dam to Black Eagle Dam;
- Requiring ice fishing shelters to be removed from the ice by at least March 1 in the Eastern Fishing District;
- Allowing bow and arrow harvest of Chinook salmon from Oct. 1 through Nov. 30 on Fort Peck Reservoir.

Anglers and others are invited to participate by reviewing these and other FWP ideas - and by contributing additional ideas of their own. Comments can be submitted online or at public meetings that will soon be scheduled in each FWP region.

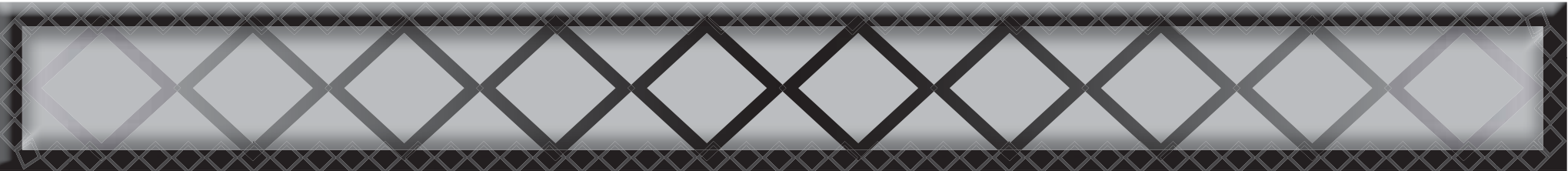

Perennials Make For Good Spring Planting

Spring is here in our region. Daytime temps are regularly in the 60's but overnight lows are still a bit scary for most annual plants. Plants that are safe to install right now would be trees, shrubs, and perennials. Many people plant perennials because of the attraction of year after year growth. This means they will not have to plant their entire space with annuals each season. We try and keep a selection of perennial plants in stock all season long. Firstly, when considering perennial plants it is important to realize that most perennials do not continue to bloom in the way that annual flowers do. Since they grow for more than one

season they focus there bloom time to a certain time of year in hopes to attract pollinators and other insects that will help them either pollinate the flower or move the seeds to a new location. Since perennials do not bloom continually, it is important to plant a variety of items so as to help ensure there is color in the landscape throughout the entire season. We're happy to help you with selecting items that will bloom during certain periods of the summer months to create that continuous flow of color. Secondly, when choosing to plant perennial beds, it is often essential in our area to work at improving the soil in the area you wish to grow them. You will find that your

results will be much improved than if you attempt to grow straight in the native soil most of us have in our outdoor landscapes. Soil amendment is important because there are several challenges with the soils in our regions. Due to the glacial flows that passed through here centuries ago creating those beautiful badlands we appreciate so much, they caused us other problems. The tended to grab soil as they moved and when they distributed it again they landed sand particles in one space and clay particles in other places. Soils that are not balanced with clay and sand content each pose their own unique challenges. Sandy Soils: Soils that are high in sand content are

generally extremely quick draining. In a climate like ours where rains and other natural watering are rarer, that makes getting things established in sandy soils somewhat difficult. It can often be a challenge to keep young plants hydrated. On a positive note, sandy soils tend to allow roots to permeate through and grow very quickly. This can mean a person with sandier soils can see rapid growth (with proper hydration) that would be much more difficult to achieve in soils that are heavier, like clay. Clay Soils: Perhaps the most common it seems, soils with high clay content while being moderately nutritious, are difficult to get things to thrive in because of the dense nature of their particles. Clay

because it is so small, has room to hold lots of moisture, so soils generally do not appear dry when they are high in clay. Once they do become dry they can often crack at the surfaces. Work should be done to improve the space between clay particles by adding sand or other organic materials that can help create more porosity. Don't know what kind of

soil you have? You can follow the instructions on our website to perform a “soil composition” test. All you need are simple materials you already possess at home. It won't cost you a dime, and you'll be better prepared in knowing what you need to succeed. We're here to help with all your gardening questions. Happy growing!

RMC Launches Electronic Health Record Accessable From Your Smartphone

You know the scenario. It's after business hours and you've just remember you forgot to make an appointment with your healthcare provider. It would be so convenient if you could use your Smartphone to schedule it from home. Now you can! Roosevelt Medical Center, of Culberson, has invested in new technology capable of meeting the demands of busy patients who want to manage their healthcare outside of normal business hours. Roosevelt Medical Center has partnered with Athenahealth to implement a new electronic health system that promises to provide technology that enhances the patient experience while making access to healthcare convenient at any hour. The new system will replace the old, less efficient health IT system to enable more advanced patient care delivery across the organiza-

tion's entire operations from the clinic, outpatient services and the hospital. Fully-integrated, the cloud-based system will help streamline patient diagnosis, treatment plan administration and management. Through the system, patients will gain access to a patient portal for online appointment scheduling, secure provider messaging, test results and improved billing processes. "This is about delivering better healthcare by embracing technology and the convenience it can provide our patients," said Brian Fordyce, Information Technology Director. Patients will be required to validate the accuracy of their contact, insurance and other vital data points within the new system. Patients will be asked to bring their most current driver's license, insurance card, medications and provide their cell phone or home phone number to maximize communications

concerning their healthcare. Also, the implementation of the patient portal will require patients to provide an email address allowing for your most recent health information to be communicated to you using the portal. The same information will be needed for hospital and clinic visits. Patients who choose to schedule online will need to make sure to always confirm their appointments on their Smartphone by listening to the entire message and pressing the number one button. If a patient doesn't confirm the appointment they will continue to receive up-to three reminder call or text messages. Appointments made for the same day a visit will take place can also expect to receive a reminder text or call that day. Board members, providers, department managers and staff have been working with Athenahealth since January to build and customize the system to meet the specific needs of the community and its' facility. For the last month, employees at RMC have received comprehensive EHR training to ensure a smooth transition to the new system with key staff members desig-

nated as super-users who will train new staff in the future. The facility's contract with Medworx, its' current EHR vendor, has been in place since May of 2012. The Board decided to make the transition because the laboratory's computer system is old and as of last December is no longer supported with updated software technology or interfaces. "With all of the requirements for documentation it seemed to be a good time to make a total system change to meet our needs while also providing better service to our patients," said Audrey Stromberg, CEO. Although the investment made by RMC was sizeable, Athenahealth limits the amount of up-front costs RMC will have to pay, making it more affordable for the implementation phase. Instead, Athenahealth receives payment as RMC gets paid from billed revenues. "This is never an easy process but it's one we believe is worth its' growing pains. Bringing convenience to patients through this technology gives our community better access to care in a way that works with their busy lives," Fordyce said.

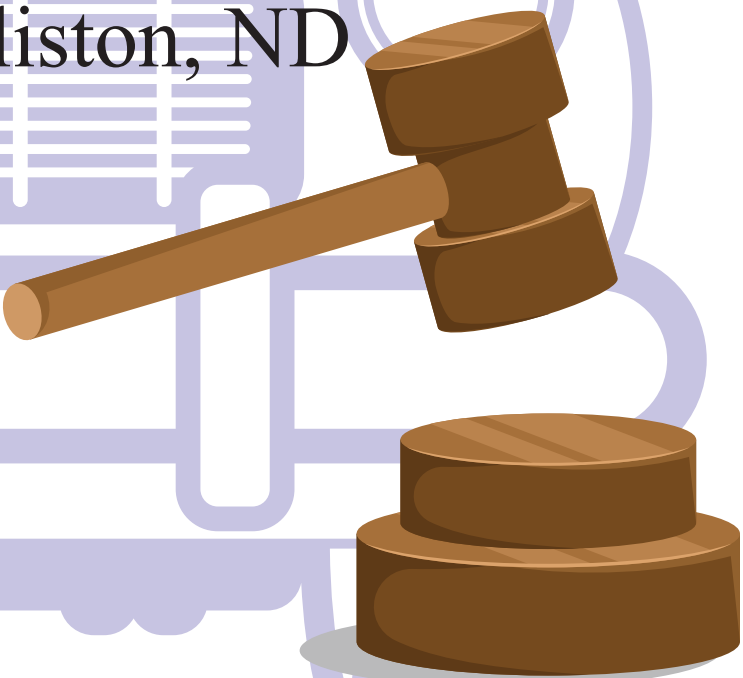
