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Watford City's 21st Annual Heritage Day To Take Place Sept. 21



Mass Flu Shot Clinic Scheduled October 3, Sidney

The Richland County Health Department has scheduled the annual Mass Flu Shot Clinic on October 3, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Flu shots are also available during normal clinic hours for those who cannot attend on October 3.

The flu vaccine will be available for ages 6 months and up, and high-dose is available for individuals 65 years and older. No FluMist is available. The Health Department carries quadrivalent, pre-filled syringes that contain no preservative. The price of flu vaccine will vary from \$40 to \$75, depending on the individual's age and the type of vaccine used. Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance may be billed for those who bring their cards. Uninsured children may receive subsidized vaccine through the Vaccines for Children program. Flu clinic paperwork may be printed from www.richland.org/rchd, on the Richland County Health Department Facebook page, or obtained the day of the mass flu shot clinic.

Clinic participants may be screened for eligibility for a free FIT colon cancer-screening test during the clinic.

No appointment is needed to get a flu vaccine on October 3, and no other vaccinations will be available that day. Flu shots, as well as other vaccines, will be available during regular clinic hours, on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, noon to 4:30 p.m. Additional clinic hours are the second Wednesday until 6 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month, from 1 to 4 p.m. Check the Department Facebook page at www.facebook.com/Richland-CountyHealthDepartment for changes to regular clinic hours.



Those Annoying Senior Moments



Since he couldn't remember someone's name at the moment, even though he might know the person quite well, he decided to start calling everyone Chief to cover his memory lapses.

Again, at the time I thought it was hilarious, but with the passage of time, I no longer find this inability to dredge up a name at the drop of a hat humorous in the least. This



out of my memory banks to save my life. As soon as I finished the litany of facts I did remember about this woman, her name popped into my mind. Trust me, I have NOT forgotten that name again, but it illustrates my point about the nebulous nature of recalling a name on the spur of the moment, even of someone I know rather well.

The good news about this is that Reader's Digest informs me that forgetting names does not mean I've gone senile, but is a natural consequence in people who have a few years under their belts. For instance, I know very well the word used to describe a multiple approach to controlling noxious weeds, that word they use that I can't remember that describes using a combination of spraying, plant-specific insects, weeding or hoeing, and grazing livestock, all used together to control an unwanted weed.

Unfortunately, when this embarrassing situation occurs, the name I needed or the descriptive word I wanted usually surfaces later when my thoughts have moved on to something else, or I recall the name or the bit of trivia at 2:30 in the morning during one of my bouts of insomnia.

I like to tell myself that I have so much information stored in the filing cabinets of my brain that it just takes awhile for my brain to scroll through the wealth of information, find the right cubicle where I stored that little nugget of fact that I am searching for, before it can dredge up the information I seek.

When name recall fails me, I think I need to take a cue from my former employer and find a suitable word that adequately and politely negates the need to come up with a name. So, if I am chatting with you and I call you 'Amigo', or 'Captain', or 'Friend' or some other moniker, please just nod and smile and go along with the joke. Eventually I will remember your real name, if that is any consolation.

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



MDT Seeks Input On US 2 Improvements In Culbertson **Public Encouraged To Weigh-In** At Sept. 26 Public Meeting

Culbertson, MT - A portion of highway running through the town of Culbertson could receive a face-lift under a Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) plan to upgrade a key seament of US-2.

MDT is in the early stages of design for a project to rehabilitate approximately 1.3 miles of highway through town with the goal of improving safety, pedestrian accessibility and roadway conditions along the route. Improvements would begin at Diamond Creek crossing west of town and extend east to meet ongoing road construction east of town.

Members of the public are encouraged to review the proposed changes to the roadway at a walk-in open house Thursday, September 26 from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. at Culbertson Town Hall (210 Broadway Ave. Culbertson, Montana 59218). MDT and project staff will be on hand to discuss the plans and answer questions.

"Our goal is to develop a highway design addressing the need to rehabilitate the road surface and improve drainage, while considering many of the longstanding concerns in the community," said consulting project manager Tom Cavanaugh. "The intent is for the project to remain within the current public right-of-way."

In addition to rehabilitating the road surface, the project would install curb, gutter, storm drainage and sidewalk throughout the more urban sections of the project. According to Cavanaugh the upgrades are aimed at both improving drainage along the highway and addressing safety concerns.

"Adding curb and gutter to the area will create clearly defined points of entry and exit reducing confusion for roadway users and improving safety overall," said Cavanaugh.

Other potential safety improvements include an enhanced LED flashing beacon at the school cross-walk and the elimination of some on-street parking to improve sight distance near intersections and fit in center turn lanes. A center left turn lane will be installed between the intersections of MT 16 South and MT 16 North to remove turning vehicles from the flow of traffic. New public parking near the school fields and a dedicated pedestrian path connecting the Culbertson Museum to existing walkways is also under consideration.

Many of the upgrades were identified in the 2012 Culbertson Corridor Planning Study which looked at transportation needs and cost-effective improvements in a 4-mile radius around the town of Culbertson.

The bulk of the improvements will receive federal funding through the National Highway System with the federal government paying up to 87 percent of the costs and State of Montana providing up to a 13 percent match through gas tax revenue. MDT plans to have the project ready for construction by 2021, pending available funding and the completion of design.

Active listening is a part of intentional communication, which allows you to truly listen and understand without placing assumptions or judgment on what is being heard. This shows your child that you are genuinely interested in what they are saying, build self-awareness and self-regulation and strengthens social and emotional skills like empathy and identifying emotions. Active listening employs asking open-ended questions, removing distractions like television and cell phones, and asking clarifying and reflecting questions of what has been communicated.

The journal of Adolescent Health found that teens who have infrequent family dinners, defined as fewer than three per week, were 3.5 times more likely to have abused prescriptions drugs or to have used an illegal drug; are three times more likely to have used marijuana, and 2.5 times more likely to have used tobacco, than those who had more frequent family meals, Family meals provide time to talk about the use of drugs and alcohol with your teen and to set expectations and logical

consequences. Juggling jobs, kids, and the demands of modern life often come at the expense of family mealtime, but studies show taking the time to prepare meals at home and spend quality time together have lasting benefits. With the start of the new school year, renew your commitment to enjoying meals together at home to nourish your child's body, brain and spirit.

After cutting and polishing the stones, Elmer created the frame out of plexiglass and Clara did the agate work, fixed with glue, one stone at a time. It took the couple 6 1/2 months to complete. The church weighs about 50 pounds and is about 30 inches high, 17 inches wide and 29 inches long.

The inside of the church is it's own delight with miniature pews, worshippers and a minister at the pulpit, all created by the Hagglunds.

After the passing of their parents, Hagglunds' daughters brought the church back to Montana and donated it to Brorson Lutheran Church, which in turn gave it to Pella Lutheran Church. It is on loan to the MonDak courtesy of those two entities.

It is truly a delight, and, since admission to the MonDak heritage Center is free, there's no cost to view this wonderful piece of art with such a local appeal. The MonDak is open Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m.- 4 p.m. and Saturdays from 1-4 p.m. at 120 3rd Ave. S.E., Sidney.

Check Your License Before You Head Out Into The Field

Don't wait until opening day to discover your license and carcass tags are faded and need to be replaced. Hunters and anglers with licenses that are displaying faded text making them difficult to read can have those licenses replaced at no cost at their regional Fish, Wildlife & Parks office.

License providers will soon receive new license paper that will not fade, as is the issue with the current yellow paper. This paper will be shipped to providers during the week of September 9. The new paper rolls will be white, not the traditional bright yellow, for ease of recognition between good paper and bad.

Another option is to go to fwp.mt.gov, login to MyFWP and request a digital version of your license to print at home or download to a smart phone. Digital licenses are good for everything but a carcass tag.

Replacement at an FWP office for faded licenses does not count against the number of replacements an individual is allowed. Local license providers are unable to offer free replacements; the cost is \$5 for each license replaced. Faded licenses can also be mailed to FWP for replacement: P.O. Box 200701, Helena, MT 59620-0701 or to your regional FWP office.

However, the lessons I've learned are innumerable and the blessings I've experienced are infinite. I was given a second chance at life on May 15, 2015 and because of that I am a changed man that continues and strives to better myself each and every day, not only for myself but for my amazing family and friends. I have found a passion with woodworking and started my own small business, Lazy Legs Woodworking. I have a wonderful fiancé, two silly and

smart boys and a fur kid that are my world. Unfortunately, over the last four years, I have had seven surgeries, six of those surgeries were for pressure ulcers and bone infections. These surgeries started eight months after being out of the hospital after my car accident and the last was on June 15, 2019. Being a paraplegic, I rely on my wheelchair as my new "legs" but that means that I have more skin that is compromised to pressure wounds/sores. Unlike most people who can feel and adjust their body when it is uncomfortable or "asleep" I cannot, so I need to be seated on specialized cushions to help relieve that pressure. Another cause for my wounds is having to transfer in and out of our vehicle with a transfer board which causes friction to my skin and compromises its integrity.

Because of all my surgeries and hospital stays, we will be paying off hospital bills for years to come and simply cannot afford a vehicle for myself but being able to have my own accessible vehicle would not only do amazing things for my physical health but even more so for my mental health. Right now I rely on my fiancé to take me to appointments, shop for our family, take our kids to school, school functions, and so much more, I have had to miss out on too many events and special moments in my kids' and family's lives because I need to use my power chair to comfortably and safely be involved. If I were able to have a vehicle that I could drive while staying in my power chair and not have to transfer, it would drastically improve not only my life but my family's as well. I could be more involved wit my boys' school, get them into sports and not only watch but take them to practices and games. I can go to my appointments on my own, go to the grocery store unassisted, take my fiancé on proper dates, take my dog to the dog park, take a drive and enjoy what our beautiful world has to offer and so much more without the worry of damaging my body and missing out on even more.

My family and I are truly grateful and appreciative of ev-

eryone's support."

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MT Attorney General Candidate Kimberly Dudik Visits Sidney

During her campaign of running for Montana Attorney General, Kimberly Dudik paid a visit to Sidney where she met with the public for a meet and greet at Sunny's Family Restaurant.

Dudik has spent time in the legislature, as assistant Attorney General and as a

"My career has always been about helping people," Dudik said.

One of the first things Dudik addressed was the issue with meth in the state, as well as the heroin and opioid problem. Dudik stated that 60-80 percent of all crimes are drug related. One thing Dudik said she feels passionately about is keeping children safe.

Dudik said that too often children are removed from their home because of drug abuse. If drug treatment was more readily available to those who needed it, children wouldn't be pulled from their homes and families.

Along with that comes the workforce struggle. There are too many people without jobs because they can't pass a drug test or they're unreliable because of their addictions.

Dudik discussed the prescription regulation program that is currently voluntary. She said that often times, those with prescription drug problems visit more than one doctor so they can get more prescription drugs. If more doctors used the regulation program, it would decrease the number of people who have access to narcotics and opioids through multiple doctors.

"Making Montana communities safer, protecting children from abuse, and ending

the cycle of criminal justice involvement are why I am running for Attorney General," Dudik's campaign says.

According to the candidate's material she passed out at the meet and greet, she is a champion of reforms in public safety. Her leadership, working with bipartisan groups throughout the state, has led to substantive changes that guard communities from sex offenders, protect vulnerable populations, especially children, enhance substance abuse and mental health treatment and improve criminal justice.

One of the things that Dudik worked on during her time in legislature was a bill that protected pregnant women from having charges brought against them if they were using drugs during pregnancy.

"It's proven that women who are pregnant can beat their addiction by 80 percent if they receive the help they need," Dudik said.

She also discussed that she is working on something to make it to where the way rape kits are used and the availability of them would

When asked how she

differs from her opponents, Dudik said that she has a wealth of experience that her opponents don't have. She also said she is a domestic violence advocate.

"Nobody on the democratic side has that," Dudik said about her experience.

Dudik went on to talk about public land and how she is a strong advocate of it.

"I would never enforce unconstitutional law," Dudik said in regard to public land.

When a participant of the meet and greet brought up the issue of child safety, Dudik explained a term called grooming. When a person spends their time grooming a child for an inappropriate relationship. Dudik said she passed a law making grooming a crime. The law passed in the 2017 legislature, HB 247. It passed with 100% support. https://leg.mt.gov/bills/2017/ billhtml/HB0247.htm

"Instead of removing a child from their home, we need to work closely to make the home safe," Dudik said.

She went on to add that one thing everyone can agree on is child safety.

"We need to advocate for everyone," Dudik said.

Casey Schreiner Visited Sidney, September 10

visited Sidney during his campaign for governor, meeting with the public at the Rod Schreiner used

to be a high school biology teacher. During his time teaching, he took a group of students to Helena on a class trip. During the trip one of his students suggested that he run for legislature, a choice that he took into consideration and said "changed his life."

"Running for governor is something that everyday Montanans should be able to

do," Schreiner said. Among the issues he finds most important to focus on, Schreiner talked about education and health care. With a father who got sick due to the high cost of insulin, Schreiner is invested in fixing the health

care system. "We need to have better resources throughout the state," Schreiner said.

He went on to talk about mental health and how it needs to be addressed and better handled in the state.

"Health care is a big priority, and education is important too," Schreiner said.

With two sons who are on the Autism spectrum, his priorities go hand in hand. He talked about how privileged people are who don't live in rural Montana and the resources that are available. If he didn't live in a good area, it would be difficult to find a preschool where his son would get the proper education.

There was a private school that he wouldn't be allowed to attend because of his Autism. Schreiner feels passionate about all Montanans having access to equal education.

Education is something that he feels all Montanans should be given access to and one of those things is equal opportunity to education and health care. With his son being on the Autism spectrum, it was difficult for him to find a special education service that would

be willing to accept a child who was Autistic.

On the topic of education, Schreiner said he feels it's important to invest in those who need it the most

"We need to re-skill those who need it," Schreiner said.

He went on to talk about the issue of mental health in the state. In 2015 he supported the Native American and Rural Youth Suicide Prevention Pilot Project. While the bill died in legislature, Schreiner said he feels it's something that needs to be addressed.

When asked where he stands on legalizing marijuana, Schreiner said it's a topic he's torn on.

"The downside for youth could be dramatic," Schreiner

Schreiner went on to talk about the drug epidemic in the state. He told a story of someone he met who needed drug treatment but didn't have access to it. They were told by a law enforcement agent to steal something, so they would be incarcerated and would then be able to get the treatment needed.

"We have a broken system," Schreiner said.

One of the participants at the meet and greet asked Schreiner how he feels he differs from his opponents.

"My values are different, and my perspective. Having a teacher in the governor's office is really important. We know what everyday Montanan's deal with," Schreiner said.



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
