

Culbertson Celebrates 60 Years Of Frontier Days & Rodeo

The weekend of June 9-10, Culbertson will be putting on their annual Frontier Days, with their rodeo followed by a street dance both nights. A true community effort, local businesses and Culbertson Saddle Club members spend their time and money to keep the tradition alive, through rodeo association changes, floods, and maintenance challenges.

A new attraction this year is the Women's Ranch Bronc Riding, with at least ten women entered in the event. They will perform both nights along with the standard events of bull riding, bareback, calf roping, saddle bronc, steer wrestling, barrel racing, team roping, ladies breakaway roping, junior barrel racing, junior breakaway roping, senior men's breakaway roping, and the wild calf race. Slack begins at 9 a.m. Saturday, for those wishing to watch.

Big Circle Rodeo will be supplying the bucking stock for the weekend.

While the rodeo will begin at 6:30 p.m. Friday, and 7 p.m. Saturday, a community breakfast and lunch will be served Saturday. The Culbertson Fire Department will be serving breakfast Saturday morning at the school, and the Women's Club will be serving their Main Street Meal Saturday at 11 a.m., just before the parade at 12 p.m. There will be a beer garden, beef and cheddar sandwiches, and hot dogs next to the Old Armory. Friday the street dance will be hosted at the Montana Bar, and Saturday it will be held at the Saddle Club itself, at the famous barn.

The barn was renovated in 2014 and 2015, and far from its humble beginnings, now hosts not only the annual dance, but weddings and other events. The original structure was moved from the area between Bainville

and Culbertson in the '50s and was used to store safflower for several years to pay for it. A favorite story among older members of the community is that when they moved the big red barn, they were cited by an officer for not putting a red flag on such

a large building being moved down the highway. The men moving the barn responded that they felt a red flag would do little to make a large red barn more visible to other vehicles.

Sidney ARS Pollination Specialist Dr. Joshua Campbell will be discussing his research into native pollinators in the region and their contributions to dryland agricultural systems. In addition, County Extension Agents Wendy Becker and Shelley Mills will be conducting a special workshop on how to effectively add bee hives to your farm, set up a beekeeper's calendar, and use Integrated Pest management to keep the bees and environment healthy. The duo will also discuss how to check for varroa mites, a serious pest of honeybees and considered a contributor to colony collapse disorder. Both Becker and Mills are graduates of University of Montana's master beekeeper program and have been conducting several beekeeping workshops around the region in recent months.

Other insect issues being addressed on the tour: Grasshoppers! These pests remain a key concern for MonDak producers following extensive outbreaks over the past two years. Sidney ARS Research Ecologist Dave Branson will be discussing current studies underway on grasshoppers and grasshopper outbreaks, as well as answering questions from tour participants.

Field pea research evaluating the effects of microbial inoculants on plant agronomics and soil health are also featured during the day with Sidney ARS Research Microbiologist Sakdikshya Dangi and Post Doc Rosalie






Cayko plans on attending North Dakota State College of Science for plumbing. Schumacker will be attending Missoula College in the fall pursuing an associate of science in business management.

In 1992, the seeds for a foundation were planted, and in 1993 the ROI Foundation, Inc. grew into a reality, with a separate board of directors now headed by Chip Gifford. The Foundation was formed to receive, accumulate, administer, and provide funds for the care and treatment of persons with intellectual disabilities in service at Richland Opportunities, Inc. (ROI).

The scholarship application says "In this same

spirit, it is the desire of the Foundation to provide a yearly scholarship in the amount of \$750 to deserving Richland County graduating seniors. This scholarship can be renewed an additional three years. Grand total of the award could be \$3,000. Applications focus on community service/involvement, and a demonstrated interest pursuing post-secondary enrichment."

The scholarship began in 1998 with Jenelle Stoner, currently Sidney's ROI Executive Director, being the first recipient. At least one scholarship has been given out every year since then.

McKenzie Co. 4-H Range Judging Team Named '23 National Champions

By Meagan Dotson The McKenzie County 4-H Range Judging team came home as national champions after attending

the 2023 National Land and Range Judging Contest in El Reno, OK. The contest was held May 2-4 at the Canadian County Expo Center. The

team consists of Paige Delaney, who was named the individual national champion, Ryan Pingel, Luke Smith, Sylvia Boekelman along

with Head Coach Morgan Wisness and Coach Devan Leo. Kevin Sedivec assisted with coaching while the team was in Oklahoma.

Range Judging challenges teams and individuals on their knowledge of native and invasive grasses, forbs, trees and shrubs. It also requires knowledge as to if those plants are annuals, perennials, or biennial. They must know which plants increase or decrease under grazing pressure, if it is desirable or undesirable for forage for cattle and grouse, and if each plant makes adequate cover for grouse.

"Ecological sites are a part of range judging. Those sites are marked off and then the 4-Hers assess the plant matter in the site and determine desirable vs. undesirable," explained Leo. "They then estimate percentages of each within the site. Those percentages then help them calculate if this eco site needs to be adjusted in any way if it's not desirable for livestock and grouse."

Judging is based on points and each plant is worth ten points for correctly identifying it and naming its characteristics; if the plant is misidentified, no points are awarded. Plants are denoted with marker flags and individuals work two plant lines, consisting of ten plants per

line. They then judge three ecological sites. Each judging is done individually and the top three scores from each team are combined for the team score.

MNAXLP

In the long term, Range Judging is a great foundation for anyone interested in becoming a range scientist, ecologist, or any other field that would require someone the ability to "read" the range in order to make appropriate management decisions.

The McKenzie County National Champion Range Judging team was welcomed home and celebrated by their community for all of their hard work and knowledge.

Plant Pathologist Frankie Crutcher, Montana State University's Eastern Agricultural Research Center, Sidney, will also discuss findings from ongoing MSU and NDSU field pea studies looking at Fusarium and Aphanomyces disease incidence under three different scenarios, including peas in a longterm, 2-year rotations with spring wheat; peas in a 3-year rotation sequence study with oilseeds and durum, and peas incorporated into a cover crop

mix to replace summer fallow. But the day is not all insects and legumes. Cheatgrass management with fire and effective greenstripping techniques to aid in wildfire management are also on the agenda, as is a talk on water availability following a cover crop, by ARS scientists, Carissa Wonkka, research plant ecologist; and Brett Allen, dryland research agronomist, respectively. Dr Campbell and ARS Research Ecologist Natalie West will also be discussing their study looking at the regional spread of Russian

olive seeds by mammals. Finally, ARS Research Soil Scientist Upendra Sainju will be discussing carbon sequestration under perennial grasses and an annual crop.

The day concludes with a free steak dinner sponsored by the Sheridan and Roosevelt County Conservation Districts. Pesticide points are pending. Additional details to come as plans are finalized.



Grasshoppers Are Hatching

Grasshoppers have started to hatch and now is the time to begin scouting your crops and rangeland. Grasshopper Life Cycle

In the fall, adult grasshoppers deposit their eggs in the soil where they overwinter and begin to hatch from May-July. Juvenile grasshoppers develop through five nymphal instar stages (30-40 days) before developing into an adult with fully formed wings. Adults live for 40-60 days. There are a few species of grasshoppers that overwinter as nymphs; however, these species are not economically damaging.

Management

The majority of management options for grasshoppers rely on insecticide applications based on scouting and threshold of the crop. Cultural and biological control options are not generally effective.

Scouting

Crop fields should be scouted at least once a week. High nymphal densities can cause severe defoliation, however newly emerged grasshoppers do not need to be controlled unless their population is at a threatening level. Grasshopper numbers can be estimated using the square foot method by counting the number of grasshoppers in a visually estimated square foot, and randomly repeating it 18 times while walking in a transect, tally the number and divide by two to get the number per square yard. When grasshoppers are in high numbers, it can be difficult to do the square foot method. Four 180° sweeps with a 15-inch net is equivalent to the number per square yard.

Control

It is easier and more economical to control grasshoppers while they are in their nymphal stages, because they can be killed before damaging crops, treatment prior to maturity can prevent egg deposits, and smaller grasshoppers are more susceptible to insecticides.


Control in Crops

For a list of insecticide options by crop, see the North Dakota Field Crop Insect Management Guide, available online or at the Extension Office.

The following table shows rates based on grasshopper nymph and adult counts. Newly emerged grasshoppers do not usually need to be controlled unless the population is at the "threatening" level or action

threshold.

Control on Rangelands A number of 15-20 grasshoppers per square yard is the economic threshold for treatment of grasshoppers on rangeland. These densities can result in up to 200-500 pounds of forage lost per acre. Reduced Agent and Area Treatment strategies (RAATs) can be used on rangeland to reduce control costs. Bakken GROW Program Will Provide Humanitarian Relief & Solid Employment For Ukrainian Refugees

The Bakken Global Recruitment of Oilfield Workers (GROW) Program is looking for sponsors for Ukrainian workers, with intentions of welcoming 25 new workers to North Dakota by July 2023. The North Dakota Petroleum Council (NDPC) launched this program in the spring of 2023 as a way to address the oil and gas industry's shortage of workers.

"Due to the war between Russia and Ukraine, many Ukrainian citizens want to flee their country

and come to America and work to make money to send back home to their families. Many of these refugees have backgrounds in different areas of work and have many skills," said McKenzie County Economic Development Director Daniel Stenberg, who is the contact person for McKenzie County and NDPC for this program. "Bakken GROW will provide humanitarian relief and good, high-paying jobs to hard working Ukrainians, while also filling jobs that are very much needed in the oil and gas industry."

Over 100,000 Ukranians have entered the United States for work since the war began, as they have either fulfilled their military obligation or have three or more children. Many of these individuals are meeting their visa requirements through the Uniting for Ukraine (U4U) Program, which allows for employment, but was formed primarily for humanitarian reasons. Most Ukranians can expect to be in the United States for two years through U4U and the Bakken GROW programs.

"The BAKKEN G NDPC will serve as an immigration liaison be-

tween its members and recruiting agencies and will begin by utilizing the U4U Program. Refugees will be matched with an NDPC member oil and natural gas company and will be employed right away after arriving in North Dakota," Stenberg explained.

While the NDPC will work to secure employment for these individuals,

sponsors are still needed to vouch for vetted refugees. Sponsors must be 18 years or older with an annual income of at least \$28,000. They will be responsible for meeting the U4U refugees once they arrive in the United States and transporting them to their initial housing and employment, helping them complete paperwork for a Social Security card and driver's license, making sure their health care services and medical needs are being met, and assisting with access to English as a second language class. A single individual can sponsor up to five Ukranians.
