

"Gifts From The **Heart**" Annual **Event To Be Held At Masonic** Temple In Sidney Sat., Dec. 9

Area volunteers will be holding the annual "Gifts from the Heart" event at the Masonic Temple, Sidney, on Saturday, Dec. 9 from 7 a.m.-noon. "Gifts from the Heart", formally Christmas Coalition, is a program set up for people who feel they can't afford Christmas for their children.

The community donated all brand-new and unopened items for attendees to come Christmas shop at no cost. Each child shopped for will receive a hat and mittens. Reusable bags are filled with everything a family would need for Christmas dinner; including a \$15 meat voucher from Reynolds for you to choose a turkey or ham. There are only two rules: the child or children (0-18) must live with the shopper, and they must live within Richland County. Jakkie Waller, "Gifts from the Heart" chairman said, "We don't have a lot of rules because we leave that to the Lord."

The community-oriented event has been going on for around 30 years and is put on by volunteers from many different parts of the community and walks of life. Waller said, "Our motto is 'From the community, for the community, back into the community". At the beginning of November, toy drops were set up at all four Sidney Edwards Jones offices, Jessica Cayko's Thrivent Financial office, MiMi's Kitchen, Meraki, Electricland, Rouge Ilc, MT Bare Cave, and Michele Herres' State Farm office. In Fairview, there were drops set up at Neu's SuperValu and Fairview Alliance Church. A.B.A.T.E. brings in toys and West Side Elementary, Sidney, also held a food drive for the event. The money for the meat vouchers was donated by an anonymous donor. Hat and mitten drives were done at all financial establishments in Fairview and Sidney. Area youth groups come in and volunteer to help set up, sort food, and whatever is needed, while three or four of the yearly volunteers have been doing it since the beginning. After the event, members of the Mormon Church come to help tear it down. Any baby items not claimed at the event will be donated to the Sunrise Women's Clinic, food goes to community members in need who were not able to attend, puzzles go to the Crestwood, the Boy's & Girls Clubs of the MonDak gets what they can use for school age kids, and the rest goes to the Salvation Army. Financial donations may still be given at Stockman Bank or by contacting Jakkie Waller at 406-480-9117 and new, unwrapped items may be dropped off at the Masonic Temple, Dec. 8, from noon-6 p.m.





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

SAR Exercise & Demonstration Held Last Weekend

Badlands Search & Rescue held a mock exercise in tandem with a search and rescue (SAR) demonstration for the McKenzie County Sheriff's Office on Saturday, Dec. 2, out of the Little Missouri National Grasslands Bennett Camparound.

In conjunction with the scenario of the mock exercise and demonstration, the command post was set up and operational on the night of Friday, Dec. 1.

Ten of the 18 members of Badlands SAR were on hand to showcase their abilities and make-up of the team. From the support squad that conducts all of the incident command and support functions to the team members that deploy as part of the ground search and sUAS roles.

The objective was twofold, to evaluate team performance during a mock mission and to allow the sheriff's office to observe, evaluate, and participate from their key roles of the agency having jurisdiction, incident command, and working in a unified effort between the agency and SAR team.

This was a first as well for both the mock scenario, full team deployment and also for the sheriff's office to partake and be there in their respective and vital roles.

NDCC 37-17.1-28 states that the chief law enforcement officer of each jurisdiction is to oversee search and rescue operations. But, aside from giving that broad authority, it does not require any training or readiness standards to respond to such incidents creating often hindered responses or efforts due to lack of personnel available, training, equipment, and overall comprehensive

knowledge of SAR-specific roles and practices.

Since 2018, Badlands SAR has worked to build an organization to help those agencies fill that critical gap that often negatively can impact the extremely important initial hours and days during a search incident. Data and statistics from all around the world agree on the first 24 hours of a missing person case to be the often-determining factor in a search becoming a rescue or a recovery.

Despite much hesitation and even push back when pursuing legislative

action to improve upon this area, Badlands SAR has continued to train, develop a team, work with agencies that are open to assistance, and deploy to several cases in North Dakota and Montana now, mostly due to family members pressuring agencies to do more and request adequate help for finding their loved ones but also with agencies becoming more open and willing to accept outside assistance.

While it may be seen as a negative connotation by some, it has never been the goal to remove authority or transfer it. The goal has simply been to realize this is a topic that needs improvement badly, as well as quickly, and that it can be achieved through unified efforts and cohesion between government public safety and nonprofit public safety organizations. It takes time to build and develop something of this magnitude and this exercise and demonstration held in McKenzie County is a first and a huge step in the right direction for these types of incidents and the goal is to foster a partnership to strengthen readiness and abilities in this complex domain.

On hand at the exercise were four members from the MCSO; Chief Deputy Michael Ficken, Patrol Lieutenant Max Matthews-Kasner, Patrol Sergeant Joshua

pated in the exercise. Each given a first-hand look at the SAR mapping system as well as a live feed from the command trailer of the aerial drone footage during the search

In tandem with this demonstration, the team was also performing an evaluation of its members. Badlands SAR has worked to adhere to standards set by the National Association for Search and Rescue (NASAR) as well as developing or borrowing policy, procedures, tactics, and techniques from other SAR teams as well as incorporating expert-developed methods in topics of search theory, lost person behavior, and vulnerable children and

adults. It is an immense amount of information to tie into a search team, but as the team has progressed and developed it is apparent that for the best outcomes possible, it is the only way to go in order to maximize the chances of success on real-world incidents.

Upon completion of the exercise, the after-action review took place around the campfire over grilled food and other fixings donated by CashWise, Bismarck. The participants conversed both in official capacity for the event but also socially in order to get to know one another. Now, it is up to see-

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


Miniature art is fine art with a centuries old history. The miniature art form traces its roots back to book paintings and illuminated manuscripts in the 3rd century. Techniques such as stippling, hatching and pointillism are sometimes only discovered under magnification. Miniature art today expands beyond portraits and embraces a wide variety of subject matter, media and techniques. Miniature art is extremely detailed work with exquisite color and strength of composition rivaling that of larger paintings. A compositional guide requires each piece be no more than 1/6th scale of the actual subject. A fine miniature piece can be magnified many times and still meet fine art standards. This demonstrates the great skill and discipline artists must have to work miniature. Miniature art, with its minimal space requirements and wider affordability, places original fine art within reach of art lovers and collectors. Nearly all of the artwork in this show is for sale and any piece would make a great gift.

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

Many Montanans have heard about Energy Share of Montana, but may not realize exactly what it does.

Director

Energy Share helps Montanans who are facing loss of heat or lights in their homes and who have no resources to pay the bill themselves. Assistance is situationally-based, not income-based. This means that even if someone has an income that is higher than normal poverty guidelines, if their situation is such that they're about to lose their heat or lights and they have no money in the bank to pay that bill, there is a good chance Energy Share can help them.

There are an endless variety of circumstances that can lead to the necessity of seeking help with a bill, but here are just a few examples of situations with which Energy Share helped last year:

 A single adult male was in the hospital for an extended period of time and fell behind on bills due to missed work. Although his energy provider was willing to work with him, it got to a point where he needed to pay the rest of the bill, but simply did not have the money to do so.

 The husband/father in a family with three children was injured on the job. His

wife had just started a new job and didn't yet have her first paycheck. While waiting to hear back from Workman's Comp, they ran very short on funds.

 Tragically, a single mother was diagnosed with severe health issues, has to be admitted to the hospital every two-three weeks, and is no longer able to work. She applied for disability and is waiting to go out of state for further medical care.

Last heating season, Energy Share helped 1,730 Montana families in situations such as this with an average of \$602 per home. While the number of families that were helped increased slightly from the previous year, the average assistance per family increased 40% from the year before. People are struggling financially! The great thing about living in Montana is that we help each other. Energy Share was able to assist these families last year because individuals and organizations donate to make that happen.

Montana's Human Resource Development Councils (HRDCs) are the best point of contact for people needing help with home energy bills. The HRDCs handle applications for Energy Share and LIHEAP (the federally-funded energy assistance program). Additionally, they are usually aware

Help For Your Home Energy Bill of other programs available in the community.

is hard to ask for help! If you know someone who really should be on the receiving end of Energy Share but is hesitant to ask, please come alongside them as they reach out for assistance. In Montana, neighbors help neighbors and that's what Energy Share is all about.

Community Enhancement Applications Due Dec. 15

Each year, the Williston City Commission and STAR Fund Advisory board allocate up to \$50,000 for nonprofit groups and organizations to fund activities and projects that improve the quality of life in and around the Williston area. Grant recipients in the past include: Upper Missouri District Health Unit Safe Seats Program, Maah Daah Hey Trail, Williston Sea Lions, Western North Dakota Honor Flight and many others.

The Community Enhancement Grant program is made possible through the Williston STAR Fund which was created to help provide financial support for economic and community development projects that create jobs. The funds are derived from a voter approved 1% city sales tax through June 30, 2030. Seventy-five percent of the collections benefit infrastructure needs and property tax relief while 25% assists projects that promote a vibrant and sustainable community. The deadline to apply is Friday, Dec.15, 2023 at 5 p.m. Applications may be emailed, mailed or delivered to Williston Economic Development. The STAR Fund Advisory Board will meet to evaluate the applications mid-January 2024.
