

Eastern Montana Democrats should support Brock in primary

It was to Sean Azzariti, a former Marine who spearheaded a "legalization" campaign because doctors in Colorado could not prescribe cannabis to treat PTSD, even though it works.

Now we live in a state where doctors can only prescribe the world's most prescribable drug 25 times before they must pay for a state investigation to see if they deserve to retain their license — which might make sense if we were talking about a drug that's actually addictive, like opioids.

We also live in a state featuring legislators that have no interest in representing those who've elected them. We need new roads, and the politicians hear us, but they accomplish nothing.

But Casey Brock is NOT getting my vote because he's pro pot. He's getting my vote because he is NOT a politician. Like my candidate Bernie Sanders, Casey Brock is an outsider. He's a Libertarian-leaning Independent at heart, with friends in the Legislature on both sides of the aisle, and that's how things are accomplished — through compromise.

I don't agree with Casey Brock on much, but I can argue with Casey Brock about everything and NEVER hear a lie, and I ALWAYS know he will do right by the voters and Veterans of Montana. And if Eastern Montana Democrats want to hedge their bets, they'll vote for Casey Brock on June 7, too.

BNSF Railway Trims Freight Rates

BNSF Railway, Montana's primary freight carrier, has announced a decrease in its tariff rates for shipments of wheat in the Northern states. BNSF's Vice-President of Ag Products, John Miller discussed the reduction of wheat rates by \$100 per car with a meeting of farm group leaders in Great Falls on Wednesday. Miller indicated that this rate reduction is market-based, and should help move burdensome stocks of wheat to export markets, as well as to domestic customers. Recent reductions in fuel costs, plus lower export volumes, were factors in the action by BNSF. Miller also noted that pulse rates are lowered by \$75 per car.

Montana Grain Growers Association (MGGA) and Montana Farm Bureau Federation (MFBF) have a long-standing agreement with BNSF to collaboratively find solutions to freight issues surrounding Montana grain shipments. This agreement, beginning in 2005, has brought Montana rail freight rates in line with those in other states where freight competition is more robust. "Montana and the United States have had a difficult time moving the 2015 wheat crop," said MGGA president Rob Davis, a grain producer from Larslan, MT. "The world is in a wheat surplus situation, and the US dollar is very strong. These two factors have combined to create slow exports for our crop."

Miller indicated that the \$100 per railcar reduction is scheduled to remain in place through August 1. MFBF president Bob Hanson of White Sulphur Springs commented on what the reduction means for wheat producers. "Movement of our grain stocks is important," said Hanson, "but a lower freight cost is also good for the balance sheets of our grain producers, who are facing wheat prices below the cost of production, and are very concerned about all their input costs."

Wheat prices have been in the \$4 per bushel range for several months, while costs of production for most farmers are above \$5. **MNAXLP**

Candidate Forum 2016 Held March 22 in Sidney

Tues., March 22, marked the 2016 Candidate Forum held in Sidney, MT at the Elks Lodge. Patrick Hackley MC'd the event and was in charge of asking candidates questions from the public. Chase Kilzer with Culbertson FFA Chapter led pledge of allegiance and gathered questions from the audience for the present candidates:

Shane Gorder - Running unopposed for re-election county commissioner. "There has been a lot of change and a lot of growth in our community and our staff." When asked what a potential challenge might be in his position, he said that things were slowing down but would like to keep all 180 Richland County employees. To avoid layoffs, they would reduce travelling costs.

Janice Klempel - Running unopposed for Clerk of District Court. Agrees with Gorder that staffing could be an issue, but wanted the public to know, "We are just as busy as before the oil downturn, if not busier. Our solution to keep all jobs intact is to reduce travelling costs."

Scott Staffanson - Running for House District 35. When it came to funding towns, Staffanson stated that the last thing he wanted to do was raise taxes. Abortion was brought up at the forum and Staffanson stated, "I am pro-life all the way. I do believe, however, a minor should not be allowed to get an abortion without a parent or guardian present." Staffanson also believes that more federal land should become state land and says that the federal government needs to stop taking private land. When discussing how his platform would benefit the public, he said that he supports local counties in schools, and believes in freedom and less government.

Chris Trumpower - Democratic candidate for House District 35. absent.

Joel Krautter - Running for House District 35. Joel Krautter's largest goal for candidacy is an infrastructure package that is long overdue. When asked about funding for towns, Krautter stated, "The state has a \$5 billion budget, and tax is already at it's highest and I do not believe in sales tax. I would like to look at our current budget and make our state government more self-sustaining." Krautter also wanted the public to know that he is always available to talk and to hear concerns and ideas. He is very responsive and believes that talking to the public is a key to success. Krautter's ideas for new infrastructure success is to look at the budget, delve into bonding, and build coalitions. Krautter's platform benefit for candidacy is that he would focus on issues and needs in the state, bring infrastructure, work with agriculture and be a voice for the veterans. When asked about land in the state of Montana, Krautter stated, "Federal land is mismanaged and needs to be in better management. I fully support public land." Krautter is also pro-life and is a full supporter of a culture of life.

Casey Lee Brock - Running for state senate. Brock lobbies on his own dime and enjoys his work; he believes that public service involves going up and bringing the voice for the people. He fully supports bringing in more infrastructure and would like to build up towns' economies so that they can be more self-sustaining without government help. When it comes to charter schools, Brock believes that parents should have more choice into what their children are being taught. Brock shared a personal story of walking with his young daughter through the store and she was pointing out sexual protection items; he believed that at her young age, he didn't want his daughter knowing what those items were. When he confronted the school, the response was, "We do not have to ask you what we educate your children." Brock would like to change that. Casey Lee Brock is against abortion, but would also like the public to know that he is a voice for the people. He does not want his personal beliefs to interfere with politics and that he is not running for himself, but for the people. Brock's platform also consists of fixing welfare because he believes it is a bloated system and that people misuse it. He would like to rebuild Montana's welfare and believes families on welfare should be checked on regularly until they are able to handle themselves

without government help. Brock would also like to legalize hemp farming and already has several ideas he would like to share with the public.

Steve Hinebauch - Running for state senate. 5th generation farmer was stated many times. When asked about funding for towns, Hinebauch stated, "We do not need anymore government." Hinebauch is in favor of charter schools and believes in competition in education. He would like the public to know that he has never voted democratic and is a full-time cowboy. Hinebauch is against abortion and believes every life deserves a pursuit of happiness. Steve Hinebauch also believes that the state needs more control over federal land because it's a lot easier to go to Helena, MT if there's an issue than it is to go to Washington D.C.

Bret Smelser - Running for state senate. Served 22 years being the mayor of Sidney, MT and is a fiscal conservative. Smelser is pro-life for creation is a blessing and a full-time supporter of the second ammendment. He believes that charter schools are excellent, though he would like to make Montana schools even more efficient. When asked about funding for towns, Smelser stated that he would like to bring a general fund for funding. Bret Smelser's platform benefit for candidacy is to provide help to cities and towns that have been negleted for the past years.

Kristen Juras - Running for Montana Supreme Court Justice. She is running non-partisan and has been involved with agriculture for just over 30 years. She teaches Ag Law currently at the University of Montana. If elected, Juras would insure that the court would indeed act like a court and that currently it is creating leg-

islatures that aren't in its place to make. "Currently our court is ranked the worst, I would like to bring in my experience in agriculture, law and business to improve Montana's court." Juras would like to improve the business climate and her platform benefit for candidacy is that she will bring in her MT agricultural experience to the

Dirk Sandefur - Running for Montana Supreme Court Justice, absent.

Eric Mills - Running for Montana Supreme Court Justice, last minute candidate, absent.

Matt Rosendale - Current senator for Dawson, Wibaux and Richland counties. Will be running this year for state auditor. Matt Rosendale, if elected, stated, "I would eliminate ObamaCare. I would fill it with choices and bring in more out of state insurance options to lower costs of insurance in Montana by creating competition." When it comes to public land in Montana, Rosendale stated that land is being mis-managed and that the state needs to be in more control of federal lands.

The Montana Primary will be held June 7th and the General Election will be on November 8th, 2016. Further debates and forums are to be announced.



Calving Season: Winter

calving in North Dakota this year seems to feel more like spring calving and may get ranchers questioning their calving season strategy. Winter calving (January – March) has and is the choice for most seed stock operations and for many smaller - moderate sized diversified operations. Breeders want big, well developed yearling bulls to feature in their winter spring production sales which will have maturity for greater summer breeding. Some operations with considerable spring farming work load, want calving completed while they can devote considerable attention to the herd and not be distracted or take time away from farming operations later. They also realize the ability to sell heavier feeder calves off the cow at the close of the grazing season in October – November to be a high value marketing strategy.

To calve at this time of the year you have to be prepared with infrastructure and facilities. For close observation the herd needs to be confined and fed in a lot or small paddock. When weather is tough; heavies should be in bedded barns or brought into calving pens as they go into labor and held for several days till calves are a few days old. Generally life is easier and it is a healthy situation for calves if the ground stays frozen and bedded vs later in March when warmer temperatures and precipitation

create slop and mud. Cows which calve well ahead of spring grass need to be fed rations that support lactation which require considerably greater feed quality or supplementations. This is usually significantly more expensive than feeding a gestating cow contributing to greater wintering costs for early calving.

For the most part cattlemen will calf when they can make it work for their situation. There is no one most profitable time to calf. Early calves need to offset greater costs with high calf valve and late calvers need to control costs to offset lighter calf weights. Profitable ranching is about balancing cattle type and genetics, feed resources, operational conflicts, and personal goals and philosophies. This information was gathered from John Dhuyvetter, NDSU Area Livestock Specialist.

Over \$1.6 Million **Awarded To Combat** Noxious Weeds In MT

Every county and tribal reservation is eligible for \$7,500 in funds Submitted by MT Dept. Of Agriculture

Helena, Mont. - The Montana Department of Agriculture announced the award of over \$1.6 million for the development and implementation of noxious weed management programs.

The Noxious Weed Management Advisory Council reviewed 86 Noxious Weed Trust Fund grant applications requesting over \$2 million and recommended

Dyer's Woad awarding over \$1.6 million for education, research, and cooperative noxious weed management

projects. The advisory council met the first week of March to review applications and make selections to assist counties, local communities, tribes, researchers and educators in efforts to combat noxious weed problems in Montana. In total, 83 grant proposals were awarded funding, including 60 local cooperative projects. 13 research projects, and 10 education projects. In addition to the \$1.6 million awarded, each of the 56 counties and 7 reservations in the state are eligible to receive \$7,500 per year.

The Montana Noxious Weed Trust Fund grant program was established by the Montana Legislature in 1985. The advisory council reviews applications, hears applicant testimony, and provides funding recommendations to the director for final approval. Funding is typically passed through a governmental organization, local weed district, conservation district, extension office, or university.

Researchers To Survey Communities On Local Community Benefits And Costs Of Oil And Gas Development

BOZEMAN - Researchers will be using a mailed survey in Richland County, Montana, and McKenzie County, North 'Dakota, to collect data to better understand the local commu-'nity benefits and costs of oil and gas development. The survey asks businesses and landowners about how recent oil activity affected their businesses and farm and ranch operations. The post-boom timing of this study makes it notable as little hard data exists about communities after peak drilling activity, according to Julia Hobson Haggerty, project director and assistant professor of geography at Montana State University.

The project is made possible through a grant from the United States Department of Agriculture-National Institute of Food and Agriculture (USDA-NIFA). It is not related to other survey research underway at MSU.

Survey areas include the Marcellus shale play in Pennsylvania, the Bakken oil field in North Dakota and Montana, and the Powder River Basin in Wyoming. A four-state team from Pennsylvania State University, Cornell University, MSU and the

University of Wyoming is collaborating on the project. "While researchers flock to boom towns during oil and gas activity, there are very few investigations of local economies after the rush," said Hobson Haggerty. "The results will give us information at the local level about how businesses and landowners experience oil and gas development over the long term."

Surveys will be sent via regular mail in March to randomly selected residences and businesses in each of the areas. Data collected will be anonymous, and no names or addresses will




