National Guard Helps SHC Combat COVID-19

The Montana National Guard started helping the Sidney Health Center (SHC) combat COVID-19 on Saturday, Oct. 2. Montana Governor Greg Gianforte sent out four Montana National Guardsmen to assist the Environmental Services Department at Extended Care and the Hospital.

During September, SHC has experienced a rapid increase in COVID-19 related cases, ranging from three to seven COVID-19 inpatients daily.

"As a result, our hospital census has averaged 18 inpatients per day, which is running at or near capacity for Med/Surg and ICU areas," noted Pam McGlothlin, SHC Nursing Services Senior Executive.

SHC is a critical access hospital, which means we are licensed for 25 inpatients (Med/Surg – 16 beds, ICU – 3 beds, and Maternity – 6 beds). When the census runs near capacity, SHC must evaluate what services they can continue to offer such as elective inpatient surgeries.

SHC needed the guardsmen not only because of the rising cases of COVID-19, but also because the Environmental Services department has been running short-staffed due to sick leave, family obligations, and unfilled open positions.

With the help of the National Guard, SHC has additional resources that allow the Center to continue to provide a clean, safe environment for patients, residents, and staff. Their assistance supports the clinical staff by cleaning areas so that patient flow



continues in the clinic, ER, and hospital settings.

Cleanliness of the environment is one the components of the national hospital inpatient survey that is measured by CMS (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services) regarding quality and perception of patient care.

"A clean, safe environment mitigates the spread of infectious disease and keeps patients, residents and staff healthy," added McGlothlin. The governor's office

will continue to provide resources to hospitals to help them secure necessary staffing and collaborate with hospitals to help address certain needs.

Sidney Health Center expressed that they are

thankful that the state is deploying the National Guard to help assist healthcare workers as COVID-19 cases continue to rise and impact access to medical care in rural areas.

On Wednesday, Sept. 29 McKenzie County community members gathered at the new fairgrounds construction site to celebrate the new Ag Expo.

The event featured remarks from building committee members Tim Jorgenson, Howdy Lawlar, and Chris Kubal - all of whom were instrumental in getting this project off the ground.

The celebration was designed to showcase the 2+ years of hard work by

the building committee, design and construction team, the McKenzie County Fair Board, and McKenzie County to move forward in the process of making this building a reality.

"We were very excited to have the opportunity to talk more about the project and to thank the people who have played a large role in making the project happen," said Emily Huso, ICON Architects Marketing

Coordinator.
This new building will be

a big improvement from the previous fairground location and buildings. Huso added, "The current fairgrounds is undersized, dated, and does not accommodate the growth of McKenzie County."

The new location will have 212 acres of land and a 112,000 square foot building that will provide more space and accessibility for fairgoers and events.

It will include an exhibition hall for various recreational and social events such as trade shows and

conferences, as well as private events such as weddings or corporate events. The livestock pavilion will hold shows, cattle ties, sheep and hog pens, and up to 200 horse stalls. An outdoor arena will be onsite and available to host rodeo shows as well as expanded equestrian and roping events throughout the year.

The all-season building will accommodate students and other user groups such as 4-H, FFA, Rodeo Association and their events.

shows, educational activities, among other opportunities.

Huso said, "The building will provide the next generation an agriculture-focused space of their own; an investment in the future of agriculture in the McKenzie County region."

The project is expected to be completed by the spring of 2023.



Environmental Impact Statement Completed For Fort Peck Dam

Review period will end on Oct. 25. Flows may drastically impact local irrigators.

Fort Peck, MT - The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Omaha District has publicly made available the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for test releases from Fort Peck Dam. MT.

The purpose of the EIS is to assess the capacity of test flows from the Fort Peck Dam to promote the growth and survival of the pallid sturgeon, a fish species listed as

endangered under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. The EIS describes the formulation of alternative plans, presents analyses of predicted benefits and environmental impacts; identifies a preferred alternative, discusses uncertainties, and considerations for implementation.

The draft EIS was released in March 2021 and included a 60-day public comment period that ended on May 25, 2021. During that time, USACE received approximately 360 comments through virtual public meetings and written correspondence. Comments were received from members of the public, businesses, non-governmental organizations, federal, state, and local governments, as well as from tribal governments. All comments were considered in preparation of the final EIS.

The final EIS has been filed with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), who will have posted the Notice of Availability in the Federal Register on Sept. 24. The review period will end on Oct. 25.

The release of the final EIS does not constitute a decision. Thirty days following the EPA's Federal Register notice of the EIS filing, USACE may issue a Record of Decision to select an alternative for implementation and other commitments.



include Katherine Bidegaray and Synnevah Meldahl.





When asked what one food item reminds you of fall, what would you say? It's easy to imagine the vast majority of folks would say pumpkin, pumpkin spice, or some other variation of this fall favorite. Besides being just a symbol of the season, pumpkins also are a nutrient-dense, low-calorie food.

Pumpkin has about 50 calories, 1.8 grams of protein, 12 grams of carbohydrates, and 2.7 grams of dietary fiber according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Pumpkins are also full of vitamins and minerals like beta carotene. Beta carotene is what gives a pumpkin its vibrant orange color. Our bodies convert beta carotene into vitamin A and eating foods with high volumes of beta carotene supports immune health, vision, and cell growth, according to the National Institutes of Health.


Because pumpkin is so nutrient-rich, there is a wide array of health benefits we can take advantage of by consuming pumpkin. From reducing the risk of developing certain types of cancer, offering protection against asthma and heart disease, decreasing the risk of age-related macular degeneration, to combatting fertility issues, pumpkin offers many health benefits to its consumer.

So, how do you choose that perfect pumpkin? Depends on what you plan on doing with it. The big, orange ones are the best choice for carving, but you're not going to want to eat those. For eating, look for smaller, sweeter pumpkins labeled "sugar" or "pie". When choosing the right pumpkin, avoid ones with dried-out stems, blemishes, bruises, or soft spots. An alternative to fresh pumpkin would be canned pumpkin puree from the grocery







Virtual Open Houses Scheduled To Discuss Potential Changes To Hunting Regulations

By Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks

FWP regional staff will hold virtual meetings across the state to discuss potential hunting regulation changes for 2022 and 2023.

These meetings will be held via Zoom and allow the public to hear directly from FWP staff and ask questions about the proposed changes.

The potential hunting regulation changes are available online for the public to review. The potential changes are coming now during the normal biennial season setting year to help make Montana's hunting regulations simpler and easier to understand.

Over the last several weeks, FWP biologists have worked on these potential changes with a sharp focus on the science behind the regulations. The potential

changes focus primarily on deer and elk regulations; some regions have included regulations for other species as well. The potential changes include a reduction in the number of hunting districts (i.e., making them larger) and simplification of license structures.

Public comment will be taken through Oct. 20. Virtual open houses are scheduled as follows and will run from 6-8 p.m. with the exception noted below:

Zoom sign-in information will be posted on the FWP website closer to the meeting date.

After Oct. 20, FWP biologists and other staff will sort through the public feedback collected and develop proposals for all game species for the Fish and Wildlife Commission meeting on Dec. 14. Following this meeting, a second 30-day public comment opportunity will begin on the commission-approved proposals for all hunting regulations for the 2022 and 2023 seasons. This public comment period will also include regional FWP Citizen Advisory Council meetings.

The commission will adopt final hunting regulations at their meeting in early February.

Drought Hinders Harvest For Area Farmers

This year in McKenzie County harvest was "a little tough" for producers. One of the driest years to date in 127 years with soil moisture low and poor crop conditions.

"Several crops were turned into forage for livestock because there was not enough of the crop to make any kind of desirable yield. Seed heads only filled part way before curing off and most small grain crops – aside from corn-had very low yields. Wheat was around the 5-to-15-bushel rate. That's highly variable, but that's the truth," said Devan Leo, McKenzie County Agricultural and Natural Resource Agent.

Many of the crops that

were turned into forage for livestock were tested through NDSU Vet Diagnostic lab to ensure the nitrate levels were lower in the forages. Leo explained that many tested "ok." "Most crop fields have a test strip left in them for insurance claims. Soybeans are not insured at this time and the dryland crops were in pretty tough

shape." The drought this year has been exceptionally hard on farmers in the area. It has been devastating across the board, with not enough moisture to sustain crops to create a desirable crop yield. Leo said that insurance is going to play a pivotal role in success or failure for many crop farmers this year.

She suggests crop rota-

tion in crop fields; greater diversity in crop rotations can boost crop production over time, despite conditions of drought or excess moisture.

In addition to this she cautions producers that are shipping in hay from other states or different parts of North Dakota need to be cautious about where the feed source is coming from.

Leo said, "We may temporarily fix our feed shortage, but in turn, cause a permanent debilitating weed problem on our property. Palmer amaranth and water hemp are two that I can think of that may make it onto our properties here in a bale of forage. Please be diligent and cautious when shipping in feedstuffs."

Ribbon Cutting & Grand Reopening Of Sidney-Richland County Library Oct. 25

The Sidney-Richland County Library will be celebrating its newly renovated space with a ribbon cutting on Wednesday, Oct. 20 at 2:45 p.m., followed by an open house from 3-6 p.m.

The open house gives the public a chance to see the space and visit with library staff about current programs and services.

"We love our library, and we are proud of the space we have," said SRCL Director Kelly Reisig

The library went through renovations on the outside, downstairs, the main area,

and the inside upper level. A new parking area was created behind the library along with new landscaping and pavement.

The downstairs is an entirely renovated area that added over 5,000 square feet to the library space. It includes a new children's area for story time and books, a new library-dedicated small program/class space, and a new office for the Learning Volunteers for Adults Program (LVA).

The main area of the library includes new restrooms, new circulation area, new computer stations, and additional seating areas. The upper level now has a new Montana History Room, teen area, and shelves for large type, adult fiction, and nonfiction materials.

Reisig explained that the biggest catalyst for the improvements was the absolute need for space in every area of the library.

She said, "Our maintenance person had no storage or floor drains for cleaning. Although we had a basement, it needed improvement and had no access for those that were unable to use stairs. The demand for the library's collection continues to be high and our ability to fulfill that need was greatly diminished because of our limited capacity to add to the collection. Finally, we also needed space for programs. Our weekly story time, for example, was held upstairs. In order to prepare we had to move all of the tables, push library shelving out of the way (which meant that during the program parts of the collection were not accessible). Even with those changes, we would find that the space could not accommodate the number

She is most excited about the accomplishment of making the renovation possible. "A public library is a result of the dedication of the community, the Library Board of Trustees, and the staff. As a city-county library we also are fortunate to enjoy the support from both the City of Sidney and Richland County Commissioners. Most libraries have capital improvements as a result of a bond referendum that, if passed by the voters, ultimately increases the taxes in a community. We didn't have to do that

because Richland County Commissioners believed in the library and wanted to make those improvements without passing on that tax burden to the taxpayer. It's rare, often overlooked, and is a great example of what makes living in this county so special."

The library has partnerships throughout the community to enhance services and education. This new space enhances its collection, programs, and services in a myriad of ways that will make Richland County a better place.


