Moore and Williams will be playing the main concert on Saturday, Aug. 5 at 7 p.m. Early bird tickets are \$60 for reserved seats and \$55 for general seating. The week of the fair, prices go up to \$65 for reserved seats and \$60 for general seating.

The PRCA rodeo will again be presented by Brookman Rodeo, LLC, a locally owned stock company. They have been providing the livestock for Richland County's Rodeo since 2009. Thursday will be Heroes Night, sponsored by Kraken Resources. Friday is Tough Enough to Wear Pink night, sponsored by Mid-Rivers Communications, Duane and Sherry Mitchell, Sidney Health Center Cancer Care, White Claw, and Prairie Electric. Early bird tickets are \$15 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. The week of the fair adult tickets go up to \$17.

This year for the first time at the Richland County Fair and Rodeo, the 406FMX Freestyle Motocross Team will be performing Wednesday at 7 p.m. in the main arena. The team is multinational with one member from Australia, another from Chile, and one from Butte.

North Star Amusements will be the carnival this year again. They originate in Bridger, MT, and travel throughout Montana, Wyoming, and North Dakota during the spring and summer. In the fall and winter, they go down to Arizona. They are offering prepaid wristbands for unlimited rides per day for \$30 each while supplies last.

There is much, much more to see and do at the

fair, with food, vendors, exhibits, and free entertainment there is sure to never be a dull moment.

The event will be hosted Wednesday, Oct. 4 at Russell and Jill Thiessen's ranch located 8½ miles south of Lambert and 16 miles west of Crane.

Registration begins at 9 a.m. with speakers lined up to start their presentations at 9:30 a.m. Mark Voll, Zoetis Animal Health, will be speaking about biosecurity threats and calf health at weaning. Dr. Chad Zehnder, Purina Animal Nutrition, will be discussing fetal development and emerging technologies for weaning calves. Dr. Chris Zellmer, Diamond V will present weaning management tips and rumen health and Jon Scofield, Zinpro, will talk about lameness in cattle and the role of trace minerals.

Tri-tip sandwiches will be served at 12:30 p.m., and there will be time that afternoon for questions and observations of cattle on display. Dinner will wrap up the event at 6:30 p.m., with brisket on the menu. Beef and sides are courtesy of Russell and Jill Thiessen.

"I trim sale bulls in the winter and that was how I connected with Russell. We started talking about feed and one thing turned into another discussing a possible field day," said Purina Livestock Production Specialist Austin Buzanowski, Glendive. "We thought it would be a great way to showcase their operation, the feed program, and the partnership between us."

The Badlands Cattle Conference will provide valuable information to those in the industry. They are hopeful that attendees will take home new ideas to apply to their operation. It will additionally serve as an opportunity to network with other cattlemen from the area.

"Our main goal is to provide a lot of worthwhile knowledge. The cattle market is great and feed should be plentiful this fall, so it is a good time to invest in areas that have not been focused on before," Buzanowski explained.

In 2020, Salina and her husband, Michael, Hagwood decided they needed to start a small business. With a little time in the kitchen, some equipment, and a few contacts and Montana Cow Pies was born.

They started Sugar Rush as a hobby in a cabin that Hagwoods had put on their property in Richey, MT, in 2013. They moved to Sidney in 2014 and Salma started an ice cream truck to teach her kids how to run a small business and bring some nostalgia to Sidney. During that time people kept asking her for baked goods, so it transitioned back into Sugar Rush Bakery and the van was used for delivering. They moved into the mall in 2016 but moved out in 2018. She restarted the busi-

She restarted the business under Montana Cow Pie in 2020 as a delivery business. It grew to a wholesale along with retail business and the local grocery and retail stores have caught on. Now Montana Cow Pies are sold in multiple places around Sidney.

In November 2022, Salina decided she wanted to expand. She had gone into it planning to sell shoes as well as the pies but things changed as time went on. She moved into the section of the Village Square Mall in May 2023 that was once ElectricLand and later, Top Gun Shooting. Now, she had all this room. She said, "The place was sitting empty and people were complaining

that there's no mid-priced clothing in town. It just kind of happened." They changed the name and today, Montana Cow Pies Bakery and Dry Goods offer clothing, shoes, coffee house style drinks, and ice cream as well as the cow pies. She said, "I would rather benefit by helping the community instead of benefitting by being selfish." She plans on possibly expanding even more in the future.



## **Miller Takes Reins At Boys & Girls Club Of Richland County**





Elaine is a kind, selfless leader that always puts the needs of others before her



Boys & Girls Club of Richland County is excited to announce that the Club has been awarded a five-year 21st CCLC grant to assist with improving academic achievement for our members. One of the requirements of this federal grant is that Club families will not be charged any fees for after-school or summer programming. In addition, we will be providing free transportation from West Side to Central using the BGC bus. As a component of this grant funding, we will be working directly with staff and administration at West Side school to provide academic support for those students we share. We will continue to charge for our special K1 program as it is not part of the grant funding.

This grant will cover approximately 20% of our yearly programming expenses for the five-year duration.

The additional 80% of the required funds will need to be raised annually by the Club through donations, other grants, and fundraisers, so we will continue to need support from our Club families and the community. There appears to be a common misconception that Boys & Girls Clubs of America provides financial support for local Clubs. That is not the case; in fact, our Club pays BGCA over \$5,000/year in membership fees for the use of their brand and the other non-financial supports provided to the Club.

We are proud of the programs we provide. These programs include after-school and full-day Friday programs during the school year and full-day summer camps. These programs focus on academic achievement, healthy lifestyles, character and citizenship, and leadership development. We also have a half-day program Monday-Thursday for K1 students who attend kindergarten in the morning and come to the Club in the afternoon. The Club also provides a wide variety of community outreach programs including weekly food backpacks for Richland County students living in food insecurity, free food and produce boxes, free winter outerwear, and free school supplies. ## Rasmussen Gains Hands-On Experience Through Internship Program

MSU-Bozeman student Alex Rasmussen has had a busy summer completing his internship through the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC), the Montana Rangeland Resources Committee and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). According to the DNRC, the internship is designed to offer beginning agriculturalists, natural resource and range specialists, biologists, soils majors or any student looking into natural resources the real-world and hands-on experience implementing the educational tools already gained to a ranching operation. Interns spend two weeks at each of six host/ mentor's ranch operations. Rasmussen started the summer at a ranch in Boulder, then made it to Big Timber in time to help with lambing as well as cattle. Fencing was on the agenda on a ranch at Ekalaka where he helped rip out two miles of barbed wire fencing and put in four miles of electric fence. The next stop was a ranch in Ryegate.

Since July 17, Rasmussen has been a welcome asset at the busy Dick and Connie Iversen ranch south of Culbertson. He has gained experience in rotational grazing as he moved cattle, has stacked bales, done some fencing, put out salt and minerals, and even helped with two major events the Iversens

hosted during the week.

Rasmussen is from the Portland, OR, area and has always loved the outdoors. Although he had no ag experience, and without knowing exactly what his career path may be, he chose to attend MSU Bozeman, where he felt the programs offered would provide a good way to not sit in an office. He will graduate next year with a degree in natural resource and rangeland ecology, giving him multiple state and federal employment options, as well as potential jobs in the private sector.

Rasmussen is truly enjoying his internship saying his favorite part has been the constant learning opportunities. "I don't do well in a classroom but I love to learn," he explained. "Every place I've been has provided chances for new experiences and learning the handson way." With only limited experience on a tractor, learning to run equipment has been fun. Some of the work has been from horseback, which he was already proficient at, but most has been with 4 wheelers and side by sides. He has gained experience with skid steers and other ranch equipment as he visited each place. "I love most, but not all, things mechanical," he said.

Rasmussen is looking forward to getting back to school and putting what he has learned to use. "This will bring a lot more meaning to what I'm learning in the

classroom," he stated.

Iversens have had a very gratifying experience hosting the students, stating "It has been a fun experience to be part of the Working Lands Internship program. We have had the opportunity to mentor agricultural students and give them a hands-on view of a working ranching operation. At first the idea of having a person you have never met move in and be part of the family for several weeks is kind of daunting but the young college students we have had have been nothing but delightful. Most have had very little experience on a ranch and our job is to give them the opportunity to see the inner workings of agriculture they don't get sitting in a classroom. Our hope is this will help them be more informed about agriculture and make their job easier if they work in the ag field. Rasmussen is the 6th student we have hosted over a period of five years, the first year we hosted two students in the same summer All of the students we have had the pleasure of hosting have become lifelong friends and some have even returned to visit and help with chores when we needed some extra help. We have been asked to be references to jobs they applied to as well as giving supporting information for their projects. It has been a very satisfying experience that we hope to repeat in the future."



# Montana FWP "Kids To Fish" Program Allows Anglers To Borrow Gear & Tackle For Free

Over 40 rod loaner sites, and 350 rods, can be found in northeast Montana

Glasgow – A popular Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks Region 6 program that allows kids and their friends or families to check out free fishing rods and tackle is in full swing again this year.

In time for summer fishing, FWP staff has restocked and maintained over 350 fishing rods in most of the 41 different location sites across Montana's Hi-Line. The "Kids to Fish" program lets anglers check out fishing rods and reels equipped with basic tackle, such as hooks, bobbers, and sinkers. Typically, eight rods are at each location, and some places have a tackle box available to borrow/use the available tackle.

Marc Kloker, FWP Region 6 Communication and Education Program Manager, manages the program.

"Although it takes quite a bit of time and effort to maintain, replace, and travel around to all the loaner locations, it's worth it if it gets someone out fishing who wouldn't otherwise have the opportunity," said Kloker.

"Just because someone doesn't have a fishing rod doesn't mean they shouldn't be able to go fishing," adds administrative assistant Ken Jansa, who handled most of the 'rod-run' duties the last

three years. "Whether it's a cousin in town that wants to go along and needs a rod, or an extra pole is needed for catfishing on the Milk River or chasing walleye on Fort Peck, we want as many kids as possible to get out, fish, and enjoy themselves."

FWP appreciates the businesses and other locations that display a rack of these fishing rods, and they are the reason the program has been so successful.

"The many business owners and organizations who participate in the program deserve special thanks," said Kloker. "They're helping a lot of kids have fun on the water this summer."

The sturdy loaner rods come already rigged with a bobbers, split-shot, and hook, and should be ready to go. Anglers can then change the rigging however they want to target their desired species.

Anglers are expected to sign out the equipment at the site and return it in good working order, if possible. Kloker reminds folks that these rods are to be brought

back to the loaner location, even if damaged or with broken line. "We really want these poles brought back to their location sites," says Kloker. "The next kid that comes along should also have a chance to fish."

If poles are continually lost or stolen, the program will need to make the necessary changes and location sites may be removed. In addition, some sites that haven't seen much use have had their poles removed and taken elsewhere with more opportunities.

These fishing rods are also available to be checked out from the outlets by individuals, families, organizations, youth groups and schools. If anyone is looking to check out a large number of rods (over 20) for a particular event, please contact either the Glasgow or Havre FWP offices and they will get you set up. If there are any questions about the program or if you are interested in having poles available at other locations in your community, please contact Kloker at 406-228-3704.



#### How to Report Boat Accidents in North Dakota

By ND Fish & Game Dept.


Regardless of how safe and cautious boaters are on the water, accidents happen. If a boating accident involves injury, death or disappearance of a person, an accident report must be completed and sent to the North Dakota Game and Fish Department within 48 hours of the occurrence.

If property damage exceeds \$2,000, but no deaths or injuries occur, a boat operator has five days to file a report.

These reporting requirements are mandatory whether

there is one or more boats involved.

A boat accident form is available on the Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov, at any Game and Fish office or by contacting a local game warden.

## **Rosberg Presents: Building A Character-Based** Athletic Program Aug. 7 at Sidney High School

On Monday, Aug. 7 at the Sidney High School, Sidney, MT, Scott Rosberg will present "Building a Character-Based Athletic Program". This program will include "The Responsibilities of Coaching" from 4-5 p.m., "Life Lessons for Athletes" from 5:15-6:15 p.m., and "The Role of Parents in Athletics" from 7:30-8:30 p.m.

The Responsibilities of Coaching (Coaches):

Coaches have a variety of responsibilities when they take on the role of coach. They have responsibilities to their players, their fellow

coaches, their standards, the profession of coaching, and much more. This presentation explores those responsibilities and the importance of coaches taking their responsibilities seriously, so that they can provide kids the opportunity for a positive athletic experience.

Life Lessons for Athletes (Athletes & Coaches)

Have standards, not rules. The clearer behavioral standards are defined, the better chance athletes will rise to them. In order for individual athletes and teams to reach their potential, they must have clearly identified expectations for team behaviors. So often

we focus on someone being an athlete based on physical talents, while overlooking less than best effort and poor attitudes. This presentation re-defines the term "athlete" in more than just physical terms by describing the importance of athletes displaying the following types of behavioral characteristics: Discipline, Teachable Spirit, Mental Toughness, Selflessness, Integrity.

The Role of Parents in Athletics (Parents, Athletes, & Coaches)

This is a straightforward message from athletes to their parents about how parents can help their athletic performance, create good memories, and demonstrate respect from the perspective of young people. The presentation is broken into the sections "Before, during, and after the game." Key concepts included are encouraging healthy risk-taking through sport, releasing your child to the game, red flags for if you have not released him/her, how to watch your child's games, proper behavior at games to help model poise & confidence, and post-game behaviors that will help your child keep his/her perspective and bounce back ready to go for the next game/ practice.

About the Speaker:

Scott Rosberg, Proactive Coaching & SlamDunk Suc-

Rosberg has been a coach at the high school/ middle school levels for 40 years, an English teacher for 21 years, and an athletic director for 12 years. He has published numerous books on coaching and youth/ school athletics, two books of inspirational messages and quotes for graduates, and a fiction series of stories for athletes and coaches. 
